I also spent some days reviewing the Unchurch state hospital records. I sincerely appreciate your including me in the loops of data collection for all these people of our common bloodlines. I essentially agree with your conjectures about the mysteries for which we lack sufficient documentation, although I'm just as tantalized as you probably are also. On the subject of poor Susie, I have the urge to take a flower to her grave should I ever manage to pass through Chattahoochee. If either of her parents or any sibling ever visited her, there is no mention of it in the file. I think I related to you earlier that my mother recalled only "fear" about her Uncle John. As a child and preteen, I knew Aunt Belle only as a stern old woman on the rare occasions that I saw her at all. Aunt Sadie was more the cheerful one who seemed to like the children. It delighted her when Uncle Harry slipped us quarters-which was a fortune then to an 8 - or 9 -year-old, and which I generally spent promptly anyway. I have no memory of ever actually speaking directly to Aunt Belle.
These details of Rebecca Pearl are extremely sad also. I can offer nothing about her save that my mother told me that Uncle Garland's first wife, Pearl, was mentally ill, and that his second wife, Hilda, had been Pearl's private nurse prior to her commitment to the state hospital. I do not have a marriage record for William Garland and Hilda (or a divorce record for Pearl), but I see that the inquiry from Uncle Garland to the State Hospital in 1919 was more than four years since Pearl's admission there. He remained in Jacksonville at least through the City Directory listing of 1935, and then some time before his death in 1950 he and Hilda moved to Alabama.

It happens that I have recently finished reading All Quiet on the Western Front, the powerful novel of the First World War, so when I read the diagnosis description of Fred B.'s problems, my first thought was that he could have had a post-traumatic stress. A cursory Internet search did not find him as a WWI soldier, but he would have been in his 30 s and unmarried at the time of that war, so I think it would be worthwhile to try to rule out his conscription and/or participation in 1917 or 1918.

Cleora Beard Gill (200 South th Street, Apt. 4, Lake Wales, HISTORICAL FL 33853) writes: "In doing some research for an article... on SOCIEYY my parents and their children, I found the name of a lumber POTNAM CO, FL company that was somewhere in north central Florida between 1912 and 1917. I thought I would try one last time to find it.
"The company was the John Jones Unchurch Lumber Company. I know my parents lived in a lumber camp at one time. I have them in Shells Bluff in 1912. Shells Bluff is supposed to be about 20 miles out of Runnel.... I have them in Watertown in 1917.... I know the time spread is large and the company is out of business by now. Some of the places I heard about when I was growing up from. were Palatka, Lake City, and Oldtown." Footprints

A discussion with Putnam County Archivist Janice Mahaffey Jane $1 / \% 2$ revealed that the John Jones Unchurch Lumber Company was mentioned in the old records of the Wilson Cypress Company of Palatka. This led us to call Corinne Richardson of the staff of the invaluable St. Augustine Historical Society Library, and she responded in a matter of hours with the information that the John Jones Upchurch Lumber Company had widespread operations in Georgia and Florida from its headquarters in the Dyal-Upchurch Building at the foot of Jacksonville's Main Street Bridge. The company also had a large complex about twenty miles from Gunnel where State Road 206 crosses US 1 in the area known as DuPont Center. Perhaps best of all, we have been able to put Mrs. Gill in touch with a grandson of John Jones Upchurch, who said he would be happy to hear from her. So, Gentle genealogist, "Seek and ye shall find--sometimes!"

Enclosed are articles on the Dyal-Upchurch Building, which was designed as an office building for the Dyal-Upchurch Company, a Georgia lumber and investment firm that moved to Jacksonville from Moniac, Georgia. Frank Unchurch of Deal \& Unchurch was the son of John J. Unchurch (See enclosed MEMOIRS OF GEORGIA, Vol. 1, p. 452). The company purchased the site of the DyalUnchurch Building in July 1901, and the building was completed and occupied in May 1902. The first city directory listing for the building is 1903. Two Upchurches are listed in the 1903 city directory for Jacksonville:

Delmer D. Unchurch, wife-Cozie--occupation, Bookkeeper, National Bank of the State of Florida. Boards 218 W. Adams Street

Noble A. Unchurch, Physician, 303-304 Dyal-Upchurch Building. Boards 218 W. Adams Street.

