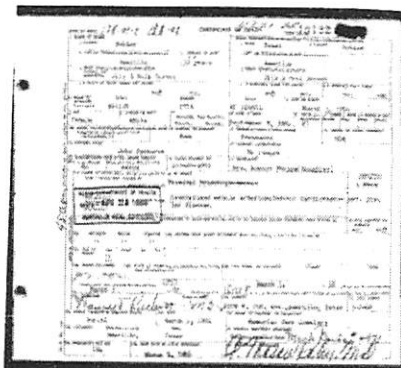

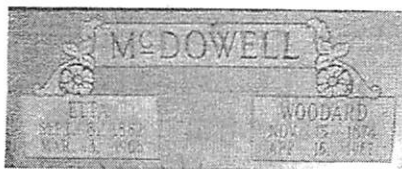

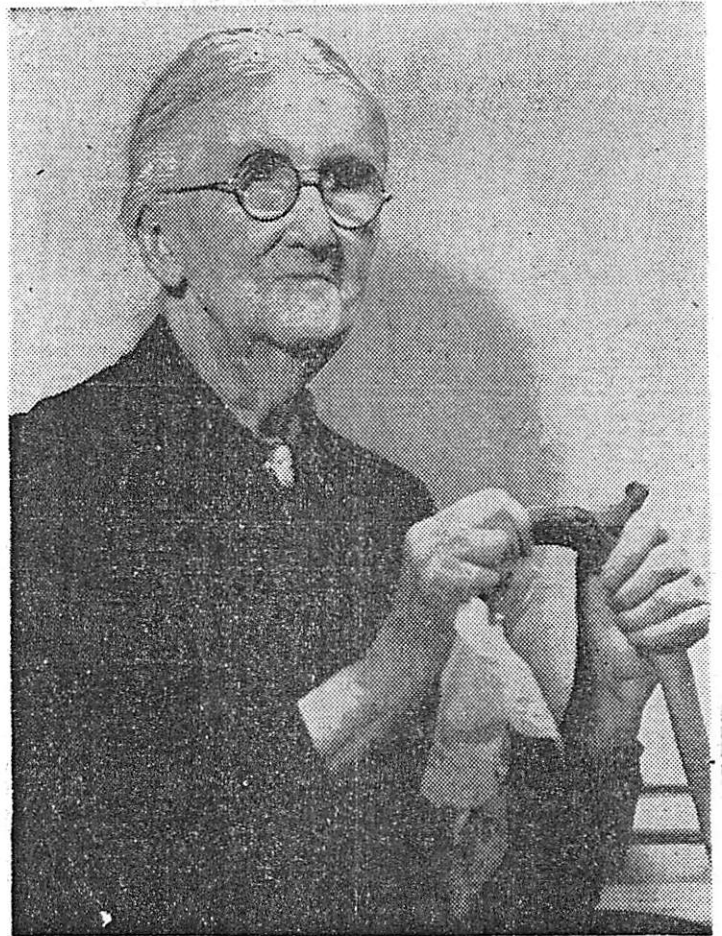

Mrs. Josephine Upchurch Broadwell of Morrisville, Route 1, who was born on September 18, 1852, is shown above as she looked yesterday on her 100th anniversary. She is a daughter of the late Isam and Dille Beavers Upchurch. During the past 31 years, Mrs. Broadwell has made her home with a son, J. M. Broadwell, one of her five living children. Others are Mrs. W. H. Mills of Apex, Mrs. S. Z. Sears of Morrisville, Route 1; G. M. Broadwell of Varina; and Fred J. Broadwell of Live Oak, Fla. A sixth child, Mrs. W. B. Booker, is dead. Some of Mrs. Broadwell's children, 33 grandchildren, 63 great-grandchildren, and 18 great-great-grandchildren are expected to help her celebrate her birthday at a dinner next Sunday at her residence.

