I tried to make a sketch of grandpa's barns etc. it is poorly done. The well is as large as the snake house! I see very little for I have optic neuritis. I wonder what caused Uncle Lase' and Aunt Maria's blindness and if there is any connection I can see nothing at Grandpa's clearly in my mind and loved every thing there. Now I loved the walk at the early morning with grandpa. The dew was on the ground and morning glories were every where. I was always at grandpa's heels. The garden was between his house and the house where pop and Aunt Bessie lived in when they were first married. They had me to eat oysters with them. Aunt Bessie cooked the best oysters I ever ate.

The black cherry tree. It was still there when the house burned. Mama told me of getting a spanking for eating them for they always made her sick when she was a little girl.

Grandpa's house. Uncle W. would always be sitting on the front porch in the evening when we got there

from the train station. Grandpa would be waiting at the end of the wall.

- 1) The old kitchen. Grandpa would play with us there mainly days and nights.
- 2) The grandest Johnny house I ever saw.
- 3) The well. We'd make little men out of May Pops and stick and let them swim in the well on a string.
- 4) The watering trough. Fascinated me. It was made out of a huge log - hollowed out. The old mill house. When I was a child Grandpa had his hams hanging in there.
- 5) The chicken house. There were the best peaches on the tree beside it.

The wheat barn which was square. The inside was like a bin. Closed two thirds of the way up in front. We loved to play in the wheat and bury our selves up to our necks.

- There was a large pig pen here. There was right much space between it and the next barn. I didn't have room for the space on the paper. Grandpa had lots of Palomd China (?) pigs. Every way they were black and white. This pavilion type barn was rather large and oblong. It was open on all sides and rather high off the ground. I've asked all the family what it was

- used for and no one knows. We loved to play there. The pea fowls would strut around in there. By the way, our Aunt made cushions of the pea fowls feathers. Some one would wave one over the table while we ate to keep the flies off.
- > This was a shelter type barn. The cows could go in and out.
  - > Our favorite barn. This was a very large barn. The front opening was wide.
  - i Aunt Maud would drive Phillis (the horse) inside with the luggie. They kept the luggie, wagons etc. in the hall way and there was still plenty of room. They hung the harness on the wall. On the right (inside) there was a row of stalls for the mules and horses. On the left there was a raised up walk way. I'd walk up there and watch them milk the cows. Some how they had slats in the stalls along the walk way in which they fastened the cows heads. They had a place in which to eat while being milked. There was a ladder on the left of the hall way which led to the hay loft. The ladder was nailed to the wall. How we loved to climb up there and play in the hay. The

Cats had their kittens in the hay.

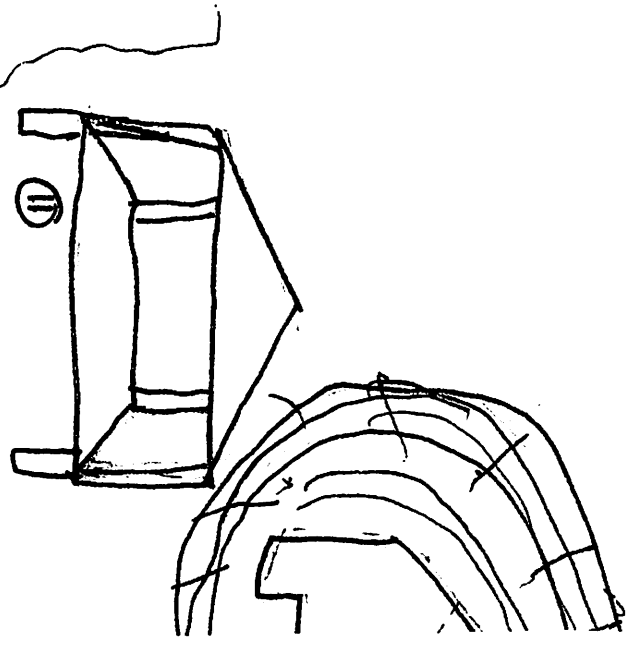
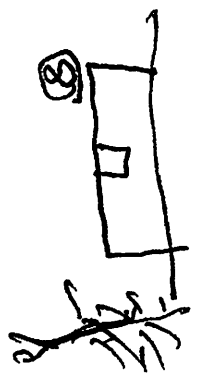
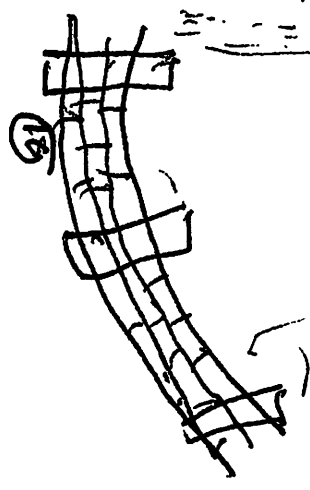
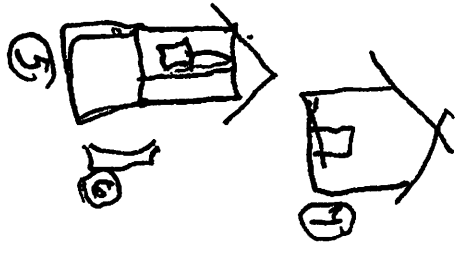
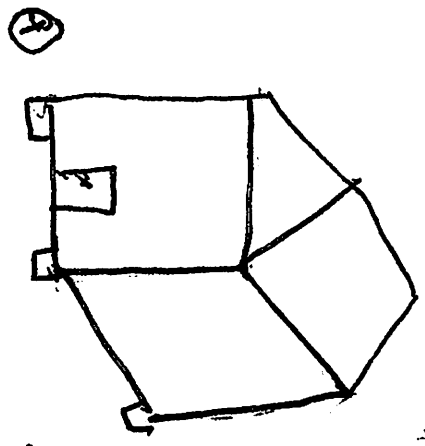
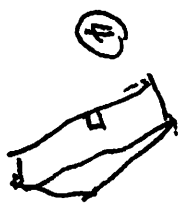
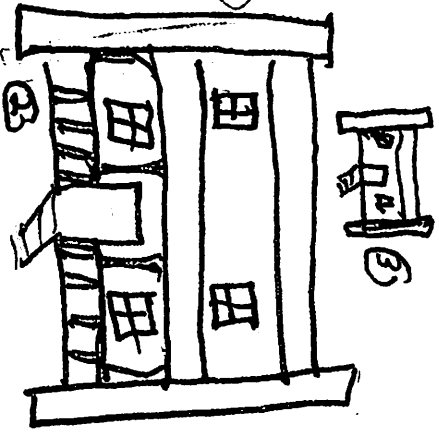