You do not list your father's name nor the time period when he worked for the John Jones Unchurch Lumber Company. If you can give us an approximate year, we will search further.

CHARLTON COUNTY.

JOHN J. UPCHURCH, lumberman, Race Pond, Charlton Co., Ga., was born in Nassau county, Fla., March 18, I86r. He was the son of N. S. and Sarah A. (Parker) Upchurch, and of a family that early settled in that state. He attended the common schools and completed his education by private instruction. Before reaching manhood he was embarked in business, at the same time displaying a liking for the excitement of politics. After a warm contest he was elected one of the representatives of Nassau county in the Florida legislature in 1887 and 1888, enjoying the distinction of being the first democrat to represent that constituency in the lower branch of the state legislature. In 1889 Mr . Upchurch moved to Race Pond, Ga., and engaged in business. He also entered into the councils of his party and took a prominent part in shaping its campaigns. In 1894 he was elected to the Georgia senate from the fourth senatorial district, and served on several important committees of that body. 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## 7 John James ofpchurch

When the advance guard of civilization first penetrated into the Land of Flowers, the speculative mind of man could not fail to consider the vast wealth that the splendid forests of pine and other timber of commercial value afforded -a great natural resource that needed no searching out nor prospecting, but reared itself in splendor from gulf to ocean. It was therefore not strange that the lumber interest was the first of importance to be developed, nor that it reached the proportions that it did, and has continued to be a most important industry; is the greatest producer of wealth to-day, and holds so much of promise for the future. The development of no other natural resource afforded so much of wealth nor was the foundation of so many fortunes. The man who began as a wage worker by economy was enabled to become proprietor of a small saw mill; and once engaged in manufacturing the easily accessible products of the forest, his fortune kept pace with his industry and intelligent application of business methods. Not only in the milling industry has there been immense returns to the investors, but in every branch of the trade there have always been a large array of rich opportunities for the profitable employment of time and capital. Fortunes have been made by dealers in timbier lands, by felling the forests and selling the logs; in manufacturing and dealing in lumber, and in every industry where wood enters into the manufacture of commercial commodities. Many of the most successful of Florida's earliest settlers made their fortunes in some branch of the lumber business; while many of the substantial fortunes of today trace their incipiency and their growth to the virgin forests. Many men who have engaged in the lumber business have accumulated the capital with which they have engaged in business of a different character more suited to their tastes, or with which they have made investments in improved and unimproved real estate, or in commercial, industrial, or financial enter-
prises. Many of them have accumulated capital so rapidly that

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$$ they were unable to employ it all in the business to which they were devoted, and were thus necessarily compelled to seek other enterprises in which to profitably employ it. By reason of this fact, there has been not only a great aggregation of both wealth and population attracted to the State directly because of the vast lumber interests, but the employment of the fortunes won in that industry in establishing and developing other interests has also served to greatly increase the wealth and importance of the State in many ways.

To the enterprise and industry of the lumber men, therefore, many other commercial and industrial enterprises owe their establishment and development. The lumber industry has also served the agricultural.interests by clearing the land and making them available for cultivation. The more enterprising and carefully managed of the larger lumber companies have, too, in, recent years found it exceedingly profitable to fence their denuded lands and make of them great pastures, where thousands of head of improved cattle are bred and fattened at a minimum of expense. Not only in lumber and its products has the forest yielded fortunes, but in naval stores as well, and the operating of turpentine plants and handling of naval stores is one of the most important industries of the State. Not only throughout this country but throughout
the countries of the world, these products of the forests are in demand, and the exporting of lumber and naval stores each constitotes a business within itself, some of the South's largest corporatons having the scene of their industry and their habitat in Florida. The wonderful opportunities that have always been offered and are found today in these industries have naturally attracted the most alert, aggressive and ablest business men of the State, and has even drawn from without her borders men of high character and splendidly developed business abilities. As individuals, or aligned with corporations, they are actively engaged in developing these resources of Florida, and in many instances have numerous small plants scattered over the State, with yards and storehouses at some central shipping point, and general offices which are transacting their business in the metropolis.

