George Upchurch and his Family UAFA Enrolled Family AFEF No. 5

I. Introduction

George Upchurch was born about 1757, probably in Brunswick County, VA and died in Wayne Co., KY ca. 1830. This compendium is being created, maintained, and updated by the Upchurch and Allied Families Association and cooperators so as to have at one online site details about this UAFA "enrolled" family. Today, thousands trace their heritage back to George.

Each UAFA enrolled family is served by a coordinator. Initially, the default coordinator of all enrolled families is Phil Upchurch, the manager of UAFA. Financial support is required to enroll and augment records for an enrolled family and to keep it online for the long term. The financial co-sponsors of the George Upchurch Family are shown in Appendix 1, along with the level of resources accumulated so far. The ultimate goal is to have a minimal endowment of \$10,000 for this family, the earnings of which will support the records of this particular family and UAFA.

Historically, the records for the George Upchurch Family have been found in a great many places. By "enrolling" this family under the procedures of UAFA, the intent is to have a central portal which will readily allow a member of this family to see and understand reference materials about their heritage. Much of this material exists in the Allied Family Archives amassed by Phil Upchurch over a forty year period. This and other resources will set the stage for further research or for the creation of a comprehensive family history. Progress will depend on collaboration.

Readers are aware of the large amount of conflicting data for any given family on Ancestry.com and other sites. It is difficult and essentially impossible to get these conflicts resolved online. Furthermore, some of these sites fade from view over time. The plan and intent of UAFA is to resolve both of those issues. It is our intent that content portrayed by UAFA for an enrolled family will be factual and subject to ongoing validation and that the content will remain online for the long term under the auspices of UAFA. To make this a reality, UAFA must be sustained by an active volunteer Board of Directors, volunteer cooperators must be active participants, and some hired help must be available. Tax-deductible financial contributions will be important to allow all of this to happen. See **Appendix 1** for an invitation to participate.



II. An Overview of George Upchurch and his Family

A. A Brief Review of the Life of George Upchurch

George Upchurch (ca. 1757- ca. 1830) was the son of Michael Upchurch III (d. 1795) of Brunswick Co., VA. George's grandfather was James Upchurch, who was born in Virginia and died there in 1765. His great grandfather Richard Upchurch was born ca. 1658 and died before 1700. His great-great grandfather, Michael Upchurch (1624-1681), was the original American Upchurch immigrant who came to America about 1638.

George Upchurch married Rachel Bethshares (1763- ca.1830) and eventually they migrated to Kentucky via Iredell, NC. In 1814, the family acquired land near the Little South Fork River in Wayne Co., KY and lived there until his death in ca. 1830. George and Rachel had seven children.

III. Supplementary Resources Providing Information Pertinent to the Family of George Upchurch

A. Concept

For any given historic family, details may be found in many places. In recent years, overall compilations of various kinds have increasingly been made available online. The concept of accessioning these entities to help assemble the records for a given family involves a special approach created by the Allied Families Association. Techniques to capture content of a given entity are unique for each given enrolled family. In some cases, Allied Families has created its own collections to be accessed in support of enrolled families. Such is the case for images and excerpts.

B. A Listing of Resources that Provide Useful Information for the George Upchurch Family

1. Cemeteries – General

UAFA will access and annotate selected cemetery records in support of the George Upchurch Family. The individuals buried in a given cemetery may be selectively listed or all burials may be listed. To the extent possible, records from Find-A-Grave will be used and credit will be given. UAFA will add supplementary notes to burial listings to make them more meaningful for a given burial. The following cemeteries have been treated in support of the George Upchurch Family:

- a. Dishman Cemetery (Appendix 2)
- b. Upchurch Cemetery, Pall Mall, TN (Appendix 3)
- 2. Books primarily family history books (Appendices 4 and 5)
- 3. Images/Videos including pictures supplied by family members (Appendix 6)
- 4. Documents including wills, deeds, pension applications, etc. X
- 5. Maps showing relevant enclaves and migration patterns X



6. Excerpts – brief extracts of items of special interest to the family – (Appendix 7)

The resources in the database applicable to the George Upchurch Family are indicated by X's above. As resources are created, the X's will be replaced by specific items in the database. For example, if there were three images that were relevant, they would be listed as AFDB-3, AFDB-22, and AFDB-31 (AFDB=a prefix derived from Allied Families Database). The numbers are currently imaginary, selected for illustrative purposes.

Appendix 1: Status of Financial Support for the UAFA Enrolled Family of George Upchurch (ca. 1753 - ca.1853)¹

II. Support Targets

- A. Initial \$200 Allows the family to be "enrolled" on a minimum level by having a narrative placed on the UAFA website. This target has been met.
- B. Secondary Target of \$500 Allows the creation of a periodic e-newsletter designed to keep members of this enrolled family informed as to progress in documenting the family and to seek more input. The e-newsletter will be maintained online indefinitely.

OR: As of July 10, 2015, a total of \$250 has been contributed to reach the target of \$500.

C. The Endowment Target – The goal is to reach several benchmarks leading to a fully invested minimum permanent fund of \$10,000, the income of which will be used equally to support the documentation of the George Upchurch Family and the operation of UAFA.

Benchmark One – Contributions up to \$2,500 (beyond the initial and secondary targets) will be collected and placed in a reserve non-interest bearing account.

Benchmark Two – An additional \$2,500 will be collected bringing the long-term support fund to \$5,000. Between the \$2,500 and \$5,000 levels, the funds will be placed in an interest bearing



account. If the UAFA treasury is healthy, it will match funds to move from \$2,500 to \$5,000. Upon reaching \$5,000, the assets will be invested in a balanced index Schwab account with funds supporting other families, with each family fund accounted for separately.

Benchmark Three – When the long term support fund reaches \$10,000, then and only then will proceeds from the fund be used for support purposes. The tentative policy is that five percent of the value of the fund as of December 31 each year will be available for support purposes.

- III. Opportunities for Supporting the George Upchurch Family
 - A. Individuals are invited to volunteer their time for various projects.
- B. Contributions of family history materials are sought. Included could be books, manuscripts, collections, or physical objects.
- C. Financial contributions are invited and are tax-deductible to the extent allowed by law (UAFA is a 501(c)3 IRS approved tax-exempt organization).
- D. UAFA invites supporters to consider established a charitable remainder unitrust or lead charitable trust to support the George Upchurch Family or to list UAFA in their estate plan. Inquire for details.

Appendix 4: Book Review No. XXX The Meal is Gone by Riley McGinnis, 2002.

This charming family oriented 141 page, 5 by 8 inch book is about life in Wayne County, Kentucky, where modernity was slow to arrive. The author recounts his own personal experience and draws upon family memories, going back to the early 1900s. The setting is in the deeply rural area of Wayne Co., KY known as Slickford. There Upchurches and allied families settled in the early 1800s. The local, hard to reach, Dishman Cemetery has hundreds of burials and, to the extent that monuments could be afforded, the inscriptions tell part of the story.

But Riley uses his own personal experience to tell the story. He starts with the fact that a supply of corn meal processed from a defunct grinder is about to be exhausted. While lamenting the loss of the source of this rural food staple, he recounts how his relative got in the corn grinding business in the first place. This leads him to tell the fuller story of the people who lived in the Dry Hollow community downstream from the very remote Jim Town and upstream from the better known Slickford, all about 20 miles south of Monticello, the county seat of Wayne County.

The telling in this book is a potent record of how people in this time and place made a living the old-fashioned buggy and wagon way, even as city people were enjoying modern automobiles.

Riley Ray McGinnis is linked to the Upchurches in more than one way. His wife, nee Peggy Jo Upchurch, is a descendant of Moses Upchurch, head of a line in the George Upchurch/Shadrack Upchurch subclan. Riley is a descendant of nee Clarinda Jane Upchurch, a granddaughter of Silas Upchurch, who was head of another line in the same subclan. Clarinda, a Wayne Co. native, married James McGinnis, who was born in 1861 in Pall Mall, TN and moved as a child to Wayne County, KY with his mother. Jim and Clarinda lived in Jim Town and are buried in the Dishman Cemetery at Slickford.

