The earliest deed books for Nash County were numbered A, B, C, etc. through probably Book N. deeds. Of these, Book A is the only one still in existence, but it is not in use. These books were re-copied by the second Registrar of Deeds, Lodrick F. ELLEN, who held office from 1805 to 1823. The present books are numbered 1, 2, 3, etc.

The deeds were not recopied in chronological order, which is very confusing. For instance, in Book 1, pages 1-108 were copied from Book A, pages 1-292; pages 109-320 from Book B, pages 1-320; pages 321-380 from Book E, pages 1-61; and pages 381-408 from Book F, pages 1-45. Other books are just as confusing. Deed Book 2, containing only land grants, is the original Book J.

While it is most helpful in genealogical research to have complete abstracts of deeds, it would take several volumes to contain such abstracts. Therefore, this one volume containing abstracts of relationships in the "fine print" in the first twenty deed books of Nash County seems to be the best solution.

All relationships that were proved or indicated are contained herein, as well as deeds between grantors and grantees of the same given name. Also included are all deeds in which property conveyed either to or from persons residing in other counties than Nash. This gives an indication of persons moving into Nash County, as well as out of the County, many moving to other states. All persons mentioned were residents of Nash County unless otherwise specified and all counties mentioned are located in North Carolina unless otherwise stated.

There are many bills of sale for slaves and other personal property, as well as powers of attorney, contained in these deed books that give much genealogical information. However, these are not given in the index. The books have evidently been indexed several times. In the back of Book 2, the original Book J, is the statement: "These indices have been revised twice and found to be correct", by B.H. SORSBY, J.P., Register, Feby. 1868".

Many people with ancestors from Wilson County will also undoubtly be interested in these records, as approximately one-fourth of Wilson County was formed from Nash County.

Article 466 on the Carpenter Family contains details on Simeon Carpenter which are in serious conflict with data I have collected from a variety of sources over several decades. Country crossroads

Town's name determined by railroad

The traffic slowly drifts by Annie Vee Powell's front porch in Middlesex on a balmy Friday afternoon. She adjusts her sweater and offers to take time to reminisce about the history of her hometown.

This quiet, serene afternoon is characteristic of life in Middlesex, according to the 76-yearold native. The same atmosphere existed while she was growing up.

She started her journey back by explaining the origin of the town's name.

"There are two stories as to how Middlesex got it's name," she said. "Some people think that it was named after Middlesex, England, because when they came to lay the tracks for the railroad, one of the men was from there."

The other story also hinges on the Norfolk Southern Railroad line, which passes through the center of town. "Some say it's because this town is located on the railroad midway between Raleigh and Wilson. Therefore, it's the middle section of track," Miss Powell explained. "But no one seems to know which story is for sure."

What is certain, as with any municipality suffering from growing pains, a number of changes have recently fallen on the residents of this community. Fifty years ago, life was the same, but different.

"When I was a child, we had to be really careful of the highway in front of the house and the railroad behind us," Miss Powell related. "We were really careful of playing in the street."

If anything ever did happen to her or her two brothers, Charles and Bill, their father could fix them right up. Dr. E.C. Powell was one of three physicians in town at the time.

"Now, we don't have any except the one who comes from Wilson for his office hours," she said.

She remembers her father making house calls and her

mother, Annie, worrying about him. One of his special treats was going out to the Free Will Baptist Children's Home.

"My daddy used to do all the work out there and not charge a penny," Miss Powell said. "I remember one night, when it was really cold and snowing, daddy got stuck in the snow making a house call. Some woman gave him her coat and



That used to be the kind of community support that Miss Powell said is now lacking in Middlesex. She said she doesn't feel safe outside after dark.

"It used to be that you could open both the front and back doors to let in the breeze," she said. "We used to call that the shotgun effect. Now, you wouldn't think of opening a door or window after dark."

She related a story to illustrate how small Middlesex used to be. "We used to have our own telephone exchange before we hooked up with Wilson, and we also had our own switchboard right here," she said. "You could call the operator when you were leaving for Raleigh, and she would take messages for you while you were gone. When you got back, she'd let you know if anyone called. That was about 70 years ago."

Middlesex has grown and changed a lot since then.
"There are more residents and more mobile homes," she said.
"Business has not grown as much, most of that is still in Zebulon or Wilson.

"So many people went other places for jobs," Miss Powell said. "We used to have a sawmill and when it left, it took a lot of people with it."

Farming is still a way of life for some in Middlesex. "They (the farmers) would gather at the general store and sit and talk all day long," she related. "I remember the story of one man who sat there and talked for hours about what he was going to put in his garden that year. Unfortunately, he went home and died that afternoon."

A good number of people who were born in Middlesex move on to bigger and better things — they move to Zebulon.

"I go to Zebulon and see more people than I do right here," Miss Powell said as the afternoon breeze ruffles the trees in front of her porch on E. Hanes St. in Middlesex.



Museum saves country doctor history

A museum in Bailey recalls an era that many of us cannot remember.

The Country Doctor Museum honors a time when doctors had to be much more than healers. They often were also pharmacists, bookkeepers, gardeners, horsemen, obstetricians, coroners, family counselors, confidants and friends.

The small museum in Bailey is the only museum in the United States that is devoted to the type of doctor that began to be phased out by the modernization and specialization of medicine, according to the curator.

Today a visitor to a doctor's office fills out forms for a receptionist, then is examined often by a nurse before seeing a

physician, museum curator Emilie English said.

"You don't even see the doctor, really, except for a few minutes," she said.

In the 19th century, though, the doctor had to do everything as the museum shows. It actually is a composite restoration of two doctors' offices.