One of the most successful and busiest men of the lumber men of the State is John James Upchurch, who has made a phenomenal success of his life's work, though he has barely reached the prime of life. Mr. Upchurch is one of those public spirited and entergetic men who, while devoted to his own business, is ever watchful of the interests involving the public good and has not only served his people in the Florida legislature, but during a period when his business interests required his residence in Georgia, he was as active in the politics of that State as at home, and his ability and power for doing good was recognized to the extent that he was sent to the legislature of Georgia and served in both branches of that body in the house of representatives and the senate, during three terms.

Mr. Unchurch is of French-Huguenot descent, his first American ancestor having been a pioneer settler in North Carolina during the colonial days. His mother's people are natives of Florida, having been among the first American settlers. His father's family removed to Florida in 1858, and located in Nassau County. Mr. Upchurch was born at Callahan, Florida, March 16, 1861, his parents being Daniel J. and Sarah A. (Parker) Upchurch. His father was a man of a high degree of intelligence, and even in those early days was a successful real estate agent. Appreciating to the fullest extent the advantages of education, he sent his son to the public schools of Callahan until he had gained therein as much advancement as possible, when he gave him a preparatory course in the Bingham School at Mebane, North Carolina. From this school he went to the University of the South, at Sewanee, Tennessee, where he took the practical course afforded by that splendid institution of learning.

His first business venture was made in 1882, when he began the manufacture of pine lumber as owner and operator of a sawmill located at his native town of Callahan. This industry prospered under his excellent business management, and within a few years he found himself in possession of sufficient capital to enable him to establish another lumber manufacturing plant, which he located at Raceford, Georgia. He kept his citizenship in Florida, however, and as he took an active interest in politics, he was, in 1886, elected to the Florida legislature as a representative from Nassau County, and enjoyed the distinction of being the first democrat who was successful in reaching the legislature from that county.

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In 1889，he formed a copartnership under the firm name of the Dyal－Upinurch Investment Company，which has since that date proven a successful and prosperous business enterprise．This com－ many entered into the business of manufacturing lumber on a very large scale，greatly improving and extending the plant at Raceford． The important interests of the company，of which Mr．Unchurch was and is treasurer，demanded that he make his headquarters at Raceford，and he therefore became a citizen of Georgia．The progress of this company has been almost phenomenal，and it was several years before Mr．Unchurch could take from it his personal time and attention．He did，however，during his residence in Georgia win such a place in the community in which he resided， that he was honored by three elections to the State legislature．He served during the terms of 1895－1896，as senator from the fourth district，and during the term of 1899－1900 represented his county in the house．The succeeding term of 1901－1902 saw him again in the senate．In 1903，his business interests became so extensive that he was unable to give all of his time and attention to any one inter－ est，and he therefore removed to Jacksonville，where it became necessary for him to establish office and headquarters．From this vantage he supervises the numerous interests in which he is the active spirit，and is constantly alert for profitable investment of the capital which continues to flow from his numerous commercial and industrial investments．He is now treasurer of the Dyal－ Unchurch Investment Company；president of the Upchurch Lumber Company，and first vice－president of the Jacksonville Development Company．He is also a director in the Atlantic National Bank．He is one of the most influential members of the Jacksonville Board of Trade，and noted for his progressive and enterprising spirit which is of such a character that he always is as ready with his means as he is with his time and talents，wherever he recognizes an opportunity for advancing the best interests of the people of his city or his State．He is a man of easy approach， noted for his courtesy and geniality．Socially，as well as in a busi－ ness way，he enjoys a wide popularity and holds an enviable posi－ timon in the esteem of all with whom he comes in contact．He takes an active interest in all political affairs，and is among those who are looked to for counsel when it comes to shaping democratic policy．He is one of the prominent members of the Seminole Club and of the Germania Club，and is a consistent member of the Methodist Church．

