Growth also an issue in 1911

Newspaper special edition published 84 years ago covers another period of burgeoning development

On Sept. 15, 1911, the 6-year-old Apex Journal published its first Industrial Edition, highlighting the history of the town as well as the people and businesses that had contributed to its more recent progress. According to the editor, Walter N. Keener, the special edition was the realization of a months-long dream and the product of much hard work.

Should this general survey of our beautiful town be the means of encouraging our citizens to greater efforts and induce people and capital to come among us, we shall feel that we have been repaid," Keener writes on the editorial page.

Keener notes that local merchants and businessmen helped provide the advertising to make the special edition possible. He also talks about the problems "too numerous to mention" his staff faced in put-

ting the edition together."
"But here it is," he writes. "If you like it, say so. If you don't, keep

your lid closed."

The Industrial Edition came out as the town's tobacco and cotton markets were preparing to open. One hundred seven pupils had just begun the fall session at the Apex Graded School. And the town commissioners had just called for an election on the question of issuing bonds (\$10,000 in 20 years at 5 percent) to build a town hall and make street improvements. Following are excerpts from that special issue:

Wonderful Growth of Apex

History of the town from its incorporation down to the present time - a concise statement of its progress along all lines and the opportunities offered the home-seeker and investor. Why we say "Keep Apex Growing."

What is now the splendid town of Apex had for its original cognomen the undignified appellation of "Log Pond." This name was derived from the fact that that section of the town now occupied by the splendid store of A.B. Hunter and the other brick structure between this and the open park lot of the Seaboard Air Line Railway was under water and filled with logs.

Land was plentiful and agriculture was in a primitive state then. The farmer had an unlimited opportunity of selection and as the land now under the town of Apex was on a ridge, agriculture gravitated to the numerous streams on either side.

Not much history was made until the pall of the Civil War had passed away and the arts of a peaceful civilization had been resumed. This section, like all of the South, suffered in prosperity and in men.

The history of Apex really began with the coming of the Raleigh & Augusta Air Line Railway. During the war this, under the then name of the Chatham Railroad Company, had been projected as a military enterprise to reach and bring into the use of the Confederacy, the products of the coal field of Chatham County.

After the war it was re-organized into the Raleigh and Augusta Air Line Railway Co., having for its aim and object what it has since be-

come, one of the great arteries of commerce of the Southern states.

The first enterprise to follow in the wake of the railroad was the large lumber business of the late J. McC. Ellington, whose son, Frank K. Ellington, is now a prominent citizen of Raleigh. Mr. Ellington was a prosperous man and soon attracted others to his location.

The General Assembly of 1871-1872 incorporated the town of Apex and named its officers. H.C. Olive was its first mayor.

These were the days before prohibition, and Apex like other communities had its liquid refreshments. Many amusing and many equally pathetic experiences might be told of the early "antis." But the people were never of a vicious nature and serious crime was hardly ever known.

These were the unsettled days of the early formative period. They were followed by the more seasoned times when the village of Apex had settled itself into a state PERCY J. DLIVE of incubation for the future.

Churches were established and schools came. It was a Baptist community, and the Apex Missionary Baptist Church was the first C.P. SELLERS permanent church to be established here.

ern Railroad Co. was chartered. In S.S. ROGERS 1905, the pivotal year of Apex's S.W. STONE history, this road was extended to Durham and its name changed to he Durham & Southern Railway Company. From this year dates Apex's new growth.

The first enterprise marking the new history and one which more than any other had to do with the continued progress of Apex, was the Merchants & Farmers Bank of

In 1906, the Planters Warehouse was built. This year also marked the building of the handsome new union railway station. About this time came Mr. A.C. Hughes, our present mayor, who has from the beginning worked heart and soul to carry the community forward.

In this year Messrs.. L.S., P.J. and W.W. Olive, C.P. Sellars, J.B. Mason, J.R. Cunningham and A.C. Hughes organized the Apex Land & Improvements Co. This year also marked the established of what had been long needed, adequate school facilities.

From then on the history of Apex was the history of the present — a history day by day of progress and development.

A healthy place

A peculiarity about the town is its drainage. One may stand on Salem (the principal) Street any rainy day and see the water flow off one side on its way to the Cape Fear River. and in a few inches on the other side see the waters pursuing their way in an opposite direction to Neuse River. The altitude of the town and the unusual drainage features make it one of the healthiest places to live in to be found any where. The drinking water is pure and cool, and the weather never reaches the extremes as found in other places.

Business overview

Briefly stating, Apex has two banks, three hotels and several boarding houses, marble yard, furniture store, two big lumber yards, knitting mill, canning factory, livery stable, two undertaking establishments, newspaper and job office, two big department stores, one drug store, two meat markets, two fish dealers, one big hardware store, a complete gents' furnishing store, one dry goods store (exclusive of department stores), two restaurants, five grocery stores (outside of department stores), large farm supply store, building and loan association, three real estate companies, four insurance offices, one commission broker, ' two physicians, one dentist, one occulist, two lawyers, four churches, one roller mill, two barber shops, two railroads, two telegraph offices, one general store, and others.

Modern brick buildings that are either being erected or planned for the next six months will be occupied by the following businesses: gents' furnishings and shoes, meat market, moving-picture show, two dry goods stores, one grocery, one hardware, and one drug store, two churches, town hall, and several

others.

