The following is an excerpt from the 9JUL 1993
letter from Norma Jeann Gooding concerning her
Grandmother TEU

I can tell you a little about
Theodosia. She was in a
wheel chair for 30 or 40 yrs before
her death she had Arthritis. She
had to lay in bed on one
side or the other ~~before~~ because
her legs were permanently bent
in a sitting position. She was
a beautiful person & loved to
read her Bible. She always
told us kids stories. One

she told has stayed with me all these years. She was a very big woman, she was alot taller than her husband. Her brother Ballinger & his wife Aunt Dicie used to visit alot. He was a giant of a man & wore a patch on one eye. His wife Dicie was real tiny & smoked a corn cob pipe. They looked funny together. But Uncle Ballie we called him was a gentle man. Him & Theodosia were close.

Aunt Mae lost her husband in the 40's. Theodosia lived with Mae after William died.

As you can see Mae's husband died in 1948 and Grandpa died in 1941. So Theodosia lived with Mae for along time.

I was with my grandmother about 3 hrs. before she died. She patted me on my cheek and told me to always love others. That night I was

wake up and saw an angel at the foot of my bed. I believe to this day it was a sign that Gannie had died & went to Heaven. I was real young so maybe I dreamed it.

I am not sure how much narrative information you are interested in but I am sending along information on the migration of Will Gooding and Theodosia Upchurch from Greely County Kansas to Uvalde County Texas ca 191906-7. You said you gave lectures on the Upchurch history. This may give you some fodder for such lectures. Hope you find it interesting. It is written as it was told to me by Will and Theodosia during the time we lived on the same farm in San Patricio County near Aransas Pass, Texas. in the 1930s.

Grandma Gooding, as she was affectionally called, was a gentle woman but had a stern streak that was obvious in her way of life. Will was a great practical joker. To pull off a good prank was the highlight of his day. His father and grandfather were both Baptist ministers. Will was a religious person who prayed daily and I couldn't possibly count the times he has placed his hand on my head & prayed for me when illness struck. Both were quiet people and talked about themselves only when asked. OH. how I wish I had asked more!!!

Also on Otter Creek, in Ky. That's in Theodosia's family Bible, her writing. All I have figured it's close to the Tennessee border.

Looking back at records, William Harvey Gooding was born in Palmerville, Ky near Mt. Pisgah I believe Otter Creek may be Order Creek instead. I'm not well organized on my paper work yet. But again the family tells this story:

When the family was traveling by wagon train, they reached Otter Creek in Ky. and camped over night. The ladies were getting the fire ready & men folks were out hunting. They

put the baby (Henry Alvin) in a basket under the wagon, in the shade. The men came in & meal was cooked, they ate. The mother went to get baby & it was gone. The men folks started looking around and found lion or cougar tracks & where baby was dragged. They located the big cat on a ledge above creek, & it was playing with the baby. There was a chance that if they shot it might hit the baby, but took a chance, cause the cat would kill it anyway. So the father took aim across wagon wheel & shot. He killed the cat & got back a scratched & bruised boy but otherwise unhurt. The baby wasn't but a few days old. My Grand mother Theodosia, told this to us many times. Said her daddy's nick name was (Otter)

I met Ballinger Upchurch and Dica Huddleston Upchurch, the younger brother of my grandmother, in Austin, Texas in the 1950s. They were in their 70s at that time but you could still see the frame of a very large and stout man in him. Dica smoked a corn cob pipe but had a petite porcelain pipe she smoked when in public places. She was a character. They lived in Coos Bay, Oregon at the time and he had retired from the lumber business. Grandmother died a few years after that meeting. At the time I was a State Trooper with the state of Texas and arranged for an escort for her to Uvalde where she was buried beside Will Gooding.

→ JOHN EDGAR GOODING

The following is their life together as told to me by Will Gooding in the late 1930s while he and my father were farming together in Aransas Pass, Texas: Will Gooding asked for the hand of Theodosia of Henry Alvin Upchurch but was refused. The two later eloped and were married. When Henry learned of this he came after Will armed. They learned of this and fled to what was then Fentress County, Tennessee where they remained until Henry cooled off. He never spoke to his daughter after that time.

About 1895 several members of the Gooding family headed West. The first two daughters were born in Wayne County. They settled in Caldwell County Missouri after four months travel by wagon. Their third child was born in Caldwell County. They moved on to Greely County, Kansas where Will and his father obtained land and built homes. Will's mother died in Greely County. She was Rebecca Chrisman d/o Harvey Chrisman of Wayne County.