Mr．Upchurch was married August 7，1890，to Susie Hawkins， daughter of Doctor T．D．Hawkins，of King＇s Ferry，Florida． Their married life was of brief duration；and some years after her demise，he was married to Belle W．Upchurch，a daughter of W．G． Unchurch，of Raleigh，North Carolina．He has now living six children，as follows：Gerald R．，John J．，Junior，Frank B．，Susie E．，Garland L．，and Marion Upchurch．

John James Upchurch was born in Callahan on March 10, 1861, the son of Nathaniel S. Upchurch and Sarah A. Parker. Realizing the importance of education, Nathaniel Upchurch sent his son to public schools in Callahan and then sent him for a preparatory course at the Bingham school in Mebane, North Carolina. Later, John attended the University of the South at Sewanee, Tennessee, one of the noted educational institutions in that part of the country at that time. In 1882 at the age of 21 , John Upchurch entered the business world. He owned and operated a logging business in Callahan and later established another lumber manufacturing plant at Race Pond, Georgia. He became a partner in the Dyal-Upchurch Company in 1895, a company which was successful in the lumber trade. Because of expanding business interests, Mr. Upchurch moved his residence to Jacksonville in 1907, so that he might establish an office and headquarters there.

The citizens of Nassau County elected him as their representative to the State legislature in 1886.

John Upchurch married Susie Hawkins on April 7, 1890. She was the daughter of Dr. T. D. Hawkins of Kings Ferry, Florida. She died after a brief married life. Three children resulted from this marriage: George H. Upchurch, John J. Upchurch, Jr., and Frank D. Upchurch. Some years later he married Belle W. Upchurch, the daughter of W. G. Upchurch of Raleigh, North Carolina. The children from this marriage were Susie E. Upchurch, Garland L. Upchurch and Marion F. Upchurch.

It was said of Mr. Unchurch: "High principles have ever guided him in his relations with his fellowmen and in the conduct of his business affairs and it is well known that he holds to a high standard of business ethics."

## DYAL-UPCHURCH BUILDING

The day after the 1901 Fire, a young New York architect named Henry John Klutho read of Jacksonville's destruction in the New York Times and decided that this city presented irresistible architectural opportunities. He arrived here the next month and soon formed a partnership with the well established Atlanta architect J. W. Golucke. The first and only Golucke-Klutho commission was this Second Renaissance Revival style office building designed for the Dyal-Upchurch Company, a Georgia lumber and investment firm that also moved to Jacksonville immediately after the fire. The Dyal-Upchurch Building was the first high-rise structure erected in the burned-out Downtown area, but it is not a true skyscraper, because its brick outer walls are loadbearing. It was constructed on 426 wooden pilings
driven into the riverbed, with six-inch cast-iron columns and twenty-inch I-beam girders supporting the interior. With 60 percent of the office space rented before the building was half-completed, a sixth story was added during construction. The first floor facade is faced with Indiana limestone, which also is used on the windows and quoins. The top of the building formerly had a limestone cornice and parapet, which was removed following a fire that gutted the upper stories in 1915. The rest of the facade is constructed of light granite-colored bricks (newspaper accounts claimed that over one-million bricks were used to build this structure). The main entrance features a handsome arch flanked by pilasters, and the lower facade on the Main Street side displays a series of rusticated arched windows. Soon after the building opened in May, 1902, the Atlantic National Bank was formed and for many years occupied much of the first story. The DyalUpchurch Building was restored in 1981 and was the first in Jacksonville to utilize National Register rehabilitation tax credits.

