Samuel Louis Stockton was "Pa" to his children and "Louis" to others who knew him. He learned to read and write in the little log school house near the place of his birth in the community now known as Tecula. As a young man, he sold his share of the land that he inherited from his parents. He purchased a farm in the Mixon Community about six miles north of Tecula. It was there where he built a one-room log cabin and settled with his bride in 1888. The cabin was a few hundred yards west of the old barn that exists on the place today.

Ophelia Stockton was "Ma" to her children and grandchildren and "Felie" to others who knew her.

Louis and Felie Stockton's farm grew to several hundred acres as they purchased more land.

After their second child was born, they built a new home that was located a few yards north of the home that exists on the place today.

Louis Stockton had a keen sense for business. He belonged to the Woodmen of the World Society. He was interested in the religion of The Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society, which became Jehovah's Witnesses in 1931. It was not unusual for him to travel to Jacksonville to attend religious meetings.

Louis Stockton had spent the day prior to his death at the hard labor of stripping ribbon cane.

At Christmastime, only a few weeks after Louis died, the family home burned. The children had popped firecrackers in the back yard a short time before the family left the house to visit neighbors. The house burned while they were visiting. It is believed that a firecracker was carelessly tossed into a barrel of feathers on the back porch and started the fire.

The death of Louis and the loss from the fire caused difficult times for Ophelia and the children.

Neighbors helped, and a new home was built. The family worked hard, and their farm operation continued to support them.

All of the Stockton children attended school at Mixon, which was about one and one-half miles from their home.

On July 20, 1914, Ophelia Dickey Stockton married Samuel Patrick Wood. He died in 1916 at the age of sixty-one and is buried in Mixon Cemetery.

Ophelia was Mrs. S. P. Wood for only a few months when Mr. Wood took leave of the family without telling anyone where he was going. He returned from the mysterious journey almost a year later, bearing gifts for the family.

When I was growing up, Ma still owned her gift from Mr. Wood, which was a beautiful hand-made cedar chest. Had it not been for the much admired chest, which had Mr. Wood's and Ma's names carved on it, we might not have heard as much about Mr. Wood.

His absence from the family and the briefness of the marriage are probably reasons why Ophelia continued to be known as Ophelia Stockton.

In 1918 a new family home was built by a carpenter and the Stockton sons. This home was one of the finest in the community. It was a large white house with five rooms and an enclosed hallway and a closet to store quilts from the floor to the ceiling. The windows had screened frames, and the two entrances had screened doors. The back porch was screened in and extended the full length of the house. There was also a large front porch that housed the water shelf where the wooden bucket of water sat with the common dipper that everyone drank from.

After the family moved into the new home, the old one was torn down, and Chester, the oldest son, used the lumber to build his first home.

We, Ma's grandchildren, remember her Victrola and some favorite records, "Turkey in the Straw," "My Blue Heaven," and "Red River Valley." We enjoyed the porch swing and took care not to bump the wall with it. Stories about the remains of the old ash barrels that once produced lye for making soap and the ruins of a storm cellar, caved in many years before are among our memories. There was also the old well that according to family tradition was dug in the early 1890's by Ma's stepbrother, Billie Penland, who received a gold watch for digging the well. It was a forbidden well to children; however, we would occasionally dare to lean over its curb and peep into the deep hole at the shimmering water below, even knowing that the consequence would surely be death if we fell in.

One of Ma's nephews, J. C. Griffin from Stockton lineage, boarded with her during the 1930's and 1940's and took care of the farm chores.

For many years Ophelia Stockton sold milk, butter and eggs produced from the farm. She traded at J. L. Brown's general store in Jacksonville, purchasing what she needed and saving the balance.

The great depression of the late 1920's and 1930's caused many banks to foreclose and pay only a percentage on each dollar deposited with them. At that time Ophelia had money deposited in one such bank and was one who took a loss. After that she had very little faith in banks.

During the depression many people lost their farms, and some families had very little to eat. Vegetables, fruits, chickens, eggs and milk, all produced on the farm, helped in those lean years, and Ma managed to keep her land and recover financially.

Ophelia Stockton had two sons who served in World War I, and during World War II, each of her children had one or more sons who served in the U.S. Military forces.

Ma Stockton was a Christian of the Methodist religion. As a young woman, she was converted into this faith at her home by a traveling minister. She attended the church in Mixon that served both Presbyterian and Methodist worshippers.

Ophelia Stockton suffered several years of poor health prior to her death from a stroke.

Louis and Ophelia Stockton had nine children, all born at Mixon in Cherokee County, and here are notes on them.