Besides the above, plans are being made for the addition of at least two manufacturing plants, besides four or five stores.

Businesses

Apex Insurance and Realty Co.

This business, which is one of the largest of its kind in the state, was organized Oct. 13, 1909 for the purpose of conducting a general life, fire and guaranty insurance business in connection with the buying and selling of and the landing of money on real estate. Its of-

ficers are A.B. Hunter, president; C.P. Sellars, vice president; S.S. Rogers, secretary and treasurer (and active manager), and Percy J. Olive, attorney.

The Apex Mercantile Co. Inc.
One of the msot widely serviceable institutions established in Apex during the recent period of the town's history when it was verily awakening from its lethargy, is the Apex Mercantile Company.

This stock company was organized incorporated and began

business Sept. 5, 1910.

The stock carried by the Mercantile Company embraces a wide field. The corporation does a general merchantile business, consisting of dry goods, millinery, shoes, hats

and so on. There is a furniture department with a complete line of general household furnishings, bedroom suits, dining room suits and the like. In the grocery department there is always to be found a complete line of the freshest groceries on the market. Coffins, caskets and so on are likewise kept. For the particular benefit of the farmer they always have on hand farm wagons, feed stuffs, and fertilizer in the season, which is handled on a general time basis. Thus anything the townsman or the countryman desires can be secured from the Apex Mercantile Company.

Apex Mule & Supply Company
The inspiration of its organization is due to Mr. C.P. Sellars, who, in 1908, having made Apex his permanent home, and already having entered whole-heartedly into the spirit of progress and development, actuating the business men of this community, saw opportunity for success in a large establishment combining a sales and livery stable, with buggy, wagon, harness, and feed store.

His idea was quickly entered into by Messrs. J.W. Lassiter, L.S. Olive, Percy J. Olive S.W. Stone and W.B. Johnson, and on the 24th day of December 1908, the Apex Mule and Supply Company was organized. A most desirable site was purchased from Mr. L.S. Olive on Salem Street, near Center, where the business was at once located.

This business has steadily grown in volume. Its first year's business amounted to about \$50,000, its second to \$60,000, and the business for this year will amount to \$100,000.

Prominent Citizens

Mr. Alfred V. Baucom
Mr. Alfred V. Baucom was born
March 18, 1874. He was educated
at the Green Level Academy, and
later attended the Pharmaceutical
Department of the University of
North Carolina. His earlier life was
spent on his father's farm in the
Green Level section. Just 15 years
ago he broke away from the agricultural pursuit and came to Apex,
entering service with the firm of
Harward & Hunter as salesman,
where he continued for approximately four years.

On April 1, 1900 he opened a drug business in company with Harward and Hunter, and the newly erected concern was given the appellation of A.V. Baucom & Company. To anyone who has familiarized himself with the conditions in Apex it is absolutely futile to speak of the service that this drug business has accomplished during the past score years in promoting the prosperity and development of the town.

The destruction of this business in the disastrous fire last June was one of the keenest losses that Apex realized in this unfortunate calamity. Mr. Baucom without delay re-established his business in the old W.F. Utley building, and has continued to accommodate the people as well as the circumstances would permit. He will continue

there until December 1 when he will locate in the handsome new brick structure which will be erected on the site formerly occupied by Mr. W.H. Harward. Early in 1912, this will be one of the handsomest, best equipped drug stores in the whole country... with one of the most beautiful and expensive soda fountains with solid onyx counter... the furniture will be modern, up-to-date, fascinating. A private prescription department will be located in the rear of the store and the customers will, as of old, be given commendable attention.

Mr. A. Clark Hughes

Mayor of Apex and one of the important factors in the town's growth, A.C. Hughes was born in Pittsylvania County, Virginia on April 4, 1861. He was educated at Chatham Male Academy, Chatham, Virginia. In 1895, he moved to Louisburg, N.C. and engaged during the subsequent 10 years in the hardware business, having bought out the Louisburg Hardware and Supply Co. He retired in 1905 and moved to Apex having previously observed the advantages that this town would likely afford with its proper growth and development.

In 1905 then, just on the eve of that period in the progress of this town which might justly be termed its renaissance, Mr. Hughes moved to Apex and established a real

estate business while the town was in the merest embryonic state of development and may be termed the pioneer in the progress which issued.

Adolphus B. Hunter

No citizen of all the people of our town has done more for the development of Apex and this community than Mr. A.B. Hunter who has been in the general mercantile business for a longer period than any merchant now in business in Apex.

His father, the late Joseph Hunter, settled on a farm three miles south of Apex where he reared an interesting family of children. After several years attendance in private schools near his home — for in those days the public schools were not worthy of the name — the subject of this sketch entered Wake Forest College where he remained till June 1878.

In July 1878, he moved to Apex and associated himself with Mr. W.H. Harward in a steam cottongin which they operated for over 15 years in connection with other interests. In 1880, he clerked in the general store of W. H. Harward with whom he formed a partnership

in 1881 under the firm name of Harward & Hunter to do a general mercantile and supply business.

He established a tobacco market for Apex and aided in establishing the Merchants and Farmers Bank of which he is now a director and vice president.