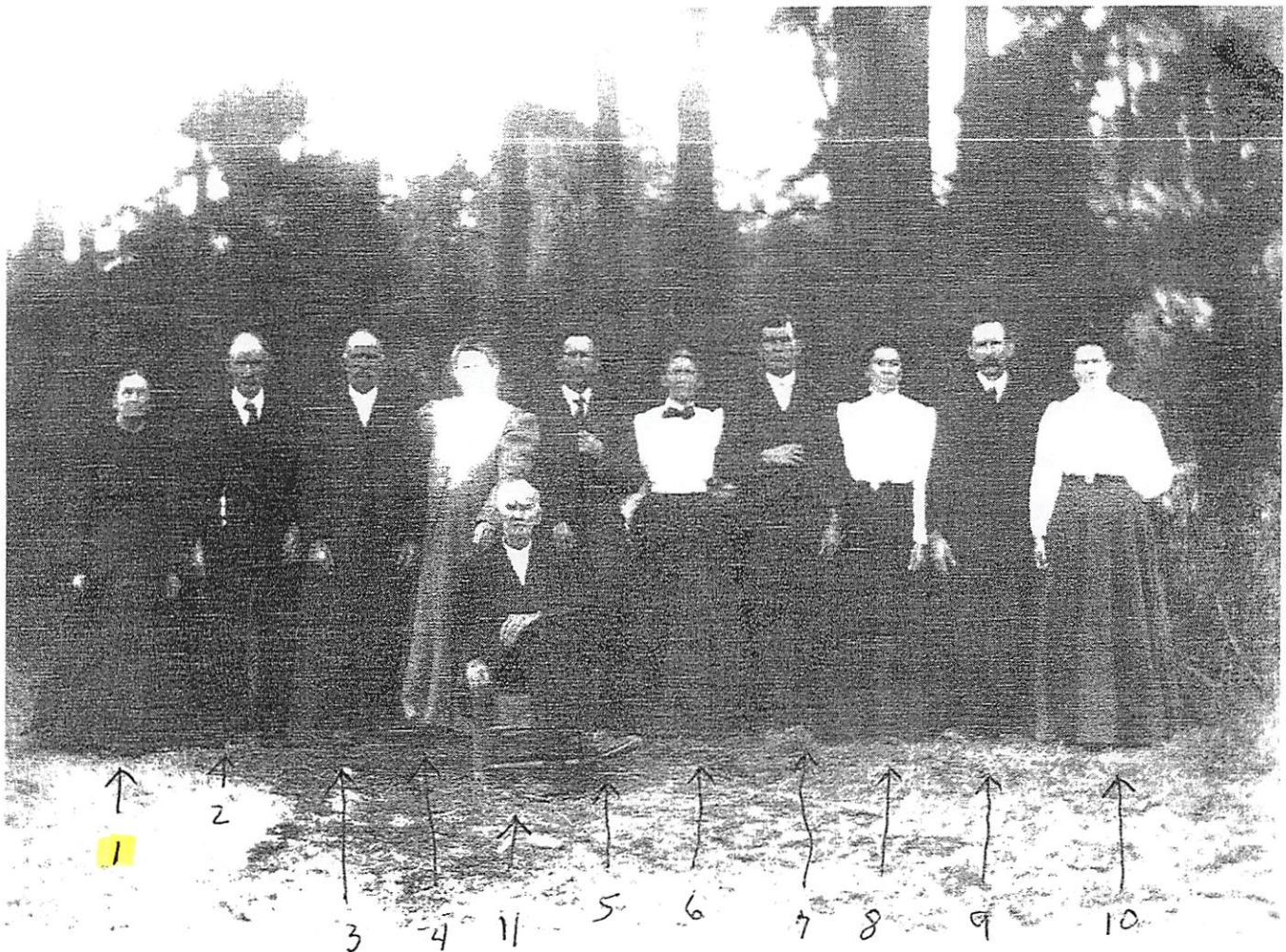

This is the birthday party for Isham Sims Upchurch (b 31 Dec 1824, d 5 Apr 1916). I have a brief sketch that I wrote about this photo, and will include it below. Taken 31 Dec 1899.

A TRIPLE CELEBRATION

December 31, 1899 was a very special day to have this photograph taken. It was New Year's Eve, the last day of the 19th Century, and it was also the 75th birthday of Isham Sims Upchurch. Isham is pictured sitting in a chair, with his daughters and their husbands standing behind him. Isham's wife, Adelia Beavers Upchurch had passed away 24 Sep 1893 and is buried in the Upchurch Cemetery near the Chatham & Wake County line. Isham had fought for the Confederacy during the Civil War, in the 16th North Carolina, Company G. He was released from the prison at Point Lookout, MD on 21 June 1865. He and his wife, Adelia had 13 children. Sidney died at age 10, and Mary at age 8. On 3 Feb 1903, Isham married for a second time, at age 79 to Rosanna Taylor (age 53), who died 10 Dec 1911. Isham Upchurch died 5 Apr 1916 at age 91. Isham's daughter, Josephine Frances Upchurch lived to age 102, as did her son, Fred Broadwell. Beginning Second Century Of Life



On September 20, over 150 relatives and friends of Mrs. Josephine Upchurch Broadwell of the Green Level community in Wake County gathered to observe her 101st birthday. No, that's not a typographical error. This "young" lady is beginning her second century of life. She has 121 living descendants, including five children, 33 grandchildren, 63 great-grandchildren; and 20 great-great-grandchildren. She lives with her son, J. M. Broadwell of Morrisville, Route 1, and the birthday event was held at the home of Mrs. Norman Crabtree. Friends describe Mrs. Broadwell as "a helpful, regular Christian witness", always willing to pitch in and work when a neighbor, relative, or friend needs help. "Many of us might look younger if we were willing to serve as she has," one of her friends commented. She attended church services regularly until she was 97 years old. The oldest of eleven children, Mrs. Broadwell has many relatives in and around Apex, Fuquay Springs, Olive Chapel, Raleigh, Greensboro, Durham, and Thomasville.

He's experienced all that during the 26 years he spent in the Army. But he's ready to fight again when his country goes to war.

"Right this minute," said the Negro preacher, and he clicked his heels in salute. He only wishes that Col. Teddy Roosevelt were living to lead him in battle.

"If Mr. Teddy were here to give them signals, they couldn't hold me back," he said. Preacher Ferrell believes Colonel Roosevelt was one man who would have put an end to Hitler pretty quick.

Can't Be Confused.

Historians sometimes attempt to confuse the veteran on the dates, but the memory of those hectic, historic and hair-raising days are still too vivid in his mind. He can relate the battles, the dates and even minor occurrences more vividly than the history books tell the story.

"I can just see Mister Teddy right now going jumpy-like over them hills, with his little red flag, and waving his hand right and left to give us the signals," he recalled.

He remembers all those events and also remembers when all the Negroes were released from the army.

His service at the funeral of President McKinley in Cleveland was just a coincidence. Orders were sent out for a detachment of soldiers, and his company was the one selected.

Preacher Ferrell—"Uncle Reuben"—he prefers to be called because that's what all his white friends call him—is a medium-sized person, with a shiny bald head, well built and still strong despite his age.

A graduate of Shaw University at Raleigh and the Greensboro College for Negroes, he's well mannered and well polished, with a fine flow of English.

His marital record is the seldom, if ever, equalled, and it's true because birth certificates bear him out. He has been married three times.

