Matthew Addison Council – b. 1835 d. Dec 14, 1862

Matthew Addison Council, (son of Kimbrol W. and Ada Yates Council). He was born in Chatham County, North Carolina and died 14 Dec. 1862 at Finns Point, Salem, New Jersey.

Matthew married Lousetta Upchurch on 08 Aug, 1855 in Chatham County, North Carolina. Lousetta was the daughter of Simms Upchurch and Abigail Olive.

Matthew is my great-great grandfather, born of Kimbrol W. and Ada Yates Council in Chatham County, North Carolina (Apex) Matthew and Lousetta had about 100 acres and lived close (about a mile from their grandparents, Robert and Rebecca Council. His parents Kimbrol and Ada lived close also. In fact all the brothers and sisters lived relatively close and all attended the same church, Mt Pisgah Church. Part of the land for the original church was donated by Kimbrol Council. The Mt Pisgah Church today was nothing like the original one, which was nothing more than a wooden structure with a dirt floor.

Kimbrol Council (Matthew's father) and Simms Upchurch (Lousetta's father) were elders in the Mt Pisgah Church.

Lousetta, Matthew's wife was born 27 July 1834. When he and Lousetta married he was just shy of 21 years old. Everything revolved around the church. All the social gatherings, gossip, and news of the day. It was a treat and a celebration to go to church each month. Because farm work took so much time, farmers made the trip once a month and made a big picnic out of it. All the families that could came that day. So it stands to reason that news of the war was talked about but the young men and they knew it was coming. And I am sure they boasted of how they would fight for their state and their way of living. I am equally sure that the wives and mothers were ever fearful that the day would arrive.

Well the war did come. Conscription came calling and all the young men from around the Mt Pisgah Church were conscripted up and they were herded off with nothing more than their good hunting rifle and the clothes on their back. Matthew enlisted 15 July 1862, along with his brothers, PB (Paschell), ED

(Dorsey), GS (George) and Calvin). Robert J Council, the youngest of the boys joined during the end of the war and was paroled at Appomattox.

Matthew served under Stonewall Jackson. He was in Major General Daniel Harvey Hill's Division in Garlands Brigade (Brig Gen Samuel Garland Jr.). His direct commanding officers were Col DK McRae and Capt. Thomas Garrett. Matthew was wounded 17 Sept, 1862 at Sharpsburg Maryland. On this date in the battle, 46 were killed, 210 wounded, 187 missing. Matthew was captured and marched to Finn's Point Salem, New Jersey. They were put on boats and taken to Ft. Delaware, a masonry fortification located on Pea Patch Island in the middle of the Delaware River. He died of his wounds 14 Dec. 1862 after serving only 5 months those that died were taken across the river in the very same boats and thrown into pits, (mass graves) at Finns' Point Salem, New Jersey. There is a monument with the names of the soldiers who died there, both Union and Confederate. Where exactly Matthew is, I cannot say only there are a number of Mounds, pits, where the many soldiers were buried. The Union soldiers are separate from the Confederate soldiers.

PB (Paschell) was the last to see his brother. PB was handed over to the Confederate soldiers in exchange for Union prisoners held by the Confederate side. PB would meet his end in Fredericksburg.

It had to be very tough for those left behind when their husbands, fathers and brothers were marched away. I am sure Matthews's wife Lousetta had her difficult times. She had an affair with a Confederate Officer and the result being Henry Williams. The Confederate Officer was G.S. (George Sanford Williams). It became evident after a time of her pregnancy and she was excommunicate from the Mt Pisgah Church. I have seen and I have copies of the church records. No one was allowed to talk to her or acknowledge her. In 1865 Lousetta and GS Williams married.

GS Williams was wounded three times at three different battles; the most notable was at Gettysburg. He was paroled at Appomattox. I wonder if he and Robert J Council saw each other there. Anyway he signed an Oath of Allegiance and came

home to Chatham County and married Lousetta Upchurch Council. He then became stepfather to my great grandfather James Henderson Claude Council.

