



Few people living in Pilot are aware there was a Post Office there in the early 1900's. It was located in Mr. Al Privette's store and was situated in the southeastern corner of the crossroads. It is still standing today and is used as a storage building. The first Postmaster was Johnny Monklin who picked up mail from Eagle Rock, in Wake County, brought it back to Pilot and left it at the store. This was a trip of eight miles he made with his horse and buggy. In winter he used a heavy buggy robe to keep him warm. When it rained, he would stop and rest under a barn shelter, bridge or whatever was nearby to protect him from the weather.

Mr. Thomas Jones, a Negro, was the second Courier in Pilot. He served there until 1913

when the Post Office was abandoned for Rural Free Delivery, provided by the Federal Government. These early carriers not only carried the mail, they carried the news they picked up along the way. Some of the mail carriers from the Pilot Community are, Troy Medlin, Ernest Upchurch, Bud Griffin, Buddie Williams, Starkey Hoyle, Clarence Pearce, Ben Corbett, Herman Jones and Hardin Perry.


Also, if at all possible, I would appreciate a photo of George's grave site.

There are many Perry home sites located in different parts of Franklin County, One of
the best know and more familiar Perry sites in the county is "CASCINE" which was a
land grant to the elder Jeremiah I Perry. Deed records prove Jeremiah 1 Perry owned."
CASCINE Reference is p. 18 of Warren Co. DR 2 July 28 1767. Old Granvilla Co.
map has Osborne Jeffereys place identified by his name and the Jeremiah 1 Dermy place
liearby, as "CASCINE". This proves the location of his land is in the southern part of
Franklin county, but there is little if any need for such proof here because there is no doubt
whatever about the location of the "CASCINE" property or that it originally belonged to
older Jeremian I Perry.
According to Hattie Frances Perry Stallings and Benny Laster Perry
in their book. "The Family of Wesley B. Perry "published in 1975 in
Willis 1 Perry sold the " CASCINE " plantation to his uncle Burwell
Perry just before he moved to Georgia. She cited this information
in her book, on Oct. 15, 1/85, "Willis 1 Perry deeded to Runwell 1
Perry 382 acres "a certain tract or parcel of land lying and being
in the county aforesaid containing by estimation three hundred and
eighty two acres more or less lying and being on the SS of Cedar
Creek,as may more fully appear by a patent granted to the elder
Jeremiah Perry by John Earl of Granville bearing date October 28,
1751. " Also another tract 467 acres.
According to Hattie Stallings, this was the " CASCINE " land and as
much as she hated to shatter a strong tradition, she said that this document proved that it was Willis 1 Perry, not the younger
Jeremiah 2 Perry, who sold the " CASCINE PLANTATION " to his
uncle Burwell 1 Perry;
However, I, Ned Perry, invite you to compare this information to
the next paragraph below.
A Charles Wesly Perry wrote a book in 1967 about his father,
"A History of the John Wesly Perry, Jr. Family "
I his book is in the NC Archives, 929.2 Page 60 of this Book says
uat
Burwell 1 Perry was the youngest of the Perry brothers. He was
about πeen years of age when they came to Granville County, that
part of which is now Franklin County. He received land grants
totaling 1,5// acres. The other brothers all received land grants of
land from Lord Granville. Jeremiah 1 Perry, (this would have been
trie older Jeremian) the oldest of the SEVEN BROTHERS also had
a grant of 1500 acres, (This next sentence may not be accurate.)
which he gave to his son Jeremiah 2 Perry, Jr. and that Jeremiah 2
Perry, Jr. sold that land to his uncle Burwell 1 Perry. (see notes for
Jeremiah 1 Perry.) Documents indicate that the older Jeremiah 1 Perry's eldest son Willis 1 Perry inherited, according to English
custom. The males in the Jeremiah 1 Perry family can pretty well
be reconstructed, with Willis 1 Perry as the only child of full age
when his father died. "

Now you the reader can decide between the two accounts written above, which one is the accurate account. I, Ned Perry the writer of this information could not clear that question up.

Anyway, The old Perry home was built on this tract of land owned by Burwell 1 Perry. This land has never been out of Perry hands, of which they are very proud.

"CASCINE" - The Perry Family Homestead, was built in 1750, and is the oldest house in Franklin County, North Carolina. The Perry Plantation is (or was up until the late 1960's) owned by Bennett Hilliard Perry, Sr. a direct descendant of Burwell 1 Perry. Bennett Perry was an attorney in Henderson until he passed away on June 21, 1963 at the age of 78. He was born in Granville County, was educated at Horner Military School, Oxford, NC and received the bachelor of laws degree from the University of North Carolina in 1907. He had practiced law in Henderson, NC since 1907, except for two years he spent in the United States Army during World War I, in which he served as a Captain.