Anyone whose heritage tracing leads to rural Wayne County, KY will be delighted to read this down-to-earth story about how things were in the old days. Riley tells about their log houses, about transportation and about how they eked out a living. This is so much more interesting than reading a dry history book.

Of the 22 Upchurch clans in America, each headed by a member of the fifth generation of the family in this country, the one headed by George Upchurch has a very strong focal point in a single county- Wayne County, KY. Certainly at least 10,000 descendants of George Upchurch trace their heritage back to this one county. Thus the book tells a part of the story of the heritage of a large number of people covering Upchurches, but going beyond to many allied families – Parmley, Dishman, Keeton, and more.



While this book makes a big contribution to the history of the Upchurches and allied families, it also reveals that much remains to be organized. Exactly where did each of the children and grandchildren of George Upchurch live? Can we augment information found on their tombstones? What about details on the streams, roads, stores, schools, etc., etc., that impacted their lives. Much of this information is available to be lifted up from the files. The more like Riley telling the story, the better.

We have been unable to find available copies of this book online. For the good of the entire George Upchurch family and allied families, perhaps someone will step forward and help us increase the availability of Riley's book.

Appendix 5: Book Review No. XXX <u>The Upchurch Story</u> by Olive A. Morgan, First edition, 1976. Second edition, 1978.

This 287 page pure Upchurch book, together with the 1972 <u>Upchurch Family</u> by Etta Belle (Lewter) West, constitute major leaps forward in giving form to the Upchurch family in America. Olive Morgan was late to the party, as West and her cabal spearheaded by Martha Lucy (Upchurch) Tidd had already been assiduously working the records for some two decades when Morgan commenced serious work in 1965 by visiting Wayne County, KY. The work of West and Tidd and their collaborators was generously shared with Morgan, which Morgan graciously acknowledged. The unfolding of our American Upchurch story is reminiscent of the creation of the Gospels, with each version relying on earlier materials.

Both books describe the Upchurch family somewhat like five blind men, having never seen an elephant, based on what part of the beast they first touched. So it was that both West and Morgan make a stab at telling the broader story starting in England and then presenting outlines of whatever sections of the family that was available to them or caught their fancy. Much of what they wrote about our heritage in England and our forebears in colonial America needs serious adjustment and certain parts are just plain wrong. Their strongest chapters are those that deal with their Revolutionary War era relatives in their direct line. This would be for Moses Upchurch (1753-1853), in the case of West, and George Upchurch (1757-1830), in the case of Morgan.

These comments having been made, we move on to state that Olive Morgan was a tireless, dedicated, extremely productive Upchurch researcher. Our broader Upchurch family is deeply indebted to her for her ground-breaking Upchurch work. It is fitting that this review of her book be, as well, a tribute to her. She and this reviewer established a close bond and I shall couch this review in personal terms.

In the early 1970s, as my latent interests in Upchurch family history ramped up, I made contact with Olive Morgan. Then in the summer of 1975, a business trip took me from St. Louis to Kansas City. A bonus was a chance to meet with Morgan. She was to pick me up at my hotel and we were to lunch in her home. This only took place after Olive and her daughter had collected me, and daughter Kathryn determined that her mother could be trusted to host a lunch alone for her male collaborator. We had a delightful session all about Upchurch history. She proudly showed off her new typewriter, from whose keys would come her book a year later. Olive encouraged me to start the *Upchurch Bulletin*, which I did in 1980. She allowed me free use of her book and furnished me with her complete address list for cooperators and purchasers of her book.

Morgan's treatment of the family of George Upchurch (1757-1830) is very detailed and the result of a huge amount of hard work in collecting names, dates, places, etc. The occasional pictures included are important contributions to the work. Morgan carefully depicts George as he was born, raised, and married in Brunswick Co., VA. She documents the move to Iredell Co., NC prior to 1790 and the completion of his family there. This is followed by the migration of George and his already married children to the Little South Fork of the Cumberland River in Wayne Co., KY in the 1810-1820 era. From the records Morgan presents, one can grasp the expansion of the family on the Little South Fork and on to nearby Otter Creek. Son Joseph finds himself in Fentress County, TN and ever since, the study of the George Upchurch family has required close examination of the records in these two nearby counties



across the state line from each other. Raw material is provided which will allow us to chart the path of segments of the George Upchurch family to distant counties in Kentucky, Tennessee, and to other states. This diaspora was accelerated by the events of World War II. While two centuries of spreading of the George Upchurch clan is factual, a fascinating aspect remains the original situation of deep rural isolation, the remnants of which we can see today. A significant consequence of this situation was the frequent marriages of cousins. Another was frontier justice a la the Hatfield and McCoy mode. A challenge for the family is to reach back and record this aspect of the heritage of the George Upchurch family before it recedes beyond our grasp.

The fact that Morgan found and published blocks of Upchurch family information from distantly related parts of the family leads one to need a map of what was included. The following may be helpful:

From the above, one sees that Morgan reported to some degree on 8 of the 22 known Upchurch clans, each headed by a member of the fifth generation in the family. She touched more lightly on several more, but not on all. From this sketch, one sees she gave much attention to her own clan headed by George Upchurch. The only plausible reason as to why she lifted up other families, such as the 85 pages devoted to the Samuel Upchurch family, is that the data became available and she seized it because it was available.

Having given Morgan much well deserved praise for her Upchurch research and book, it is; nevertheless, appropriate to point out some missteps as follows:

• Like others, Morgan overreached in portraying the heritage of Michael Upchurch I who came to America in 1638. This is true for his ancestor, for his supposed connection with Little Gidding



and for the connection of our family to Upchurch in the shire of Kent, England. In the issues of the *Upchurch Bulletin*, one finds all of this clarified.

- On page 42a, Morgan presents the Charles Richard Upchurch (1875-1938) Family and posits that he is a son of Green Berry Upchurch and a grandson of Hubbard Upchurch. Details in the *Upchurch Bulletin* show that this Charles Richard Upchurch was a son of a different Green Berry Upchurch who was, in fact, a son of John Upchurch VII, a son of John Upchurch III.
- On page 60, Morgan refers to a Benjamin Upchurch in Georgia as a nephew or brother of Revolutionary War soldier Charles Upchurch. Later research shows this Benjamin to have been the son of Harmon Upchurch.

We may forgive Morgan in the above and few more such transgressions as she was struggling to fit the flotsam and jetsam of family history data in to a coherent story, which West also did imperfectly. Since that time, more facts have been uncovered and our story of the first five generations of the American Upchurch family can now be set forth with more completeness and confidence, admitting that there are still some pieces of the puzzle to be made to fit. But when Morgan addresses the structure of the George Upchurch family, she rarely misses a stitch.

This book would be a valuable one for any member of the George Upchurch family to have. Unfortunately, it is out of print. Fortunately, the many issues of the *Upchurch Bulletin*, all now available online, cover much of what is in Morgan's book. Current efforts to enroll the family under the program of Upchurch and Allied Families Association, Inc. will build upon Morgan's work and present an updated version of the George Upchurch family.

To do justice to Olive Morgan one is invited to visit Volume 6, No. 3 of the *Upchurch Bulletin*, dated July, 1985. This issue is dedicated to Morgan and presents a lovely photo of her provided by daughter Kathryn. The tribute to her there penned ends with a poignant letter from Kathryn reporting on her mother's passing on August 17, 1985. She has been gone from us now nearly 30 years, but for those of us who are steeped in family vibes, she is still with us in spirit. May she rest in peace.

A TRIBUTE TO OLIVE ADA STEVENS MORGAN. An Outstanding Upchurch Genealogist. Vol. 6, No. 3, July 1985, p. 85

It is with much pleasure that we dedicate this issue of the UPCHURCH BULLETIN to ADA MORGAN. She ranks in the forefront of those who have labored to bring Upchurch history into bold relief. Her many accomplishments in the face of adversity exemplify those outstanding traits which may be observed among our relatives. Among her achievements there is the outstanding compilation of Upchurch history published in 1976 under her sole authorship with the title THE UPCHURCH STORY.