The Knight Crockery Company was established in 1881 under the name of Mumby, Stockton, and Knight. The firm sold household furnishings, china, glassware, and crockery. The manager of the business was Raymond D. Knight, Sr ., who served as Jacksonville's Mayor during the Spanish-American War. This building was constructed in 1902, when the Knight Crockery Company moved into it. Although smaller in scale than the adjoining Dyal Upchurch Building ( $\mathrm{D}-27$ ), the facade of this three-story structure has keystones above the second and thirdstory windows and gray bricks similar to its larger

1. I have no proof that the John M. Deal who served in the same Confederate unit as Nathaniel Smith Unchurch was the same man as the partner with JJU,who constructed the Jacksonville building in 1901, but I would bet money that either he or another family member (a son?) was the one. I've not taken the time to look up obits or other documents for any Deal, but when this one jumped out at me in the same Florida Confederate Service book in which I found NSU, it screamed to be copied. On page 16 of the Klutho Architecture book, there is mention that the Dyal-Upchurch Company was previously based in Moniac, GA (where JJ. lived for a time). It was in May 1901 that a great fire totally destroyed downtown Jacksonville. In July 1901, the D-U company purchased the site for its new headquarters in Jax and immediately contracted for construction. The same page reports that "Frank" Unchurch ordered this building from Klutho, but that may be an error, for the only Frank down there seems to have been JJ's son, but if he was actually born in 1894, as in my records, he would not have been ready in 1901 to work for his father. Maybe Frank became spokesman for the company in later years.
2. Circumstantial evidence points to this Frederick R. Unchurch being the son of David Reed U. The birth dates and birth place match up to the Jax obit. You are probably right that he had a first wife named Nannie. I would guess that he moved to FL to work for his cousin JJU, and after JJ died in 1933, Frederick worked briefly for the steamship company, as noted in the obit.

The home and business locations for NS and JJ Unchurch, et al, in FL and GA are all close to the state border. I expect they owned large expanses of lumber (and turpentine, according to Frances Register) operations that crossed the borders in the neighborhood of Callahan, FL and Moniac, GA. The turpentine business during those years was pretty ugly, and I notice that obituaries do not mention that part of the career history. But if they owned lots of pine trees, it would have been tempting to utilize the resource. It is only speculation, but it may be that the St. Augustine location came about after the family had accumulated some wealth. It was (and is) a beautiful resort area (near the beach), and I can readily understand why someone who could transport his working talents might want to move there from the swampy, mosquitoladen northern state border area. Fernandina Beach is between Jax Beach and St. Augustine, and that
may have been a vacation property. Fernandina is junky now, but back then it was likely more secluded. JJU: owned a huge home in the city of Jacksonville, but Frances Register told me she remembered the day it burned to the ground (1930 or so?). After that he lived in a smaller house in the same neighborhood and may have also kept a "main" address in the little town of Williston. These are just speculative thoughts. $\qquad$

## John Jones Upchurch, IIII

No. 13043 • 20 January 1921-1 August 1989
Died in New Port Richey, Florida, aged 68 years
Interment: Williston, Florida

IT COULD HAVE BEEN FORESEEN that Jack Upchurch would be among the highest-ranking men in academics of our class. He joined us after three years at the University of Florida, where he won high honors. He was on the plebe baseball squad, and also in the chess club, exemplifying both sides of officer development. First class year, Jack was one of the four selected to play a role halfway between cadet and officer: while carrying the full load of first class subjects, he also taught Spanish to second classmen. Professor's insignia joined the stars on his collar.


Jack's assignment to the Engineers was a natural, as he graduated No. 6 in the class. But his assignment to the 100th Infantry Division was to be the high point in his life. He joined the 329th Engineer Battalion, and commanded a company in it from May 1943 to November 1945. His service won him two Bronze Stars and a Commendation Medal. But he was proudest of the Presidential Unit Citation won by his company for assaulting the Maginot Line. In February 1946, Jack joined several of us in Theater Headquarters G-2 (then called ETOUSA and later USFET, before becoming EUCOM). Here he won another Commendation Medal.

A master's degree in engineering from Harvard resulted in assignment back to his beloved Florida, where, in his words, he
". . . tackled flood control and fished for black bass in the Florida Everglades for two years."