The "CASCINE PLANTATION" is located in Franklin County, about three miles south of Louisburg, NC, just East of U.S. Highway 401. I want to give a little space of our Perry History to record some information which I believe our Perry Family would like to know. Much of the following information was secured from a special story written by T.H. Pearce of the Durham Morning Herald, Sunday, May 16, 1965, of Durham, North Carolina.

" CASCINE IS ANTEBELLUM MONUMENT "

"CASCINE" might be called a symbol of Old North Carolina. It is a modest little house, so modest that it has been largely over-looked in the excitement over more pretentious historical attractions. Yet it was built 17 years prior to the time Governor Tryon began his Palace in New Bern, NC. When people think of early American homes and plantations, almost invariably they think of Mount Vernon, The Hermitage, or Perhaps Monticello. Comparatively few people have ever heard of "CASCINE." Yet in Franklin County, NC is located a large plantation, with buildings intact and furnished just as they were when North Carolina was still a British Colony. Perhaps "CASCINE" doesn't have the historical importance of Mount Vernon and Monticello, but as an example of buildings and furnishings of early America, it is unexcelled.

A framed document hanging on the living room wall of the old house reads:

"Department of Interior, Washington, D.C.
This is to certify that the historic building known as Cascine, in the County of Franklin and the State of North Carolina has been selected by the advisory committee of the Historic American Buildings Survey, as possessing exceptional Historic or Architectural Interest and as being worthy of most careful

preservation for the benefit of future generations, and that to this end a record of its present appearance and condition has been made and deposited for permanent reference in the Library of Congress.

Harold L. Ickes, Secretary of Interior. "

The plantation is owned (as of 1964) by Bennet H. Perry, Jr. an attorney located in Henderson, NC. The buildings and furnishings were preserved and restored to their present state by the Senior Bennett Perry. Bennett Perry, Sr. devoted much time and labor to this end. Bennett Perry, Jr. has stated that he intends to carry on with his father's efforts and has evidenced an equal love for the old plantation.

Bennett Perry, Jr. is a direct descendant of the seven Perry brothers who settled the land in 1740, coming from Virginia after receiving a grant from the Earl of Granville. A framed copy of the original grant now hangs on the living room wall.

The original tract has remained intact throughout the more than two centuries that have passed since it was originally granted to the Perrys.

CASCINE is not designated by a historical marker. One can get to Cascine from HWY 401 about 7 miles south of Louisburg. CASINE cannot be reached from but is located just North West of the North end of the Franklin Reginal Airport in Franklin County.

A person who turns down the dirt road, to the East, will find, after driving about 1 mile with the lands of the plantation on both sides, a long, oak-lined drive leading off the East side of the road. At the end of this drive one will see a graceful old two story white house with a large porch across the entire front. This is the so-called "new" house of CASCINE. It was built in 1850. A beautiful example of ante-bellum architecture.

To the left of this residence is the original "CASCINE HOUSE", a trim six-room, white framed, shingle-roofed house built in 1750 and still furnished as it was over two hundred fifty years ago.

Entering the house from the small front porch, one goes directly into the living room and goes back in time, more than two hundred years, to Colonial North Carolina. This room contains a collection of furniture which would bring joy to the heart of any antique fancier. There is a corner cupboard with a collection of old china and glassware. Over the mantle, above a large fireplace, hangs a portrait of an early member of the Perry family. On a deacon's bench, along the rear wall, there is an old carriage robe with the name "Perry" in needle-point. This robe was the handiwork of a guest, who presented it to her hosts in appreciation for their hospitality.

Going into the dining room, the visitor's eye is immediately caught by the display of priceless pewter ware, once so common, but now so rare. The pieces range in size from small mugs to large platters, displayed on the dining room table, in a corner cupboard, and across the mantle.

On the hearth, there is an assortment of utensils which were an integral part of every house-hold of the era: warming pans, irons, candle molds, bed warmers, and even a popcorn popper and a waffle iron.

One of the most interesting relics is a framed copy of a Treasury Warrant, signed by Alexander Hamilton, Secretary of the Treasury, September 13, 1789. This document was numbered one (1) with pen and ink and was the first money ever borrowed by the U.S. Government. The amount was \$20,000.00 and was loaned to the government by the Bank of New York.

