
MAP OF WAYNE COUNTY IN 1800 SHOWING THE

WAYNE COUNTY SCHOOLS

During the early 1940's the consolidation of Wayne County's High School and most of the outlying schools was completed. The new central high school building (now referred to as the A.J. Lloyd Middle School) became part of a Works Progress Administration (WPA) program, after making the rather controversial decision of where, to erect the handsome building made of native sandstone. The building was situated on all Hwy. 90 adjacent to Monticello where water would be made available from the new water works, also being put in with the help of WPA. A sandstone building at Rocky Branch was also built.

Once consolidation was in place, Arthur J. Lloyd, principal of the Windy High School, became principal of the Wayne County High School, where he worked for 31 years, up until the high school was moved on the north side of Hwy. 90 amongst a complex of school buildings.

George Upchurch 1757-1830 settled in Wayne County, KY about 1810 and still has huge numbers of descendants in the area. I am not descended from George but embrace him as one of 22 Upchurch Clans. I write to you to see if you can help us on a coordination problem.

Melva Upchurch Henninger ,who is from Wayne County originally, and I have long been collaborators. Recently we discussed how desirable it would be to have someone on the ground in Wayne County that could help us elevate the Upchurch family profile in Wayne County and especially in the Museum. Perhaps you would be such a person or perhaps you could help us find someone. It would be best if they were a descendant of George but that is not essential.

Among our 22 Upchurch Clans George Upchurch has the strongest linkage to a County of them all. This plus your excellent Museum means is is a shame not to have a local contact we can interact with from time to time.

Melva tells me she will soon visit Monticello and I hope she will nose around to help on our quest. If you have any suggestions they would be most welcome.







Wayne County boasts of some of the most unusual post office names. One patron relates, "My family never moved but the post office continually did; at one time we got our mail at Alex and then Grape." Post offices found themselves being named for various reasons.

Robert M. Rennick related in From Red Hot to Monkey's Eyebrow: Unusual Kentucky Place Names about how Stop post office got its name. "In western Wayne County, the road stopped at the local store that for sometime served the Ramsey Island neighbor-A hood. In 1910, John Upchurch petitioned Washington for a post office. His new office needed a name. There weren't enough local people to form a

committee to decide a suitable name, so Mr. Upchurch asked some visitors for their help. They tried but couldn't come up with a name that pleased him. They were about to leave when he called to them 'Stop! Let's talk about this some more.' So the post office became known as STOP."

One's imagination can be used to vision how Turkey Ridge, Flat Springs, and Sandclift may have become named. People's names were very commonly used also as we experience Keith, Susie, and Hardwick post offices. Come, visit our genealogy to explore Wayne County's unusual post office names and learn how they may have gotten their names.

Southern Ridge Trail - A Path Through The Woods

Southern Ridge Trail was just a path through the woods. Numerous families, mostly from Virginia and North Carolina, started on the trail at Cumberland Gap and traveled it to Wayne County.

Who were these families? The Parmleys, Burnetts, Ryans, Keetons, Rices, Bells, Dobbs, Youngs, Scotts, Sallees, Sanduskys, Burks, Kogers, Denneys, Davenports, Elams, Phipps, Smiths, Adkins, Barnes, Lovelaces, Sharps, Adairs, Barriers, Parkers, Dolens, Blevins, Gregorys, Marions, and possibly others followed the Southern Ridge Trail. This impressive list of surnames comes from an essay about the South Fork Country by Odell Campbell. Melva Upchurch Henninger thinks her ancestor, George P. Upchurch probably traveled this trail. She would also add the Roberts surname to the list. It is likely that a number of readers of this article will know that a surname in their family should be added to the list.

The trail ran many miles across the northern part of Tennessee, near the state line before it crossed into Kentucky. Samuel D. Perry, on page 132 of <u>South Fork Country</u> stated: "This trail entered Kentucky near present Jellico, Tennessee and proceeded westerly, intersecting the Jacksboro Road near present Silerville, Kentucky, and continued on to the mouth of Bear Creek, and continued on to Wayne County. The Southern Ridge Trail remained essentially, a trail, and only the hardiest of immigrants traveled it."

Melva Henniger has done much research on the trail. She has found that soon after it entered Wayne County, at a point slightly north of Mount Pisgah, it divided into two branches. One branch went to Parmleysville, while the other wound to several areas in the southern part of Wayne County, including Coopersville.

How early did families come over the Southern Ridge Trail to Wayne County? That is a big question, and of course we don't know the entire story, but we do have the opinions of credible local historians about the people of two communities:

Parmleysville

Odell Campbell did much research on Parmleysville. Mr. Campbell believed that there was a settlement in that community as early as 1780. He based his conclusion, at least in part, on the recollections of John Keeton (1866 - 1941) of Elk Spring Valley. Keeton remembered that as a boy of five or six years, he had heard stories told by Granny Parker who lived to the age of 106. In its beginning Parmleysville had a stockade to protect the settlers from Indians. Granny Parker had memories of the stockade. It was there when as a young girl she had come from North Carolina to Parmleysville.

