Dear Ken:

Enclosed is a copy of the January 26, 1996 report of Professor David Ransome on what he learned about the Upchurch families that lived in the area near the Brington Church in Huntingdonshire Parish in England during the period 1580-1630. You will recall that this is the area from which our ancestor Michael Upchurch I departed for America about 1638 as documented by Professor Ransome's first report published in the UB.

I am writing to you and a few others to give an opportunity to participate financially in paying the \$1225.00 bill of Professor Ransome. Please know that you are not obligated to participate. I am prepared to pay whatever portion of the bill necessary to discharge the obligation to Professor Ransome. However, it seems reasonable to give others the chance to share this joy.

The hopes for this research were to identify the parents of our Michael U. I. This has not been accomplished but I feel the Professor has done a creditable job of searching the records (even reading Latin) and preparing a report. This report will be published in full in the UB in due course. I will add notes which will make the report more readable and meaningful for our readers and for others who may take this work a step forward. This work, even with my notations, will not excite the UB readers. However, this is a scholarly work and it deserves to be made a part of the American record for present and future Upchurch generations. This work dove-tails well with work done by Belle West and Associates, but goes beyond what they did.

At this point, I do not visualize a further contract with Professor Ransome, although he seems willing. If a financial backer for such a third assignment appears, the work would be worth undertaking. I do feel his charges are reasonable.

I will welcome any comments you have on the enclosed report and look forward to continued collaboration with you on our mutual interest in our Upchurch heritage.

Please forgive my long delay in writing to you. We made it to England "by the skin of our teeth," so to speak. We were scheduled to go to England on February 1. On January 13 my father-in-law had a major stroke. He stabilized just in time for us to make our trip.

We do not know at this point where Michael Upchurch was born and raised. The village is located on the western edge of what used to be Huntingdonshire. This county exists no more since some years ago it was combined with Cambridgeshire. We shall, however, continue to use the designation, "Huntingdonshire," for the sake of greater clarity.

The northeastern part of Huntingdonshire, about one fourth or one fifth of the county, was originally fen country. The fens were reworked where a few shy and seemingly backwoods people lived. About the time that Michael Upchurch was born serious efforts were begun to drain the fens. Until then most of the villages in Huntingdonshire were located in the south and west of that county. Brington like Little Middle ^{is in that} Middle area. It is a tiny village, and the feeling one has is that one is definitely in the country. We were driven by a friend. Even at the modest speed we at which one has to travel travel on English country roads. Moleworth, Old Weston, and Brington seemed to run together. Only the signs along the road told us when we were passing from one to the other. Like Little Middle and other non-fen areas of the ^{consisted} county, the landscape around Brington consists of low, gently rolling hills. The church, All Saints, is located a bit off the main road and sits on a slight rise.

Before proceeding, it might be wise to clarify some terms of the art architecture of Anglican church since the terms vary a bit from those used in the Free Church Protestant tradition. "Nave" refers to the part of the church where the people sit. "Chancel" describes the area where the choir and the altar, or pulpit ^{table} are located. "Sanctuary" is used to designate the area immediately around the altar.

We were fortunate to find Brington Church open. Now most country churches in England are locked, and one has to go searching for the person who has the key in order to get into the building. Since the church has such a high roof and tower it gives the impression of being somewhat larger than it actually is. The pews ^{looks} though it would not seat more than a hundred people, and even at that some of them would have to be children or quite thin adults. The pulpit ^{is} large and handsome. The cover on the font, the place where infants and adults are baptized, is Jacobean and is really quite attractive. The church was clean and neat but did not have a polished look. Like the area it looked like the country - decent and in order but by no means elegant.

I could find no information on when the church was built. The chancel was added in the nineteenth century. When one sees the church it is obvious that the chancel was a later addition. With the nave as the only original portion the building was quite small when our ancestors worshipped there.

No one was around to question. There was no service leaflet or bulletin. From the furnishings of the church I definitely gathered that the services are "Low Church" - leaning toward the Evangelical - rather than "High Church" - leaning toward the Anglo-Catholic.

As I stood there in the dim February light
with the fine English rain falling outside, ^{I thought} that the
church at Brington was very much like our upland
heritage - devoutly Christian, solid, enduring,
respectable, and dependable. I can be proud of,
and content with, such a heritage. I hope that
all of my cousins share my feelings.

Thanks for your letter of 6 MAR 1994 and for the details. This past weekend I found time to extract the information in your letter and to place it on the Master outline and in the various Biopiles. A copy of the updated Master outline for the Sidney Lee Simmer, Sr family is enclosed along with a list of questions about missing details. I will be grateful for any answers you have or can get.

The story of how your grandfather was never able to receive due recognition for his accomplishment is a familiar refrain in family history. Sometimes it is a matter of people not being asked for their views and sometimes they get credit where it is not due. Feelings within families can take an ugly turn whereas you would think the situation would call for love and compassion. I have several such instances in my own family. My upper parent did not approve of our marriage in 1948.

I was gradually able to win them over (I think) aided in large measure when they learned I could milk a cow. It seems as if either you or I could write a book on the complexities of relationships in families.

Ken, I am curious to know if you would be willing to carry out a limited correspondence project on behalf of the Upchurch Family in relation to our history in England. There are several potential dimensions to this including an aspect related to the Upchurch Family and Little Gidding. I have had limited contact in the last 2-3 years with an individual in England who said he would be doing research on the Little Gidding records for the 1600-1700 era. I have lost contact with him but suspect it could be reestablished. I am not pressing you to take on this assignment but offer it as an option. If you undertake the project you could do it at your own pace.

With regard to the village of UPSTIRE I enclose a copy of a map with this village highlighted. It is just north of M25 on a line between central London and Harlow. I don't recall anyone ever having mentioned this village before. I just spotted it on the map in 1989.

Enclosed is a blow-up of the area  
associated with BRINGTON. Until I reexamined  
the map I could not figure out the relationship

of the village one to another. I was most pleased  
to see that we had been very close to Burgham  
although I don't recall that we ever drove  
through it. We did spend one night at the  
Leighton Bromswold Gathering which is (was)  
the residence of Vicar Robert Van de Meyer (he has  
guest rooms). He is the church leader for the  
church at Leighton Bromswold and at Little  
Gidding and I believe at Wimwick. We regularly  
travelled from Leighton Bromswold to Little Gidding  
by way of Hamerton. Also we drove from Great  
Gidding south on B660 to B662 especially to  
travel east from that point on B662 as it  
is shown as an old Roman Road. We  
stayed several nights at a mid motel  
at Upton on A1. We had a lovely dinner  
in a Pub at Elstow. I have no idea what  
we can find about the history of Burgham  
but our heritage seems to be tied to this  
village - just how much we are not sure.

Enclosed is a letter & card re Peter M.G.  
Bunnows, Esq of Norton Rose (A legal firm). I first  
met Peter in about 1980±2 years when  
I paid a very brief visit to Little Gidding.

At that time he had a room in the Little Gidding  
 manor and had a strong interest in the  
 Little Gidding Community/Community. I next encouraged  
 him in MAY of 1989 by which time he was  
 married, had children and lived (rented) in  
 the house associated with the church at  
 Great Gidding. He still had an interest in  
 Little Gidding and did legal pro bono work  
 for them. His office was in London. I helped  
 with the drawing of a \$10,000 gift from an  
 Upchurch relative to Little Gidding with Peter's  
 help (it paid for a new window in the  
 church at Little Gidding. If it suits your  
 purpose you could attempt to contact Peter  
 at Great Gidding or in London.
