- As far as Charles and Alice are concerned - Charles Richard Upchurch was a card grinder at Judson Mill (a cotton mill in Greenville) and Alice was a spinner. Some of the other children were also spinners. It was through the "mill village" that most of the Upchurch children met their spouses. It was a way of life, and more than just a neighborhood. Charles Richard Upchurch died in 1938. Alice Zena (Gadd) Upchurch survived 24 year longer. She became a sort of "anchor" for the Jamison Street Church of Christ, and many of my relatives alive today remember her influence there. She died in 1962, but had been a resident of the same house for 55 years (since around 1907). It wasn't long after her death that the church relocated - I'm not saying that it was entirely her, but a convenient coincidence. In 1968 the church moved to its present location on White Horse Road and became known as the Berea Church of Christ. Fredrick James Boling and Lena Mae Upchurch Boling both lived well into their 90's. In fact they were closer to 100 year old when they passed. Lena Mae suffered from rheumatoid arthritis since she was a child, but managed it (after losing use of her hand) all of her life. They had three children together, and all of them are on their 90's and still going strong. The oldest, Evelyn, was always a "home-body" so she doesn't do much still, but stays happy and still attends weekly service at Berea Church of Christ every Sunday. My grandmother, Elizabeth Zena (named after the Gadd), is 91 years old and plays guitar and banjo in a band that plays for churches and nursing homes. She greatly enjoys the playing of music. Tommy, the youngest, enjoys farming and canning and (like me) researching days gone by. - Maybe I have said too much, if so I apologize. - Was wondering if you knew conclusively who Green Berry Upchurch's father was. And if so how they came to be in Wilkes County. I have found some scant internet information but I have not yet been able to CONCLUSIVELY determine this paternal source. If you know this, I would be indebted to know this information.

With much gratitude for what you have already compiled and for your ever enduring dedication to the Upchurch family history, and your relentless pursuit to make it available to all, even at personal cost. I thank you for your directives and motives. For some reason I feel as though every few generations God plants the seed of genealogy in the mind of an individual - the burden and desire to tell the tale of what once was. I feel that burden and desire has fallen upon me - and I suspect that you have the same yearning. A strange thing isn't it? God Bless and thank you again. -Jason Forster.

Hello Mr. Upchurch. I feel as though I am late in contacting you. But at least I am contacting you now. Green Berry Upchurch of Wilkes County, NC was my GGG Grand Father. He was born in September 1824. His mother was named "Happy", I believe. I am not sure if it was a nickname or a legal name. I do not know who his father was. I believe that he likely had a wife and a family prior to the Civil War, but I am not sure if - and if so what happened to them. He enlisted in D Company of the 33rd NC in 1863 and fought with them for awhile, almost to the end but was not with them at the surrender at Appomattox, for some reason. He would have been almost 40 when he mustered in. He returned to Wilkes County and married (again?) to Mary Shors (sp?) and I only know of one child bore to them - Charles Richard Upchurch. Mary Shors Upchurch died prior to 1880. In the 1880 census Green Berry is living alone with his young son, Charles, still in Wilkes County and is listed as a widower. At some time between 1880 and 1890 Green Berry Upchurch and his young son moved to near Anson County, NC - where I believe they had some relatives living. But that is only speculation. I am not really sure why they moved that far away from Green Berry's home county. I do believe that the Upchurch's kept in contact with one another (across county and even state lines) and I would love to find the letters that they wrote each other. I find it interesting that in the 1880 Census Green Berry is living with only his five year old son. I wonder who was providing and who was able to care for young Charles. At any rate they ended up east of Charlotte. At least Charles did. It is said that Charles had a very difficult upbringing and I can see why. He married Alice Zena Gadd at a very young age in 1892. He was only 17, and she was only 15! Alice was the youngest daughter of (what I would consider) a Civil War hero - James E. Gadd of the 26th NC - K Company - "The Pee Dee Wild Cats". They were mustered out of Anson County, NC. The 26th, and James Gadd along with them, fought through the Battle of New Bern, then in Virginia at Malvern Hill, then back in NC for the heroic effort at the small

