- As far as Charles and Alice are concerned - Charles Richard Upchurch was a card grinder at Judson Mill (a cotton mill in Greenville) and Alice was a spinner. Some of the other children were also spinners. It was through the "mill village" that most of the Upchurch children met their spouses. It was a way of life, and more than just a neighborhood. Charles Richard Upchurch died in 1938. Alice Zena (Gadd) Upchurch survived 24 year longer. She became a sort of "anchor" for the Jamison Street Church of Christ, and many of my relatives alive today remember her influence there. She died in 1962, but had been a resident of the same house for 55 years (since around 1907). It wasn't long after her death that the church relocated - I'm not saying that it was entirely her, but a convenient coincidence. In 1968 the church moved to its present location on White Horse Road and became known as the Berea Church of Christ. Fredrick James Boling and Lena Mae Upchurch Boling both lived well into their 90's. In fact they were closer to 100 year old when they passed. Lena Mae suffered from rhumatory arthritis since she was a child, but managed it (after losing use of her hand) all of her life. They had three children together, and all of them are on their 90's and still going strong. The oldest, Evelyn, was always a "home-body" so she doesn't do much still, but stays happy and still attends weekly service at Berea Church of Christ every Sunday. My grandmother, Elizabeth Zena (named after the Gadd), is 91 years old and plays guitar and banjo in a band that plays for churches and nursing homes. She greatly enjoys the playing of music. Tommy, the youngest, enjoys farming and canning and (like me) researching days gone by. - Maybe I have said too much, if so I apologize. - Was wondering if you knew conclusively who Green Berry Upchurch's father was. And if so how they came to be in Wilkes County. I have found some scant internet information but I have not yet been able to CONCLUSIVELY determine this paternal source. If you know this, I would be indebted to know this information.

With much gratitude for what you have already compiled and for your ever enduring dedication to the Upchurch family history, and your relentless pursuit to make it available to all, even at personal cost. I thank you for your directives and motives. For some reason I feel as though every few generations God plants the seed of genealogy in the mind of an individual - the burden and desire to tell the tale of what once was. I feel that burden and desire has fallen upon me - and I suspect that you have the same yearning. A strange thing isn't it? God Bless and thank you again. -Jason Forister.

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Battle of Rawl's Mill, and back to Virginia. Onward after that they drove with the Lee and his legions to Pennsylvania. They fought with bravery on the first day of Gettysburg when they charge the so called "Iron Brigade" of the Union and pushed them back, but with terrible cost. Out of 800 men, 588 were either dead or wounded. And there on that day James E 4Gadd was shot twice in the same arm, which was amputated in a field hospital the next day. James was sent back to NG and although crippled, married and had several children, the last of which was Alice Zena Gadd. Charles Richard Upchurch married her when she was just 15 years old and he was 17. They struggled in the Reconstruction Era south and Charles found work where he could. In the 1900 census Charles and Alice are found in Union County, NC with three kids and only in their early 20's. Between 1900 and 1905 they may have moved to Scotland County, NC for a short time, as my G-grandmother is shown elsewhere to have been born in "Laurel Hill, NC". Either way by 1908 they were in Greenville, Couth Carolina. I remember my grandmother saying to me, "After they started building the cotton mills in Greenville, many people from North Carolina started moving in." In this case she was right. Around this time Green Berry Upchurch died in September 1906 and he was buried at a veterans cemetery. - Anyway Charles and Alice moved into a mill house on Judson Road in Greenville and became part of the "mill village". It must have been quite a lifestyle change for them, having been used to open country and farmland. But they made due with what they had and managed to make a living and ended up having a total of eight children. (Lena Mae Upchurch was my G-Grandmother). Around the time of WWI there were three Boling brothers that built a church directly behind Charles and Alice's home on Judson Road. It was a Church of Christ and it was built on Jamison Street (literally directly behind Charles and Alice). The Upchurch's became involved in this church and two daughters married into the Boling family (from which I descend). Mary Upchurch, the eldest, married Willie O'Dell Boling and Lena Mae Upchurch married Frederick James Boling. Willie O. Boling was in WWI and suffered injuries due to mustard gas. He had respiratory issues the rest of his life, I believe. Federick James Boling was several years younger than Willie and fell in love with Lena Mae Upchurch a few years after that war.

Thank you Phil for your great response!

I do know of Charles Ervin U. and of Evelyn. In fact I know Evelyn fairly well, but I never did get to meet Charles Ervin U. He was the late, last child born as the other children were already growing up. He lived much of his life right there in that house on Judson Street that I mentioned. Yes, I do know that they were involved with Upchurch family history, but I did not/know that this meant that they had already made contact with you and had found the work that you had already compiled.

I should have known this as the notes that I have from them are quite detailed as you have compiled.

I don't know what information you might already have but I will tell you what I know and then I will go on the website that you mentioned and post it there if I am able.

The Gadd's is where I begin because I suspect that you know more about the Upchurch's - more than I could ever hope to unveil. (but I hold out hope that I can find that conclusive link to connect Green Berry U. of Wilkes County to the rest - for the time I will take your more advanced understanding of things as Word enough. And thank you for the connection to John VII, and the caution that more investigation is needed) I have placed Jesse Gadd in Montgomery County, NC in 1830 as a young man with a slightly older wife, a young child between 0-5 and someone's grandmother I believe. Jesse Gadd's wife was named "Didima" and I believe that she was full blooded Indian. I suspect from the Choctaw, but perhaps Cherokee or even Lumbee (due to their proximity and nothing more). Neither Jesse nor Didima could read or write. They had a child at a very young age, as was common in the poor south. Jesse may have only been 15 or 16 when Didima, about 17 or 18, gave birth. I believe that this first child was William Gadd. After they legitimized their relationship, they went on to have six other children that lived at least until 1850 (twenty years later), where I have found them again in the census in Montgomery County. Five of those six were males. When the Civil War began, Jesse Gadd was already 49 years old. His oldest son was already 34. It would not be uncommon for a 34 year old to join the effort in 1861, but it was quite unusual for a man almost 50 years old to join until drafts and "home guards" were reshaping the south by 1863. But for a 49 year old man to join in 1861 was unusual. However both enlisted in the 28th NC in Aug, 1861. Jesse did not survive the harsh life of the soldier long. He died of yellow fever in Wilmington a few months later without ever seeing combat.

Another one of Jesse's sons (James E. Gadd) enlisted in the 26th NC from Anson County at age 22 on July 1, 1861. He went on to fight, as I mentioned in my previous email, in Gettysburg and was shot in the right arm, which was later amputated. His older brother William was also at Gettysburg (with the 28th NC) and was wounded during "Picket's Charge" on the third day.

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