He took an active part in establishing the Apex Knitting Mills of which is is a director. He is also a director and president of the Apex Insurance and Realty Co.

For many years Mr. Hunter has been interested in his personal farming operations which he has conducted with success and profit. He has erected about a dozen houses in the northern part of town, to aid in housing the rapidly growing population of Apex.

Mr. Hunter has served several times as alderman of the town, and was mayor of Apex at one time. He served in the 1903 state legislature.

J.B. Mason

A write-up of the progress of Apex, no matter how brief, would not be complete unless mention of Mr. J.B. Mason was made. When the town was in its infancy and was needing outside financial aid, J.B. Mason, seeing the great future for Apex, came down from the city of Durham and with the aid of the Olives and others, organized the first bank for out town.

He is cashier of the powerful Citizens Bank of Durham, president of the Little River Manfacturing Company, vice president and treasurer of the Commonwealth Cotton Manufacturing Company, vice president of the Durham Lumber Company, member of the Board of Aldermen of the city of Durham for eight years.

His work in Apex will always be felt, and his large interests in our town makes him the same as if he were one of our citizens.

Valuable Work

Mrs. A.C. Hunter tells of the many good things done by the Woman's Betterment Association and what it hopes to do.

The Woman's Betterment Association was organized about four years ago, but the past year has been our most successful one in many ways.

The association has obligated itself to look after the Apex Graded School building and grounds and keep same in a sanitary condition. We have spent over \$25 for window shades to protect the children's eyes; had the floors oiled to keep down the dust and germs to protect their throats; pay a janitor to make fires early in the morning and to clean the building before the children get there to keep them from having to do it. This costs us \$40 each year. We had a stage built in the chapel for about \$15; a partition built in the large room up stairs; at the cost of \$30; paid \$6 for lamps; \$5 for a nice globe.

Out on the grounds, we had the well cleaned out, a new cover made for the well with a lock and key to prevent the little children from falling in the well, and also placed several buckets and dippers at the well for some of the large boys to keep filled for their use. (We hope that each child will furnish their own cup as this will prevent many diseases.) We bought 20 shade trees at the cost of \$10, and a nice \$300 piano that is rent free for each child to practice on.

We are going to furnish an office and library in the next week or two for the use of the school and have some where for visitors to rest and amuse themselves.

The New Hotel

Apex is peculiarly fortunate in having erected here just in conjunction with the new impetus of growth and development of the town a hotel that will fully meet these important requirements: proximity to the railway depot and to the business center of town; adequate space accommodation and sufficient service to commend the establishment to the further patronage of the people.

The new hotel, that will be opened in a few days, is situated just above the Apex Mule and Supply Company on Salem Street. The building will be a large convenient and inviting structure. There will be at least 20 commodious rooms and additions will be made when the patronage increases sufficiently to necessitate that course. The handsome new rooms will be elegantly furnished with the best and most serviceable High Point furniture; the halls and compartments will be well lighted and heated; the hotel service will be the best to be had.

1911 Industrial Edition 'saved' by first mayor's granddaughter

In response to many requests to include some history of Apex in this special edition, we are pleased to be able to include these excerpts from the Sept. 15, 1911 Industrial Edition of the Apex Journal.

The information was not taken, however, from an original copy of that paper but from a typewritten copy prepared in 1963 by Apex native Anne Lydia Olive.

She said she found the paper in a trunk at her home.

"It was falling to pieces then," she said in a recent phone interview from her home in Raleigh. "It was already about 50 years old."

Olive said she decided to type the stories and ads from the edition to keep from losing them. She also had the paper laminated to preserve it. After awhile, when the laminated copy became "awkward to have around," she gave it to the state archives.

"But now people say it's disappeared from there," she said.

Olive prepared two typed editions of the Industrial Edition and made several copies from each that she distributed to friends and

family members.

"I gave one to the Apex library but people tell me that's gone too," she said.

But Olive said she is glad she made the effort.

"I think it's just one of the most interesting little histories of this town," she said. "It really gives a good picture of what Apex was like at the time."

She notes that the edition doesn't include everything about the town; as an industrial edition it is devoted mainly to those businesses that advertised.

Olive, who moved to Raleigh when she was 9 years old, is the granddaughter of Apex's first mayor, H.C. Olive. A proponent of education, he served for several years as chairman of the Wake County Board of Education. He also served in the state. Senate and was a state leader in the Baptist Church. He also founded the H.C. Olive Company, a mercantile business.

H.C. Olive died in 1898 and his three sons took over the company. Anne Lydia Olive's father, Percy Olive, served as president of the company.





Newspaper special edition published 84 years ago covers another period of burgeoning development

On Sept. 15, 1911, the 6-year-old Apex Journal published its first Industrial Edition, highlighting the history of the town as well as the people and businesses that had contributed to its more recent progress.

According to the editor, Walter N. Keener, the special edition was the realization of a months-long dream and the product of much hard work.

"Should this general survey of our beautiful town be the means of encouraging our citizens to greater efforts and induce people and capital to come among us, we shall feel that we have been repaid," Keener writes on the editorial page.

Keener notes that local merchants and businessmen helped provide the advertising to make the special edition possible. He also talks about the problems "too numerous." to mention" his staff faced in put-

"But here it is," he writes. "If you like it, say so. If you don't, keep your lid closed."