A small bedroom, off the dinning room, contains a stretch cord bed, two leather trunks, a dresser, and a night stand. On the dresser is a box containing a large tortoise shell comb.

In a gun rack at the side of the narrow stairs, in the back hall, are two muzzle loading rifles, a flintlock muzzle loading Sharps rifle and muzzle loading Confederate manufactured carbine. These guns, along with a Philadelphia derringer, in the dining room cupboard, make up the armament of the house. A number of shot and powder flasks hang by the stairway, in addition to a metal hurricane lamp.

One of the two upstairs rooms was used as a sewing and spinning room and holds an assortment of spinning wheels, a loom, and other equipment used for the home manufacture of cloth in that bygone era. The second upstairs room is a bedroom and contains a spool bed, cradle, and a leather trunk.

The books in this house give a clue to the tastes of the early occupants and would bring envy to the eye of any collector of rare volumes. In addition to the usual works of Shakespeare and Pilgrims Progress, there is a copy of Milton's "Paradise Lost "dated 1764; a "Magazine Des Infants" printed in France in 1705, and a pamphlet, dated April 19, 1774, containing Edmund Burke's speech on American taxation.

The "CASCINE" house is constructed of heart pine, cut from the plantation. No joints show in the floor; all the flooring was cut to

the full length of the rooms. The interior woodwork has been painted. Time has given it a surface appearance of something grown beautiful with age that is both wonderful and rare. Typical of houses of this era, "CASCINE" house contains no kitchen, The cooking was done in a separate building constructed of brick which still stands a few paces away.

Sampson' Strickland and his unidentified first wife (possibly Elizabeth Taylor) had the following known child:

i. Sampson' Strickland, born say 1754, probably in Southampton County, Virginia. He married first his cousin BYTHE (-?-) about 1780 in Wake County, North Carolina. 153 She died before 1816, and Sampson married ANC second Elizabeth (-?-) in Nash County, North #57 Carolina, before 14 September 1816.154 He died in Franklin County, North Carolina, on 16 May 1839. 155 Sampson is first of record as a soldier in the Revolutionary War in 1780, when he enlisted in Wake County. 156 He sold to brother Obadiah 250 acres on the north side of Mocoson Creek on 28 May 1784. 157 Nash County records reveal little about Sampson. The Wake County tax collector found him from 1792 to 1794. 158 Sampson later moved to Franklin County, where he appears on tax lists from 1804 to 1815. 159 He apparently moved to Nash County by the next year, as Sampson, wife Elizabeth, and others sold eighty-five acres on the Willow Meadow Branch on 14 September 1816.100 Sampson's relationship to the other individuals was not specified. He was an insolvent for the year 1821, as reported on 14 November 1822. 161 The Nash County court noted that he was in arrears on his property taxes on 15 August 1827. 162

Sampson and his second wife Christiana (-?-) Strickland had the following children:

ii. Obadiah Strickland, born circa January 1763 in Johnston County, North Carolina. He married a woman who remains unidentified about 1783 in Wake County. She was perhaps Winnie (-?-). Obadiah died in Pickens County, Alabama, on 10 December 1842. 163 He received 250 acres of land in Wake County on Mocoson Creek from his brother Sampson on 28 May 1784. 164 Their brother Abel witnessed the transaction. Obadiah was in Franklin County, North Carolina, by September 1788, when he was a patroller in Captain Arrendell's district. 165 Obadiah witnessed a deed involving brother Abel Strickland on 28 February 1789.166 A Winnie Strickland also witnessed the same deed. Some researchers have proposed that Winnie was his wife, but there is no other supporting evidence. Obadiah relocated to Franklin County, probably in 1789, as he appears in the 1790 census there.167 He served as the overseer for the road from Mocoson Creek to Dunn's Road to Williames Ferry DAD on September 1793.168 He appraised the estate of Zedekiah Edwards in September 1822. 169 The federal census schedules note that Obadiah was a male between sixty and seventy years old in Franklin County in 1830. He lived with a woman between fifty and sixty years old, almost certainly his wife. 170 He was still in Franklin County on 25 December 1832, because he owed about \$100 to William Dunn's estate. 171 Obadiah's obituary in Pickens County, Alabama, states that he died on 10 December 1842. 172

