# Child actors stage new strain of Jack's beanstalk

One of the most famous childhood fables tells the story of a young boy, Jack, who sells the family cow for a handful of beans. At first it seems the lad has fallen prey to a charlatan, but later the magic of the beans is realized. A beanstalk grows into the clouds and acts as a gateway to the land of a terrible giant.

For generations, the story has remained the same: Jack sees giant. Jack steals treasure. Jack kills giant. It would seem that Jack's adventure has been written in stone. However, there are still many unanswered questions. For example: Did Jack have a happy childhood? What did Jack's neighbors think of his monstrous beanstalk? And just where did the giant get all that treasure?
Although an upcoming performane by the Triangle East Players' Children's Theater may not answer all these questions, it will show that a handful of beans can make comedy bloom.
Coming July $23-25$, the chilldren's theater will present "Jack and the Beanstalk: A Pantomime" at East Wake High School's north auditorium. Performances are scheduled for 7:30 p.m., except for Sunday's showing which will start at 4 p.m. For ticket information, dial 365-IMAGine.

The upcoming production borrows from the traditional alements of "Jack and the Beanstalk," but in the process adds a tongue-in-cheek approach that incorporates song and dance.
During the performance not only will the audience be introduced to Jack and the giant, but a host of other characters as well, including: the citizens of Pennyfarthing, Jack's hometown; the town's stingy king; the daffy vegeatable fairy, a conjurer whose magic seldom goes right; the giant's menacing, aptly named henchman, Fleshcreep; Mrs. Blunderbore, the giant's wife; and Daisy the Dancing Cow, just to name a few.

By combining the characters with a story that is part "Camelot" and part "Jack and the Beanstalk," and adding a dose of vaudeville, you might get a clue as to the nature of the performance.

Serving as the director of the play is Frank Jeffreys, a former physics teacher at St. Mary's Colloge who left his position to pursue a career in theater.

Active in both writing and directing, Jeffreys' talents have also taken him to the big screen he acted as Howie Mandell's stunt double in the film "Little Monsters." However, the past is of no concern to Jeffreys, who prefers to keep his sights on the future.
"I really prefer people to see me

as what I am now," explained Jeffreys. "I haven't gone wrong with people who see past the surface."
When asked about his current directorial project, Jeffreys said the play is not like what people think of "Jack and the Beanstalk" in that it contains a lot of good, funny humor.
Jeffreys added that he is inpressed with the talent of the theter group's young performers and that their talents should grow as they increase their communication skills.
"It's (theater) about communication," said Jeffreys. "Everything you do in life is about communication.
"What sets theater apart is that it puts you in touch with your feelings," he continued.
In the future, Jeffreys said he would like to branch out and possibly direct an adult production, but for now he is happy in what he terms a "win-win situation."
"By being a part of my life, they (the theater group) add to the depth of my life," he explained.

 interview with a mime? Sounds oxymoronic Or just plain moronic. How do you quote someone who commanicates solely with body language? You cant help wondering, what would Barbara Walters or TerryGross ask? And what in the world would David Letterman do to the guy? When we caught up with local mime Frank Jeffreys last week on Fayetteville Street Mall, he didn't have much to say at first. As the official mascot for "First Night Raleigh," he was busy promoting the New Year's Eve festivities, passing out pamphlets and stickers, jugging and, of

Businessmen on the Fayetteville Street Mall in Raleigh give mime Frank Jeffreys a wide berth. Women and chitdren are friendlier to the man who left a college teaching career to act and write fill time.

So, we asked, what's the longest you've gone without talking?
The mime's blue eyes suddenly got big. He flashed five fingers, made a fist, then flashed them again.

Ten? You mean, 10 hours?
He beamed a closed-mouth smile and nodded.
Enough small talk. After his two-hour gig, Jeffreys was more than willing to talk. About the power and vulnerability in not speaking. About the nasty backlash against mimes. About how a 45-year-old former college physics teacher wound up in white face paint.

Who would have thought? A mime who talks your ear off.
Passersby couldn't help but stare - a talking mime?! "Hey, you're not supposed to talk!" one man shouted.

Jeffreys' voice is soothing, librarian-soft and slightly raspy. That's what happens when he doesn't speak. After the 10 -hour stretch, he was practically hoarse.
Silence is one of the challenges that Jeffreys enjoys most about miming.
"There is strength in complete surrender," he said. "The mime is helpless because he can't express himself the way others do. But that means he's powerful because people pay attention to him. If he moves an eyebrow or a finger, people notice."

On the mall, women and children paid him the most attention. A paralegal, $:$ computer programmer and a 4 -jear-old let him put glittering star stickers on their cheeks, their blouses or their shoes. Men in suits usually refused. They crossed the street or avoided making eye contast.
"I'm invisible to a large nurnber of people," said Jeffreys, who sees the reactions
as a barometer for society. "I
think it's sad that they can't allow themselves to have a little fun.'

Still, he realizes that some people simply can't stand mimes.
"I've seen the buttons that say, 'Shoot a mime' and 'Oh, no, here comes a mime,'" he said. "I want to say, Look, I'm out here doing my job.' "
After participating in previous First Night Raleigh celebrations, Jeffreys was asked to be the mime mascot, modeled after the event's poster. This year's theme is International Understanding, in recognition of the 50 th anniversary of the United Nations, which is being celebrated at similar events around the country.

According to production director Joedy Lister, Jeffreys is the right mime for the job. "Frank's a peaceful, loving mime," he said.
Dressed in a green-and-yellow striped sweater, black beret, suspenders and white face, Jeffreys didn't badger or mimic the paunchy construction workers, the fast-walking business types or the policemen on the mall. That's New York miming. He didn't climb any invisible ladders or get trapped in any invisible boxes, either. That's Marcel Marceau.

What he did was continually bring out the spontaneity in folks. With three plastic balls, he recruited people to play catch, which evolved into an impromptu juggling act.
"I can juggle five balls in a pinch, but what's the point? I want other people to get the feeling of what it's like to juggle," he said. "You have to use the artistic and rational sides of your brain at the same time."

As a boy growing up in Raleigh,
he seemed destined for a rather rational pursuit, science. His father taught science at Garner Junior High and his mother headed the state's special virology unit. At the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Jeffreys double-majored in zoology and chemistry and later went back for
a couple of master's degrees in environmental chemistry and education. He worked as a researcher. He taught physics for 10 years. Then, in his mid-30s, he left his teaching post at Meredith College to follow his dream acting and writing full-time.

He has written a documentary,
two yet-to-be-produced screenplays and has had bit parts in several films, including the recent releases "The Road to Wellville" and "Radioland Murders."
He also works as a motivational speaker (minus the makeup), having spoken on everything from the importance of humor in the
workplace to cost containment. At one recent appearance, he urged a group of retired bombardiers to follow their dreams, no matter their age.

As a mime, Jeffreys offers unspoken motivation. Near the end of his gig, he approached a group of down-on-theirluck mall regulars clutching their possessions: a beat-up radio, blankets and bundles of clothes. They seemed invisible to the lunchtime crowd rushing by. To Jeffreys, they were another audience.

He tossed one of his blue globes. A young fellow with long brown hair caught it and tossed it back. Back and forth the ball went. Then a second ball, and a third. "All right!" one of them said. The ragtag group gathered around, delighted by the show. Jeffreys was smiling again, his lips a brilliant red against the white makeup. His new buddy was laughing, showing off the big gap in his teeth.

When he dropped one of the balls, he chased it down and came back. He looked at Jeffreys. Jeffreys looked at him. Without a word, they resumed juggling.