The office of Dr. Howard Franklin Freeman dates back to 1857. It has been converted into an apothecary. Shelves from the 1880s are lined with authentic bottles of the era.

The office of Dr. Cornelius Henry Brantley, circa 1887, now features medical devices and items from that century.

The museum was started in 1967 by Josephine Newell and Gloria Graham. Both had come from families of doctors and had collected a lot of anti-

quated equipment that became the foundation of the museum, Mrs. English said.

The museum maintains a medicinal herb garden, growing many of the plants that were once and still are used as medicines.

For example, the stem of witchhazel is an astringent. Foxglove becomes a heart medicine. Dill aids digestion.

"Evidently they weren't afraid to try things or else how could they have found these things out," Mrs. English said. The museum has a few examples of quackery — scalpels used in bloodletting, instruments to relieve "pressure on the brain," devices to apply electrical current to inflamed areas, and tonic waters containing morphine.

But even some of these

theories come back into vogue, she said, noting recent experimentation with leeches.

The museum also features a few oddities. On display is an operating table that was used during the Civil War.



Place in history

Formerly the offices of two doctors, this building is now The Country Doctor Museum.

Also there are Matthew Moore Butler's surgical tools, believed to have been used by Butler to assist in the May 1863 amputation of General Stonewall Jackson's left arm.

The museum also has Butler's journal, recording various charges generally between \$1 to \$1.50. "Wouldn't that be great today?" she said.

A rate chart from 1866 prices amputation of an arm or leg at \$25, amputation of a toe or finger at \$5 to \$25, treatment of syphillis in its advanced stages at \$20 to \$30, and delivery of a baby at \$10.

Not dating back that far are the museum's "guest curators," mainly retired doctors, many of whom add to the oral histories at the museum.

"There's so many older physicians who have so much to share, so much to tell," Mrs.

English added.

Dr. Ben Thomas of Zebulon will be guest curator of the museum this Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m.

To get to the museum, take U.S. 264 east and exit at N.C. 581 South. Follow the signs to the museum on Vance Street.





Saponi - evidently a corruption of Monasiccapano or Monasukapanough, which is shown by Bushnell, is probably derived in part from a native term "moni-seep" signifying "shallow water." Paanese is a corruption and in no way connected with the word "Pawnee". The Saponi belonged to the Siouan linguistic family, their nearest relations being the Tutelo.

The oldest known town site of the Tutelo was near Salem, Virginia though the Big Sandy River at one time bore their name and may

have been an earlier seat.

In 1650 the Occaneechi a tribe whose historic seat was on an island in Roanoke River near the present Clarksville, Virginia. Edward Blande and his companions learned of them in 1650, but did not visit their town. The Occaneechi belonged to the Siouan linguistic stock. Their closet connections were probably the Tutelo and Saponi. They were located on the middle and largest island in Roanoke River, just below the confluence of the Staunton and the Dan, near the site of Clarksville, Mecklenburg County, Virginia.

In 1654 - 1656 Lederer, an early Indian authority mentions a war in which the Saponi seem to have been engaged with the Virginia settlers. The location of the Saponia and Tutelo at about the early mid 1670's removed to the junction of the Staunton and Dan Rivers where they settled near their kinsman, the Occaneechi; each tribe occupying an island in the Roanoke River near Clarksville, Mecklenburg County, Virginia near the North Carolina border.

When the Occaneechi lived on the Roanoke River in Virginia they probably ranged over into Warren, Halifax and Northhampton Counties in North Carolina. In 1701 they were in Orange

County, North Carolina.

In 1701 they were in Orange County and another group of Saponi migrated to Nash County, North Carolina. Soon afterward they left this place and gravitated toward the White settlements in Virginia. They evidently crossed Roanoke River before the Tuscarora War of 1711, establishing themselves a short distance east of it and 15 miles west of the present Windsor, Bertie County, North Carolina. A little later they, along with the Tutalo and some other tribes were placed by Governor Spotswood near Fort Christianna, 10 miles north of Roanoke River about the present Gholsonville, Brunswick County. The name of Sappony Creek in Dinwiddie County, dating back to 1733 at least, indicates that they sometimes extended their excursions north of Nottoway River. By the treaty of Albany in 1772 the Iroquois agreed to stop incursions on the

Virginia Indians and probably about 1740, the greater part of the Saponi and the Tutelo moved north stopping for a time at Shamokin, PA., about the site of Sunbury. One band, however remained south in Granville County, North Carolina until at least 1755, when they comprised of 14 men and 14 women.

In 1748 once again the Saponi left Catawba in South Carolina and returned to Virginia. They further splintered into smaller bands who spread throughout the colony. A few Saponi migrated to Granville County, North Carolina where they settled on the land of the Indian trader William Eaton.

Monday May 23, 1757 a petition from Andrew Hampton was read in the North Carolina House at Newbern, the petition praying for an allowance for the provisions furnished 160 Indians was placed under consideration. Earlier the North Carolina Assembly in 1753 had appointed Commissioners in Granville and three other frontier counties to furnish provisions for the Indians allied with the Province against the French and the Cherokee Indians. The allied Indians were probably Tuscarora and Saponi. In 1753-58, some 30 Saponi lived north of present Henderson, North Carolina on land of Colonel William Eaton, who acted as their interpreter. The first Court of Granville in 1746 was held in Colonel Eaton's house, he served as Public Register for the County and was Commander of the Regiment of eight Companies of the Militia.

In 1757 a delegation of Indians from the Virginia/North Carolina border region which included two Saponi representatives visited the Governor of Virginia at Williamsburg, Virginia.