They were wiped out by a blizzard around the turn of the century. My father John Gooding was born in Greely County in 1902. When he was about 4 or 5 years of age Will sold his land and bought two wagons and six head of mules. One large wagon for their belongings and one smaller for family and food. He headed south. About all they had to buy was staples such as flour, salt, coffee and sugar. Grandpa said the wild game was plentiful and the streams were clean and full of fish. They came down what is now US Highway 83 and finally settled in Uvalde County. Their last two children were born in Uvalde County.

Will acquired more land and started farming again. This time it was drouth that wiped him out. My father worked for the State of Texas on a compulsory dipping program to wipe out the Mexico fever tick. He wound up in San Patricio County where he and Will again acquired land and started farming again. Will Gooding became to old and was suffering from heart problems so he quit. Both he and grandma wanted to return to Uvalde so they moved to Uvalde where their daughter Ora lived. Will died there and Grandma came back to Austin to live with her only surviving child, Susie May Gooding William who was widowed by that time. Grandma Gooding was living there when her brother Ballinger came to see her. She died there and was carried back to Uvalde where she was buried by her beloved Will. They were both wonderful grandparents and I loved both of them very much.

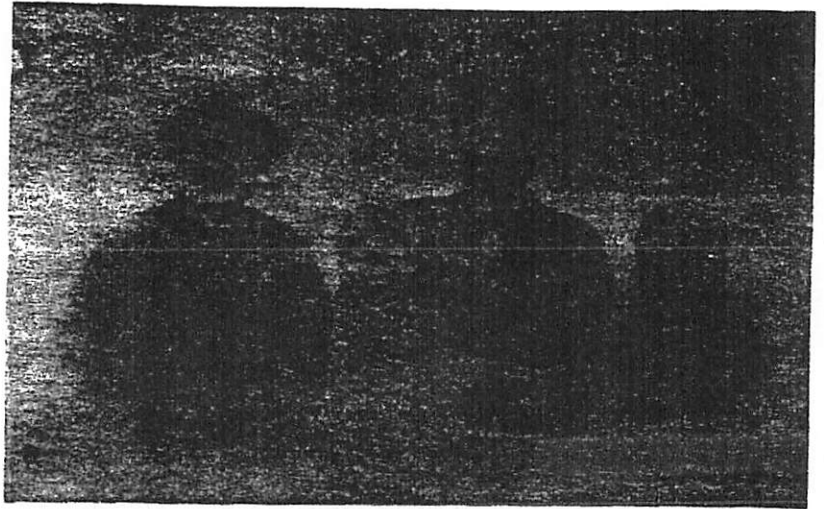

William Harvey Gooding (Will) asked for the hand of Theodosia Upchurch in marriage but was denied by her father, Henry Alvin Upchurch. The two eventually eloped and were married. Henry Upchurch came after them, armed, but the two slipped out the back way and fled to relatives in Tennessee with the help of a horse and buggy. Upon learning they were leagally married Henry Upchurch returned home. He set in motion legal action to disinherit his daughter and never spoke to her again in his lifetime. Will and Theo eventually returned to Wayne County Kentucky to settle. Two daughters were born in Wayne County Kentucky and sometime before 1897 Will and his family left Kentucky for Kansas. They settled in Greely County, Kansas. One daughter, Sally Ora was born on the way in Polo, Caldwell County Missouri. Will homesteaded land, built a house and bought cattle. They were wiped out by a blizzard around 1905. One child, John Edgar Gooding, was born in Horace, Greely County Kansas. Will sold the house and land, bought a large freight wagon for the household good and a smaller wagon for the family and clothing and food. He purchased six head of mules, hitched four to the big wagon, two to the smaller wagon and headed South. John Gooding remembered parts of the trip. They had a small dog that would trot along under the wagon in the shade until he got tired then they would let him ride inside. Will said the route followed what is today generally along Highway 83. He said the streams were clean and full of fish and game such as quail, turkey, deer and rabbit. They would buy staples such as flour, coffee, etc. as they came through small settlements along the way. They eventually settled in Uvalde County where Will went to work on a ranch breaking horses and mules. Two more boys were born in Uvalde County.

The Upchurch line can be traced back to England where there is a family crest. It is little wonder the hand of such a well bred lady would be denied a "Shanty" Irishman such as Will Gooding. Theodosia said the twinkle in his deep blue eyes won her heart. They lived long and happy lives and raised six healthy children.
