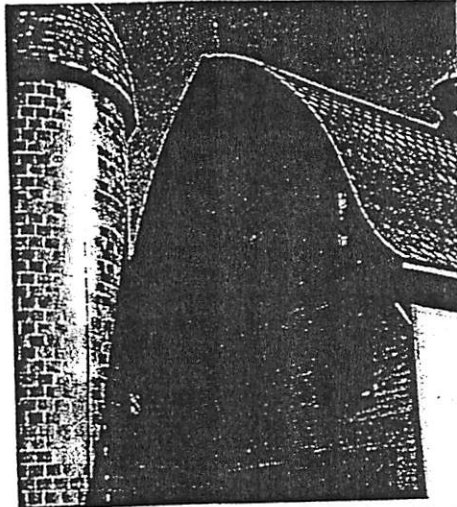


Benjamin Thomas "Tom" Hicks

Benjamin Thomas "Tom" Hicks learned his carpenter trade from his father. He later became a "master carpenter" and was involved in building the Glen Royall Cotton Mill and the Royall Mill Village in Wake County. The Village initially consisted of thirty houses that were used to accommodate the workers. The houses were referred to as "operative houses". As the mill grew, more houses were needed

and Tom continued with that project. He also had a secondary job of carving names on tombstones after his normal workday was completed. Tom Hicks was the "lead carpenter" for numerous large homes on Faculty Avenue, which is now known as North Main Street in Wake Forest, NC. One of Tom's most outstanding accomplishments was the Wakefield Barn, built in 1934, located on Falls of Neuse Road, Raleigh, NC. Tom was the master carpenter, working with S.O. Rich for owner John Sprunt Hill. The current owners of the barn received the 2001 Anthemion Award for the "commercial rehabilitation and adaptive reuse of the Wakefield Barn".

As Tom grew older his hearing diminished. On July 15, 1938 Tom was walking on the railroad track in Wake Forest, NC and was struck and killed by Seaboard Train #191. The story is told that he was looking up at three or four low-flying airplanes, the most modern means of transportation at that time, and did not hear or see the train coming.