The Industrial Edition came out as the town's tobacco and cotton markets were preparing to open. One hundred seven pupils had just begun the fall session at the Apex Graded School. And the town commissioners had just called for an election on the question of issuing bonds (\$10,000 in 20 years at 5 percent) to build a town hall and make street improvements. Following are excerpts from that special issue:

Wonderful Growth of Apex

History of the town from its incorporation down to the present time - a concise statement of its progress along all lines and the opportunities offered the home-seeker and investor. Why we say "Keep Apex Growing.

What is now the splendid town of Apex had for its original cognomen the undignified appellation of "Log Pond." This name was derived

from the fact that that section of the town now occupied by the splendid store of A.B. Hunter and the other brick structure between this and the open park lot of the Seaboard Air Line Railway was under water and filled with logs.

Land was plentiful and agriculture was in a primitive state then. portunity of selection and as the land now under the town of Apex was on a ridge, agriculture gravitated to the numerous streams on either side.

Not much history was made until the pall of the Civil War had passed away and the arts of a peaceful civilization had been resumed. This section, like all of the South, suffered in prosperity and in men.

The history of Apex really began with the coming of the Raleigh & Augusta Air Line Railway. During the war this, under the then name of the Chatham Railroad Company, had been projected as a military enterprise to reach and bring into the use of the Confederacy, the products of the coal field of Chatham County.

After the war it was re-organized into the Raleigh and Augusta Air Line Railway Co., having for its aim and object what it has since be-

come, one of the great arteries of commerce of the Southern states.

The first enterprise to follow in the wake of the railroad was the large lumber business of the late J. McC. Ellington, whose son, Frank K. Ellington, is now a prominent citizen of Raleigh. Mr. Ellington was a prosperous man and soon attracted others to his location.

The General Assembly of 1871-1872 incorporated the town of Apex and named its officers. H.C. Olive was its first mayor.

These were the days before prohibition, and Apex like other communities had its liquid refreshments. Many amusing and many equally pathetic experiences might be told of the early "antis." But the people were never of a vicious nature and serious crime was hardly ever known.

These were the unsettled days of the early formative period. They were followed by the more seasoned times when the village of Apex had settled itself into a state PERCY J. DLIVE of incubation for the future.

Churches were established and schools came. It was a Baptist community, and the Apex Missionary Baptist Church was the first permanent church to be established

ern Railroad Co. was chartered. In S.S. ROGERS 1905, the pivotal year of Apex's history, this road was extended to S.W. STONE Durham and its name changed to he Durham & Southern Railway Com- W. P. UTLEY pany. From this year dates Apex's new growth.

The first enterprise marking the new history and one which more than any other had to do with the continued progress of Apex, was the Merchants & Farmers Bank of Apex.

In 1906, the Planters Warehouse was built. This year also marked the building of the handsome new union railway station. About this time came Mr. A.C. Hughes, our present mayor, who has from the beginning worked heart and soul to carry the community forward.

In this year Messrs.. L.S., P.J. and W.W. Olive, C.P. Sellars, J.B. Mason, J.R. Cunningham and A.C. Hughes organized the Apex Land & Improvements Co. This year also marked the established of what had been long needed, adequate school facilities.

From then on the history of Apex was the history of the present — a history day by day of progress and development.

A healthy place

A peculiarity about the town is its drainage. One may stand on Salem (the principal) Street any rainy day and see the water flow off one side on its way to the Cape Fear River and in a few inches on the other side see the waters pursuing their way in an opposite direction to Neuse River. The altitude of the town and the unusual drainage features make it one of the healthiest. places to live in to be found anywhere. The drinking water is pure and cool, and the weather never reaches the extremes as found in other places.

Business overview

Briefly stating, Apex has two banks, three hotels and several boarding houses, marble yard, furniture store, two big lumber yards, knitting mill, canning factory, livery stable, two undertaking establishments, newspaper and job office, two big department stores, one drug store, two meat markets. two fish dealers, one big hardware store, a complete gents' furnishing store, one dry goods store (exclusive of department stores), two restaurants, five grocery stores (outside of department stores), large farm supply store, building and loan association, three real estate companies, four insurance orrices, one commission broker, two physicians, one dentist, one occulist, two lawyers, four churches, one roller mill, two barber shops, two railroads, two telegraph offices, one general store, and others.

Modern brick buildings that are either being erected or planned for the next six months will be occupied by the following businesses: gents' furnishings and shoes, meat market, moving-picture show, two dry goods stores, one grocery, one hardware, and one drug store, two churches, town hall, and several

others.

Besides the above, plans are being made for the addition of at least two manufacturing plants, besides four or five stores.

Businesses

Apex Insurance and Realty Co.

This business, which is one of the largest of its kind in the state, was organized Oct. 13, 1909 for the purpose of conducting a general life, fire and guaranty insurance business in connection with the buying and selling of and the landing of money on real estate. Its of-

ficers are A.B. Hunter, president; C.P. Sellars, vice president; S.S. Rogers, secretary and treasurer (and active manager), and Percy J. Olive, attorney.

The Apex Mercantile Co. Inc.
One of the msot widely serviceable institutions established in
Apex during the recent period of
the town's history when it was verily awakening from its lethargy, is
the Apex Mercantile Company.