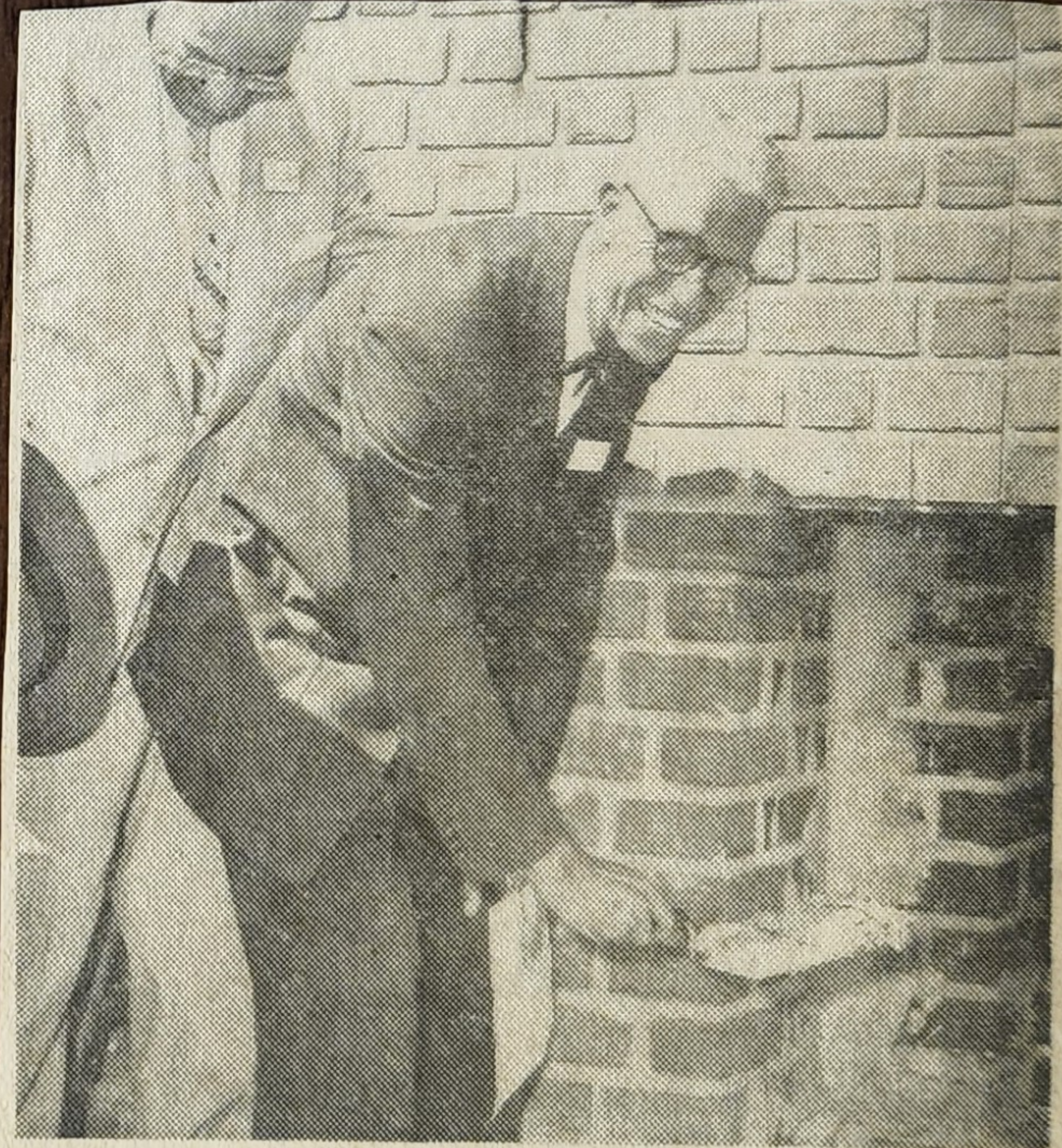

Old Olive's Chapel Has Ninety Years Of History and Holds Many Records

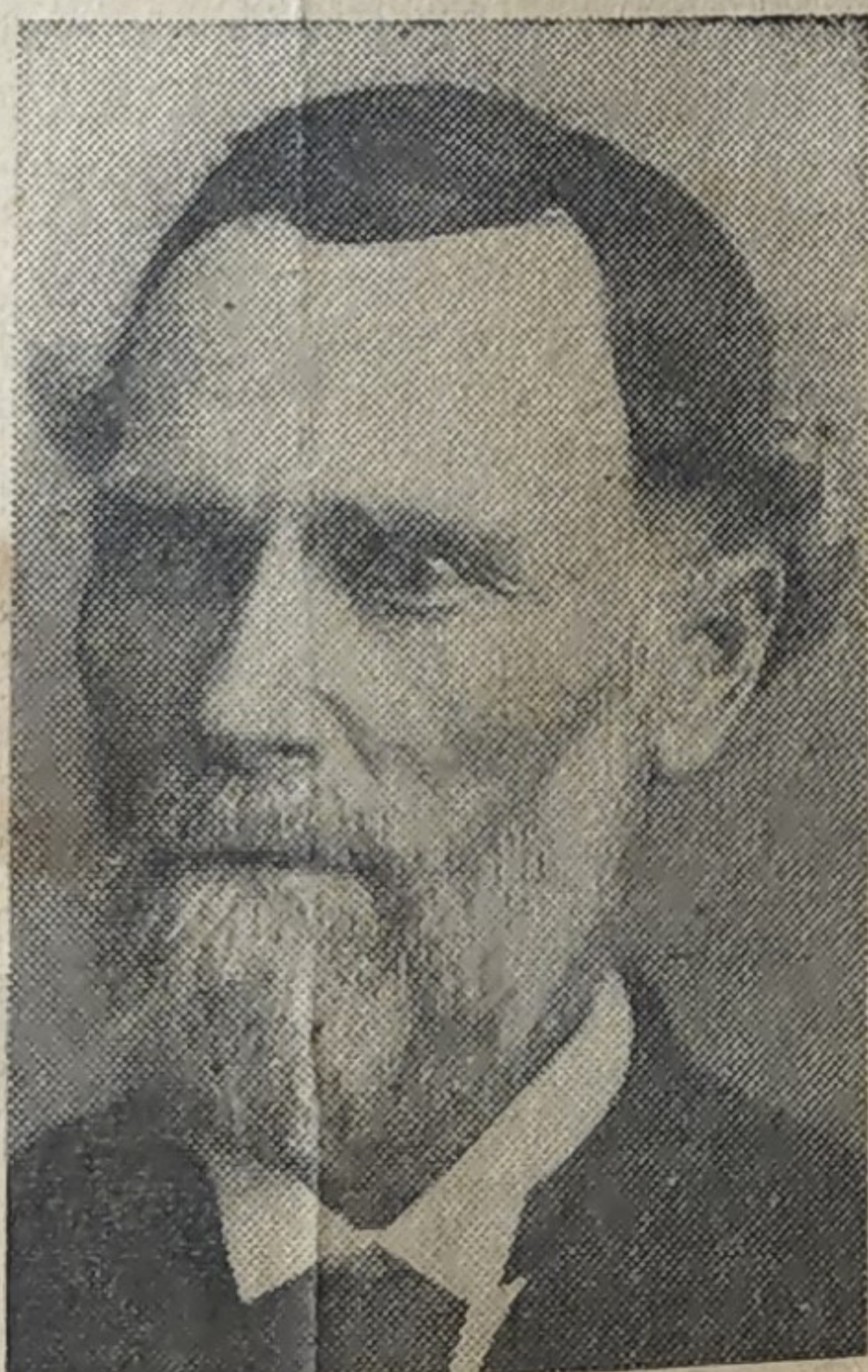
For Many Years It Was Only

Record-breaking is the word for this unusual church. Here is a partial list of its achievements since being founded in 1850:

