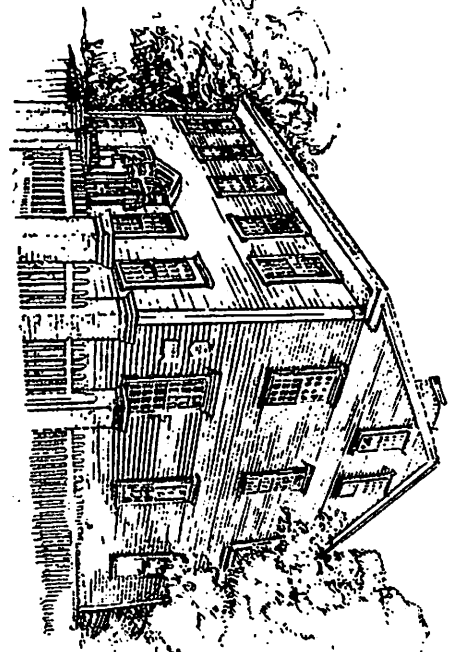

where you lived with "B". Y is where Sallaine and I lived thru - 1208 COLLEGE PLACE. This was a lovely Colonial Home owned by Mrs HARRIS (A Farm superintendent at N.C. State College) He lived there and had several apartments in the house. In June 1949 Sallaine and I moved into an upstairs Apartment where we lived until DEC 1950. Then upon returning from California in FEB 1953 we lived in a downstairs apartment for several months. You said you walked to school. There was an elementary school at 2. I am guessing that is the one you attended.

You mentioned Randy Hill and Katie McKinnon who worked for "B". When I started to work for the Agronomy Dept as a 13 year old High School student in 1941 both of these ladies were present in the Department. They were motherly types who looked after "lost" souls like me. I had an association with them all during my days as a student at NC State in the mid 1940's and then as an Instructor 1949-1950. They were still there years later. I remember them with fondness.

Do I understand correctly that B attended the First Baptist Church and that this was downtown across from the Capitol? Sallaine was attending church there at the time we were courting and she and I attended service there several times. Dr. Booder Jones was the minister and I can recall that he could paint beautiful word pictures.

It is a coincidence that in recent weeks I have reestablished contact with Francis Norris Regester who now lives in western N.C. She and I plan to meet in Florida next winter and she is going to introduce me to the "Florida" uplander.

The article in the N.C. State News (1947) about B was great. It is of interest that he was instrumental in causing soybeans to be a commercial crop and this year I will have about 800 acres of soybeans. Naturally we will be keeping our fingers crossed for good weather & good prices.

Susanne, I am sorry it took me so long to answer your letter and to thank you for it. Like you, I juggle a lot of balls and sometimes I don't get back to a project as soon as is desired. The good news is that I do get back - almost always.

I continue to come up with more material on the Upchurch Family. We are hoping to make a trip back to NC in the next 3, 6, 9 months - or whenever and I hope to spend several days there collecting more key information. There is always more to do.

It would be nice to have a note from you whenever you have time. Naturally I would welcome any questions you have on our shared Upchurch Heritage. Also I am always interested to have more input and new cooperators

The last time I saw her was about fifteen years ago and I was astonished at how much she looked like my mother. Then they are closely related.

my sister, Francis Carroll of Raleigh, wants to know when you joined the DAR. She is now trying to get into the DAR, and they will not accept Francis (Pattie Aline Upchurch Moring) information. So my sister had to hire a genealogist to prove the lines. She ^(genealogist) was not able to find the marriage bond between Bertie Upchurch and Margaret Gates. Do you have that information?

Mother doesn't know which one of the girls went to Thomasville Female College. She said that Uncle John and Aunt Florence were close so that may have been she. Aunt Florence is Mrs. J. C. L. Harris in the article. She and Nana were the only ones I knew.

If I remember correctly, Uncle Logan, her husband, was from the western part of the state so that may be a clue. I do know he was a lawyer and that she had to run away and marry him because he was a Republican.

I don't know anything about Jacob Royter's military service. From Aunt Marilee's book it sounds as though he was a Jay.

I do have more information about Adeline Suoria's other ancestors. We are descended from the Bullocks and the Howards through the Sims, I think. I will be glad to send it although the print is small and difficult to read. My husband's hobby is genealogy. Several years ago he did a book about Granville County residents. There wasn't anything about his family in the book but

There was a lot about mine.