Ada was born Olive Ada Stevens on 30 NOV 1904. In 1922 she married William Henry Morgan who had seen extensive service in the U. S. Navy before and during World War I. After the war Ada and Bill lived in Kansas City, MO where Bill worked with his father in a sheep commission firm at the stockyards. For health reasons the family moved to Denver, CO where Bill died an untimely death, leaving Ada a widow at the tender age of 24. The marriage was blessed with two daughters, Elizabeth who died of pneumonia at the age of one year and Mary Kathryn who now resides in the 4207 Kansas City area.

Ada never remarried but with resolute purpose returned to work at the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company where she served for 39 years in positions of ever greater responsibility. Upon retirement she had the title of School Consultant.

Our cousin always looked for more challenges. She provided for herself and her daughter, maintained her own home and progressed in her career. Beyond this she became interested in the Spanish language and learned to speak it so she could vacation effectively in Mexico. This led to her being the President of the phone company Spanish Club for six years.

Ada is the daughter of Eliza Wayne Upchurch, the granddaughter of Moses Upchurch, the great granddaughter of Shadrack Upchurch, and the great granddaughter of George Upchurch, Head of Upchurch Clan No. 5. Let us repeat here in her own words something of her thoughts as taken from the foreword of her book.



"In 1965, my granddaughter, Melinda White and I made a pilgrimage to Kentucky, Wayne County, in search of a town called UPCHURCH which was on the road map for that year. The town was not there, but in Monticello we found relatives and they led to other cousins. Not all the Upchurches found were in the George Upchurch family. There did seem to be a common ancestor and each time I tested that theory it proved to be correct. My dau and son-in-law Charles and Kay White, would copy the names of Upchurches in the places visited. Of those to whom I wrote, and of those who replied, each had a missing ancestor somewhere along the line. Each time the ancestor was traced, he was in the line stemming from our common ancestor.

I have been helped in this endeavor in many ways. Grateful thanks is due the family of Martha Tidd, (Mrs. Charles) whose untimely death in 1973 was a great loss to all. She found the letter of Michael Upchurch's in the Ferrer Papers at Magdalene College in England (without the letter we would not know when our story began). We are grateful for her fine generosity in sharing her findings with all of us.

To Belle West (Mrs. G. H.) for kind permission to quote from her book, UPCHURCH FAMILY OF ENGLAND, VIRGINIA AND NORTH CAROLINA, and for her warm encouragement. To Elva Upchurch (Mrs. Razzie) for exchange of data and the pictures, and for her inspirational seeking out the graves of soldiers of the Civil War, and providing markers for unmarked graves. To Roy White of Salt Lake, for his many contributions of records. To Vera and Cosby Upchurch and their sons Bruce, for help in locating old graveyards around Wayne County and for Cosby's amazing memory for names and events long past. To my grandson, Mark White, for copying records at the Missouri State Library at Columbia, where he is a student at the University of Missouri. To all, who sent their lines and helped in any way my heartfelt thanks. It could not have been done without you."

Let your Editor report on his first interaction with Cousin Ada whom he is proud to claim as a fifth cousin. In the summer of 1975 my interest in Upchurch history was getting to be serious and a business trip was scheduled for Kansas City, MO, Knowing of Ada's interest, I called her and she invited me for lunch in her home. When she came to pick me up her daughter, Kathryn, was with her. Kathryn subjected me to a polite but thorough examination before she would trust "this stranger " to have lunch alone with her mother. The session was most stimulating and we have had many contacts by letter and phone since that time. Her book appeared the next year.

Unfortunately THE UPCHURCH STORY by Olive A. Morgan is now out of print. Those who are not fortunate enough to have copies must rely upon friends who do or upon those few libraries which happen to have a copy. It was reviewed in UB, Vol. 1, Number 1, 1 pages 37-39 (1980).

About two years ago the burden of keeping an independent residence provided no more excitement for Ada and she purchased a more easily maintained condominium near her daughter in Overland Park. From time to time in the last year or so Ada has suffered ailments which all of us encounter from time to time. It is no longer possible for her to maintain the active correspondence which was so satisfying to her for so many years. She still accepts good wishes from her many relatives, friends and acquaintances who are legion in number. Ada is maturing into that graceful period of life where she is comforted by the loving attention of her daughter's family including two grandchildren arid two great grandchildren.

Ada, this tribute is being penned to you and deposited throughout the halls of history. May all people know for all time that you have been a good and faithful servant. You were given talents and you



multiplied them. The extended Upchurch family, which now numbers in the many tens of thousands will be ever grateful for your outstanding contributions to our understanding of ourselves.

After the above tribute was written, the following letter dated 20 AUGUST 1985 was received:

"Dear Cousin Phil,

I'm sorry to tell you of my mother's death Wednesday, August 17th.

She entered the hospital on the 5th of July with a severe kidney infection. Of course the underlying cause was Alzheimer's Disease as her communication skills were so poor she couldn't tell us what was wrong until she was in very serious condition.

She was in the hospital until the 9th of August and died in the nursing home the following Wednesday. She was never conscious from the 5th of July.

The only thing that made us feel a tiny bit better was that we had a large family picnic here, on the fourth, and she thoroughly enjoyed herself. She ate well and played with her two great-grandsons. I feel her last day was a happy day.

INTRODUCTION AND PRELIMINARY OUTLINE OF THE GEORGE U. CLAN (CLAN No. 5) Vol. 8, No. 4, October, 1987, p. 139



A. INTRODUCTION.

With the exception of the George U. Clan, the various clans and subclans of the Upchurch Family have been presented in past issues of the UB. In due course we shall return to some of the clans and subclans to present updated versions of outlines as new details are being added on a regular basis and some of the outlines are now much improved over the earlier published versions. In the meantime, in the next several issues of the UB there will appear outlines of the various subclans of the George U. Clan. In the present issue attention will be given to George U. himself and his children.

Details on the George U. Clan have not been published in the UB earlier because the late Mrs. Ada Morgan covered this clan so thoroughly in her book "The Upchurch Story." Unfortunately, that fine book is now out of print. As we present outlines on this clan we will have access to details in Morgan's book and to additional details which have come to light through correspondence with various cooperators including many descendants of George U. We shall always be grateful to Ada Morgan for her untiring efforts in searching out and publishing details on the George U. Clan and on many other Upchurch Clans.

B. GEORGE UPCHURCH.

George U. was b. ca 1757 probably in Brunswick Co., VA and d. in 1830 in Wayne Co., KY. He lived for a few years as a young man in Iredell Co., NC. He was the son of Michael U. III, the gs of James U. I, the ggs of Richard U. I, and the gggs of Michael U. I, the original Upchurch immigrant who came to America from England in 1649.

The early years of George U. were spent in Brunswick Co VA as were those of his siblings William U. IV, Elizabeth U. II, and Sherwood U. Their father, Michael U. III, spent all or most of his adult life in Brunswick Co., VA and he died there in 1795. Brunswick Co., VA may be considered a major stopping point for the overall Upchurches in their 150 year shifting from Surry Co., VA to various parts of NC. In Brunswick Co., VA the Upchurches owned land, paid taxes, married, served the community/country in various ways, died and were buried. Michael U. III had a first cousin James U. III who also lived in Brunswick Co. and had issue. These Upchurch families intermarried with various families of Brunswick Co., including the Moseleys, the Hamiltons, and the Bethshares (Bathshares) and had dealings with these and other families. The substance of all this is that the records for Brunswick Co., VA for the 1700's deserve more study from an Upchurch standpoint and will no doubt yield more facts about our family and especially about George U., his siblings and their parents.