Was there a settlement at Parmleysville as early as 1780? Odell Campbell thought there must have been.

Coopersville

Beginning in the late '70s Ben Coffey and Garnett Walker gave much attention to an old cemetery at Coopersville. The cemetery has several early

Roberts graves, but the stone for W.Roberts (1711 - 1774) especially caught the interest of those two historians. Mr. Walker said there must have been a settlement there in 1774 because people were left behind to bury Roberts and construct the nicely built table tombstone over his grave.

A few years ago when Melva Henninger and her cousin Dr. Phil Upchurch become engrossed in researching the Southern Ridge Trail, they also researched the Roberts Settlement at Coopersville, believing the two topics to be part of the same story. From their search through land grants, deeds, and countless other records she found that the Roberts Settlement had many early settlers from Burk (then Rowan) County, North Carolina. William Roberts sold his house and land there in 1768. Roberts, however, was born in Virginia. That information is inscribed on his tombstone. Henninger and Upchurch found that several of the Roberts men were surveyors, and quite well-known in their time.


Near the tombstone of W. Roberts stand two more table tombstones. William Bailey Roberts (died 1n 1833) and his wife, Lydia Ponder, are buried there. The younger Roberts, a great nephew of W. Roberts, did much surveying in the Coopersville area. Court records indicate that he owned land in Wayne County in 1800. He and Lydia had 14 children. When William's estate was settled, it was stated that he owned land on both sides of Canada's Creek, which included the location of the cemetery. Many Wayne County people can trace their ancestry to Henry Roberts (1796 - 1872). Henry was a son of William and Lydia.

Was there a settlement at Coopersville as early as 1774? Ben Coffey and Garnett Walker thought there must have been. After much research, Melva Henninger and Dr. Phil Upchurch are convinced that they were correct.

What did those early-comers bring with them? Samuel D. Perry, on p. 135 of <u>South Fork Country</u> stated: "Few of the comforts of their previous life could be carried by the immigrants. Most of the home-seekers were poor, anyway, and their material wealth was limited. More often than not it could be carried on a single pack animal. A good rifle, some lead and powder, an axe, and an iron kettle were, often, the sum total of many a western trudging family's treasure."

Did most or all of the immigrants bring seeds and a hoe for the garden patch and field? Did some or all of the wives bring a little bundle of sewing and knitting supplies, and maybe have at least one pocket filled with seeds from their flower beds back in Virginia and North Carolina? What about a few personal belongings? Did they bring some sort of bedding or a tent for camping? How much could one poor pack animal carry? Did some of the families mentioned above come over the trail with a string of pack animals? Our questions about those early-comers could go on and on.

As historic trails go, the Southern Ridge Trail is not usually considered a major trail. In the history of Wayne County, though, it is a major trail because it is part of the family history of so many of our citizens. We hope at least a few people who read this article will remember a handed-down story, or a letter, or a journal that contains a bit of information that will help "fill in" the story of the trail. The Museum staff will appreciate anything you care to share.

Connecting your family to early America's rich history has been made easier by an extensive donation of materials to the Elizabeth Furr Duncan. Genealogy Library located next to the Wayne County Museum.

An extensive collection of documents is now available on the families of and Sumter/Sumpter Upchurch thanks to the of Melva donations Upchurch Henninger, a researcher and former resident of Wayne County. Smaller files are available on the families of Roberts, Bertram, Crabtree, Cooper, Ard, Beard and Ballew.

members moved to Wayne County in 1809 in the area known as Sumpter. Fort Sumter was later named for the general.

The new files also include countless records on the Upchurch family whose patriot families settled in the Mount Pisgah County area. Wayne became the home of over generations of ten Upchurchs with the first immigrating to Jamestown Colony in 1638. Over 70,000 of the Upchurch family are now connected to the family of Michael Upchurch who arrived at Jamestown.

The new files available at the genealogy library are the result of over twenty years of correspondence with researchers on the Upchurch and Sumpter families as well as others. These files include family trees, census documents, wills, correspondence, and some photos. The collection also includes copies of original documents.

Mrs. Henninger notes, "The donation of materials took many years to gather with many letters written to State Libraries." She also worked to solve several research questions with Sue Rogers, a volunteer

researcher.

Many Wayne County families connect in some way to these families and the Revolutionary period. Many have ties to several sons of the famous General Sumter, Thomas longest surviving general of the Revolution who served under four presidents. His brothers and nephews also served as early guides to Kentucky in 1759. Other family

The Roberts family is also an important part of the new research available, another patriot group claiming land grants in Wayne County. The family settled an area called Roberts Valley which was renamed later Coopersville. Some of the Roberts family also were part of Kentucky's legendary Long Hunters.