I am enclosing an article about William Clinton Upchurch's funeral. My husband was in Raleigh recently and copied this out of Aunt Royce's scrapbook. It must be fate that I received this just about the time I saw your inquiry.

I was raised in my grandparents home on Hillsborough Street in Raleigh. My grandmother was Pattie Aline's oldest daughter. She and my grandfather went to live with her aunt, Roxanne Elizabeth Dodd Upchurch, when they were married in 1900. Aunt Royce then lent them the money to build the Hillsborough Street house in exchange for life care - my mother, who is now 88, has been in that house for 80 years. Nana was there until I was eight. She came after Aunt Royce died which was just before my parents were married. I was like Alex Haley in that as I was the only child for six years in a house always full of relatives I soaked up a lot.

Pattie Aline was married when she was 17. She was very close to her sisters but not to

her brothers. We knew that there were
four boys, but mother and I had never
heard of Reid and George until my husband
uncovered this article. I had heard of
Uncle John and Aunt Sara when I was a
child. They lived in the country and had 10
children none of whom my grandmother or
mother seem to know. Aunt Sara's father
was a Duke University professor. Now mother
doesn't know what he did.

As for Uncle Charlie I didn't hear
about him until about 20 years ago. I
heard he moved to South Carolina. I have
no idea who his family is.

Aunt Sara was the eldest. Her husband
was mayor of Raleigh during the Civil War
and Reconstruction Days. They built the
Dodd-Nimsdale House which is on the
National Register. A number of people have
tried to restore it but is now left empty
with board up. Most of my mother's

furniture come from that house. I have always said I would give what is to be my share of the house in when opened to the public. I already have some of her things. She and Uncle Doll had no children although they had an adopted daughter who died without issue.

Mama was next to the youngest. Aunt Betty Carter was the youngest. She was Mrs. P. A. Carter. Uncle P. A., whom I did know, was a very successful cotton broker in N. Y. They were in the New York Social Register and had a place ^{near} Central Park and a home in Long Beach, Long Island. Mother used to visit them in the Tenn. She always said she went first class to New York when she was young and never wanted to go back any other way. Aunt Betty died in the late 20's. Uncle P. A. lost all of his money in the depression and had to come back to N. C. where a nephew took

Care of him. He lived to be 95 and was a very handsome gentleman. They had no children.

Aunt Jenny married Uncle Pool who was my great-grandfather Messing's business partner. We knew their family well. In fact their oldest daughter and her husband lived with us for about ten years.

Aunt Florence's family we knew with the exception of the oldest son. She had 10 children. Her grandson, Luke Coley and his wife, were two of my mother and father's closest friends. Her great-grandson, Sammy Coley is the one who is the close friend of Frances Harris Register and is why Frances comes to Raleigh.

Which child of Uncle John's were you from? How did you get to Florida? Do you have any Epchurch relatives in Raleigh? The Mayor of Raleigh is an Epchurch and we have wondered if we are kin to him. Do you know any

of the other boys relatives?

yes, we are cousins. you are my mother's second cousin and that isn't too far away.

my sister would like to know about your DAR membership as soon as possible. Thank you.

I am enclosing a copy of the N. E. State Alumni News which featured my grandfather Williams in July, 1947.

As I said before I loved my grandfather. He is one of the few people I have known who found the abundant life Christ said he came to bring us. He had everything good health, success, happy marriage and prosperity. He had all of the fruits of the spirit and joy just bubbled up in him.

I was born eight months after my Aunt Susanna died. She was my grandfather's favorite. Mother said his hair turned white overnight and she remembers him sitting in his chair crying and crying.

I was the only child for six years and spent a great deal of time with my grandparents. I started out calling them "Maggie and C. B." - only I couldn't say the C. I still remember the day in the garden when I was five or six that Grandmother said it was time I called her Grandmother but B. liked his name. So B. he was to all four children.

When I began to grow into adulthood I began to have depression. I didn't know what it was then but I knew that B. had the answers for a happy life. I would sit on a stool at his feet and talk to him while he was puffing on a cigar. So this day whenever I smell a cigar I think of him. I would ask him to show me the way. All he would say was "Go to Sunday School and church, read your Bible get a good education and read "Lime" magazine." I've never liked "Lime" and I doubt if he would today.

I would also ask B. to tell me what my purpose was in life. All he would say is, "I can't tell you that but when you find the way you will know it." He was right.

Grandmother, on the other hand, was a preacher. One minute she would be pushing me socially and the next religiously. She would say, "Leave her alone, Margaret, she will find the way."