This stock company was organized, incorporated and began

business Sept. 5, 1910.

The stock carried by the Mercantile Company embraces a wide field. The corporation does a general merchantile business, consisting of dry goods, millinery, shoes, hats

and so on. There is a furniture department with a complete line of general household furnishings, bedroom suits, dining room suits and the like. In the grocery department there is always to be found a complete line of the freshest groceries on the market. Coffins, caskets and so on are likewise kept. For the particular benefit of the farmer they always have on hand farm wagons, feed stuffs, and fertilizer in the season, which is handled on a general time basis. Thus anything the townsman or the countryman desires can be secured from the Apex Mercantile Company.

Apex Mule & Supply Company
The inspiration of its organization is due to Mr. C.P. Sellars, who, in 1908, having made Apex his permanent home, and already having entered whole-heartedly into the spirit of progress and development, actuating the business men of this community, saw opportunity for success in a large establishment combining a sales and livery stable, with buggy, wagon, harness, and feed store.

His idea was quickly entered into by Messrs. J.W. Lassiter, L.S. Olive, Percy J. Olive S.W. Stone and W.B. Johnson, and on the 24th day of December 1908, the Apex Mule and Supply Company was organized. A most desirable site was purchased from Mr. L.S. Olive on Salem Street, near Center, where the business was at once located.

This business has steadily grown in volume. Its first year's business amounted to about \$50,000, its second to \$60,000, and the business for this year will amount to \$100,000.

Prominent Citizens

Mr. Alfred V. Baucom
Mr. Alfred V. Baucom was born
March 18, 1874. He was educated
at the Green Level Academy, and
later attended the Pharmaceutical
Department of the University of
North Carolina. His earlier life was
spent on his father's farm in the
Green Level section. Just 15 years
ago he broke away from the agricultural pursuit and came to Apex,
entering service with the firm of
Harward & Hunter as salesman,
where he continued for approximately four years.

On April 1, 1900 he opened a drug business in company with Harward and Hunter, and the newly erected concern was given the appellation of A.V. Baucom & Company. To anyone who has familiarized himself with the conditions in Apex it is absolutely futile to speak of the service that this drug business has accomplished during the past score years in promoting the prosperity and development of the town.

The destruction of this business in the disastrous fire last June was one of the keenest losses that Apex realized in this unfortunate calamity. Mr. Baucom without delay re-established his business in the old W.F. Utley building, and has continued to accommodate the people as well as the circumstances would permit. He will continue

there until December 1 when he will locate in the handsome new brick structure which will be erected on the site formerly occupied by Mr. W.H. Harward. Early in 1912, this will be one of the handsomest, best equipped drug stores in the whole country . . . with one of the most beautiful and expensive soda fountains with solid onyx counter . . . the furniture will be modern, up-to-date, fascinating. A private prescription department will be located in the rear of the store and the customers will, as of old, be given commendable attenMr. A. Clark Hughes

Mayor of Apex and one of the important factors in the town's growth, A.C. Hughes was born in Pittsylvania County, Virginia on April 4, 1861. He was educated at Chatham Male Academy, Chatham, Virginia. In 1895, he moved to Louisburg, N.C. and engaged during the subsequent 10 years in the hardware business, having bought out the Louisburg Hardware and Supply Co. He retired in 1905 and moved to Apex having previously observed the advantages that this town would likely afford with its proper growth and development.

In 1905 then, just on the eve of that period in the progress of this town which might justly be termed its renaissance, Mr. Hughes moved to Apex and established a real estate business while the town was in the merest embryonic state of development and may be termed the pioneer in the progress which

issued.

No citizen of all the people of our town has done more for the development of Apex and this community than Mr. A.B. Hunter who has been in the general mercantile business for a longer period than any merchant now in business in Apex.

His father, the late Joseph Hunter, settled on a farm three miles south of Apex where he reared an interesting family of children. After several years attendance in private schools near his home — for in those days the public schools were not worthy of the name — the subject of this sketch entered Wake Forest College where he remained till June 1878.

In July 1878, he moved to Apex and associated himself with Mr. W.H. Harward in a steam cottongin which they operated for over 15 years in connection with other interests. In 1880, he clerked in the general store of W. H. Harward with whom he formed a partnership

in 1881 under the firm name of Harward & Hunter to do a general mercantile and supply business.

He established a tobacco market for Apex and aided in establishing the Merchants and Farmers Bank of which he is now a director and vice president.

He took an active part in establishing the Apex Knitting Mills of which is is a director. He is also a director and president of the Apex Insurance and Realty Co.

For many years Mr. Hunter has been interested in his personal farming operations which he has conducted with success and profit. He has erected about a dozen houses in the northern part of town, to aid in housing the rapidly growing population of Apex.

Mr. Hunter has served several times as alderman of the town, and was mayor of Apex at one time. He served in the 1903 state legislature.

J.B. Mason

A write-up of the progress of Apex, no matter how brief, would not be complete unless mention of Mr. J.B. Mason was made. When the town was in its infancy and was needing outside financial aid, J.B. Mason, seeing the great future for Apex, came down from the city of Durham and with the aid of the Olives and others, organized the first bank for out town.