There were lots of trees behind the mill and in the large pasture. Lightning struck every barn at Grandpa's one time or another. My brother Dan said there must be a lot of iron in the soil. I could go there now and know where every barn stood. I think I will do just that this fall and look around.

I have most of the other information you wanted and will send it soon. Thank you again for what you have done for all of us interested in the Upchurch family. Mama would have loved your bulletins. I feel as if I have found some of my beloved Uncle Jeff. <sup>in you</sup> Best wishes - May Hargis.

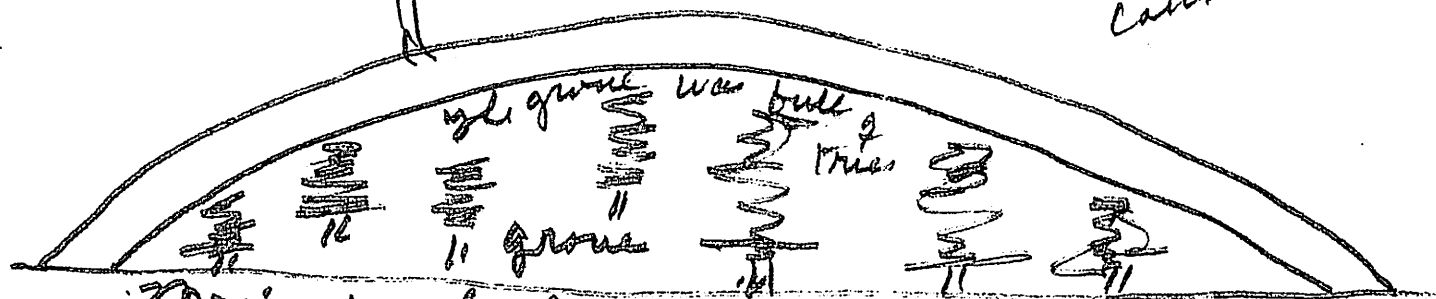

The sketch of Grandpa's farm is most helpful as are the many other details you provided. I too was named after a character in a book my mother read! I had the impression that Beatrice was named Beatrice Aurora Martin after Grandmother Aurora O. (Ray) Upchurch but your information shows Beatrice Row Martin.

Here are some more specific questions in case you can answer them:

- (1) It seems you were born in the Inwood community - Do you know in which house?
- (2) Where were each of your grandchildren born (city, county, state)?
- (3) Any idea as to when your brother James was named?
- (4) Do you have any addresses for any of James family? I would like to send them a flyer on U. B.
- (5) Do you have any details on your brother Andrew? I only have William Andrew Martin, Sr b 12 MAY 1908 Curabe Co, NC and Gray Caraway & had 1 son Jr.

- (6) Did you ever know any of the John Williams Upchurch or family who lived for a time on the west side of the road between Grandpa's and the church? (He was a brother of Eleanor Marks U I who was our Great Uncle William George U and for whom your mother was named).
- (7) Can you recall any additional specific events about any of our Uncle + Aunts - when they worked, what they did?
- (8) Could you give me a rough sketch of the time periods when your mother + father lived & worked at ~~different~~ different places?

Dear Phillip:

I intended writing you since I just got your Upchurch Bulletin. We have had un-expected sickness which kept me from it. I've enjoyed the Bulletin immensely. I've heard many a tall of many of the people in the Bulletin. I know it took a great amount of time to get all the facts together. My husband thinks they are a masterpiece and you did a great job. So do I. They make it so easy for the rest of us to learn more about our family. I am truly grateful to you.