He was a man who loved his wife. She in turn, admired and respected him. It was she who bragged about his accomplishments as he never would. He loved her every time he came from and went to the college. She came with baggage, though. She developed asthma

When she was pregnant with Aunt Susanna and was a semi-invalid a great deal of her life. Until she got better she spent every summer and fall at High Hampton in the mountains. She left him with three rawly children (from all reports); and according to mother, Grandmother's religiously fanatic aunt who lived with them. A lesser man would have run off with someone else.

Long before I ever heard of anyone talking about diet and exercise B. advocated eating lots of fruits and vegetables, walking, and getting a good nights rest. He didn't drive a car and walked back and forth to work twice a day. He was only sick, even with a cold, once in my life and that was when he had the flu the Christmas before he died.

He was also a conservationist urging us to turn off the lights and shutting off the water. Daddy thought he wasted more electricity shutting off and on the lights.

The only time I ever saw him sad was the day George Washington Carver died. Grandmother told me not to bother B. as he was mourning the death of Dr. Carver. I did manage to slip by Grandmother later. B. said, "The world has lost its greatest scientist and the finest Christian gentleman." 1/03/1984

known". I assumed that Dr. Croker was a white professor at State. Therefore I was astonished that someone black was a Phi. Grandmother's answer was, "Why not?"

B. was also very punctual. In fact he so insisted on being on time that I grew up thinking that being late was a character defect.

He also thought that a lousily developed character. He was concerned that Pale children had life too soft. He, in particular, would be annoyed that I did not want to walk six blocks to school. He had had to walk three miles each way to get an education.

B. went to Sunday School, Church, Sunday night services and Wednesday night prayer meeting. He and Grandmother were fitness and generous to the poor. When I was young we were in the midst of the great Depression. I never saw anyone turned away. He and Grandmother also did a lot of work on the house. Then which kept people employed long after they both were dead. People came back to pay tribute. Some we had never seen before. My roommate in college became a social worker in 1948. She told me that most of the welfare cases they had my grandparents had helped at one time or another. They were also very generous to us.

B. loved football. Every home game he, mother and I and later the younger children would walk up to Redlich Stadium. Daddy, who had been a star football player at State, would go ahead to keep the time and hold the lines. I sat in the monogram club seats while B & mother would sit across the stadium in the faculty section. As we would leave the house Grandmother would be listening to the Metropolitan Opera. Mother would always say, "I don't know why grandma likes that dreadful music!" Grandmother couldn't understand why she loved football as she used to watch in the days when they didn't have forward passes. Mother thought that a particularly exciting Duke Forest game helped to tell Papa as she called him.

When I was young he was the only person I knew who had gone to Europe. I have a miniature of me when I was two in a little pink dress he brought back from Switzerland. Mother said he had a hard time finding something to drink ^{in Europe} since he didn't drink wine. He also went to all 5 of the 48 states except Moore.

Mother told two stories about him which I think reflect his character. He never

finished his Phd at either Ohio or Ohio Wesleyan.
Mother's birth presented that. He just was Dean
of Agriculture. Dr. Kilgore, who was a neighbor,
persuaded the Snuckers to give him that job as
he had a Phd. Mother said she was in Spring
Break in the mountains when there were
headlines in the paper that her father had been
fired. It greatly embarrassed her. Although
she was very friendly with the Kilgore
children, she never liked Dr. Kilgore and
thought he deserved his miserable last days.
B. apparently never harbored any ill feelings
and he and Grandmother would not let
Mother say anything unkind about him (Dr.
Kilgore)

There was a secretary in the Agronomy
Department who wasn't very good. The
men under B. wanted her fired. B. said,
"Yes, I, too, am a slow learner just give
her time." She turned out to be one of the
best secretaries they ever had. The men
cried when she left. Mother probably
got that story either from Kathy Marlinton,
a neighbor and family connection, or from
Randolph Hill, daughter of D. H. Hill, and
life long friend and college roommate of
Mother. Both worked for years for my
Grandfather.

Mother also said that when they were young they were guinea pigs for all the say bean foods my grand father was working on.

I never heard B. expressed any worry, anxiety, anger or condemnation of anyone. He liked to see come to criticizing anyone was Rascal. He said he was a money spender.

There were some things that peaked him. That was when I would leave my bike in the rain as my skates where he could trip over them. Also when we would do scatter brain things he say "Just rattling around".

