




MARIA PARHAM HOSPITAL

The first hospital of size to be established in Henderson was the old Sarah Elizabeth Hospital, a frame structure on Zene Street. The late Dr. H. H. Bass, Sr., and a group of associates headed that undertaking, and this facility continued for a number of years to serve the community. In time it gave way to the new Maria Parham Hospital, a much larger plant, situated on Chestnut Street, between Orange and Horner Streets.

Greater Henderson has a population of approximately 16,000 people. In recent years the town has grown rapidly in business and population. In keeping with this progress, we find our hospital to be one of the greatest assets of the community.

Maria Parham Hospital, Inc., with 27 bed capacity, was founded in June, 1925, by five Henderson doctors: H. A. Newell, P. T. Upchurch, T. S. Royster, B. G. Allen and A. P. Newcomb. Dr. Newell owned a majority of the stock. S. S. Parham, having made a considerable gift to the hospital, it was named for his mother. The first patient was admitted July 1, 1926.

In May, 1931, the Maria Parham Hospital Association was incorporated and leased the hospital from its owners. The incorporators of the Association were: H. T. Morris, J. W. Jenkins, John D. Cooper, and Mrs. Ellen D. Cooper and was operated as a non-profit organization.

In 1941, an addition was built which increased the number of beds to 44. The hospital became community-owned in January, 1946, when public subscriptions raised the funds necessary to

purchase it from its owners. It is now a non-stock non-profit organization governed by a board of 17 trustees, the Mayor of Henderson and the Chairman of the County Board of Commissioners being members, ex-officio. The present Chairman of the hospital board (1954) is General J. W. Jenkins. Other members of the board are:

The new James H. Parker Wing was completed and occupied in 1953. This addition cost \$487,000. The money was raised by private subscription, a donation from the Federal Government of \$211,761, a donation of \$70,266.15 from the State of North Carolina, and a loan. The largest private subscription was \$50,000 from Mrs. Julia A. Parker and Dr. James Craig Joyner. This wing contains new surgical and obstetrical facilities, dietary department, central supply and business offices and also adds 31 beds to the hospital, making total bed capacity of 75.

The Julia Fitch Jones Nurses' Home previously was constructed at a cost of \$130,000, and was dedicated June 8, 1952, as a memorial to the mother of Julia Augusta Parker, Mrs. Leila Leeds, Annie Jones Geary and Mrs. Caroline Jones Fell. It has a commodations for 33 nurses. Of this \$130,000, \$40,000.00 was the gift from the children of Mrs. Julia Fitch Jones.

The hospital, together with the nurses home, has a front footage of 294 feet and a depth of 110 feet. The total plant has a value of over \$750,000.

Maria Parham is a general hospital for white people only, but renders service to the colored people as out-patients in case of emergency. In 1953, it treated 1,888 out-patients; that means those who do not stay overnight and 3,494 in-patients (excluding

w born); total days of care for in-patients 18,708. In the year 954, there were 1,792 operations performed and 19,428 laboraory tests were made, and 4,825 x-ray examinations made.

Henderson's community hospital has a staff of 16 doctors, and a general personnel of 89 which includes the following:

Through the years the high standards of Maria Parham Hospital have been recognized by national organizations; the hospital is accredited by the American Medical Association Registry and by the American College of Surgeons. It is eligible for its part in the distribution of the Duke Foundation funds.

The hospital is a member of the American Hospital Association, the North Carolina Hospital Association and the Blue Cross.

SCOTT PARKER SANATORIUM

THE SCOTT PARKER SANATORIUM was a gift to Vance County, made by Mrs. Willie Parker Peace in honor of her father, W. S. Parker. The sanatorium is to be used exclusively for tubercular patients, applications for admittance being reserved first for the people of the county.

The county bought the land from A. T. Barnes, located next to the present County Home, for \$2,000, and Mrs. Peace gave the building, which cost fourteen thousand dollars. The County entered into contract with Mrs. Peace whereby in case the building ceased to be used as a tubercular hospital, the property would revert to her upon payment to the county of thirty-nine hundred dollars.

The building committee selected were: Eric G. Flannagan, architect, Dr. R. T. Upchurch, local physician, S. B. Rogers, representing the county, Mrs. W. B. Waddill, county welfare officer, Mrs. A. J. Harris and Mrs. Willie P. Peace.