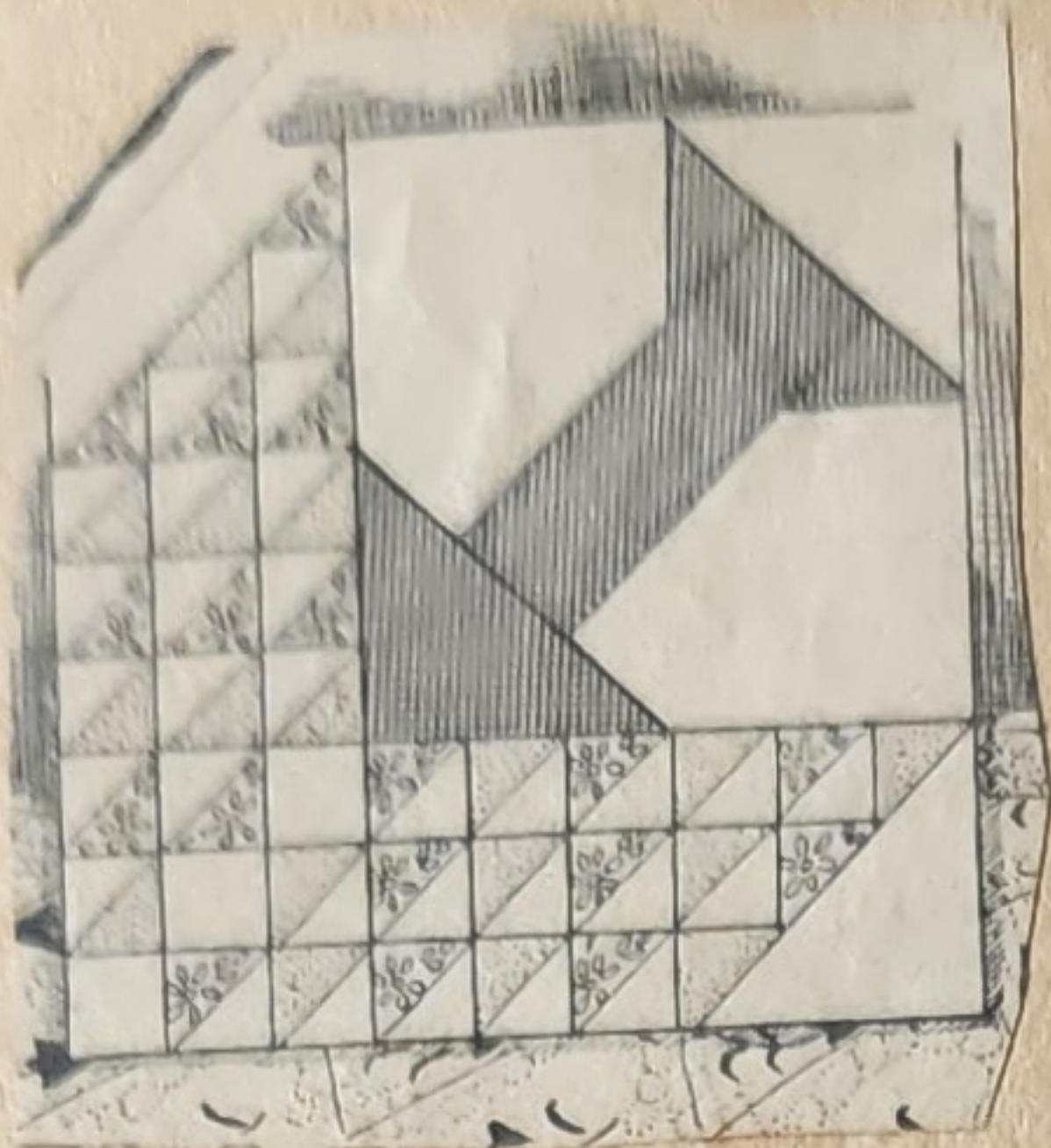

Things Found in the Bible.

The learned Prince of Granada, heir to the Spanish throne, and imprisoned by order of the crown, was kept in solitary confinement in the old prison of the palace of Madrid. After thirty-three years in that living tomb, death came to his release. The following researches in the Bible, marked on the rough walls of his cell, told how his mind sought employment through the many years:

In the Bible the word "Lord" is found 1,853 times; the word "Jehovah" 6,855 times; the word "reverend" but once—Psalm 3:9; the word "girl" but once—Joel 3:3. Psalm 117:8 is the middle verse in the Bible; Esther 8:9 is the longest verse in the Bible; John 11:35 is the shortest verse in the Bible. In Psalm 107, four verses are alike—8, 15, 21 and 31. No names or words of more than six syllables are found in the Bible. Isaiah 37 and Second Kings 19 are the same. In the Bible there are 66 books, 1,189 chapters, 773,643 words, and 3,586,483 letters. The 23d Psalm is the most beautiful; the most cheering and inspiring promises are in Matthew 11:28, John 14:2 and 7:37, Psalm 37:4. Isaiah 60:1 is most suitable for new converts; Matthew 7th chapter for vain boasters; for all men, Luke 7th chapter, from the 30th verse to the end of the chapter.

Rev. J. M. Hilliard, 89, well-known Baptist minister, died at 12:30 o'clock this afternoon at a local hospital, after an illness of several weeks.

Survivors are the widow, Mrs. J. M. Hilliard, of Knightdale, two daughters, Mrs. C. E. Sice-
loff of High Point, and Mrs. Gay Hensely of Winston-Salem.

Funeral services will be conducted Sunday afternoon at Green Street Baptist Church at 4:30 o'clock. The body will lie in state at the church from 3 o'clock p. m., tomorrow until the hour for the services. Until 3 p. m. it will be at Sechrest's Funeral Home. The burial will be at Oakwood Cemetery.

Mr. Hilliard was born in Wake County, six miles east of Raleigh, March 17, 1850, the son of James W. and Harriet Broadwell Hilliard. He was educated at Yates Academy in Wake County and Wake Forest College. He was married to Mary Colon Hinton in October, 1878. He studied for the ministry and was licensed to preach by the Mount Pisgah Baptist Church, Chatham County, in 1871.

During his ministry of 64 years, he served approximately 41 churches baptizing thousands of persons and preaching as many funeral sermons. He pioneered in fields where remuneration was small and seldom received more than \$750 for a year's work. Several years ago Mr. Hilliard became pastor of a little mission church on East Green Street, this city. For six years he labored there, organizing and developing what is now known as Green Street Church. This ultimately became the Southside Baptist church, and for eight years Mr. Hilliard served as pastor of this church.