One day in June of 1947 he woke up, fixed his breakfast, fainted and died a few minutes without pain in my mother's arms. Mother thinks his natural placemaker face set just as he did many years later. I think he died just the way he had wanted his children to go. Long after he died people would tell me how much they loved him and what a wonderful Christian he was.

After all I would say about him is that he was a man of few words, strong, lasting, kind, generous, moral,

happy, modest, and had a wonderful sense of humor.

I hope this will do you helped by some very pleasant memories.

Once again I am afraid I am remiss in writing to you. I was in England on a trip with our daughter when you wrote to me. I was home for a day and a half to attend a Colonial Wars - Colonial Dames event that my husband and I were on the committee for. ^{the event} Then Jack Patten up to join her boat in Bar Harbor, Maine and for a visit there. Once home I was met with mountains of mail, events, and then the holidays. After Christmas we started up again a renovation program we have done on our 1719 house for the past three winters. Some Colonial and Revolutionary Families of North Carolina

Δ moved to Chatham Co. some years later. John Moring was influenced to come to N. C. by his old friend and neighbor in Surry County, Va. who preceded him to N. C. by several years. This neighbor was William O'Kelly, father of James O'Kelly, the founder of the Christian Church. Both families lived near Lebanon Church, Va., the parent Christian Church in Virginia. Also in that section was a bridge called "Mooring Bridge", which was an old landmark for many years.

Δ Mrs. Charles Burgess Williams, aforesaid, of Raleigh, N. C., joined the Daughters of American Revolution, as a descendant of John Moring, (son of Henry, the emigrant). The following records are copied from her D. A. R. papers: John Moring enlisted in Surry County, Va. in the Regt. under command of Captain Wilson, troops commanded by Col. Blount, and served six months and 10 days. He was a sergeant in Virginia Continentals, and was present at the surrender of Lord Cornwallis (the British Commander) at Yorktown Oct. 19, 1781. . . . John Moring was pensioned late in life, as a soldier of Va., but he is listed with N. C. pensioners, having moved to N. C. long after the Revolution. See Natl. No. 30930, of Mrs. Hattie Frances Moring Niese, of New Jersey, also Mrs. Annie Yates Seaman of New York.

Δ John Moring born 1764 in Surry Co. Va., died Sept. 21, 1844 in Chatham Co. N. C., was a Rev. Soldier. He moved to N. C. prior to Sept. 28, 1805, at which time he purchased 536 acres of land in Chatham Co. N. C. from Wm. O'Kelly. The author has seen a photostatic copy of that deed, to which James O'Kelly and Christopher Moring were witnesses. In the deed John Moring's name is spelled Mooring, but Christopher (John's son) signed his name Moring. John Moring's home was in Chatham County between Morrisville and Chapel Hill, on the old stage line. John Moring married first Anne Lane, (daughter of a Rev. War Colonel). They lived in Chatham Co. N. C., and had children, viz: (1) Christopher Moring, married Frances Barbee (or Frances Herndon). Christopher's son Gus was father of Mrs. Hattie Frances Moring Niese, aforesaid. (2) Henry Moring married Tabitha Beasley. (3) John Moring married Annie Vaulander, and had descendants including Mrs. Annie Yates Seaman, aforesaid. (4) Willis Moring, married Eliza King. (5) Nancy Moring, married Jefferson O'Kelly.

The Moring family is one of these. Your Uncle Will's list of the children of Alfred Moring (b. 25 FEB 1814) shows 9 children. My list taken from the Alfred Moring Bible shows

I reread your matter on 20 NOV 1978 shows 10 children. There are 8 names that match from the two lists. Uncle will show a Kate Moring and I cannot identify Kate as being one of the 10 on the Bible list. on the Bible list we have:

(#9) • EU PHRASIA SMITH MORING
b 11 APR 1855 no death date

I speculate that "Kate" Moring who married B. A. YORK is one of the above. Any ideas?

Uncle will show that Franklin's sister CORINNA MORING [CORINNA ALLEN MORING] married Adolphus FARRINGTON. I suspect this should be spelled FEARRINGTON

I realize it is not your "thing" to delve into the above matter. Perhaps you will sooner or later run into one of your relatives who has the family history "bug" as I do and we can go into all of these odd details.

you can appreciate that I have a keen interest in your Grandfather Charles Burger Williams given that he and I were both professionals in the field of Agronomy and that I served in the very same department of which he was the first head and that I served in the building which bore his name - Williams Hall on the N. C. State Campus. Have you ever visited the building? Did you attend the naming ceremony? [I was in graduate school in California at the time].