He is cashier of the powerful Citizens Bank of Durham, president of the Little River Manfacturing Company, vice president and treasurer of the Commonwealth Cotton Manufacturing Company, vice president of the Durham Lumber Company, member of the Board of Aldermen of the city of Durham for eight years.

His work in Apex will always be felt, and his large interests in our town makes him the same as if he were one of our citizens.

Valuable Work

Mrs. A.C. Hunter tells of the many good things done by the Woman's Betterment Association and what it hopes to do.

The Woman's Betterment Association was organized about four years ago, but the past year has been our most successful one in many ways.

The association has obligated itself to look after the Apex Graded School building and grounds and keep same in a sanitary condition. We have spent over \$25 for window shades to protect the children's eyes; had the floors oiled to keep down the dust and germs to protect their throats; pay a janitor to ? make fires early in the morning and to clean the building before the children get there to keep them from having to do it. This costs us \$40 each year. We had a stage built in the chapel for about \$15; a partition built in the large room up stairs, at the cost of \$30; paid \$6 for. lamps; \$5 for a nice globe.

Out on the grounds, we had the well cleaned out, a new cover matigator the well with a lock and key to prevent the little children from falling in the well, and also placed several buckets and dippers at the well for some of the large boys to keep filled for their use. (We hope that each child will furnish their own cup as this will prevent many diseases.) We bought 20 shade trees at the cost of \$10, and a nice \$300 piano that is rent free for each child to practice on.

We are going to furnish an office and library in the next week or two for the use of the school and have some where for visitors to rest and amuse themselves.

The New Hotel

Apex is peculiarly fortunate in having erected here just in conjunction with the new impetus of growth and development of the town a hotel that will fully meet these important requirements: proximity to the railway depot and to the business center of town; adequate space accommodation and sufficient service to commend the establishment to the further patronage of the people.

The new hotel, that will be opened in a few days, is situated just above the Apex Mule and Supply Company on Salem Street. The building will be a large convenient and inviting structure. There will be at least 20 commodious rooms and additions will be made when the patronage increases sufficiently to necessitate that course. The handsome new rooms will be elegantly furnished with the best and most serviceable High Point furniture; the halls and compartments will be well lighted and heated; the hotel service will be the best to be had.

News Items

The following items of local interest were also included in the Sept. 15 edition.

Mr. J.W. Jenks has disposed of his valuable Jersey cow. The cown gave five gallons of rich milk daily.

She was sold to Dr. James R. Rogers, the purchase price being \$100.

A family of Pennsylvanians passed through town Tuesday on wagons making their way to Florida for the winter. They presented an interesting spectacle.

Mr. W.H. Luther of Oveda, Fla., who left Apex several years ago, and now owns a considerable number of valuable orange groves in Florida, has been visiting his relatives near Apex for several days.

Mr. L.J. Sears attended the meeting of the Wake County Board of Education in Raleigh last week. Mr. Sears is chairman of the board.

Mr. Alfred J. Fletcher, who recently secured his license from the Supreme Court to practice law, left Monday in search for a suitable location.

Mr. Edward L. Beasley, who recently underwent an operation for appendicitis in the Rex Hospital,

returned home Monday afternoon much improved. He was detained in the hospital for three weeks.

Mr. W.W. Pegram of Vaughn, a prospective citizen of Apex, was here Wednesday looking over the town. He expressed himself as being thoroughly impressed with the growth and development of Apex, and will in likelihood enter the mercantile business here in the near future.

1911 Industrial Edition 'saved' by first mayor's granddaughter

In response to many requests to include some history of Apex in this special edition, we are pleased to be able to include these excerpts from the Sept. 15, 1911 Industrial Edition of the Apex Journal.

The information was not taken, however, from an original copy of that paper but from a typewritten copy prepared in 1963 by Apex native Anne Lydia Olive.

She said she found the paper in

a trunk at her home.

"It was falling to pieces then," she said in a recent phone interview from her home in Raleigh. "It was already about 50 years old."

Olive said she decided to type the stories and ads from the edition to keep from losing them. She also had the paper laminated to preserve it. After awhile, when the laminated copy became "awkward to have around," she gave it to the state archives.

"But now people say it's disappeared from there," she said.

Olive prepared two typed editions of the Industrial Edition and made several copies from each that she distributed to friends and

family members.

"I gave one to the Apex library but people tell me that's gone too," she said.

But Olive said she is glad she

made the effort.

"I think it's just one of the most interesting little histories of this town," she said. "It really gives a good picture of what Apex was like at the time."

She notes that the edition doesn't include everything about the town; as an industrial edition it is devoted mainly to those, businesses that advertised.

Olive, who moved to Raleigh when she was 9 years old, is the granddaughter of Apex's first mayor, H.C. Olive. A proponent of education, he served for several years as chairman of the Wake County Board of Education. He also served in the state Senate and was a state leader in the Baptist Church. He also founded the H.C. Olive Company, a mercantile business.

H.C. Olive died in 1898 and his three sons took over the company. Anne Lydia Olive's father, Percy Olive, served as president

of the company.

One may stand on Salem Street any rainy day and see the water flow off one side on its way to the Cape Fear River and on the other side see the waters pursuing their way in an opposite direction to Neuse River.

Mr. W.W. Pegram of Vaughn, a prospective citizen of Apex, was here Wednesday looking over the town. He expressed himself as being thoroughly impressed with the growth and development of Apex, and will in likelihood enter the mercantile business here in the near future.