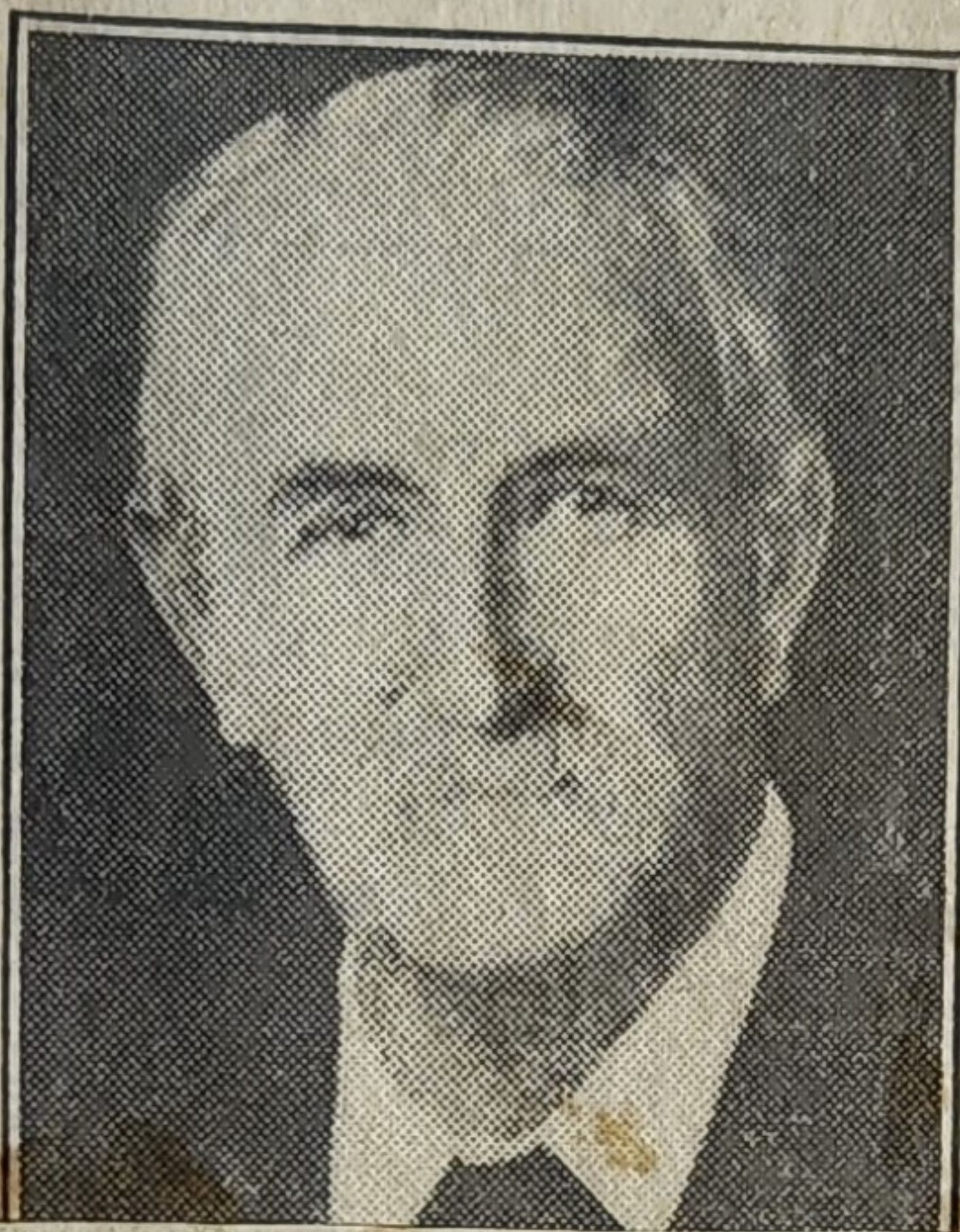
EDUCATIONAL WORK

The impress of Mr. Hilliard's life was also felt in the cause of education. For ten years he worked in Buncombe County, where he established the Fairview Baptist Academy. In 1891 he became secretary and treasurer of the orphanage at Thomasville, now known as the Mills Home, serving there four years. At other times he has been associated with the Baptist State Mission Board.

Mr. Hilliard was thrice married; the first time to Miss Mary Colton Hinton, October 28, 1878; in the second marriage to Miss Tanquilla Johnson, September 25, 1900; on the third occasion to Mrs. Elizabeth R. Knight, December 20, 1906.

To the first union were four children: Iola (Mrs. C. E. Sice-
loff), Alice (Mrs. Bascom Hoskins), Eugene and James. Of these Mrs. Sice-
loff is the sole survivor.

ANNOUNCES GIFT TO WAKE FOREST

**President Gaines Reveals
Bequest of \$10,000 By
Daughter of Yates**

Wake Forest, Sept. 22.—President F. P. Gaines, of Wake Forest College, this week received notice of the probate in the County of Dutchess, State of New York, of the will of Mrs. Annie Yates Seaman, by which ten thousand dollars, "gold coin of the United States of America," is bequeathed to Wake Forest College, as a memorial to her father, Matthew Tyson Yates, the first missionary sent out by the Southern Baptist Convention to China.

The bequest of Mrs. Seaman to Wake Forest was doubtless due to the fact that her father was an alumnus of this institution, having graduated here in 1846, and was until his death warmly interested in all measures for increasing its equipment and endowment. He was a member of a large family and had to make his way through academy and college, which he did by teaching singing schools, and by remaining out of school a year in order to make money to enable him to finish.

While in China, Dr. Yates proved to be not only the greatest of the Baptist missionaries, but also an able administrator and man of affairs. During the Civil War when shut off from the homeland, by serving the Foreign Court as interpreter and the United States as assistant Consul at Shanghai, he was able, out of his own funds, to keep the mission going. Later he became vice consul general of the United States in China and was offered still higher posts, which he declined that he might devote himself to the missionary work. He had, however, made some savings, which he invested wisely, and at his death in 1887 was possessed of a competence. It was the expressed opinion of Hon. Willie P. Mangum, consul general of China, who had been a fellow student of Yates at Wake Forest, that had Yates devoted more of his time to money-making he might have become possessed of an immense fortune.