Battle of Rawl's Mill, and back to Virginia. Onward after that they drove with the Lee and his legions to Pennsylvania. They fought with bravery on the first day of Gettysburg when they charge the so called "Iron Brigade" of the Union and pushed them back, but with terrible cost. Out of 800 men, 588 were either dead or wounded. And there on that day James E. Gadd was shot twice in the same arm, which was amputated in a field hospital the next day. James was sent back to NC and although crippled, married and had several children, the last of which was Alice Zena Gadd. Charles Richard Upchurch married her when she was just 15 years old and he was 17. They struggled in the Reconstruction Era south and Charles found work where he could. In the 1900 census Charles and Alice are found in Union County, NC with three kids and only in their early 20's. Between 1900 and 1905 they may have moved to Scotland County, NC for a short time, as my G-grandmother is shown elsewhere to have been born in "Laurel Hill, NC". Either way by 1908 they were in Greenville, South Carolina. I remember my grandmother saying to me, "After they started building the cotton mills in Greenville, many people from North Carolina started moving in." In this case she was right. Around this time Green Berry Upchurch died in September 1906 and he was buried at a veterans cemetery. - Anyway Charles and Alice moved into a mill house on Judson Road in Greenville and became part of the "mill village". It must have been quite a lifestyle change for them, having been used to open country and farmland. But they made due with what they had and managed to make a living and ended up having a total of eight children. (Lena Mae Upchurch was my G-Grandmother). Around the time of WWI there were three Boling brothers that built a church directly behind Charles and Alice's home on Judson Road. It was a Church of Christ and it was built on Jamison Street (literally directly behind Charles and Alice). The Upchurch's became involved in this church and two daughters married into the Boling family (from which I descend). Mary Upchurch, the eldest, married Willie O'Dell Boling and Lena Mae Upchurch married Frederick James Boling. Willie O. Boling was in WWI and suffered injuries due to mustard gas. He had respiratory issues the rest of his life, I believe. Frederick James Boling was several years younger than Willie and fell in love with Lena Mae Upchurch a few years after that war.

Apex

Historical Raleigh (enlarged and revised edition)
With Sketches of Wake County (from 1771)
And Its Important Towns
Descriptive, Biographical, Educational, Industrial, Religious, Illustrated
By Moses N. Amis - 1913

- △ The town of Apex had its beginning with the close of the Civil War. Among its first settlers were J. McC. Ellington, H. C. Olive, Q. I. Hudson, W. F. Utley, W. H. Harward, Brinkley Olive, A. N. Betts and others, who contributed to its life in the beginning and afterwards. It was incorporated by the Legislature of 1871-'72, with the late Hon. H. C. Olive as its first mayor. It derived its name from being the highest point on the survey of the Raleigh & Augusta Air Line Railroad.

Until 1905 it was but a small town, where the standard of virtue, intelligence and patriotism was high, but where little progress in material things had been made. In that year, beginning with the organization of a bank and the establishment of a tobacco market, began a new life for the town and surrounding community. Fire later destroying a number of unsightly frame buildings, the first brick structure was soon erected. Again, in June, 1911, nearly all the remaining old frame buildings in the business section were also consumed by fire. Now the principal street of the town (Salem) is lined with handsome pressed-brick-front stores. Business houses have continued to increase in number, until now nearly everything to complete a small city is here represented. This metropolis of western Wake is one of the busiest, most attractive and substantially built towns of its size in North Carolina. Its streets are well laid out and splendidly shaded in the residential sections, while the business part of the town is marked with buildings of beautiful architectural designs and substantial construction.

Apex has a population of about one thousand, and, being located in the centre of one of the best agricultural sections of the State, has a large rural territory from which to draw life and sustenance. It is in the limited "Old Belt" tobacco¹ lands of North Carolina and Virginia, which produce the finest yellow-wrapper tobacco. The tobacco market at Apex is one of its chief industries. It is equipped with two splendid warehouses, three large prizehouses², markets about two million pounds of tobacco annually, and enjoys the distinction of making the highest average price per pound of any market in the State. It is the centre of a fine cotton-production section, the receipts of this staple being from three to five thousand bales of cotton per year.

Public education in Wake County has always found some of its most potent advocates and influences at Apex. Notable among those who have wielded an influence throughout the county in this respect are the late Hon. H. C. Olive, State Senator and for many years chairman of the Wake County Board of Education; Hon. L. J. Sears, at present, and for many years past, chairman of the same board, and Hon. Percy J. Olive, an ex-representative and a public man who has taken an especial interest in the schools. That these gentlemen are and were but the exponents of the sentiment around them is witnessed by the fact that Apex has one of the finest and best-equipped schools in the county, and that every school in White Oak Township levies a local tax to supplement the general education fund.