Extensive records for these families are now available to the public at the genealogy library. Other sources are also available as well as trained staff to help you connect. your family tree to history. County Wayne The Historical Society welcomes donations of records and information with extensive family files available. Hours are 10 a.m. through 4 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.





A very popular television series airing on national educational channels features very capable and knowledgeable historians known as "history's detectives." These men and women receive questions from the general public that pose questions about various historical documents, artifacts, and sites. In turn the "history detectives" travel to distant parts of the country to interview scholars in order to solve the "mysteries."

Recently a few amateur Kentucky historians decided to revisit a mystery that came to their attention in 1990 when Ben and Juanita Coffey of Wayne County, Kentucky documented the existence of a gravesite located in the south central region of the commonwealth known locally as Coopersville.

The site is in Wayne County and is a part of the Bauley-Bell Cemetery (Kidd-Bell Cemetery) located on a "well-kept knoll" 1.4 miles southeast of Highway 92 near Canada's Creek. The cemetery has been known for decades and is still used for burials.

The particular burial site that is of interest is the coffin-shaped slab covering the grave of W ROBERTS. There is a crude but well-defined chiseled inscription that reads: "W ROBERTS B 1711 D 1774." Prior to this discovery, it was believed that the oldest known tombstone in Wayne County was that of Jane Bartleston, who died in 1803.

The existence of the gravesite poses several questions: "Who was W ROBERTS?" "When and why did he arrive in Wayne County?" "What caused his death-disease, old age, accident, or hostile Native Americans?"

His birth and death dates have opened a floodgate of questions that have to do with the actual location of the gravesite especially as it relates to the question of the first permanent settlement in Kentucky.

For years the settlement at Harrodsburg has been listed as the first permanent settlement in the state. One history of Harrodsburg includes the following information: "Harrodsburg was founded in 1774 by James Harrod, the first city in Kentucky. It was initially known as Harrod's Town or Harrodstown. The settlement was abandoned as a result of attacks by Native Americans in Dunmore's War the same year, but was resettled in 1775." (1.)

William Henry Perrin says: "In May (1774) James Harrod, who had been in one of the surveying parties of the preceding year led a party of 31 men into what is now Mercer County and laid the foundation of the first settlement and village in Kentucky..." (2.)

Cecil B. Hartley in "LIFE OF DANIEL BOONE" wrote: "...it was not until the year 1774 that the whites obtained a permanent foothold in Kentucky. From this year, therefore, properly dates the commencement of the early settlements of the State..." (3.)

The above testimony and other historical sources have served to "prove" that the first permanent settlement in Kentucky was Harrodsburg in 1774.

There may be a need to explain that this is no attempt to prove that Coopersville in Wayne County was ever established by law as a "town." It is, however, a claim that Coopersville was a "settlement" and probably preceded the "settlement" at Harrodsburg.

It is entirely appropriate to call the Coopersville settlement "ancient" since the word is defined as: "having had an existence of many years; of or relating to a remote period, to a time early in history; having the qualities of age or long existence..." (4.)

Kentucky did not attain statehood until 1792. That means in 1774, what is now Wayne County was a part of Fincastle County, Virginia. Wayne County would not come into existence until 1801.

Dr. Thomas Walker is credited with providing the first written record of the existence of the Cumberland Gap. In 1750 he made the following entry in his diary: "We went four miles to large Creek, which we called Cedar (Indian) Creek, being a branch of Bear Grass (Powell's), and from thence six miles to Cave Gap (Cumberland Gap)..." (5.)

It would be a mistake to assume that Walker was the first person to go through what would later be called the Cumberland Gap. There are scores of accounts of the gap being used by Native Americans. "One of the most famous of all Indian trails...was the Great War Path through Cumberland Gap...It was over this trail that the dreaded Iroquois most often came into the country of the Cherokees..." (6.)

Harriet Simpson Arnow explains the use of the Gap long before Walker named it the Cumberland Gap in 1750—"...Cumberland Gap could be reached from many directions; there were the Clinch River and Cumberland Gap Trail, the New River and Cumberland Gap Trail, while all other major trails mentioned intersected with trails that would eventually lead to the Gap." (7.)

This observation becomes important in the quest to understand what was going on in Kentucky before the Long Hunters or the explorations of James Harrod. It becomes obvious that hundreds if not thousands of "white men" had found their way into the area much earlier than 1750. Otis R. Rice in FRONITER KENTUCKY observed: "The drama of frontier Kentucky had its beginnings a full century before the arrival of Boone, his predecessor James Harrod, and other immigrants." (8.)