We should note in passing that Michael U. III served in the Revolution and it can be presumed that all of his descendants, including those of his son George U. are entitled to membership in the DAR (Daughters of the American Revolution) or the SLR (Sons of the American Revolution).

George U. md. in Brunswick Co., VA, Rachel Bathshares, dau of Thomas and Ruth Bathshares. Since their children started arriving at regular intervals in 1782 it would appear that George and Rachel were married about 1780 at which time George U. would have been about 23 years of age. A reasonable speculation is that Rachel would have been about age 20 at the time she was md. and hence b. ca 1760. Thomas Bathshares was the Administrator for the estate of Michael U. III when he died in 1795.



George U. first appears in the official records as a taxpayer on the 1782 tax rolls of Brunswick Co., VA. According to the tax rolls he was living in the Sixth District as were his father and his father's first cousin, James U. III. The records are not clear as to the ownership of land by George U. in Brunswick Co., VA. His father owned 200 acres there, inherited from his father (James U. I), and retained this land until his death in 1795. If George U. owned VA land he must have purchased it. In any case, he paid only personal property taxes in Brunswick Co., VA in 1788 and appeared ready to move on to Iredell Co., NC where he is found with his family on the 1790 census. They were in the Salisbury District and had four sons under 16 years of age and one daughter. They were still on the Iredell Co., NC census in 1800 and the family was composed as follows:

- 1. Male under 10 (John U., b. ca 1799, age 1).
- 2. Male under 10 (Moses U., b. ca 1790, age 10).
- 3. Male 10 16 (Thomas U., b. ca 1788, age 12).
- 4. Male 16 24 (Unidentified son, b. ca 1783, age 17).
- 5. Male 16 24 (Shadrack U., b. ca 1784, age 16).
- 6. Male 26 45 (George U., b. ca 1757, age 43).
- 7. Male over 45 (?).
- 8. Male over 45 (7).
- 9. Female under 10 (Rachel U., b. ca 1792, age 8).
- 10. Female 10 16 (Unidentified DAU, b. ca 1786, age 14).
- 11. Female 16 24 (Lydia U., b. ca 1782, age 18).
- 12. Female 26 45 (Rachel Bethahares, b. ca 1760, age 40).
- 13. Female over 45 (probably mother of George U.).

Subsequent to the above census, one additional child was added to the family. Joseph U. was b. 10 AUG 1800 presumably in Iredell Co., NC. It thus appears that George and Rachel U. had six sons and three daughters. We have good records on seven of the children which will be detailed later. However, for one dau., b. ca 1786, and for one son, b. ca 1783, we have only the fragmentary information shown on the 1800 census. Not even a name is available. Present records would indicate that all of the known children of George U. moved with him to Wayne Co., KY, shortly after 1810. At that time the unidentified dau would have been 24 years old and the unidentified son 27 years old. If these two children survived to be adults they could have married in the community and/or migrated out of Iredell Co., NC. They could have gone to KY or to other states. We must be alert to see if individuals surface in the records who could fit the age brackets for these two individuals.

The female over 45 in the home in 1800 is most likely the mother of George U., since his father died in 1795. It is not likely that it is the mother of Rachel since this mother was sued by her children in the late 1790's. We do not have a clue as to the two older men in the household in 1800 since the fathers of both George and Rachel were deceased by that time.

Records of the Chancery Court of Brunswick Co., VA (Brunswick Order Book 18, 25 FEB 1799) show that the children of Elizabeth Bethshares, of whom Rachel (Bathshares) U. was one, sued their mother and an Administrator, John H. Bass, to settle the estate of their late father, Thomas Bethshares, The Bethshare children were listed as follows: Ruth Bethshares; George U. and Rachel, his wife; late Rachel Bethshares,



Thomas Moseley and Tabitha, his wife, late Tabitha Bethshares, Thomas Linch and Elizabeth, his wife, late Elizabeth Bethshares; Jesse Bethshares; William Bethshares; Molly Bethshares, and Sally Bethshares. (Note: "late" as used here has to mean "former" or "nee" - Editor). The court ruled that the land had to be sold and the proceeds distributed. Apparently George U. and his family returned to Brunswick Co., VA temporarily for this settlement according to Morgan.

Olive Morgan gives the following account of the land owned by George U. in Iredell Co., NC.

"The purchase or land grant for George's land has not been found. There is a record of the sale of that land recorded in Iredell Co. Deed Bks, G, and H. George Upchurch sells to Moses Upchurch (his son): This Indenture made 16 FEB 1810 for 100 b...all that tract or parcel of land lying and being in the County of Iredell on the north side of Rocky Creek adjoining Rubin Pletcher's line...Bogle's line..in the Trumpet Meadow. Land consisting of 124 acres, more or less...George Upchurch, his mark. Wit: Julius Keeton, John Johnson. Proved 19 March, 1810, John Nesbit, clerk. George Upchurch to Thomas Upchurch (a son) A. Brother's line.. Bogle's line..in the Trumpet Meadow. Proved 19 Mar 1810 George Upchurch to Shadrack Upchurch (a son) A 3-19. George Upchurch to Abel Sheriff...100 A..Whitehead's corner post Oak..to a chestnut on the mountain in Griffith's line. Proved 4-1-1816. William Allen Jurat, James Bartness,. George Upchurch, his mark. George was disposing of his land preparing to move on into Kentucky, the Promised Land. His sons Noses, Shadrack and Thomas were the buyers. They soon sold the land and were in Kentucky with their father. Abel Sherrif does not seem to be related. Between the years of the first sale in 1810 and the one in 1813 the monetary system changed from pound to dollars. The price of land seemed to be stable at one dollar per acre.

Regarding the land and life of George U. in Kentucky, Olive Morgan has written an excellent description which is reproduced here exactly as she wrote it.

"Wilson Rouse Jillson's book The Kentucky Land Grants describes the Grants where the land of George Upchurch was located:

This small and unique group of land grants recorded between the years 1803 and 1853 embraces the grants issued upon warrants from the Register of the Land Office upon what is known as the Tellico Claims. They apply to lands ceded to the United States by the Cherokee Indians under the treaty of 1805. There are 572 grants in the Tellico records, the surveys of this system being recorded in a book labeled "Tellico Surveys No. 1". Of the 572 grants, George Upchurch was issued Grant #58 by the Circuit Court of Wayne County, July, 1913...100 acres bearing date Oct. 12, 1814...on the Little South Fork..bounded as followeth to wit: Beginning at Miler Keaton's corner a White Oak thence south 62 and west 120 poles to a Beech and White Oak thence south 12 and west 60 poles to a large Walnut and sugartree thence south 60 poles east 165 poles to a stake binding on Keaton line to the beginning....By the Governor, Isaac Shelby, D. W. Hardin, Sec. This deed for the homestead on the Little South Fork of the Cumberland River calls attention to the large number of trees of different kinds in Kentucky, also to the absence of neighbors.

It must have been a remote and beautiful country when George and his family arrived in 1812 or 1813. The Kentucky Gazette carried an article datelined 12-22-1796 which generally sums up the way people felt about Kentucky (and still do): "Moses Austin arrived in Standford, Ky after two weeks on the Wilderness Trail. Austin noted that the tide of migration had not abated. He was moved by their pathetic faith in what they would find at the end of the journy. Ask these Pilgrims what they expect



when they git to Kentucky and the Answer is Land. have you any. No, but I expect I can git it. have you anything to pay for land. No. did you ever see the Country. No but everybody says it is good land. can anything be more Absurd the the Conduct of man, here is hundreds Traveling hundreds of Miles, they know not for what Nor Whither, except its to Kentucky, passing land almost as good and easy obtained, the Proprietors of which would gladly give on any terms, but it will not do its not Kentucky, its not the Promised Land." At any rate, this was the land that George and Rachel had been seeking. They arrived in KY in about 1811, the land was surveyed and in 1814 it was theirs. A forest of trees of many kinds produced wood for houses and barns, fuel to warm the house and for cooking. Clear, unpoluted streams gave many kinds of fresh water fish for the table, carried logs to the sawmill. wild game roamed the countryside. Kitchen gardens flourished. Tobacco was laid by. Houses began to appear on the Ridge above the Cumberland.