Mr. Flannagan was employed as architect and the contract for building was let to L. Wheeden & Co., of Roanoke Rapids. Contract between the county and Mrs. Peace was signed November 1, 1926, and the hospital was opened for receiving patients July 4, 1927. Miss Lula Wicker of Rockingham was the first Superintendent.

The hospital was well received from the very beginning. It is a one-story brick building with capacity for fourteen patients. It has rooms for nurses and office for doctors. It has modern heat and plumbing. The best and most modern equipment was donated entirely by individuals and local organizations and to charity patients the local doctors offered their services free of charge. The hospital being a public institution, it receives yearly its part of the Duke Foundation funds. Those who are able to pay for treatment are required to do so.

The building is in the shape of a flying ship, faces the north in such a way that a solid wall keeps off the biting winds of winter. Mrs. W. H. S. Burgwyn and Mrs. D. Y. Cooper, senior, ared before the State Legislature advocating the establishit of a state reformatory for wayward youths.

The first success of the Daughters was a donation of ten nousand dollars obtained from the State with which they built the first cottage, made of brick—a home for thirty boys. Later the "Margaret Burgwyn Chapel," made of granite; was built by the King's Daughters, and still later they built a beautiful arch which served as a bridge connecting the divided grounds and serving as a World War Soldiers' Memorial. Also a granite thapel was built by the King's Daughters at Samacan for fallen girls.

Mrs. Burgwyn of Henderson, was State president of the Daughters in 1936, and her accomplishments were state-wide.

Here at home our Circle, realizing the need in our community for constructive recreation, bought the old Baptist Church building for use as a Community Playhouse and presented with success plays by the Carolina Playmakers, Booth Tarkington and others. The premises were equipped with swings and other attractions for young people.

The Henderson Whatsoever Circle bought land from J. W. Beck and established a very attractive park, known as King's Daughters Park. The park has a swimming pool, tennis courts and other innocent recreations and is well patronized.

THE CONTEMPORARY CLUB

THE LADIES of Henderson now have, and have had for many ears, literary clubs, all highly successful and well attended.

From this the men took a cue and organized, in 1906, the one and only men's literary club, which lasted for ten years and died for lack of tongue but not from lack of intellect or stomach.

The club claimed to be both literary and scientific and prepared papers covering subjects from raising Angora goats to the knock-out blow to the average intellect, a paper by Dr. G. A. Coggeshall, whose subject was "The Psychological Phenomenon of Subliminal Self." A few of the members did not know what the doctor was talking about but they did not let on. Everybody looked wise, either literary or scientific.

The Contemporary Club gave a banquet once each year, to which the ladies were invited. There was always some after-dinner speaker of reputation invited to deliver an address in keeping with the occasion. When Josephus Daniels was Secretary of the Navy under Woodrow Wilson, the club invited him to make the after-dinner speech. He replied that for some reason he could not come but said he had a young man under him named Franklin Roosevelt who would make the club a good speech. The Contemporary Club of Henderson promptly turned down Franklin D. Roosevelt. He did not come and who did come is not remembered. Years later the whole town paid Mrs. Franklin Roosevelt a thousand dollars for one address.

For the purpose of giving further insight into the ramifications and qualifications of the club, a copy herewith of a program and menu of a banquet held February 20, 1912, is submitted. One would think the members were bookworms and dyspeptics from its statement that it was a literary and scientific club, but read further the almost midnight meal.

The first point of interest is the appetizer. Of the twenty-eight men present twenty-three were total abstainers, not even acquainted with any subtle tincture of alcoholic beverages, so the whet of appetite was brought about by the lateness of the meal which began at 9:30 P.M.

The banquet was given complimentary to Major J. C. Hemphill. Rev. I. W. Hughes was toastmaster and several toasts were made.

he menu for the banquet was exactly as follows and was ad at the Vance Hotel.