Ample reason to leave the colonies in the east and enter into the land beyond the Appalachians was provided when, between 1745 and 1754, over 2.5 million acres were opened to land speculators. The men interested in obtaining land at cheap prices rivaled those who came into Kentucky to hunt and trap for the prized pelts and furs of exotic animals.

This intense interest in land speculation gave rise to an "army" of land surveyors. It would be useless to form a party of land speculators to go into the wilderness to stake out territory without marking that land and establishing ownership. Any party of that nature would require land surveyors, and men, by the hundreds were trained and equipped to accomplish that important task.

Casual research will indicate that almost any hunting party, group of land speculators, and other explorers included in their number that most important individual—the land surveyor. Many of the American founding fathers were surveyors; including George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, and Abraham Lincoln!

"The first party to point the way from the Holston Valley to Kentucky set out in 1761 under the leadership of Elisha Walden, a 'rough backwoodsman' then about thirty years old. He and the eighteen or nineteen men with him established their base of operations, or station camp, where they stored skins and supplies, on Wallen's Creek, in present Lee County, Virginia. For eighteen months they remained in the region between Long Island in the Holston and Cumberland Gap. In 1763, with many of the same men, Walden undertook another extensive hunting expedition, this time passing through Cumberland Gap into southeastern Kentucky." (9.)

It becomes evident that thousands of people were living in Kentucky before 1774 when James Harrod established his settlement. One source says: "By the end of 1783 approximately 12,000 people were living in Kentucky." (10.)

-

We have thus far established:

- 1. Kentucky was well known by Native Americans and the "white man" long before Dr. Thomas Walker, Daniel Boone, the Long Hunters, or James Harrod ever entered this "dark and bloody ground."
 - 2. Land surveyors were an essential part of any of these early parties who explored in Kentucky.
- 3. The area of Kentucky that became Wayne County was certainly explored and possibly inhabited by the "white man" before 1774.
- 4. The discovery of the burial site of W ROBERTS in the Coopersville area of Wayne County points to a settlement in that section by and possibly before 1774.

It has been previously pointed out that the gravesite of W ROBERTS poses the questions, "Who was W ROBERTS?" "When and why did he arrive in Wayne County?"

Information has surfaced that might help answer those questions.

The physical appearance and construction of a gravesite can oftentimes tell something about the person buried at the site, the activities and abilities of those who prepared the site, and the circumstances surrounding the actual burial.

The gravesite of W ROBERTS consists of a rock foundation built approximately twenty inches above ground. On top of that foundation is a coffin shaped solid rock slab with his name, date of birth, and date of death clearly chiseled in the stone. The date of birth is 1711 and the death date is 1774. The numbers are interesting in that all the 7s are reversed. The name appears in all capital letters and does not give the complete first name. There are other graves in the immediate vicinity including that of W ROBERTS' son, William and his daughter-in-law. These two graves are also covered with limestone slabs. A large pavilion has been constructed over the graves to help preserve them from the elements.

All these physical characteristics of the gravesite lend themselves to the conclusion that this site was not hastily constructed but, rather, constructed with great care and deliberation. The development of the site certainly required much time, effort, and skill by the builder(s). The site suggests the Roberts family had occupied the area for a significant period of time before the death of W ROBERTS.

Some information about who W ROBERTS was is to be derived from official documents.

W(illiam) ROBERTS sold his home and land in Rowan County, North Carolina in 1768. It is certain that the Roberts family were land surveyors and it is highly probable that W ROBERTS accompanied one of the many parties of explorers, hunters, and land speculators into Kentucky to serve as a surveyor. Perhaps W ROBERTS came with one of Thomas Walker's earliest surveying teams in 1749. Research indicates that he returned with his family to the Wayne County area in 1769 or 1770 and settled in the Coopersville community.

Near W ROBERTS' burial site is the grave of his son, William Roberts. According to the engraving on the stone, this William was born in 1765. He was born in North Carolina and died in Wayne County, Kentucky in 1833. Court records indicate that he owned land in Wayne County in 1800. He was married to Lydia Ponder and together they had fourteen children. William was a surveyor having surveyed thousands of acres in Kentucky including some land in the Coopersville area. It is also known that William's son, Henry, was a land surveyor.

When William's estate was settled it was stated that he owned land on both sides of Canada's Creek which would include the land on which the Bauley-Bell Cemetery (Kidd-Bell Cemetery) is located.

Research continues to link W ROBERTS with early Wayne County history but there might very well be enough information leading historians to believe that an ancient and permanent settlement existed in Wayne County, Kentucky some time before Harrodsburg was settled. The Coopersville community of Wayne County is an "ancient" settlement and may be the earliest permanent settlement in Kentucky.

"History's Detectives" must continue the search!
