Alvin, III. Anderson, N., IV. Alexander Davis Betts, V. Allen, VI. Archibald, VII. Sarah Catherine. It should be noted that Rev. Alexander Davis Betts was the renowned Methodist minister known as "Preacher or Brother Betts." He was a prominant chaplain for the North Carolina Troops during the Civil War and was frequently referred to by General Lee as "that model Chaplain, Brother Betts." The diary which he kept from 1861 until 1865 has been preserved and published as "Experiences of a Confederate Chaplain."