The town of Apex had its beginning with the close of the Civil War. Among its first settlers were J. McC.

Ellington, H. C. Olive, Q. I. Hudson, W. F. Utley, W. H. Harward, Brinkley Olive, A. N. Betts and others, AAA who contributed to its life in the beginning and afterwards. It was incorporated by the Legislature of 1871-72, with the late Hon. H. C. Olive as its first mayor. It derived its name from being the highest point on the survey of the Raleigh & Augusta Air Line Railroad.

Until 1905 it was but a small town, where the standard of virtue, intelligence and patriotism was high, but where little progress in material things had been made. In that year, beginning with the organization of a bank and the establishment of a tobacco market, began a new life for the town and surrounding community. Fire later destroying a number of unsightly frame buildings, the first brick structure was soon erected. Again, in June, 1911, nearly all the remaining old frame buildings in the business section were also consumed by fire. Now the principal street of the town (Salem) is lined with handsome pressed-brick-front stores. Business houses have continued to increase in number, until now nearly everything to complete a small city is here represented. This metropolis of western Wake is one of the busiest, most attractive and substantially built towns of its size in North Carolina. Its streets are well laid out and splendidly shaded in the residential sections, while the business part of the town is marked with buildings of beautiful architectural designs and substantial construction.

Apex has a population of about one thousand, and, being located in the centre of one of the best agricultural sections of the State, has a large rural territory from which to draw life and sustenance. It is in the limited "Old Belt" tobacco lands of North Carolina and Virginia, which produce the finest yellow-wrapper tobacco. The tobacco market at Apex is one of its chief industries. It is equipped with two splendid warehouses, three large prizehouses², markets about two million pounds of tobacco annually, and enjoys the distinction of making the highest average price per pound of any market in the State. It is the centre of a fine cotton-production section, the receipts of this staple being from three to five thousand bales of cotton per year.

Public education in Wake County has always found some of its most potent advocates and influences at Apex. Notable among those who have wielded an influence throughout the county in this respect are the late Hon H. C. Olive, State Senator and for many years chairman of the Wake County Board of Education; Hon. L. J. Sears, at present, and for many years past, chairman of the same board, and Hon. Percy J. Olive, an ex-representative and a public man who has taken an especial interest in the schools. That these gentlemen are and were but the exponents of the sentiment around them is witnessed by the fact that Apex has one of the finest and best-equipped schools in the county, and that every school in White Oak Township levies a local tax to supplement the general education fund.

Few communities in the State have had more additions to their population within the past five years than has that of which Apex is the centre. Those seeking desirable homes have found here a happy combination of advantages—fine lands, intelligent, virtuous and hospitable neighbors, good markets, good roads, good schools and good churches. No fictitious values have been placed upon the lands; for, with the true idea of progress, the efforts of those who have done most for the community's upbuilding have been directed to keeping the real estate at its true value. Contributing mostly to this and at present forming the most valuable of its citizenship, without disparagement to others, may be mentioned Messrs. W. F. Utley, W. H. Harward, A. B. Hunter, L. S. Olive, Percy J. Olive, Dr. W. Wade Olive, S. W. Stone, J. B. Mason, J. W. Lassiter, W. B. Upchurch, J. H. Sears, A. V. Baucom, A. C. Hughes, C. P. Sellars, W. B. Johnson, A. D. Upchurch, Samuel Watkins, Jr., A. T. Seymour, C. R. Weaver, S. T. Bennett, B. H. Pate, J. R. Cunningham, S. V. Hudson, S. S. Rogers, J. R. Norris, G. C. Norris, R. J. Bolling, Dr. R. W. 

New Hill.—In Wake's southwestern corner, the antebellum community of New Hill was experiencing new growth as a result of the locating of the new Chatham Railway through its neighborhood. W. H. Matthews, local retail grocer there, and general store proprietor R. M. Brown, were joined by at least three other merchants by 1872. They were J. W. Collins, Thomas Harton, and John Wilburn. At nearby Lashley's Crossroads a sawmill powered by two fifty-horsepower steam engines was in 1870 keeping twenty-five men employed. Its proprietors were J. McC. Ellington, J. C. Hunter, C. H. Beckwith, and D. B. Holland. The town of New Hill was to become an incorporated town early in the twentieth century, but only for a brief decade.

Tickets, \$5 each, will be sold at Victorian Seasons, 221 N. Salem St., downtown Apex, where a cider and cookie reception will also be held during the tour hours.

This year's tour will feature five area turn-of-century homes and a local church.

The home of Ron and Crystal Ragland and their children, Whitney and Trey, 203 E. Chatham St., is on the tour.

It is one of the oldest homes in Apex. It was built by J. Mc C. Ellington as a wedding gift for his daughter who married John Thompson, Wake County Register of Deeds.

Located on the corner of Elm and East Chatham Streets, the house actually faces Elm Street and originally had an Elm Street address. Later it was the home of W. H. Harward, who was a prominent Apex merchant; and subsequently that of Mrs. Wrenn, who rented out an upstairs apartment to a number of young Apex couples over the years.

The interior has been totally renovated, while maintaining the original moldings. The very large windows are nine feet high and have a distinctive round-topped shape.