Susanne, as a special favor to me could you take an hour or so to write down your recollections and any anecdotes handed down to you about Charles Burger Williams. 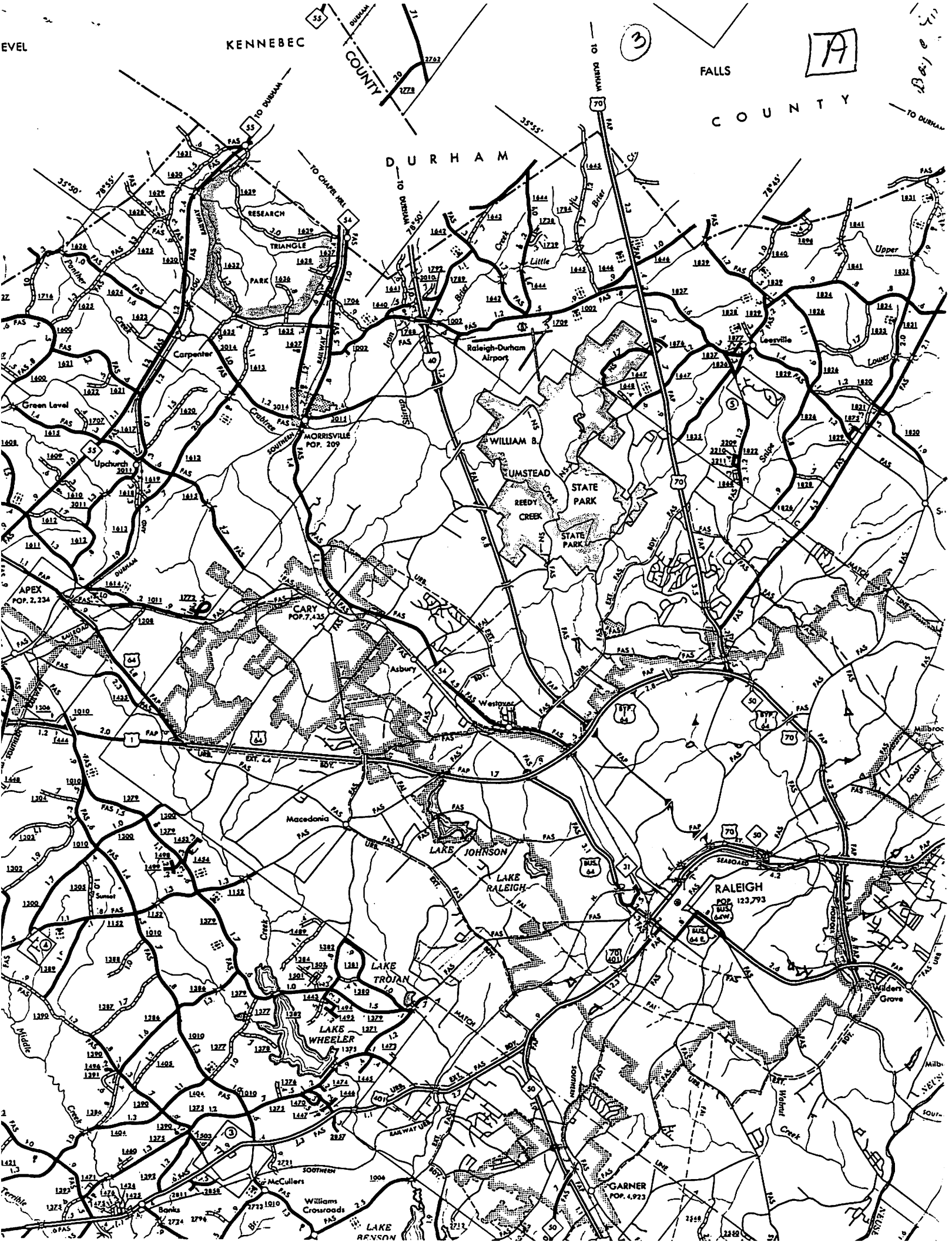