- 23 iii. Lot Strickland, born say 1764, probably in Johnston County, North Carolina. He died in Wake County between 31 December 1784 and 11 April 1785, the dates when he wrote his will and when it was proved. 173 He was under age when his father's estate was settled, 174 but he was old enough to write his own will at the end of 1784. 175
- iv. ABEL STRICKLAND, born say 1765 in Johnston County, North Carolina. He married Nancy (—?—) about 1786 in Wake County, North Carolina. He died in Franklin County, North Carolina, before 15 December 1801, when his brother Sampson returned his estate inventory. Nancy appeared on the 1804 tax list, but was not listed in 1805, indicating that she may have died that year. Abel first
 - Appeared as a witness to a deed involving cousin Elisha Strickland on 5 March 1785. The Abel purchased one hundred acres of land on Mocoson Creek in Franklin County on 28 February 1789. His brother Obadiah and Winnie Strickland witnessed the sale. He lived in Franklin County during the 1790 federal census enumeration. He helped
 - maintain the road from Mocoson Creek to Dunn's Road on September 1793.¹⁸¹ Abel wrote his will on 4 October 1801.¹⁸² The court received his estate inventory on 15 December 1801.¹⁸³ His personal property was later sold.¹⁸⁴
- v. Mathew Strickland, born say 1768 in Johnston County, North Carolina. He died on an unknown date. His mother became his guardian on 3 March 1783. Mathew received money from the will his brother Lot wrote on 31 December 1784. There is no other record that can be tied specifically to this Mathew after this point. He may be the Mathew Strickland in the Nash County 1790 federal census. He may have been the Mathew named in his brother Abel's estate sale about 1801.
- vi. Mary Ann Strickland, born say 1771 in Johnston County, North Carolina. She died on an unknown date. Her mother became her guardian on 3 March 1783. 189 Nothing further is known of her
- ∠ vii. Braswell Strickland, born say 1774 in Wake County, △ North Carolina. He married Mary StrickLand, daughter of Elisha Strickland, about 1792 in Franklin County, North Carolina. Braswell probably died in Franklin County after 1832. 190 He was probably Sampson's youngest child. He was still under age when he came to court and chose his cousin Elisha Strickland as his guardian on 2 March 1790. 191 Braswell received money from the will his brother Lot wrote on 31 December 1784. 192 The 1799 Franklin County tax list credited Braswell with two hundred acres of land. 193 Braswell brought suit against the other legatees of his fatherin-law Elisha Strickland in June 1805. The provision for Braswell's wife Mary was an insertion into the will, and Braswell sued for rectification. 194 Braswell won the lawsuit, but he somehow assaulted one of the parties and therefore had to pay court costs. He appealed the decision in May 1806. 195 Braswell owed tax on 217 acres of Franklin County land from 1804 to 1815. 196 He appears in the 1830 federal census in Franklin County. 197 William Dunn's estate records mentioned Braswell in March 1833. 198

iii. ELISHA STRICKLAND, born say 1741 in Isle of Wight County, Virginia. He married a woman who remains unidentified by 1765 in Johnston County, North Carolina. He died in Wake County, North Carolina, after 23 February 1795.8 Elisha purchased seven hundred acres in Johnston County on both sides of Mocoson Creek at a branch of Little River On 22 July 1761.83 A Joseph Strickland was a chain carrier when this patent was surveyed.[™] This Joseph was most likely Elisha's uncle. Elisha may have been the "Elijah 🕰 Strickland" mentioned in the estate records of Robert Cade in Bute County on 3 June 1769.85 Elisha lived in the part of Johnston County that became a part of Wake County in 1771. 




According to the oldest book in the Register of Deeds Office of Franklin County, Louisburg, N.C., there is a transaction recorded whereby Joseph Norris acquired land along Little Crooked Creek in Bute County, Franklin since 1779, from the State of North Carolina May 22, 1778. This was the establishing point of time when Mr. Norris started one of the first industries in this county consisting of a dam, pond, and grist mill that is now known as Perry's Mill Pond on Norris Creek. Little Crooked Creek became known as Norris Creek being named after the founder of this mill and pond. At this time in our history, General George Washington and his troops were quartered in Valley Forge where they had just endured a bitter and very cold winter. The American Revolution lasted eleven more years. This is one of the oldest mill pond sites in Franklin County. However, the original rock dam and mill house washed away during a flood in the latter part of June 1913.