Robert James "Bob" Dickey, born March 15, 1844, died October 29, 1915, of bladder cancer. He married first, January 31, 1866, Sarah F. Upchurch, born 1845 in Tennessee, died about 1873 as a result of childbirth. A story of tradition is remembered by Dickey Descendants of the night that Sarah Upchurch Dickey died. Several relatives and friends of the Dickey family were present in the home of Bob and Sarah that night. Georgia Dew Tyra was a young woman about nineteen years of age at the time and was present, and it is said that she witnessed the happening and often spoke of it during her lifetime. Sarah was very ill and had slipped into a coma. The family believed that she was dead and were getting ready to prepare her body for burial. Sarah suddenly regained consciousness, called Bob to her side and asked him to bring their two small children, Martha Elizabeth and Ophelia, to her and to bring her a drink of water and a hymn book. Bob Dickey is reported to have immediately called on one of the men folk to take a certain horse and ride for the doctor, sparing no horse flesh. Sarah then said to Bob, "I'll be leaving again, Bob." With her little daughters near her, she sang softly from the hymn book until shortly thereafter she died. She was the daughter of James S. Upchurch and Martha Bond Upchurch (See Chapter Twenty). Robert J. Dickey married second, January 5, 1875, Mrs. Eliza Ann Mills Penland, widow of Stephen A. Penland, born 1844 in Tennessee, died in Cherokee County about 1874 of pneumonia. Eliza Ann, born February 20, 1849, in Georgia, died July 11, 1926. She was the daughter of Elisha Mills who moved to Cherokee County before 1860. Bob and Eliza Ann Dickey are buried in Fitch Family Cemetery of Cherokee County, Texas. It is likely that Sarah Upchurch Dickey is also buried there in a lost grave. Bob Dickey served in the Army of the Confederacy throughout the Civil War. He was in Company C, Eleventh Texas Infantry, which was organized at Knoxville, Texas, August, 1862.

Bob Dickey, a cotton farmer, owned land in the Blackjack Community of Cherokee County. He and Eliza Ann are said to have enjoyed the company of family and friends in their home, where they often entertained. The kitchen and dining area was a separate building from the other part of the house. The other building consisted of the living quarters on the first floor and sleeping quarters on the second floor. Under the stairway was a closet where tobacco, snuff and other such precious supplies were locked away. Both Dickey and Penland children fabricated ways to enter the closet and partake of the forbidden tobacco products.

There were always black families who lived on the Dickey place. In the 1870 Census, living next door to Bob and Sarah Dickey was a young black couple named Green and Ann Dickey. Often Indian migrants camped at the nearby creek. The Indians, Negroes and Dickeys all worked the land. It was common practice for the field hands to eat the noontime meal in the Dickey home. When all three races were present to be fed, the Dickeys ate at the first-shift table, then the table was reset for the Negroes, then was set a third time for the Indians.

Among the Dickey kin at Blackjack were the Stadlers. Miss Kate Stadler, born July 16, 1897, remembered that Bob Dickey always stopped at their house for a black cup of coffee on his way to Troup, where he often traded and purchased supplies. Miss Kate and Mrs. Verna Duty Dalby both remembered that Bob Dickey had a big wagon and a little wagon. The little wagon was called a pumpkin wagon. They also remembered when Bob Dickey was baptized in the creek. They said he was an old man and that several people helped him into the water, then helped him out and into a chair where a warm quilt was wrapped around him. It is believed that he was converted into the Baptist church.

Some of Bob Dickey's grandchildren remembered his funeral procession of many horse-drawn wagons that followed the wagon bearing his casket from the Dickey farm to Fitch Cemetery.

Bob and Sarah Upchurch Dickey had two children that became adults. Bob and Eliza Ann Dickey had five children that became adults. Bob Dickey had three stepchildren, who were Eliza Ann's children from her marriage to Stephen Penland. All of these children were born in Cherokee County, and notes on each one is contained in this chapter.

Larce married June 3, 1883, Louisa Adelia "Deelie" Upchurch, born November 6, 1860, in Cherokee County, died February 23, 1938, and is buried in Tecula Cemetery. Adelia was the daughter of James S. Upchurch and Martha Bond Upchurch. (See Chapter Twenty). The marriage celebration of Larce and Adelia Stockton was held in the home of Robert James "Bob" and Eliza Ann Mills Dickey. (See Chapter Eighteen). It was a wedding party that included friends and neighbors, as well as kinfolks. The Upchurch family most likely led the entertainment, since the men were all musicians and often the women and children joined them in song and dance.

Larce and Adelia had nine children, all born in Cherokee County, and here are notes on them.