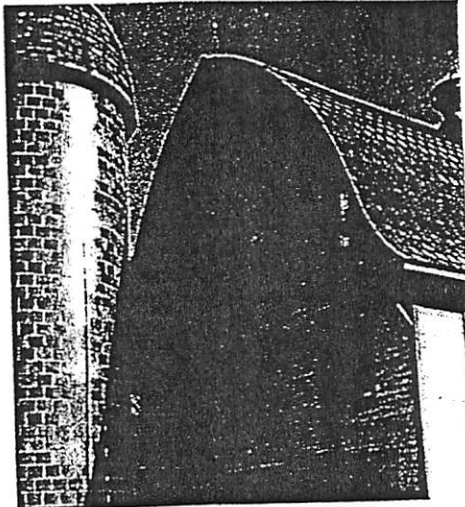

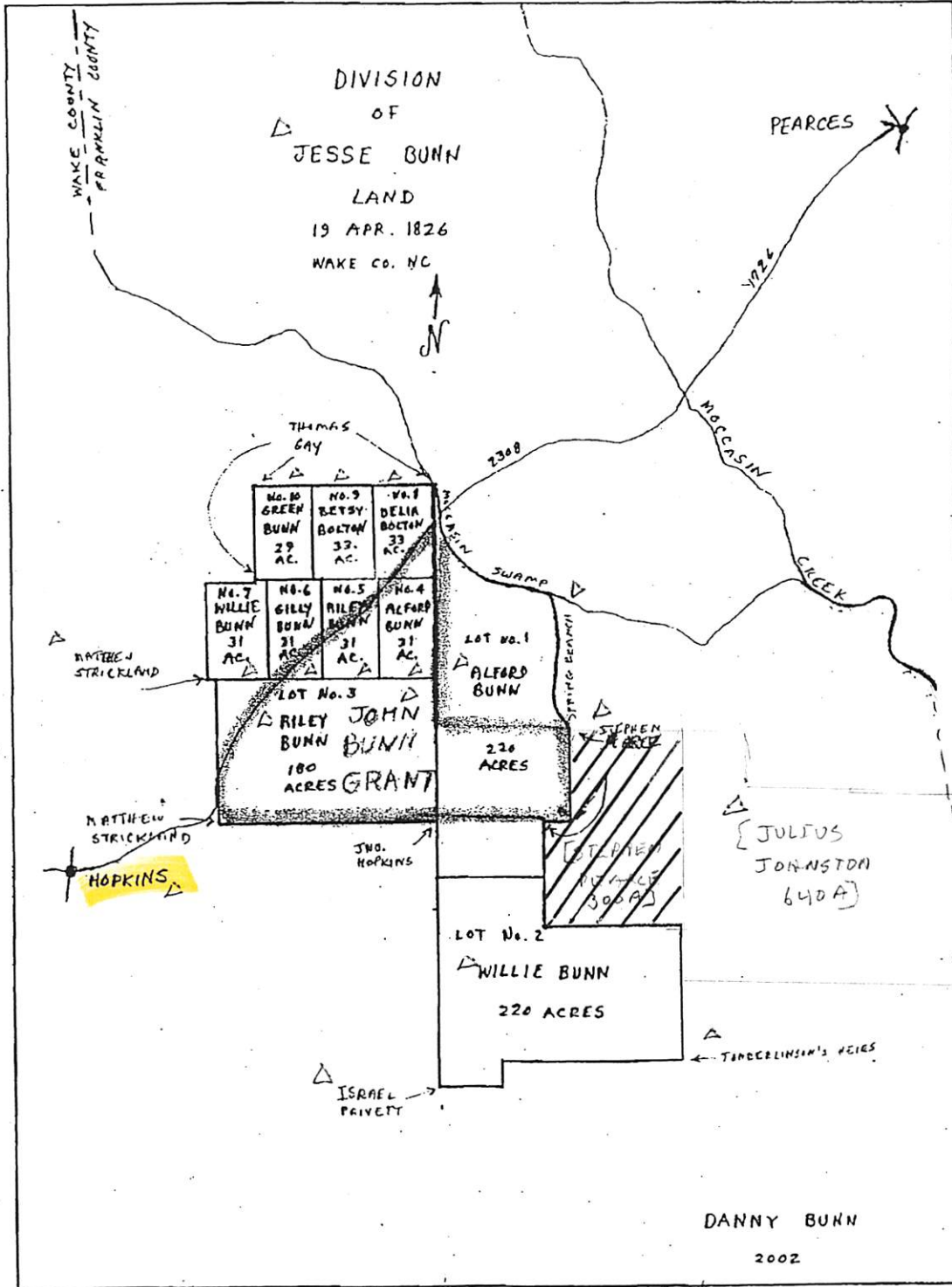

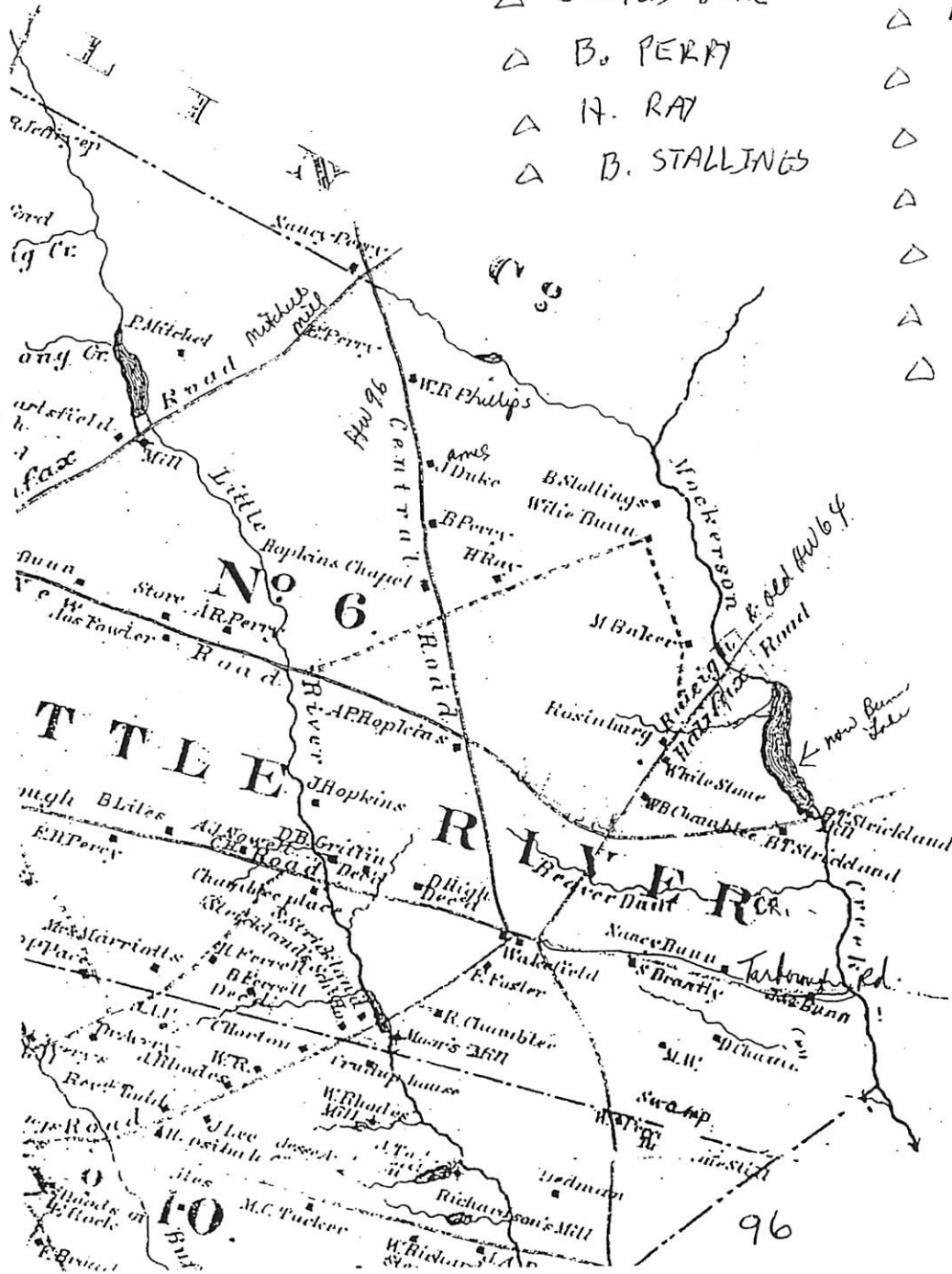
