UNCHURCH, LEILA: Henry Co Weekly June 15, 1888: To the Memory of Leila Unchurch. Whilst we deeply mourn her death not only as a Sabbath School Scholar but as a bright and Christian character always punctual in attendance with perfect lessons. In view of the loss we have sustained by the deceased of little Leila and of the still heavier loss sustained who were nearest and dearest to her be it resolved - that it is only a just tribute to the memory of the departed to say that in regretting her removal from our midst we mourn for one who was in every way worthy of our respect and regard. Resolved - that we sincerely condole with the family of the deceased on the dispensations with which it has pleased divine providence to afflict them and commend them for consolation to him who orders all things for the best and whose chastisement are meant in mercy. Resolved - that this our heartfelt testimonial of sympathy and sorrow be forwarded to the family and also a copy to the Henry Co Weekly for publication for our departed Sabbath school scholar and friend. UNDERWOOD, SOLOMON: Henry Co Weekly, Feb 25, 1881: Sudden death. On Tues last Mr. Solomon Underwood an aged citizen of this county carried a head of cotton to Daughtrey's Store in Butts Co and sold it. Returning home he put up his horse and went into the house apparently as well as usual. His wife left the room soon after to attend some household duties and returned several minutes later to find him sitting in a chair by the fire dead. His remains were interred in New Hope on Wed eve last.

UNKNOWN, NEGRO MALE CHILD: Henry Co Weekly, Nov 1, 1888: Burned to Death. On the farm of A.F. Bunn about a mile NE of town a negro child 3 years old was fatally burned last Fri. The child's mother was at work some distance from the house and called to it to bring her a piece of fire. It is supposed that it started with the fire and lit clothes catching fire burning the little fellow to death. When found the child was roasted (illegible on microfilm).

UNKNOWN, NEGRO GIRL: Henry Co Weekly, Feb 6, 1885: Home Affairs Column: On Wed of last week a negro girl living on Mr. J.J. McKibben's place at Worthville met her death in a most shocking manner. Her mother was off at work and she was left in the cabin alone, while standing near the fire her clothing ignited and in an instant she was completely enveloped in flames. She ran a distance of 100 yards to a branch and by throwing herself into the water finally succeeded in extinguishing the flames. She then proceeded to the residence of Mr. McKibben who made a hasty examination and discovered that she was seriously if not fatally burned. She attempted to strip but in doing so the skin adhered to her clothing and she was completely crazed by the pain. She lingered in this condition until Thurs morning when death came to her relief. She was about eleven years old.

Column: A negro woman dropped dead very suddenly at the residence of Mr. A.F. Sowell one morning last week. She seemed to be in good health as usual and went about her duties that morning and had gone to the well to get some water when death without warning struck very suddenly.

UPCHURCH, CHILD (NOT NAMED OF T.J.): Henry Co Weekly, August 31, 1894: Calling them home. Suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them now for such is the Kingdom of Heaven. These words were used about 1900 years ago by Him who was found a little child in Bethlehem and who afterwards walked upon the waters, stilled the tempest and raised the dead from the grave. The angel of death continues to come for our children as was mentioned in the Weekly recently, 3 were taken from our little town almost simultaneously and week before last he comes again and takes from the dear little child of Mr. & Mrs. T.J. Upchurch where it has gone to join the rest of these lovely little children all of which are safe from the troubles, trials, snares and temptations of this wicked world and when the fathers, mothers, sisters, brothers shall have crossed the stygian flood these sweet babes will be standing at the golden gate clapping their hands of welcome. To the bereaved family of this last child let us say "be comforted in the expression of Job, the Lord giveth and the Lord taketh. Blessed be the name of the Lord".

morning. She had recently been sick but seemed to be getting
along very well and was able to look after her duties about the
house and seemed to be as well as usual the day and night before
her death. She retired about 10 o'clock and about 2 o'clock in
the night her husband discovered that she was dead. She probably
died while asleep. She leaves a grief stricken husband with 3
small children, one of whom was only 3 weeks old. Her remains
were laid to rest Tues in the cemetery at Philadelphia. We deeply
sympathize with the family in their sad bereavement.