You asked me to tell you what I remember about your father. There isn't much to tell. I remember in the summers when we'd visit grand pa he was the one that meant most to me of all my aunts and uncles. I was shy and timid. Uncle Giff must have sensed that for he made me feel special. He was kind and good to me. He'd talk to me about Aunt Bessie - your mother. He'd talk to me about

manning her as he stood before the  
mirror tying his tie careful going  
courting! He was a very handsome  
man & I remember how he looked out  
of his eyes. When I last saw you  
years ago I thought you had eyes  
like him. He'd dress up - ride away  
on his horse and I thought he  
looked like a knight in a story  
book. As about all I remember  
about Uncle Jeff was his being kind  
and good to a little girl who  
needed just that. What better  
qualities could a person have!  
I don't know anything about the  
Upchurches either. I could tell a  
lot about grandpa for I was his  
shadow when we visited there.  
Beatrice, James, Andrew and I are  
the only ones in our family who  
would remember much about  
grandpa's visits. Rather our visits to  
grandpa. I feel those who don't  
remember missed so very much.  
You are one year older than  
my daughter. You were twenty when  
Uncle Jeff died and one year old  
when grandpa died. All the year  
long I'd look forward to the next

in the summer when mama would take us to grandpa's. We'd always get on the train. Even now the sound of a train whistle blowing makes me long for one of those visits again. Aunt Maud would meet us at the old railroad station in Raleigh in a buggy pulled by Phyllis, her horse. The streets by the station and for some distance were made of cobble stone. I loved to hear Phyllis' feet tapping on the stones. In those days the farm was at its best. There were huge barns every where. I saw large minnow trees were at the end of the walk. I used to sit in them and read. We over-crowded the buggy. One of the boys would stand at the back. We'd sit in the front of the buggy and in mama's lap. The week of fun began the minute we jumped out of the buggy. Grandpa was always waiting and ready for us. He'd slice the best water melon on the long back porch. Water melons don't taste like his any more. The Upchurch family was a very close family. They had as closeness that so many families don't have today. They

liked nothing better than to sit and  
talk to each other. It seemed they  
always had something to talk about.  
I heard one of them say sometimes  
at night you could hear whirling  
blades in the air at the cross road  
just above Grand-pa's - I slept in the  
mamm with mama, Aunt Pat, Aunt Lena  
and Aunt Maud. It was soothing to me  
listening to them talk. I'd drift off to  
sleep ~~but~~ to the tune of their voices. They  
would talk about Aunt Maria and  
Uncle Lars, (our great uncle and Aunt  
Grandpa's sister and brother. They were  
both blind. Mama said one always  
sat on each side of the fire place.  
They were very much loved. I loved  
to wake up in the morning at Grandpa's.  
The quinnies would be yelling and I  
loved the sound of the farm. Each  
morning Grandpa would come to  
the foot of the stairs and yell, "Mary  
are you awake?" As soon as I had  
breakfast I'd go with him and we  
would go to drive the cows down the long  
lane to the pasture. Grandpa showed  
me a large oak in the pasture. He  
said he cut the top out of it with  
his knife when he was a young

man. I'd wanted to back and find that oak. Each night we'd go back for the cows. It amazed me how easily old they could round them up. In the day there were barns and barns to play in. The main barn had a center aisle where the hoggies were kept. On the right were stalls for the horses. On the left were stalls where the cows were fed and milked. Above was a huge hay pile with hay. We'd look for kittens in the hay and usually found them. The wheat was piled high in the wheat barn. We'd bring ourselves up to our necks in the wheat. I guess there were no allergies then. Early morning dew and morning glories blooming made me think of grandpa. After taking the calves to the pasture we'd go to the garden. The garden would be wet with dew and morning glories blooming everywhere. They used to have the old kitchen built away from the house. After it burned the kitchen was built on the back of the house. In the dining room they had an

old shiny long table with benches at the sides. At any time of day you could pull out the drawers to the table and there would be a platter of country ham. I can still smell the odor of the drawer. At night the rest of the family would go to the front room and talk. Grand pa would stay in the dining room with the grand children and play. He'd chase us around the big table. He could jump up in the air and click his heels together three times before touching the floor again. When we were tired he'd tell us tales about Henry in the Civil War. Grand pa was a small man in size - About like Uncle Pet. ~~It~~ I think his heart was larger than his body. He was a happy man and loved to have his grand children around him. Momma said at Christmas time he'd take baskets of food to the sick people in the community. And would make egg nog for all his tenants. I must not forget to tell you about the Grannie House. We always had

a "two-seater", I thought grand-pa had the grandest one I ~~had~~ ever seen. He had a long row of seats. They started off the size of a paucer and ended up full size. When you "fitted" the middle one you knew you were about grown. Now days, you have no way of knowing! Our week at Grandpa's passed all too swiftly. But it was always a grand and glorious week. We got into the buggy and Aunt Maud took us back to the train station. Soon we were home again. The barns have gone now. Only the two tall chimneys are left of the house. But the memories of going to Grandpa will live in my heart forever. For there was fun, laughter, good will and goodness at Grandpa's. You would have loved Grandpa Phillip.