After the Advanced Course at Belvoir, it was back to Germany and to the Engineer Battalion of the and Armored Division. By 1954, Jack had decided that his future lay elsewhere than in the Army, and he resigned as a major in 1954. He continued his

association with the Reserves, and eventually retired as a Reserve lieutenant colonel.
A new career in real estate brought a long-time move to Haworth, New Jersey, where the welcome mat was out for classmates stationed at West Point. In retrospect, Jack's leaving the Army may have been an error. But in his first years of duty, he had not been tolerant of lower standards on the part of his superiors, and this had led to OER bias that he found difficult to overcome. To the end of his life he worked with the 10oth Division Association, and West Point remained very much in his mind. He was often an attendee at football games and class reunions. His two weeks of active duty each year were spent at West Point, working with the construction program and scouting for the football team.

For 18 years Jack lived in Haworth. Three months after graduation, he had married Barbara Nehring, an attractive brunette who was very popular with class groups. They had three sons - Paul, John, and Rick, joined later by Lois, their little sister. During these 18 years Jack proudly watched his sons go to college, start careers, get married, and also saw the arrival of his first grandchild, the first of seven.

But at the end of this same period, other things began to go awry. He sold his real estate business. His marriage to Barbara ended. A second marriage and a move to California took him away from the area where so much of his life had been lived. Finally, he moved back to his roots in Florida, in the town his grandfather had founded. A third marriage ended in divorce. By this time, Jack's health had begun to fail as well. Ironically, this last illness proved a reconciling factor, as his children rallied around him, and a long-standing estrangement was dissolved. He died after a lengthy illness, but it is typical of him that one of his last conscious acts was to send a final contribution to the Class Fund toward the 50 -year book and anniversary that he would miss.

Rest well, old trooper. We shall toast you in spirit at the 50th.

I think I told you I hope to meet with Sandy Upchurch, wife of John Upchurch, son of John Jones Upchurch IV. She will be in New Orleans in a couple of weeks, as part of a board that she and my husband both serve on. Her husband John has a different middle name, but they resumed the tradition and named their young son John Jones Upchurch V.

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Dear Cousin Phil,
What an entertaining package! I was mesmerized for a couple of hours as I read through your research and personal reflections on the life of Nathaniel Smith Unchurch. These materials will be great fodder for times with my grandchildren, including John J. Unchurch V (11), who would be VI had I named his father JJU V.

There were two revelations of immediate interest: JJU 1's Jacksonville address, 2531 St. Johns Avenue, taken from the death notice in the Florida Times- Union when NSU died. A quick Google maps search puts the location into the heart of St. Vincent's Hospital, located on the St. Johns River in the Avondale section of Jacksonville. My son Michael lives a few miles away. This clears up a mystery that has been nagging at me for years.

Secondly, and more seriously, is the history of blindness in the Gilbert U. line. JJU V suffers from juvenile glaucoma, and was saved from blindness only by having had multiple sophisticated surgeries as an infant at Shands Hospital at The University of Florida. This is an exceedingly rare genetic flaw, and I believe it tends to skip generations. Without modern diagnostic techniques and surgery; blindness is inevitable. The good news is that the child's condition is stable, with no appreciable residual damage. I wonder if the blindness of several ancestors could be attributed to the same condition.

Let me explore with my St. Augustine cousins their interest in putting a visit together. My sense is that Ill have to organize it if it's going to happen- akin to herding cats as the saying goes. It would certainly be a terrific experience.

Delighted to hear from you. Let me give you a little input re Jesse and son Matthew and you can respond which should lead us to the action project you propose.

I often say that Cousin Jesse is the richest of all Upchurches. I have had some phone and letter exchanges with him and visited him on his polo ranch in TX on 9 APR 1996. He was always cordial but has shown no abiding interest in his Upchurch heritage since. I have had no contact with Matthew. Perhaps you know Jesse married Filar the widow of John Wayne-another Unchurch footnote in history.

My belief is that the wealth of this family came when Jesse married into the Candy family and the Tandy fortune which included Radio Shack. My records reveal much disagreement in Candy with Jesse and Matthew involved and with Jesse as the largest shareholder being evicted from the Board.