But out of his moderate means Dr. Yates made no small contributions to Wake Forest College: \$250 in 1875; \$1,000 in 1878; \$200 in 1886, and \$4,350 in 1887. During his last years he was forming plans for the larger endowment of the college, and the year of his death he wrote Dr. Charles E. Taylor, "I delight to pray for Wake Forest College." This interest was the inheritance of Mrs. Seaman, his daughter, who has now, "as a memorial to her father," left this \$10,000 bequest to Wake Forest.

In her will Mrs. Seaman made special bequests to the amount of \$90,000. Among North Carolina beneficiaries of the will are the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage, \$5,000; Annie Seaman Jones, of Salisbury, \$5,000; to the daughters of her late cousin, Susan Wempe Carleton, deceased, of Durham, \$10,000; to the children of her uncle, Lucian B. Yates, \$10,000; to the children of her aunt, Betty Lane Johnson, \$10,000; to Cornelia Norriss, of Raleigh, \$5,000; to Elsie Hunter, of Raleigh, the only daughter of her cousin, Emma Hunter, \$5,000. The residuary estate, which includes all real estate both in the United States and in China and much Oriental furniture, embroideries, screens, wall hanging, and curios, is left to her daughter, Miss Josephine Gaskin Seaman. W. S. Yates, of Raleigh, is one of the six children of the Lucian B. Yates referred to.

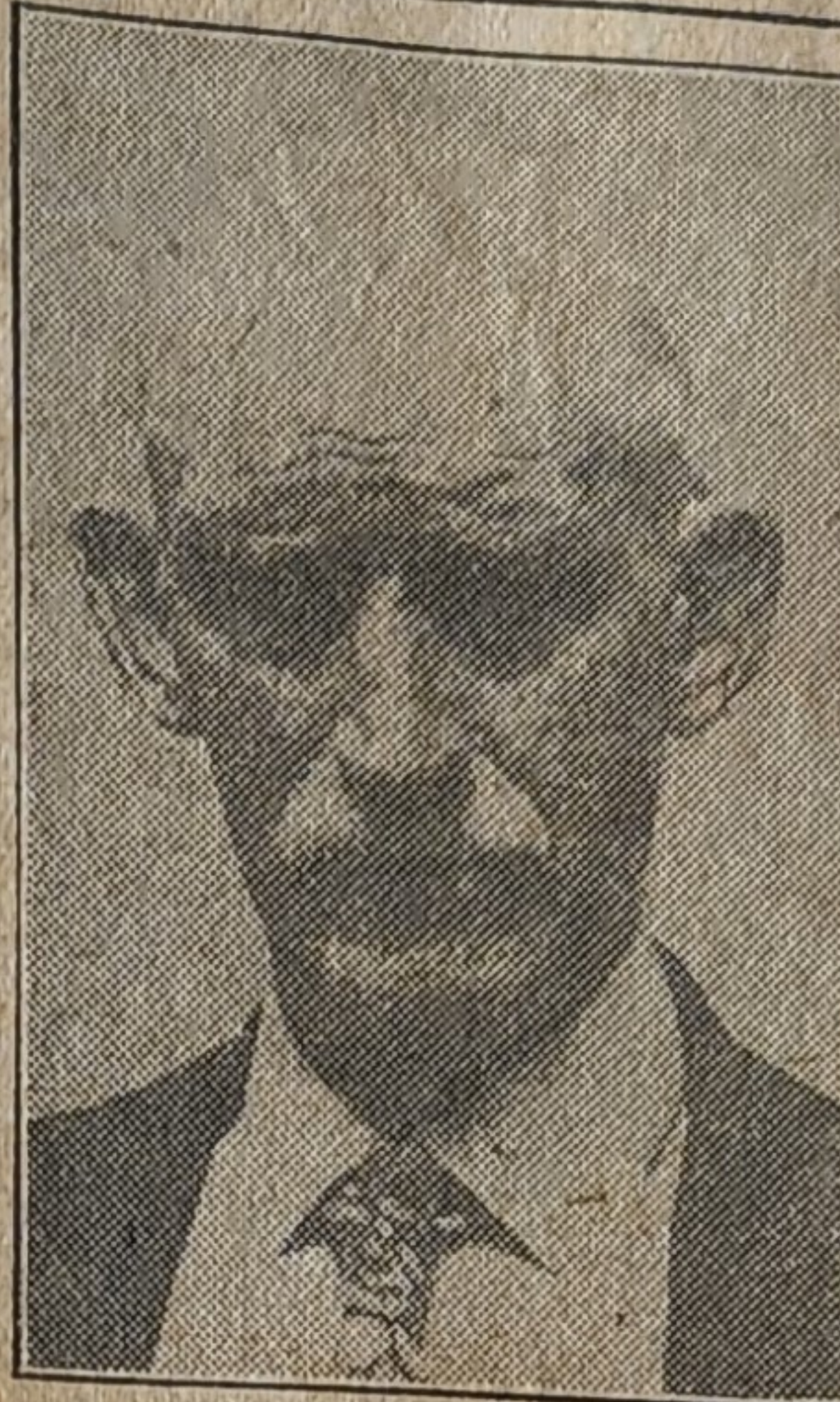

The intruder, James Atwater, a Durham Negro, was seen by a neighbor entering the house of M. H. Upchurch, whose family was away. Roger Upchurch, 13, and several women of the neighborhood rushed to the scene, and Mrs. D. C. Upchurch commanded the burglar to come out.

The Negro, hearing the commotion outside, leaped through a window and fled into a nearby wood. The Upchurch youth seized a .22 rifle inside the house, summoned his dog, and went in pursuit.

The dog discovered the Negro lying face down beside a log, and young Upchurch forced him to hold up his hands. He then conducted his prisoner back to the Upchurch home. County officers were summoned and Atwater was taken into custody.

Detectives said Atwater was wanted for breaking into a Greensboro home and stealing articles valued at approximately \$500 and with entering the home of L. T. Harris here and stealing about \$95 worth of articles.

Atwater was turned over to Greensboro authorities late today for trial there. Afterwards, he will be returned to Durham to face charges of entering the Harris and Upchurch homes.

A Shepherd to His People

By Mrs. Elizabeth Tate Knight

"These looms are enough to make a preacher cuss," he said, by way of making conversation the day he came to Cliffside mill to begin his job.

"Preachers don't curse," she answered in a tone to match the rebuke in her brown eyes.