Few communities in the State have had more additions to their population within the past five years than has that of which Apex is the centre. Those seeking desirable homes have found here a happy combination of advantages—fine lands, intelligent, virtuous and hospitable neighbors, good markets, good roads, good schools and good churches. No fictitious values have been placed upon the lands; for, with the true idea of progress, the efforts of those who have done most for the community's upbuilding have been directed to keeping the real estate at its true value. Contributing mostly to this and at present forming the most valuable of its citizenship, without disparagement to others, may be mentioned Messrs. W. F. Utley, W. H. Harward, A. B. Hunter, L. S. Olive, Percy J. Olive, Dr. W. Wade Olive, S. W. Stone, J. B. Mason, J. W. Lassiter, W. B. Upchurch, J. H. Sears, A. V. Baucom, A. C. Hughes, C. P. Sellars, W. B. Johnson, A. D. - As far as Charles and Alice are concerned - Charles Richard Upchurch was a card grinder at Judson Mill (a cotton mill in Greenville) and Alice was a spinner. Some of the other children were also spinners. It was through the "mill village" that most of the Upchurch children met their spouses. It was a way of life, and more than just a neighborhood. Charles Richard Upchurch died in 1938. Alice Zena (Gadd) Upchurch survived 24 year longer. She became a sort of "anchor" for the Jamison Street Church of Christ, and many of my relatives alive today remember her influence there. She died in 1962, but had been a resident of the same house for 55 years (since around 1907). It wasn't long after her death that the church relocated - I'm not saying that it was entirely her, but a convenient coincidence. In 1968 the church moved to its present location on White Horse Road and became known as the Berea Church of Christ. Fredrick James Boling and Lena Mae Upchurch Boling both lived well into their 90's. In fact they were closer to 100 year old when they passed. Lena Mae suffered from rheumatoid arthritis since she was a child, but managed it (after losing use of her hand) all of her life. They had three children together, and all of them are on their 90's and still going strong. The oldest, Evelyn, was always a "home-body" so she doesn't do much still, but stays happy and still attends weekly service at Berea Church of Christ every Sunday. My grandmother, Elizabeth Zena (named after the Gadd), is 91 years old and plays guitar and banjo in a band that plays for churches and nursing homes. She greatly enjoys the playing of music. Tommy, the youngest, enjoys farming and canning and (like me) researching days gone by. - Maybe I have said too much, if so I apologize. - Was wondering if you knew conclusively who Green Berry Upchurch's father was. And if so how they came to be in Wilkes County. I have found some scant internet information but I have not yet been able to CONCLUSIVELY determine this paternal source. If you know this, I would be indebted to know this information.

With much gratitude for what you have already compiled and for your ever enduring dedication to the Upchurch family history, and your relentless pursuit to make it available to all, even at personal cost. I thank you for your directives and motives. For some reason I feel as though every few generations God plants the seed of genealogy in the mind of an individual - the burden and desire to tell the tale of what once was. I feel that burden and desire has fallen upon me - and I suspect that you have the same yearning. A strange thing isn't it? God Bless and thank you again. - Jason Forster.

Hello Mr. Upchurch. I feel as though I am late in contacting you. But at least I am contacting you now. Green Berry Upchurch of Wilkes County, NC was my GGG Grand Father. He was born in September 1824. His mother was named "Happy", I believe. I am not sure if it was a nickname or a legal name. I do not know who his father was. I believe that he likely had a wife and a family prior to the Civil War, but I am not sure if - and if so what happened to them. He enlisted in D Company of the 33rd NC in 1863 and fought with them for awhile, almost to the end but was not with them at the surrender at Appomattox, for some reason. He would have been almost 40 when he mustered in. He returned to Wilkes County and married (again?) to Mary Shors(sp?) and I only know of one child bore to them - Charles Richard Upchurch. Mary Shors Upchurch died prior to 1880. In the 1880 census Green Berry is living alone with his young son, Charles, still in Wilkes County and is listed as a widower. At some time between 1880 and 1890 Green Berry Upchurch and his young son moved to near Anson County, NC - where I believe they had some relatives living. But that is only speculation. I am not really sure why they moved that far away from Green Berry's home county. I do believe that the Upchurch's kept in contact with one another (across county and even state lines) and I would love to find the letters that they wrote each other. I find it interesting that in the 1880 Census Green Berry is living with only his five year old son. I wonder who was providing and who was able to care for young Charles. At any rate they ended up east of Charlotte. At least Charles did. It is said that Charles had a very difficult upbringing and I can see why. He married Alice Zena Gadd at a very young age in 1892. He was only 17, and she was only 15! Alice was the youngest daughter of (what I would consider) a Civil War hero - James E. Gadd of the 26th NC - K Company - "The Pee Dee Wild Cats". They were mustered out of Anson County, NC. The 26th, and James Gadd along with them, fought through the Battle of New Bern, then in Virginia at Malvern Hill, then back in NC for the heroic effort at the small

