Possible Cousins of Michael Upchurch, I in America in the 1600's By R. Phillip Upchurch, PhD

rom time-to-time one encounters in long-ago records and even in present day records names that look similar to UPCHURCH. Some of them (but not all) are UPCHER, UP-SHIRE, UPSALL, UPSHAW, ACHURCH and UPSHUR. This article will address in particular the name UPSHUR. This is a well documented name in America and we shall address the matter of whether the colonial members of these two families were related. Readers of the UB and those interested in Upchurch heritage know well the story of how Michael U. I came to America from England in 1638. With rare exceptions, individuals in America with the family name Upchurch trace their family line back to Michael U. I.

Our efforts to explore the UPCHURCH/ UPSHUR connection has been dilatory but has nevertheless spanned nearly twenty years. That odyssey is briefly recounted as follows:

By 1976 your editor had become well

acquainted with Mrs. George H. West, nee: Etta Belle Lewter, now deceased, author of the wonderful book UPCHURCH FAMILY. She had in her possession a book entitled UPSHUR FAMILY IN VIRGINIA by John Andrew Upshur, The Dietz Press, Inc., Richmond, VA, 1955. This book was borrowed on 28 DEC 1976, key passages extracted and returned to Etta Belle. This book tells the story of an important family in America which originated about 1637 when Arthur Upshur (Upcher) at age twelve came to the eastern shore of VA from Essex County, England. The book details the prominence of this family in America which can only be cited briefly here. Successive generations maintained impressive homes on the eastern shore, some of which have been maintained or restored in recent decades. In 1841, Abel Parker Upshur of this family became Secretary of the U.S. Navy, and then in 1843, Secretary of State. He was killed by an explosion on the battleship Princeton in 1844. Other family members were also prominent in public service. In this century one family member has played a major role in the res-

toration of historic Williamsburg, VA the Colonial Capital. Counties in West Virginia and Texas were named UPSHUR in honor of this family. The book by John Andrews Upshur was chosen by The National Genealogical Association of America as the "best genealogy of 1955". The following six quotations from the 1955 book are relevant to our continuing interest

"About 1637 Arthur Upcher, a boy of Twelve, came to Virginia from Essex County, England. Perhaps his original home was Colchester or one of the nearby towns of Coggeshall, Socking, Dedham or Wormingford where Upchers were living at the time".

"of the Upcher Family in England there are numerous records indicating that by the beginning of the sixteenth century this name was generally spelled Upcher although earlier Essex records show many variations including Upchare, Upshire, Upshor, and others"..

"For many years following his immigration to Virginia Arthur Upcher's name appeared most frequently as Upshott, but his name ultimately became established as Upshur, a spelling to which his descendants have adhered". .

"The parentage of Arthur Upcher is at present unknown, however, no comprehensive search of the English records has been made". .

"Other members of the Upcher Family may have emigrated from England to America in the seventeenth century for early records furnish evidence that persons of similar name embarked for or were in the colonies at that period".

"Richard Upcott, age 26, took passage to Virginia from Gravesend, England, in June 1635. The New England Historical and Genealogical Register, 3 (1849 184. Michael Upchurch is listed as an immigrant to Virginia in 1654. George Cabel Greer Early Virginia Immigrants 1623-1666 (Richmond 1912), 336. He was probably the same Michael Upchurch who was in Surry County, VA., as early as 1656. Surry County, VA., Court Records, Orders, Deeds, Wills, 1645-72, 1958"..

"Arthur Upshur I 1624-1709 born Essex Co., England and is buried at "Warwick" his last home near Quimby in Accomack Co. VA".

With the above information in hand a letter was dispatched to Mr. John Andrews Upshur on 3 JAN 1977 asking for his impression on the likelihood of the Upshur and Upchurch families being related. His handwritten note was dated 10 JAN 1976 and stated in part as follows: .

"I have done much research covering a period of over 55 years. A study of English church and probate records and books on English surnames - all indicate that the Upshur, Upcher, Upchurch, Upshaw, Upshear, etc., etc. are derivations of same family years ago. Afterall, it has only been in recent times that names were spelled other than phonetically - 99% plus of the people could not read or write and spelling and writing was left to the scribes. Even in the early Virginia Court records, one will find the name of the same person spelled three or more different ways in one paragraph".

In 1995 a second edition of UPSHUR FAMILY in VIRGINIA appeared and funds donated to the Upchurch Research Fund were used to purchase a copy. This second edition was dedicated to the author of the original edition who died in 1993. The second edition authors are Robert Irving Upshur and Thomas Teackle Upshur, IV.


As a follow up, a letter to Eleanor Walton Upshur, the widow of John Andrews Upshur, brought a lovely reply and the addresses of the two authors who are brothers and also cousins of the original author. Subsequently on 12 SEP 1995, a Continued from Page 1

letter was dispatched to the new authors inviting comment on the possible relationship between the Upshur/ Upchurch families and offering to "stay in touch".

Dr. Thomas T. Upshur, IV, on 29 OCT 1995, responded cordially to the request of 12 SEP 1995. In part he replied: .

"The relationship between the Upchurches and the Upshurs is something that I haven't been alerted to until your interesting letter came while I was overseas. It is certainly possible. ---- we would be happy to find an Upchurch relationship if one existed".

For anyone who would wish to pursue the linkage of the numerous groups who went by Upchurch and related names in England in eras before 1650, additional details can be brought to the fore. One understands that this research is difficult from several standpoints. Over time we trust progress will be made. For the present, we are pleased to know that Upchurch family lines parallel to the one established by our ancestor Michael U. I, started unfolding in the early years in America. The Upshur family has a long and illustrious history. We would be honored to have our potential kin to the Upshur family further documented.