George and Rachel lived a full and eventful life on the LSF until his death in 1830/31. After his death, the land was sold and the proceeds divided. Shadrack, one of the sons, bought the land from the other heirs. The names of those who sold the land and the buyer are recorded in Wayne County Deed Book F, page 27: "John Upchurch, Joseph Upchurch, Jeptha Dishman, Thomas Upchurch, Moses Upchurch and Keeling Willaims sell to Shadrack Upchurch....a grant bearing date of October 12, 1814, 100 acres Little South Fork, Miler Keaton's corner...proved 8-18-1831. Wit: Moses Upchurch." All of the signers made their marks except Joseph Upchurch, the youngest son. He signed his name. Whenever a sale of land was taking place, it was customary for the clerk to find out if the sale was agreeable to the wife, and sign her name with her hunband's. This evidently was not done, so another opportunity was lost to find out the given name of the Upchurch daughter who married Keeling Williams. Lydia was the wife of Jeptha (Jefferson) Dishman. George and Rachel Upchurch were settled on the land at Little South Fork in Wayne Co., KY by 1814. George, one of the sons of Michael Upchurch (3), had moved on for the last time. He was of the fifth Generation of Upchurches in America. His friends and neighbors on the LSF with the dates of their land patents were: Wm. Bell 1814; Jacob Bertram, 1815; Isaac Cooper, 1815; Azariah Denney, 1814; Fleming Gregory, 1813; Miles Keeton, 1815; John Parmley, 1810 and George Upchurch, 1814."

The following is an outline for the children of George U. Each of these individuals is a sixth generation descendant of Michael U. I, and as such is head of an Upchurch Subclan. In due course an outline for generations 7, 8 and 9 descended from these Subclan Heads will be published in the UB. No such follow-up is necessary for Thomas U. since he did not marry. Such follow-up for the unidentified dau., b. ca 1786 and the unidentified son, b. ca 1783 cannot be made unless more details on them are found.

III. Unidentified son, b. ca 1783 (Brunswick Co., VA) (age 16 - 24 on 1800 census of Iredell Co., NC).



- IV. Unidentified dau., b. ca 1786 (Brunswick Co., VA) (age 10 16 on 1800 census of Iredell Co., NC).
- V. Thomas U., b. ca 1788 (Brunswick Co., VA or Iredell Co., NC), d. before 24 OCT 1855. Never married.
- VI. Moses U., b. 1790 (Iredell Co., NC), d. ca 1859, md. Catherine Barker, b. 1795 (VT), (First child b. 1815 hence probably md. in Wayne Co., KY). Ten children. Subclan outline to appear in a future issue of the US.

VIII. John U., b. ca 1799 (Iredell Co., NC), d. before 23 JUN 1873, md. Sarah Bertram, (First child b. 9 APR 1825 hence probably md. in Wayne Co., KY), - Seven children. Subclan outline to appear in a future issue of the UB.

IX. Joseph U., b. 10 AUG 1800 (Iredell Co., NC), d. ca 1865 (TN) 144 (Bur. - Pall Mall, TN), md. 2 MAR 1823 (p. Wayne Co., KY) Jane Crouch, b. 29 AUG 1806 (TN), d. before 1880 (TN). - Ten children. Subclan outline to appear in a future issue of the US.

Overall we have an excellent start on the outline for the George U. Clan. Additions and corrections to the above account and to the subsequent outlines to be published on the subclans will be welcomed.

Details on the George U. Clan were presented in <u>UB</u> Volume 8, No. 4 (October 1987) pages 139 - 149. In the current issue of the <u>UB</u> the available details on the George U./Shadrack U. Subclan are being 137/139 presented through the 9th generation.

B. DETAILS ON SHADRACK UPCHURCH.

nine children the first was b. 18 AUG 1806 (Silas U.) and the last was b. 1829 (Joseph U.). The earlier ones were b. in NC and the later ones in KY. From the spacing of the children it would appear that more births could have occurred in the period 1807 - 1809 and 1811 - 1814. Possibly these time periods involved miscarriages or births in which the children died young. At this point there is no reason to believe that any children other than the nine listed offspring reached adulthood.	273 282
Shadrack U. was one of the pioneers of Wayne Co., KY and along with his brothers and sisters helped substantially to populate the area. Their offspring spilled over into adjoining KY counties (Clinton, Russell, Pulaski and McCreary) and to Pickett, Scott, Fentress and Overton Counties to the south in TN. Wayne Co., KY lies on the East TN border. The Upchurch enclave in Wayne Co., KY was on on the Little South Fork River and in the vicinity of Mt. Pisgah, KY both of which are clearly marked on present day state maps. Perhaps we shall some day have a more detailed map of the area and of the location of the land of the Upchurch pioneers.	139
Morgan's Upchurch Story provides some expansion on the nature	
of the children of Shadrack U. About the first wife of Silas U. she writes "Nancy (Crouch) U. left her family while the boys were small, took passage with a caravan going west to Missouri. She was not heard from again." What a dramatic experience for everyone:	139,273 283
Fortunately, Silas U. found a more faithful wife on the second try. Silas U. also became a footnote in history when he witnessed some activities of the Confederate Guerilla Champ Ferguson and event recorded	273

of Shadrack U., participated in the Civil War (side not stated) and was released as a sick person. He barely made it home to die.	139
In working and reworking the George U. Clan records it becomes clear that there was a substantial amount of intermarriage among his descendants. This was common in the 1800s for remote and isolated communities. The early 1800s in Wayne Co., KY must have provided a challenging situation in which settlers had to carve a homestead out of the wilderness. They, no doubt, had to become self-sufficient for most everyday needs. For the better part of a century this community was sufficient unto itself and required only slight expansion into adjoining counties for commercial and social intercourse.	137
Many descendants of George U. and his son Shadrack U., still populate Wayne Co., KY and surrounding areas in KY and TN but other descendants of the clan have spread to the far corners of America and indeed to the world. Still, it is Wayne Co., KY that we look to as the ancestral	137,139

"Moses Upchurch born 1790 NC probable in Iredell County. He died about 1859. Moses did not apply for a land grant in KY. In 1820 he was still in Iredell Co., NC. In 1838, Jan 25, Deed Bk D-343, John Upchurch sells to Moses Upchurch for \$200 75 acres on Otter Creek. Reg. 4-12-1838. Moses md Catherine (Katie) Barker in NC. She was the daughter of either John Barker or Solomon Barker of Iredell Co., NC. Moses and his brother Shadrack followed the family names in naming their children. Each had a son George; a son Thomas; Moses had a son Shadrack; Shadrack had a son Moses. No daughter Rachel was found for Moses, the daughter Rachel of Shadrack was with him on the 1850 Census. Katie Barker was born in 1795 VA. She was with her son John after Moses died."	
Moses U. was b. ca 1790 in Iredell Co., NC and grew to be a young man and married in that community. Sometime between 1820 and 1832, give or take a few years, he moved wife and young family from Iredell Co., NC to Wayne Co., KY following in the footsteps of	1
his father, George U., who had made the same move a few years earlier. As we accumulate census and other records and study them carefully it should be possible to be more precise about the date of the move	37
from NC to KY. Moses U. appears as the head of a single person household in Iredell Co., NC on the 1810 census. Apparently, he had established himself as an independent operator at age 20. Sometime	
in the next three or four years he married Catherine Barker in Iredell Co., NC as their first son was born there in 1815. Altogether this couple had ten children of which the last two, born in 1831 and 1834 appeared after the family moved to Wayne Co., KY. Children numbers 3 through 7 were born between 1817 and 1829 but whether in	69 41

From the complete list of Upchurches in Wayne Co., KY on the 1880 census provided to us by our cousin, Roy White, Jr., we note that of the many Upchurch entries only one is shown as being born
in NC. This is Nancy Mason U., the daughter of Moses U. and the 284,141 widow of Silas U. She is head of the household and shown to be 273
60 years old although we know from other records that she was b. 20 APR 1816. She is head of a household which includes her
daughter, Winifred U., age 19. There is a third individual in the 295 household, a one month old female named May U. This child is listed
as a daughter of Nancy Mason U. but in view of her advanced age it 284 seems quite unlikely that she is the mother of May U. It would be
more likely that May U. would be a daughter of Winifred U. or possibly 295
a daughter of one of the sons of Nancy Mason U. No other evidence has 284
surfaced to support either of these alternatives or to advance other choices.
Our fragmentary records on the Moses U. family indicate that some members stayed on in the Wayne Co., KY area into the late 1800s while other members moved on to what looked to be greener pastures.
The general vicinity of Ava, MO located in western Missouri was the destination of some members. We have enjoyed communicating with some of this group of the family.