Consomme Royal, Florida Celery, Queen Olives, Pin Money Ackles, Salted Almonds, Broiled Shad, Latticed Potatoes, Half Spring Chicken on Toast, Smithfield Ham, French Peas, Asparagus Tips, Chicken Salad, Quartered Tomatoes with Mayonnaise Dressing, Peach Ice Cream, English Plum Pudding with whipped Cream, Cake, Grapefruit Punch Ala Vance, Cheese, Saltines, Coffee, Cigars and Cigarettes. Only five of the above members now survive that "Frugal Repast."

UNITED DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY

VANCE COUNTY CHAPTER

From Henderson Daily Dispatch, March 8, 1932. "The Vance County Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy was organized by Mrs. Scott Parker, September 10, 1897, at which ime she was elected president of the chapter. The charter of the Vance County chapter is in the hands of the custodian of the hapter showing the following charter members: Mesdames Lucy Closs Parker, Cary Page Harris, Alice Blount Shannon, Fannie

Lewis Manning, Maria Watkins Davis, Janie Hall Perry, Maria Louise Parham, Mattiebelle Macon Shell, Uva Barnes, Carrie T. Blacknall, Louise Boshamer Burroughs, Sallie Mitchell Cooper, Ellen Faucette Lassiter, Fannie Parker Parham, Harriet Thrower Pittman, Jennie Ferebee Shaw, Carrie Tucker Massenburg, Lania Avery Gilmer, Maggie Dunlop Burgwyn, Stella Perry and Emma Everett.

"Mrs. Parker was president from 1897 to 1900. Presidents serving from then until 1907 were: Mrs. Maria Southerland Parham, Mrs. C. M. Cooper, Mrs. E. G. Davis, Mrs. E. G. Shaw. In 1907, Mrs. Sydney Perry Cooper was elected president and has been re-elected annually. During her administration membership has increased from forty to one hundred and fifteen. The chapter celebrated every Memorial Day with public exercises, and flowers and flags placed upon the Veteran graves. And as the ranks of soldiers grew thinner, baskets of red and white flowers were sent to their homes on Memorial Day. Much attention was paid to the old and feeble.

"The outstanding work of the chapter has been the erection of the Confederate Monument on courthouse square, which was unveiled November 10, 1910. The granite for the monument came from the quarries in Warren County, near Wise. The cost of the monument was \$3,630.10, which amount had been paid in full on date of unveiling. The inscription on the monument reads: Peace to Their Ashes—Honor to Their Memory—Glory to Their Cause, and was written by Major Orren Randolph Smith, who designed the Confederate Flag, adopted by the Confederate Government." (But the flag engraved in the stone is not the flag designed by Major Smith. The flag cut in the stone is called the Battle Flag, the flag used first by General Beauregard.—Ed.)

The Vance County chapter raised money from private donations, rummage sales, plays, teas and the like, and aided many worthy causes pertaining to the Confederacy. Of these Daughters it was well said, "Never have women of a defeated people banded together for a sublimer purpose of proving the rightful-

REVEREND ISAAC WAYNE HUGHES

Mr. Hughes was born in Hendersonville in 1864. He came to Henderson from Fayetteville and was Rector of Holy Innocents Episcopal Church from 1909 until his death in 1943. During his rectorate the Parish House was built. He was a pleasing speaker and was often called upon.

Mr. Hughes was much loved and will long be remembered. In his memory a bronze tablet has been placed in the vestibule of the Church of the Holy Innocents.

DR. R. T. UPCHURCH

Dr. R. T. Upchurch began his practice in Henderson about 1908 and soon had a large practice. He was also successful in business affairs; was one of the founders of Maria Parham Hospital and in the entrance of the hospital his friends and medical associates have placed a memorial tablet which says of him, "A learned physician and a distinguished citizen."

VANCE COUNTY WOMEN

THE HENDERSON Daily Dispatch of March 8, 1932, published an entire section of six pages under the head, "All Women's Work Edition." It was devoted to the women of the time, 1932. From this issue much is quoted verbatim.

MRS. W. B. WADDILL

"Social work comes natural to Welfare Superintendent.—Mrs. Waddill's work is outstanding in Vance County and throughout the state. Her most outstanding effort in local volunteer work was in the health department of the Woman's Club, where she worked unceasingly for several years for the establishment of county health work on a full-time basis. She had great opposition, but kept the question before the public and county and city officials until the work was established."

During the first World War she served as State Chairman