He was William Thomas Tate, son of G. W. and Melissa Holland Tate of near Henrietta, North Carolina. His mother had died when he was eight years old, and his father had tried to keep the farm and his five children together. Many times he swam Broad River twice a day to work at a brick

yard to get the necessary cash to send his children to "subscription school."

She was Dovie Melissa Sparks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Sparks of Cliffside.

They were married July 29, 1906, when both of them were nineteen.

Will had been converted at the age of 12, and had joined the Mount Pleasant Baptist Church in Rutherford County. He soon began to take an active part in the church life of the Cliffside Baptist Church. Zenó Wall was at that time working in the office of the mill where Will was weaving. They became fast friends, working together in the Sunday school, and conducting prayer meetings. When he left Cliffside, Will was a deacon, Sunday school superintendent, church treasurer, and janitor.

Working His Way Through High School

For some time he had felt the call to preach, but knew he would need more education, since he had only finished the fifth grade. In 1909, after the birth of three children, and the death of two of them, Mr. and Mrs. Tate and their seven-months-old son moved to Boiling Springs High School (now Gardner-Webb College).

When he went to the bank to borrow money, they wanted to know if he had any collateral. He didn't know what the word meant, but he knew he didn't have anything. Money could not be borrowed without collateral; he didn't want to worry his father who had all he could do on his meager income; friends were not sympathetic, saying this was just a whim which would pass, and then he'd come back to the cotton mill where he belonged. He arrived at Boiling Springs with \$10.25.

The first week he had to have \$20.00 to register, buy a uniform, and books. He rented a cottage for \$4.00 a month from Mr. Noah Hamrick, and picked cotton for his landlord to pay the rent until Christmas. He borrowed \$15.00 from a fellow student and paid that back by working in Cliffside mill during the Christmas holidays. He cut wood and did many other small jobs around Boiling Springs to buy groceries. The family's food consisted mostly of bread and water.

Many times they crumbled their bread in their water, closed their eyes, and tried to imagine that it was bread and milk. Their

entire expenses for the three of them that first year, including house rent, school expenses, books, uniforms, groceries, and clothing, amounted to \$140.00. One day while cutting wood, he stuck a splinter under a finger nail. One by one all his finger and toe nails came off because of malnutrition.

After completing the work of grades six through eleven, working in the mill in the summers, and tutoring private students at night, Mr. Tate was out of debt at Boiling Springs and ready for college.

"The Walking Preacher" at Wake Forest

He sold his furniture for railroad tickets; and on the first day of September, 1912, at two o'clock in the morning, he arrived on the Wake Forest campus with a sick wife, an invalid son, a baby boy, and \$15.00. He had no house, no furniture, and it cost \$16.00 to register. R. C. Campbell, who was also from Rutherford County and a friend from high school days, took them into his home until they could find a place to rent. They, in turn, shared their rented house with other married students, including G. T. Mills and Will Elam.

While at Wake Forest, Mr. Tate pastored at various times the North Henderson, Woodland, and New Hill churches; and Bethesda and Baptist Center churches in Johnston County. Sometimes he did not have the money to hire a horse and buggy; sometimes his train would not make connection in Raleigh; but he never missed an appointment. He would walk if there were no other way; and so he became known around the college as "the walking preacher." Once when his train missed connections in Raleigh, he walked from Raleigh to Bethesda Church in Johnston County.

In 1916, when W. T. Tate was graduated from Wake Forest College, these words were written under his picture in the Annual: "W. T. Tate is industry personified." During his 40 years in the pastorate these words have held true.

Judson Mill, Caroleen, and Henrietta

After graduating from Wake Forest, he went to Judson Mill, Greenville, S. C. A recent strike, accompanied by an exodus of workers, had left the Baptist Church with 17 members. They had no building and appealed to B. E. Geer, president of the mill, to help them get a pastor. During the more than two years he was their pastor, Mr. Tate saw the church grow to a membership of over 300, build a new building, and organize a full church program.

He left Judson to go to Caroleen, North Carolina, in his native county, where he pastored the Caroleen and Henrietta churches and held afternoon appointments at various times at Concord, Mt. Olivet, and Bostic

churches. The churches there granted him a leave of absence for a year's study at the Southern Seminary in Louisville, Ky.

He took his family of seven and his wife's brother, J. J. Sparks (now pastor of Woodside Baptist Church, Greenville, S. C.) in a T-model Ford over the Cumberland Mountain roads as they were being plowed for their first paving.

Twenty-Nine Years at Pacolet Mills, S. C.

Coming back to Caroleen, he finished out a seven-year pastorate. When they left, he and Mrs. Tate said they never wanted to stay that long in one pastorate again because it was too hard to leave the people. That was almost 29 years ago when they were moving to Pacolet Mills in Spartanburg County, South Carolina. They have been at Pacolet Mills since that time.

He was never "too busy" for his children. He and Mrs. Tate were the parents of ten, seven of whom lived to be baptized by their daddy. He has performed the marriage ceremony of the five who are married. He was pastor, teacher, playmate, storyteller through the years. On a preacher's salary through the depression years, he encouraged his children to save their allowance; and rewarded them with summer trips over eastern United States and Canada. He originated "Home Night" with his children, a practice used since by many families who heard of his stay-at-home night when the family enjoys one another, devotionals, games, and refreshments.

He never sought financial success. Every change of pastorate he ever made was for a smaller salary though a larger opportunity. When the mill closed down for three months one summer, he called the deacons together and said: "You are not going to get behind with my salary. No, you're not going to get behind with my salary because whatever you pay me each week will be my salary in full."

To honor his 10th anniversary as pastor of their church, the Pacolet Mills Baptists sent him on a three months' tour conducted by J. McKee Adams of the Louisville Seminary. He saw many parts of Europe, Asia, and Africa, with special attention to the Holy Land.

On the observance of his 25th anniversary as pastor of the church, these words were quoted in the special bulletin prepared for the occasion: "A preacher's life is the life of his preaching. His words will go only as far as the projecting power of a good life will send them." Truly he has lived a good life among us."

When his retirement was announced in the *Spartanburg Herald*, the article began with these words: "Around Pacolet Mills W. T. Tate has become the symbol of all that is good." The following letter, written recently to Mr. Tate from one of his members, expresses the feeling of the people toward their pastor.

"Dear Mr. and Mrs. Tate:

"For me to think of our church without you is to think of eating bread without butter, drinking coffee without sugar, eating potatoes without salt, or eating peaches without cream. It just isn't satisfying or savory.