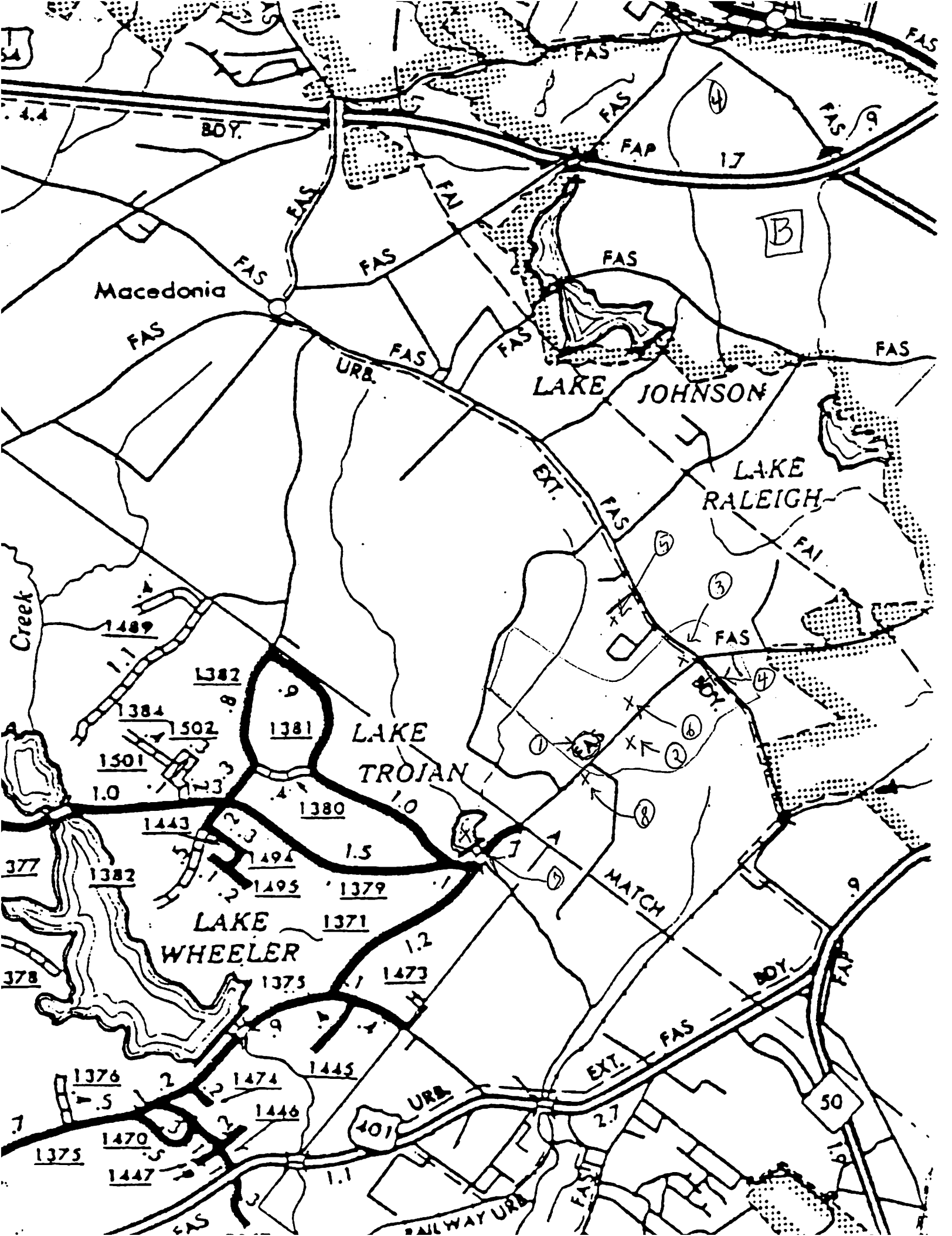

I know more about any of these descendants but know corresponded with members of the "Florida Upstarts" branch which includes descendants of Belle Williamson W. a dau of W & U & Marshall W. my GF and W & U bought a farm in this country together right after the Civil War. My Grand Uncle often referred to Uncle William and Aunt "Max" when I was growing up. W & U had a colorful history which would someday be detailed in the U.S. He was secretary to N.C. Gov. Holden and was called to Confederate service but refused to be excused and had his case appealed to the Confederate Supreme Court in Richmond. He never served but my GF did. W. & U. was an extremely successful business man in the 1870-1890 era but lost heavily (including the farm he and my GF bought) in the depression of 1893 and died of stomach cancer in 1895. GF had to buy back the farm on his own. My X-cousin still owns it.

in AZ. He is Charles Upham's Name, Jr and
he is a retired Episcopal minister. I have
visited in his home. He also has a home in VA.

I am in touch with descendants of John
William U, Sr (son of W. C. U, I) in several ways.