B. DETAILS ON JOSEPH A. UPCHURCH.

Joseph A. U. is best portrayed by Ada Morgan on page 67 of her book THE UPCHURCH STORY published in 1976. Her description in its entirety is as follows:

"Joseph Upchurch born 10 AUG 1800 NC died ca 1865. Joseph m 144
3-2-1813 Jane Crouch. At an early age, Joseph began acquiring land, 220
most of which fell into Tennessee later. He bought 50 acres on Rotten's
Fork in Wayne County, KY for \$10, part of the Kentucky Land Act, passed in
the year 1815, called the Land Distribution Act. This Act offered land
for \$20 per 100 acres. This part of KY fell into TN in 1823 and Joseph
became known as Tennessee Joe. The year also happened to coincide with
the year of his marriage.

Joseph Upchurch was a fair minded citizen of Fentress County and a likind father and husband. He was public spirited and was soon called for civic duty. He served on juries, was a Justice of the Peace, his name on many of the marriages of Fentress County gave those marriages a head start. The Upchurch Cemetery at Pall Mall was set aside by Joseph. One of the graves in the center of the cemetery is the grave of Joseph Upchurch. A simple rock, uninscribed, marks his grave. This land is his land and ever shall be."

Our best judgement is that Joseph A. U. was b. in Iredell County, 144 NC and lived there in his parents home until he was a teenager. He was the youngest of nine children. Sometime before 1820 he moved with his family to Wayne Co., KY and there completed his rise to manhood. The census records for KY and TN for the years 1830 and 1840 have not yet been obtained by your Editor and we are thus handicapped in tracking Joseph A. U. in his early married years. However, we gain the impression that he acquired KY land before he was married in 1823 and that in this same year the state boundaries were redrawn and that his land fell into what is today Fentress Co., TN. It seems reasonable that when he married and set up housekeeping he did so in what was to be his home in later years. This would have been in the vicinity of Forbus and Pall Mall, TN and on the farm where he set aside land for the Upchurch Cemetery which can be inspected today near Pall Mall, TN. This is in the vicinity of the birthplace of Cordell Hull, who was Secretary of State under FDR and near the memorial to the famous Sargent Alvin York of WWI fame. Some of the descendants of Joseph A. U. still reside in this community and we are 144 in correspondence with some of them. Joseph A. U. md. Jane Crouch. 144,220

Joseph A. U. and his wife, Jane, had ten children all presumably 144.220 born in Fentress Co., TN between 1823 and 1848. On the 1850 census of Fentress Co., TN we find John Calvin U., the oldest child, in his 498 own home and seven of the ten in their father's home. We presume daughter Lucinda Ann U., who has not yet been found on the 1850 census, 499 was by that time married to John Rich and in the John Rich household, 511 probably in the same county. We have been unable to locate the third child, William Hamilton U., on the 1850 census but from other records 500 we know he lived on into the 1870-1880 era. From the 1850 census we conclude that Ada Morgan has improperly placed daughter Elizabeth U. 4204,497 as the first born of Joseph A. U. The census records show her as 144 born ca 1840 (rather than ca 1822 as Morgan proposes). Thus, she is the 8th born of the 10 children.

During the child-bearing years of Jane (Crouch) U. there would have 220 been room for two more children, one born ca 1830 and one born ca 1843. Whether these additional children were born or not we do not know. If born, they presumably died at birth or as very young children.

The heirs of Joseph A. U. are recorded in the Fentress Co., TN 144 land records - Book L, pg. 519/20. He died ca 1865. These records list 8 of the known 10 children of Joseph A. U. Missing is daughter 144 Elizabeth U. who possibly predeceased her father or who might have 497 been excluded intentionally. We have not located any offspring for her but she did marry three times. Also, excluded from these records was son, John Jackson U., who died before his father. John Jackson U. 504 did leave two small children and from the incomplete estate record of Joseph A. U., available to us, it appears he did not leave a child's 144 portion of his assets to these grandchildren.

For this George U./Joseph A. U. Subclan it will be noted that 137/144 there were a number of intermarriages with other subclans, notably the George U./Lydia U.; the George U./Shadrack U. and 137/138,137/139 possibly other subclans. Additionally, there were intermarriages of cousins within the George U./Joseph A. U. Subclan. 137/144

In recent years we have added substantially to our knowledge of the George U./Joseph A. U. Subclan, building on what Ada Morgan 137/144,4204 so painstakingly collected and published with the help of many cousins. It is now our pleasure to record the names of those who have helped in recent years and months. OUTLINE OF THE LYDIA UPCHURCH SUBCLAN OF THE GEORGE UPCHURCH 138,137
CLAN (CLAN NO. 5)

A. INTRODUCTION:

Details on the George U. Clan were presented in <u>UB</u> (Volume 8, No. 4 (October 1987), pages 137-149. In the current issue of the <u>UB</u> the available details on the George/Lydia U. Subclan are being 137/138 presented through the 9th generation.

B. DETAILS ON LYDIA UPCHURCH.

138

As so often we must with the George U. Clan we turn to the book of Ada Morgan to learn what she reports. On page 65 of her book

THE UPCHURCH STORY she writes about Lydia Upchurch: 138

"Lydia Upchurch born about 1782 in VA, died about 1848 md. 138 Jefferson Dishman d. about 1847. Jeffery Dishman was counted on the census of Wayne Co., KY, in 1820. He lists his wife, age 26-45 years; himself as 45 or up; Two persons, ages 45 up were with them, possibly the parents of Jefferson Dishman. He bought land in Wayne: "Jeptha Dishman buys from Abraham Van Winkle 50 acres in Sandy Valley on Otter Creek. Wit: Moses and Archibald Dishman. 3-24-1836 recorded Bk H 2, page 429 on 4-15-1836. This is the same land that Jefferson sold to Moses Dishman on 10-7-1842. The taxes must not have been paid for the land was sold on the courthouse steps. a deed reads: Jefferson Dishman, my late husband, sold 10-7-1842, fifty acres; now I, Lydia Dizmonz, sell to Moses Dishman. Lydia Dizmonz, her mark. Another deed made by John Upchurch restores the land to Lydia who then was able to deed it to Moses Dishman, for whom Jefferson had intended it: John Upchurch to Lydia Dishman and her three children, minor heirs, Catherine, Jane, and Jefferson T. Dishman, on waters of Otter Creek, being part of the land that was sold by the sheriff at the Courthouse door in favor of Thomas Jones and against Jefferson Dishman and bought by Micajah Phillips - transferred to John Upchurch on 22 of February, 1847. Three months later Lydia had transferred the land to Moses Dishman."

It seems most likely that Lydia U. was b. ca 1782 in Brunswick Co., 138 VA. She would have been a child of about seven years of age when her parents moved to Iredell Co., NC. There she grew to adulthood. Although we have seen no direct evidence it seems that she must have married Jefferson Dishman in Iredell Co., NC, about 1803 when she was about 21 years of age. It would appear that the first five of her six children were born in Iredell Co., NC, with the sixth child, Burrell Tremont Dishman being born 20 OCT 1820 in Wayne Co., KY. In moving 196 to Wayne Co., KY, Lydia and her husband were following the move pioneered by her father and her brothers. Some of her siblings appeared to have married in Iredell Co., NC, and started their families there while other siblings did not marry and start a family until they arrived in KY. It would be of interest to know if all the Dishmans of Wayne Co., KY, trace back to Jefferson and Lydia (U.) Dishman or if there were other Dishmans who made the move from Iredell Co., NC, to Wayne Co., KY.