The Williams had a nice farm plus the farm that belonged to Matthew and was supposed to go to James Henderson, his surviving son. There were many debts that had to be paid after the war and many liens on the Council Farm for some of these debts. James Henderson, a minor at the time, was sued in lue of his father for these debts. The farm itself was under the control of Simms Upchurch and GS Williams. There was no money to pay these debts and Southern money was worth \$1 to every \$18 of Northern money. So the property and all that was on it was sold for pennies. James Henderson lost what he felt was rightfully his. He left the Williams farm at about 19 years of age and never returned, or spoke of his mother or to anyone of the Council Family again. He married Lecy Ann Mills in Wake County and began his own life. I cannot even find that he acknowledged his mother's death or attended her funeral. I think the casualties of war went far beyond those that paid with their lives. James Council became bitter and I think he remained that way his entire life.

Hadley Mills is a few miles from where the rest of the family lived and all had stable farms and attended the monthly meetings at Mt Pisgah Church. This is just before the war.

PB Council (brother to Matthew lives in Williams PO. PB's land value is \$1000 and his personal value is \$3000. He had more livestock.

Martha Council Housekeeper

Theodocia Council dau (1)

Ada Council (Mathew's mother) was not doing as well. Her husband and Matthew's father died 17 April 1857. That is another story

Ada Council (50) Farmer – land value \$800-\$900

George Council 18

Robert Council 14

Artellia Council 12

Ofeliua Council 9

Ada lost 4 of her sons in the Civil War and when she passed not a finer tribute was given at her funeral, many people attended. That to, is another story.

Robert Council and Rebecca were there in 1860, Robert being 92. He passed away in 1862 and since Rebecca was not mentioned in his will I can only assume she died between 1860 and 1862.

There is so much more to this Council story and I am determined to document all that I can so that my family and grandchildren will know from where they come.

Now I have you somewhat in my records but not exactly. I show possibly seven children of Lucetta but names of only four and your Viola is not among them. We have some serious updating to do with which I hope you will help. I have James born 1858 and Fenner born 1860 whereupon I am left to believe that Matthew went off to war and got killed. My next children are Alice born 1872 and Malenda born 1834, these last were obviously by her second husband. Can you help with more names. Perhaps you have some organized material you can share. In due course I will have some information to send to you. I am very pleased to have you as a cooperator for the Sims Upchurch family as we need to pull more records together for this group.

I invite you to have a look at the website for our new organization Allied Families where we are doing family history in a more powerful way. It is www.alliedfamilies.com. Note that we have already enrolled the Moses Upchurch family to which you belong. I hope you will support us in this endeavor by becoming a 2015 member of Allied Families at a cost of \$20. DOCUMENT PLACED IN HIS BJO FILE

It's sorry but I misspoke about Viola. She is the daughter of James Henderson Council, who is the son of Lousetta Upchurch and Matthew Council. Attached is a story you may have seen from Theresa Longley that speaks to Matthew's life. Matthew was wounded, captured, and died in the Civil War leaving two sons - James Henderson (1858-1930) and Fenner (1860-?). I have found these records on Fold3 to confirm.

It appears Fenner dies early in childhood as James inherits his father's farm (I need to check on this). During this time Lousetta marries (through less than reputable means) George Williams. They go on to have several more children, which I have not explored. James Henderson marries Lecy Mills (1857-1932). They have 8 children, including Viola (1879-1967), Arthur, Audrey, Miriam, Ralph, Hugh, Swannoe, and Lucy. I haven't done much with the children other than Viola.

Viola marries William Penn Carroll (1866-1951) and lives in Wake Forest (in the northern part of Wake County). They have children Ruth (1907-1975) [I vaguely remember her], Hollis, Bruce, and Cory. Again, no details on the children other than Ruth. I do have a blurry picture of Viola, a picture of their grave, and her original social security application which lists her parents.

Ruth Carroll marries Samuel Pearson (1901-1978) in Wake Forest. They have children Wallace, Robert, Nathan, Hazel (1929-1996 my grandmother), Eugene, Ellis, Shirley, and Katherine. I believe they have all passed now. Sam worked a variety of jobs: in the WPA, driving a truck for the local dairy, and as a bus driver (my father remembers riding with him as a child). They lived in Raleigh off Glenwood Avenue near Peace Street. I remember as a child going to their house, walking down the nearby RR tracks and watching baseball games at Devereaux Meadows when Raleigh had a minor league team in the early 70's.