	Benny Laster Perry, was drafted into the US Army on September 13, 1943. At the
	time, he was attending Wake Forest College, which was located in Wake Forest, NC but
	later moved to Winston Salem, NC. Ben fought with the 78th Lightwing Infantry Division
	in the European Theater of Operations during World War II, participating in the Battle of
	the Ardennes Forest, Battle of the Belgian Bulge, Central Europe and Rhineland. He
	received the Combat Infantryman's Badge and three Bronze Star Medals during these
	battles. He helped to interrogate and translate the German language from prisoners. He
	majored for three years at Wake Forest in German. Ben was honorably discharged April

	the date in time that Mr. Norris established one of the first industries in Franklin County
	consisting of a dam, pond, and grist mill on what is now known as Norris Creek. The
	creek was named after the founder of this mill and pond. This is one of the oldest mill

In 1806 the property was transferred to John Norris, son of Joseph Norris.

In 1810 John Norris sold the mill and pond to William Harrison who owned the Cedar Creek Plantation west of the Royal community, located on US HWY 401, in Franklin County, NC. The site then became known as the Old Harrison's Mill and Pond.

In 1860 Dr. Edward Alston Crudup and wife Columbia purchased the property. Dr. Crudup owned a large plantation North and West of Bunn, in Franklin County, NC. The Old Harrison Mill and Pond then became known as Crudup's Mill and Pond.

In 1904 and a few years thereafter there were several short-term owners.

In 1913 (June) the original rock dam and mill house was washed away during a flood.

In 1934 the Zebulon Oil and Ice Co. purchased the property. They planned to re-build the dam and pond in order to have an ice plant constructed at the site instead of another milling business. These plans never materialized.

In 1937 Clifton L. Perry, (Ben's father) purchased the property from Zebulon Oil and Ice Company. Clifton Perry, as did his forefathers, farmed near the head of the pond.

In 1937-38 Clifton Perry built a new concrete reenforced dam. This dam is in place today. In 1938 Clifton Perry built a larger grist mill house accommodating 2 turbine water wheels that would furnish much more power than an overshot wheel. The new dam would power 6 sets of mill stones,

Clifton Perry also built:

- 3 houses for the miller's to live in,
- a country store with 4-room apartment for the store operator's family to live in, a shop
- and a log cabin complete with a furnace to make coals for a pit to barbecue pigs and chickens, for pig pickings, picnics, recreation, etc.

Just after the end of World War II Clifton Perry modernized the operation by adding a shuck and sheller machine for corn, a feed mill and a hammer mill to grind and mix feeds for livestock. A diesel engine was installed for supplemental power and to use during periods of drought when the water in the pond was too low to use for power. A smaller gasoline unit was used at times for pulling only one of the above machines. Clifton Perry gave nearby land on which a church was built.

In 1965 the milling business closed. The milling industry had started to decline. Modern farm machinery harvested the grain, mobile feed mixers would go directly to the farm to mix their feeds, housewives would pick up small qualities of flour and meal at the supermarkets and thus the farmer had less need to go to the mill. The closing brought an end to the first industry in this area.

In 1970 Clifton Perry gave Perry's Mill Pond to his son Ben Perry.

In 1975 Ben Perry landscaped the grounds around the dam and mill area and along Norris Creek down to the bridge on SR 1001. The landscaping project was completed in time to be beautiful for the Franklin County 1976 Bicentennial. The site is a very scenic place in its natural state. High School students from several schools have pictures made here for their year books.

In 1977 Ben Perry wrote this additional history of the Mill Pond.

In 1978 The Bunn High School Seniors won a statewide award for the best outdoor pictures, which were made at the site. Many paintings have been made, pen and ink sketches, and thousands of photographs, including aerial photographs, have been made at the site. Several large newspapers have written about the site. Many weddings have been performed at the site over the years. It is a reminder of an era gone by. The Mill Pond is a 1.3 mile long clean, clear body of water with two beautiful islands; a perfect setting for a balanced wildlife habitat. The Mill Pond is open to the public for fishing and picnics, 365 days a year. The Mill Pond is well know for bass, bream, catfish and crappie.

In 1995 (August, 29) the old Mill House was washed away by a flash flood. The flood also did severe damage to the dam. Ben Perry repaired the dam shortly after the flood.

In 1996 During the summer Ben Perry rebuilt the mill.

In 1999 Hurricane Floyd destroyed the right end of the dam and the new mill built in 1996.

In 2000 Ben repaired the dam with concrete and replaced the clay and rocks. Lawrence Perry made another water wheel to replace the one that that was destroyed.

Perry's Mill Pond has a long and rich history. It is listed in the N. C. Department of Archives and History as a popular landmark and historic site. It is also listed with the Old Mills of the U.S.A.