We have never searched the Iredell Co.,NC, records for the period 1780-1830 but it would seem that these records could reveal additional interesting information about Lydia Upchurch and her relatives 138 including the overall Dishman family.

The years of birth for the six children of Lydia (U.) Dishman 138 are 1805, 1806, 1810, 1812, 1817 and 1820. It would seem that additional children could have been born in 1808 and 1815 according to the pattern of childbearing in those days. It is likely that the two additional children were born but died at an early age.

The members of the George/Lydia U. Subclan intermarried rather 137/138 intensively with the other subclans of the George U. Clan. This 137 reveals that the Wayne Co., KY, community where the Upchurches lived was a closed community. Marriage of 2nd and 3rd cousins in this community was frequent and marriage of first cousins was also known. These relationships are becoming more clear as we develop the various family outlines more fully.

We have few details about Lydia U. for the nearly 30 years that 138 she lived in KY. As far as we know, all of this period was spent in Wayne Co., KY, where she and her husband died a year or so before 1850. We do know that all six of her children married and began to have offspring during this period. While life on the KY frontier must have been challenging under any circumstances in the 1820-1850 era, we can visualize that Lydia took pride in seeing her grandchildren close at hand. One hopes that we shall acquire more details about the lifestyle of this frontier family in due course.

The Dishman descendants of Lydia (U.) Dishman have considerable interest in their family heritage. As time goes by we hope to enlist the aid of these descendants more fully. In the meantime, here is an honor-roll listing of those who have been involved. As always, any omissions should be drawn to the attention of the Editor.

From all available evidence we may reasonably conclude that John U. was b. ca 1799 in Iredell Co, NC. His parents George and Rachel (Bathshares) U. 137 had arrived in this county slightly before 1790.	143 ,147
John U. appears in Iredell Co., NC on the 1800 census as a male under ten in the home of his father. He is one of the three children born in NC, a twenty-	143
year stopping place for the George U. family as they moved from VA to NC to Wayne Co., KY. It seems	137
quite certain that John U. moved with his family	143



from Iredell Co., NC to Wayne Co., KY in the

period 1810-1815. He would have been 10-15 years old at the time. No record of the marriage of John U. to Sarah Bertram has been found but we can 143,424 presume it was about 1823 and in Wayne Co., KY as their first child was born 9 APR 1825. The last of their seven children was born in 1846. It seems likely that they had one or more children who died as infants if we may judge by the spacing of the children and the normal birth intervals for those days. We have no direct evidence of such infants.

We have nothing on the heritage of Sarah Bertram 424 beyond what Ada Morgan reports except this note from Wilma Lenora (Crabtree) Gibson. 11765

"All Bertram's of the Cumberland area descend from William Bertram, Revolutionary War Soldier, no matter what spelling is used. In Sunnybrook, KY there is a cemetery with row upon row of Bertrams".

John U. lived to the ripe age of 73 and we presume that he and Sarah died and are buried in Wayne Co., KY. There we have records of several generations who descended from the couple. Many of their descendants are still in the community but others have spread to neighboring states and to the four corners of the earth.

In reviewing the record for the John U. family
it is obvious that we have come far but that we have
much left to do. We are grateful for those who have
shown a pride in having descended from this fine
couple and we hope that they and others will help
to improve the details about this Subclan. Here is

With this issue of the <u>UB</u> the series on the descendants of George U. started in <u>UB</u> Volume 8, No. 4 (October 1987) 137 is concluded. In the case of Thomas U. there is no record of a marriage or children. He did lead an adult life in close association with his siblings and we are pleased to represent what Ada Morgan has to say about him in her book THE UPCHURCH STORY.

For "Rachel" U. we also must rely exclusively on Ada Morgan. Ada laments that we have had to invent a name for

this daughter of George U. and that the names of only two of her seven daughters have been identified and none of the sons.	137
B. DETAILS ON THOMAS UPCHURCH.	140
About this unmarried son of George U. the following is excerpted from page 66 of Ada Morgan's book:	137

"Thomas Upchurch born ca 1788 VA died prior to 10-24-1855. He did not marry. On 12-17-1832 he has a land grant from the "Grants West of the Tennessee River" of 120 acres. On 3-10-1829 Miles Keeton and Rebecca his wife sell to Thomas Upchurch 100 acres of land for \$500 on head waters of Little South Fork. Reg. 9-22-1829, Bk E-113. No date on this deed, recorded in Bk M 208 places it before 1854: Roswell Marsh sells to Thomas Upchurch for \$10 fifty acres on LSF head waters. Wit: James Upchurch, William Chriswell. Thomas' last land deal was made in 1849 reg. Bk L-213 1-27-1851; James Crabtree sells to Thomas Upchurch for \$1100 fifty acres. Wit: John W. Marion and Washington Young.

Thomas usually had one of his brother's sons helping on the farm. He left a will, written 5-18-1853 Proved 10-24-1855: Brother John, brother Joseph, nephew Silas Upchurch, nephew Archibald Dishman, nephew Joseph Dishman, niece Sinah Brown, balance of estate to be divided between brothers Shadrack and Moses. Exec. brother, John Upchurch. Wit: Joel Keeton, Cyrus Keeton, W. G. Redmon. Signed, Thomas Upchurch."



C. DETAILS ON "RACHEL" UPCHURCH.

The lament found on page 66 and 67 of Ada Morgan's book about this daughter of George U. is as follows:

137

"The 1790 Census of Iredell Co.(NC) for George U. 137 carried two tally marks for two females; one wife, one daughter. (Note: This one dau is Lydia U., b. ca 1782. RPU). So, the earliest, date for the next daughter's birth had to be 1792, for Moses was born in 1790. Her name has not been found. It is almost sure to be Rachel, after her mother. There were only two daughters. To identify this daughter, she will be known as "Rachel". It may be that someone will have her given name recorded, in some place. "Rachel" Upchurch, born ca 1792 died early in her married life. She married Keeling Williams who possibly is the progenitor of the Williams families of Wolf River. Keeling, also called Keeton, Kelon, and Keeland. Keelon Williams received a land grant for 50 acres of land on the North Fork of the LSF 5-1-1822, Bk M p51. The land was sold to Hiram Upchurch on 2-25-1843 for \$100. In 1839 Keeling bought land on Beaver Creek (Bk 4-532). "Rachel" died sometime before 1844. Keeling Williams m



5-18-1845 Dorothy McClendon. The land on Beaver Creek was sold to George Upchurch for \$12.50 9-24-1846. The deed was signed by Keelon Williams and Dorothy Williams, his wife. If his first wife's name had been included on the deed where he sold their share of her father's land to Shadrack Upchurch we would know her first name. John Williams on the 1850 Census of Fentress Co. seems to be a brother of Keeling Williams. John Williams, b. ca 1794 married 3-20-1817 Lavina Bertram dau of Jacob Bertram. Keeling was born ca 1792. In 1850 George Upchurch was making his home with John and Lavina Williams. George was a son of Moses Upchurch who was a brother of "Rachel's".

Diligent search has not found sons of Keeling Williams, although there is a listing for Keeling on the Census of Overton Co., TN in 1820 of two males under ten years of age. There is also an 1820 Census of Wayne Co., KY on which he lists 3 females between 10 and 16 years. The 1830 Fentress Co., TN Census: Keeland Williams 1 male 30-40; 1f between 30 and 40; 2f 10-15; 3f 5-10; 2f under 5 years of age. So it seems that "Rachel": and Keeland Williams had at least seven daus, only two of them are identified."