"I have been thinking back through the years of all that you have meant to our family: what good friends you and Papa were; what good jokes and fun you enjoyed

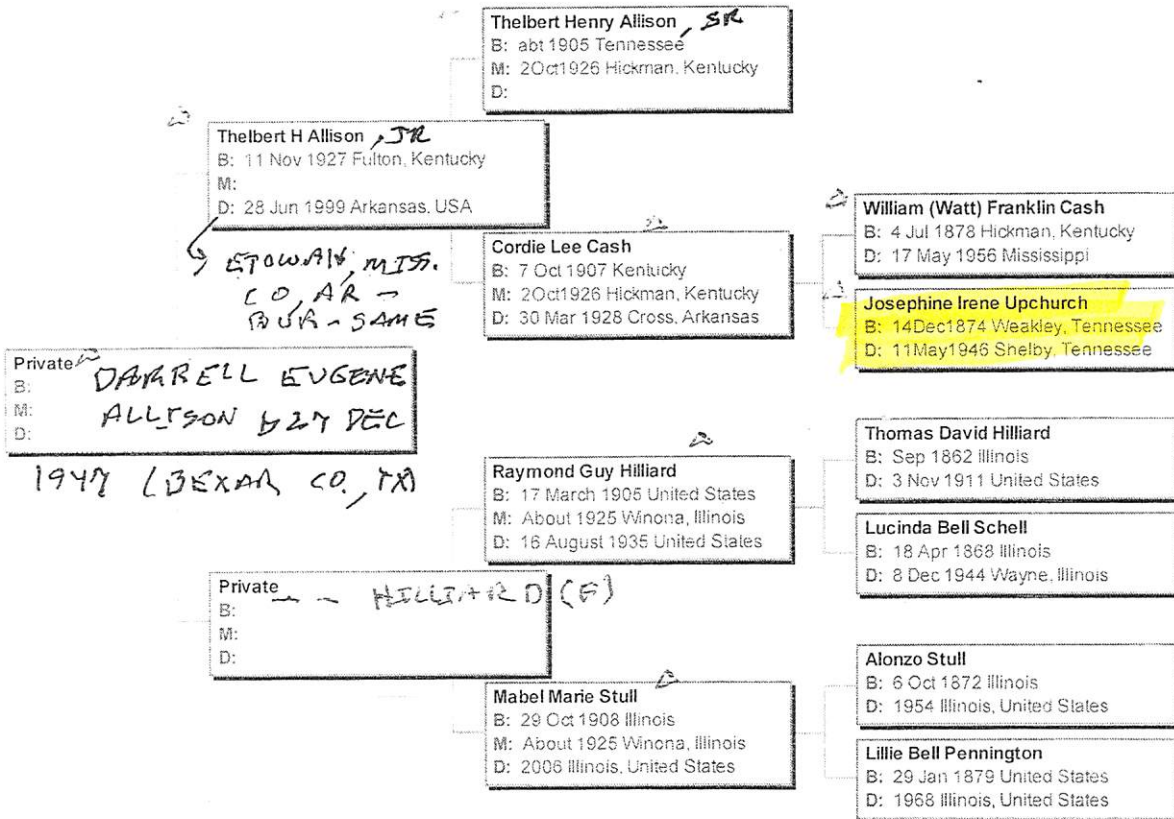

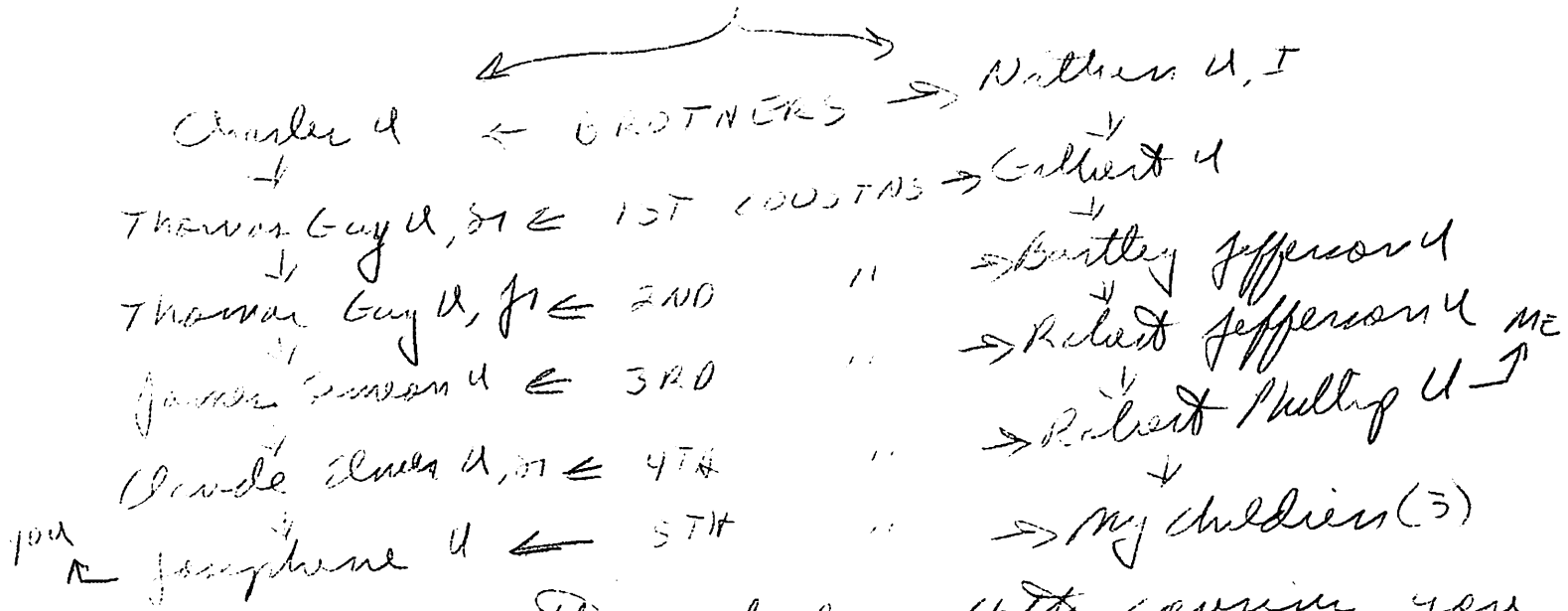