The home is furnished with numerous antiques which have been handed down from past generations. One of the most unusual is a cast iron stove that was used by Ron's great-grandmother. The curtains and upholstery in the parlor were done by Ron's mother, Betty Ragland.

The Raglands have owned the home since 1994.

Also on the tour is the Olive-E.E. Maynard Home at 206 S. Salem St.

This exceptional Queen Anne style home was built in 1905. It was originally owned by Percy Olive, the son of Apex's first mayor, H.C. Olive, an attorney who





practiced law in Raleigh and lived in Apex until 1926. It is now the residence of Maya Henderson Kelley and her sister Janeane Henderion, both Apex natives.

It is believed that E.E. Maynard, where of the home until 1980, vorked for Southern and Durham tailway for many years. Mrs.

Maynard greatly enjoyed sitting on her front porch for hours, chatting with friends and passers-by.

Long-time Apex residents may remember the cupola that was built on the home in approximately 1905 which no longer remains. A wraparound porch, detailed trimwork and an original barn presently highlight the exterior.

Inside the home, four original fireplaces, tongue-and-groove-ceiling and wainscoting remain. What was once the summer kitchen is now a modern and comfortable office.

Another stop on the tour will be the Seymour-Hedrick Home at 203 W. Moore St.

Built at the turn of the century, this craftsman-styled bungalow located at 203 W. Moore St. is owned by Lonnie and Tracey Seymour-Hedrick and has been in their family since 1934.

The one-story design with singlegabled roof and heart pine weatherboarding is typical of the architecture of the period. Inside the house, original crown molding and heart pine flooring are still present.

Other points of interest include corner fireplaces in the living room and dining room, the heart pine cabinets and the original blown glass six-over-one windows in Federal style.

Home to four generations of Seymours, this home is a hallmark of Apex hospitality. Visitors will enjoy the many pieces of family antique furniture and collectibles, as well as the newly-landscaped grounds.

Finally, the tour will include the Sears-Wells house at 209 S. Hughes St. The house is a two-story Queen Anne dwelling built on a large corner lot in 1910 for Apex 'mèrchant. L.J. Sears.

During the early 1920s Wake County provided the house as living quarters for the high school principal, Randolph Benton and his wife. They, in turn, offered room and board for unmarried school teachers. Thus, the house became known locally as "The Teacherage."

Later when Benton became superintendent of Wake County schools, his sister Mae Braswell served as the provider of room and

board for the teachers.

From the wrap-around porch supported by 16 Doric columns, to the decorative windows and four working fireplaces with their original mantles to the reworked period chandeliers, visitors will enjoy the history of the furniture and antiques which fill the house.

In February 1977 the present owners, Cloy and Shirley Wells, began completely refurbishing this home that had been proclaimed by the Town of Apex as unfit for human habitation.

Of special interest will be the "before" photographs displayed in the foyer. Visitors will gain an appreciation of the painstaking efforts of Shirley and Cloy Wells who have restored an important part of the heritage of Apex.

I saw Apex Come out of the Woods

by the late D.W. Maynard in 1941

pex was all woods, the first house was that of A.D. Upchurch's place [300 S. Salem St., house was moved and is now next to cemetery on West Moore St.]; the next one was William Passmore's, now the Baldwin place [Tingen Road and James Street, house burned]. Mr. John Ellington bought the land for the timber. During the War [Civil] the railroad was graded, starting from Cary. A few years after the war, the track was laid for the station. Mr. Q. I. Hudson was made agent and kept it almost a lifetime. He taught many boys telegraphy, two of whom are outstanding officials of the Seaboard Railroad now. [Mr. E. E. Maynard would have been one, other unknown. Mr. E.E. Maynard's daughter is Nancy Maynard Brown].

After the depot was located, Mr. Ellington built the house now owned by Mr. Bud Beasley. Center and N. Elm now owned by Colleen Newman. Harry Beasley, was born in this house when his grandfather was owner.) The second house was the Norris house [where Apex United Methodist Church CLC stands on S. Elm St.]. The third was also on east side of the railroad, on Chatham Street. This house is now occupied by Mr. Will Edwards at the corner of N. Elm St. and E. Chatham St [now home of Ron and Crystal Ragland]. Mr. Ellington gave the house to his son-in-law, Judge Thompson. The first church, a small building used by the Methodists, was built by Mr. Ellington. The building was on the corner of Moore and Elm Street. It was used for a school building until it burned. The Baptist church was on the site, now the home of A.T. Seymour, Sr. (now owned by Tommy and Robin Seymour, 306 S. Salem St.) and Mr. Roy Walls, Sr. [south of the Seymour's has been torn down; however, the front walkway remains]. The first teachers were Rev. H.W. Norris and Miss Julia Roberts, a sister-in-law of Frank Page. At first we had two schools, a male and female.

Mr. Ellington built some nice store buildings. Then other people came and built. Apex has gone forward to the present day. The first resident physician was Dr. A. J. Thompson. Apex has never succeeded as a manufacturing town. We have had saw mills, cotton mills, planing mills, flour and knitting mills. For several years we had several good tobacco warehouses. Apex gets its name because it is the highest point on the Seaboard [now CSX] Railroad between Hamlet and Norlina. Apex is a real country town, with a good school, good churches and good people.