My genealogy focus has been on the Terry family so far and a few allied families there - Choplin/Joplin and Perry. They lived in northern Wake County from at least 1800, maybe earlier, but records are sparse. Haven't done too much with the Upchurch/Council/Carroll side of the family, though I did connect with a Mills researcher a few years back. They have a nice long history near Apex and a family cemetery.

I'm not sure I have the time to be a tree-master for the group, but I can help some. Wake County has digitized ALL of their land records back to the early days (though some early ones were lost in a fire). They can be found at the Register of Deeds website.

Hope that helps. I'll look at the website and at becoming a supporter.

My great grandmother was a Mills. Also, I have roots in northern Wake and we probably have connections there. It will take time for all of this to unfold. I will move stepwise at this end.

I do hope you will find a way to encourage us in our efforts in Allied Families. This has great potential. You can help with time, money, advice, or what ever. With a hundred people each giving a little we can have a big result. We have the aspiration of a repository/museum/library in Wake County. Unless there is an unexpected development we will keep this on the back burner until we get our digital platform fully operational. But this is very important to me.

Sometime in the next few months I hope to spend three weeks in Raleigh and I hope we can meet then for a chat.

Hi Terry--- STEPHEN.

It turned out I interacted with about 75 people on my NC trip. I made the first pass at processing, thanking, etc and then shifted to producing the 2015 Upchurch Bulletin which is coming along nicely.

Now I have returned to my NC contacts for a second look and have just finished going over details of our exchanges going back several months leading me to make several comments.

First, about about your start of a design on the Annotated Cemetery Project and your interest in same. Your design is a good start and in many ways matches what I have done in an exploratory way. I need to do more on my example and then share it with you and with several others who have expressed an interest in this project. I anticipate the project will be run by volunteers out of our Cary Facility. I think it important that we have a set format but which can be modified somewhat to fit individual cases. I see the key elements as follows:

1. Introduction---to cover the name of the site (Cemetery Name), the location (GPS, Map), how the site got started (who donated land, family involved), current management, etc.
 2. A print out from Find A Grave (if available) supplemented by comments to be added (full names, relationship to others, etc)
 3. A supplementary list of people relevant but not buried here to which reference can be made in 2.
 4. A brief sketch of families involved.
 - 5 A recap showing people who helped generate the annotated version, how to make corrections, additions, the role of Allied Families, useful linkages, etc
- These are few things that need to be incorporated. I'll so some more work at my end and get back to you on this in due course.

My Master Outline on the Moses U./Sims U./Simms U. Family is a little skinny. I have made a copy of it as it now stands to mail to you before I add inputs you have provided. Your additions will greatly expand our flock of folks.

I note that you and I both trace back to Naaman Mills and are thus cousins two ways and maybe more. I have great Mills records.

I am interested to learn more about you linkages to northern Wake. My Ray relatives were in Barton's Creek Township and I have many records on related families there. Maybe we have some kind of mutual interests there.

I am impressed by your intent to document more about your family. Here I think we can make common cause by way of Allied Families. We can accommodate a certain amount on our websites and on our Allied Families trees on Ancestry.com. However, we need a large on line repository recognizing that our Weebly based websites may not eventually accommodate all we wish to post and share. As a start I have created a Dropbox account on the Cloud and am starting to place things there as a start. I know it is good for storage and for easy retrieval and for one on one sharing but I am unclear as to how we could make such info available to our broader clientele/contacts/members. Maybe you have some ideas.

I have made extract sheets covering all of your listings of relatives and will now make copies to go in the Biofiles of each person. In filing I may encounter details to share with you. My Biofile System includes Biofiles on several hundred thousand individuals. It would be helpful if I had the name of your father if you are willing to share same.

I will preserve this transmission to share with others who express an interest in the Annotated Cemetery project. This should lead to a Working Group headed up in our Cary , N. C. Facility.

Looking forward to hearing from you on the above or on any other matters of interest~