Battle of Rawl's Mill, and back to Virginia. Onward after that they drove with the Lee and his legions to Pennsylvania. They fought with bravery on the first day of Gettysburg when they charge the so called "Iron Brigade" of the Union and pushed them back, but with terrible cost. Out of 800 men, 588 were either dead or wounded. And there on that day James E. Gadd was shot twice in the same arm, which was amputated in a field hospital the next day. James was sent back to NC and although crippled, married and had several children, the last of which was Alice Zena Gadd. Charles Richard Upchurch married her when she was just 15 years old and he was 17. They struggled in the Reconstruction Era south and Charles found work where he could. In the 1900 census Charles and Alice are found in Union County, NC with three kids and only in their early 20's. Between 1900 and 1905 they may have moved to Scotland County, NC for a short time, as my G-grandmother is shown elsewhere to have been born in "Laurel Hill, NC". Either way by 1908 they were in Greenville, South Carolina. I remember my grandmother saying to me, "After they started building the cotton mills in Greenville, many people from North Carolina started moving in." In this case she was right. Around this time Green Berry Upchurch died in September 1906 and he was buried at a veterans cemetery. - Anyway Charles and Alice moved into a mill house on Judson Road in Greenville and became part of the "mill village". It must have been quite a lifestyle change for them, having been used to open country and farmland. But they made due with what they had and managed to make a living and ended up having a total of eight children. (Lena Mae Upchurch was my G-Grandmother). Around the time of WWI there were three Boling brothers that built a church directly behind Charles and Alice's home on Judson Road. It was a Church of Christ and it was built on Jamison Street (literally directly behind Charles and Alice). The Upchurch's became involved in this church and two daughters married into the Boling family (from which I descend). Mary Upchurch, the eldest, married Willie O'Dell Boling and Lena Mae Upchurch married Frederick James Boling. Willie O. Boling was in WWI and suffered injuries due to mustard gas. He had respiratory issues the rest of his life, I believe. Frederick James Boling was several years younger than Willie and fell in love with Lena Mae Upchurch a few years after that war.

- As far as Charles and Alice are concerned - Charles Richard Upchurch was a card grinder at Judson Mill (a cotton mill in Greenville) and Alice was a spinner. Some of the other children were also spinners. It was through the "mill village" that most of the Upchurch children met their spouses. It was a way of life, and more than just a neighborhood. Charles Richard Upchurch died in 1938. Alice Zena (Gadd) Upchurch survived 24 year longer. She became a sort of "anchor" for the Jamison Street Church of Christ, and many of my relatives alive today remember her influence there. She died in 1962, but had been a resident of the same house for 55 years (since around 1907). It wasn't long after her death that the church relocated - I'm not saying that it was entirely her, but a convenient coincidence. In 1968 the church moved to its present location on White Horse Road and became known as the Berea Church of Christ. Fredrick James Boling and Lena Mae Upchurch Boling both lived well into their 90's. In fact they were closer to 100 year old when they passed. Lena Mae suffered from rheumatoid arthritis since she was a child, but managed it (after losing use of her hand) all of her life. They had three children together, and all of them are on their 90's and still going strong. The oldest, Evelyn, was always a "home-body" so she doesn't do much still, but stays happy and still attends weekly service at Berea Church of Christ every Sunday. My grandmother, Elizabeth Zena (named after the Gadd), is 91 years old and plays guitar and banjo in a band that plays for churches and nursing homes. She greatly enjoys the playing of music. Tommy, the youngest, enjoys farming and canning and (like me) researching days gone by. - Maybe I have said too much, if so I apologize. - Was wondering if you knew conclusively who Green Berry Upchurch's father was. And if so how they came to be in Wilkes County. I have found some scant internet information but I have not yet been able to CONCLUSIVELY determine this paternal source. If you know this, I would be indebted to know this information.

With much gratitude for what you have already compiled and for your ever enduring dedication to the Upchurch family history, and your relentless pursuit to make it available to all, even at personal cost. I thank you for your directives and motives. For some reason I feel as though every few generations God plants the seed of genealogy in the mind of an individual - the burden and desire to tell the tale of what once was. I feel that burden and desire has fallen upon me - and I suspect that you have the same yearning. A strange thing isn't it? God Bless and thank you again. -Jason Forster.