The editor of the <u>UB</u> has received no input from present day family researchers on the George U./"Rachel" U. 137/142 Subclan. We, therefore, have no one to thank other than the late Ada Morgan who left us the legacy of her book representing many years of dedicated Upchurch family research. Any additional input will be gratefully received.

She loaned 137/144 us her Fentress Co., TN, Heritage Book and one has since been obtained for the Upchurch Research Collection. It reveals a great deal about the history of the Upchurch Family in Fentress Co., TN, and also about Sgt. Alvin York of WWI fame. Carol's father's farm adjoined that of Sgt. York and Carol knew Sgt. York.

We have a special request to locate the whereabouts of one John Bennett Upchurch. He was known to have lived in Albany, KY, as a young man and we presume that he was a descendant of George U., Head of Clan No. 5. He was born about 1916 and served as a Sergeant in WWII. Any information about his present location, if still living, and the names of his parents and children, if any, will be welcomed.

Nathan Buford U. was a practicing dentist in St. Helena, CA. We presume he had a formal education in dentistry but proof of that is yet to be obtained. He died at the young age of 34 of an overdose of medicine. The story handed down in the family is that he had a headache and took a self-prescribed dose of laudanum for the pain. Laudanum is a preparation of opium and it was widely used in medicine in that era. Some speculate that "Doc" took his own life but the death was more likely accidental. As a successful professional with a lovely wife and four beautiful children he seemed to have everything in life to relish.

The movement pattern of this family is of interest. George U., the Clan Head, had arrived in Wayne Co., KY, 137 ca 1810. Some of his children and grandchildren moved to Fentress Co., TN, which is just across the KY/TN line from Wayne Co., KY. Many Upchurch descendants today reside in Fentress Co., TN, and they help make up the rich history of that county. Our records show that Nathan Buford U. and his father, George Washington U., were b. in TN, 6702 377 presumably in Fentress Co. This means that Moses U., 141 Head of the George U./Moses U. Subclan must have been 137/141 in Fentress Co., TN, as early as 1829, the year his son, George Washington U. was born. George Washington U., 377 age 31, was on the 1860 census of Fentress Co., TN. It appears that he left shortly thereafter, probably moving westward. In due course, we shall learn more about his movements. We do know that one daughter died in San Francisco, CA, another died in Seattle, WA, and the record of his third child, Nathan Buford U. is given above. 6702 Our Upchurch heritage will be enriched as we learn more about the role this family played in the west.



"Leona U., their youngest daughter, married Lloyd Dunnington in this house as John watched from the porch. It seems that John gave his permission and blessing for their marriage rather reluctantly. When invited by his future son-in-law to join the wedding party, he said, "I'm not going to the rat killing." But he was seen peeking through the window with tear-stained eyes. And that was the real reason he did not attend, according to Lloyd and Leona."

Sandi passes along another story about Morning (Bolen) U., the wife of John as follows: 368,366

"Morning was reported to be a superb business woman, but, it seems that the family had a few problems with her when it came to her garden. Remember, the wife's garden was the primary source of a family's food during the winter. It is written that we are to redeem the time, so she did. She use the time she spent weeding the garden to praise the Lord. In fact, now here is where the problem arose, she would become so enthralled and joyous in the presence of the Lord that she would stop paying attention to where she was weeding, and start destroying the vegetables. So, whenever she went to the garden, someone from the family was assigned to be nearby to make sure she didn't destroy the family's food for the next winter."

Moving back to earlier generations, we have some hope that records of Joseph U. may lead us to more 282 information about his GF George U., Head of Upchurch 137 Clan No. 5. We know that Shadrack U., the son of 139 George U. and the father of the above pictured 137



In the meantime we are anxious to know if anyone can enlighten us about the Upchurch Village (town, stopping place?) on Road 2063 in Clinton Co., KY and on Upchurch Road which starts at Road 2063 and runs north across Highway 90 and on to cross Williams Creek. These locations are shown below on an excerpt from the road map for Clinton Co., KY. We assume these entities were named for a descendant of George U., and we solicit information from any reader who 137 can tell us the Upchurch family members involved in these sites.

The Upchurch brothers represented above are placed in the overall Upchurch Family as follows:



XID 313 Hiram H. U., also known as Ahile U. and Hial U., appears to have settled as a young man in Clinton Co., KY. He joined the Clear Fork Baptist Church in Albany, KY in 1866. In 1908 a U. S. Post Office named UPCHURCH was opened three miles north of Albany with Perry L. Brown as Postmaster. is thought that this P. O. was named in honor of Hiram H. U., who was considered to be the area's first settler. His son, Abraham L. U. was co-owner of the local store with 1725 Perry L. Brown. Hiram H. U. also gave land for the 313 school system. There was an "Upchurch School" near Susie in Clinton Co., KY, possibly named after Hiram. Apparently, Hiram H. U. was a substantial citizen. We 313 have not yet encountered a record of any service by him in the Civil War but he was of the right age to have served. He is shown above with a beard (C). This photo must have been taken about 1890, as his brother (B) died in 1891. We wish to have contact with present day descendants of Hiram. 318 William H. U. is shown above as a young man (A) and then at about age 35 (B) in about 1890. He was to die a year later in 1891 from tuberculosis or some such ailment. Evidence of his life is sparse, but we do have a good record of his four children and their descendants. The fourth child was born after the premature death of William H. U. It would appear that William H. U. was 318 too young to have served in the Civil War as he would have been just ten years old when the conflict ended. We are in regular contact with two of his grandsons, Lebeus Eugene U. of Charleston, SC, and William Thomas 10946 U., Sr., of Clyattville, GA, to whom we are indebted 10945 for the photographs shown above. They are the sons of Lebeus Martin U. 1739

Among the siblings of these two brothers we have considerable information on their brother, Silas Melvin 317 U. (aka Melvin Silas U.) but only a very small amount of information on the other four brothers and the two sisters.

In the past year or so we have continued to make solid progress in documenting the Moses U. line in the 275 George U./Shadrack U. Subclan, and we express 37/139 appreciation to all who are helping with this venture.

The story was about a trip made by the John U. family in the early 1840s and was reported by Norma in a letter to your editor received 13 AUG 1994 as follows:	430

They put the baby (Henry Alvin) in a basket under the wagon, in the shade. The men came in & meal was cooked, they ate. The mother went to get baby & it was gone. The men folks started looking around and found lion or cougar tracks & where baby was dragged. They located the big cat on a ledge above creek, & it was playing with the baby. There was a chance that if they shot it might hit the baby, but took a chance, cause the

cat would kill it anyway. So the father took aim across wagon wheel & shot. He killed the cat & got back a scratched & bruised boy but otherwise unhurt. The baby wasn't but a few days old. My Grandmother Theodoshia, told this to us many times. Said her daddy's nickname was (Otter).

There are so many things that this searching has brought back to me. Would probably make a good book. Until later.



The family of John Lafayette U. may be documented 366 as follows: George U. - Head of Clan NO. 5. 37 Shadrack U. 139 Joseph U., b. 1829 (KY), md. Sarah Bunch. 282,361 Martha Jane U., b. ca 1852, no 362 marriage found. Rachel E. U., b. 30 JUL 1854, md. b. 363 Moses Hatfield. 12423 Ruth Ellen U., b. ca 1855, md. 364 Wayne Fairchild. 367 d. Rebecca L. U., b. 3 JAN 1857, no 365 marriage found. e. John Lafayette U., b. 15 SEP 1859, 366 d. 15 JAN 1934, md. Moring (Mourning) 368 Bolen (Bolin, Boleyn), b. 3 JUN 1864, d. 12 FEB 1936. It is our impression that John Lafayette U. and his 366 siblings and their father, Joseph U., were all born in 282 Wayne Co., KY. As far as our records show Joseph U. 282 had only five children, with the subject of of our photo being the youngest. This is unusual, if true, since the last child would have been born when Joseph U. was about 282 30 years of age. Perhaps the wife of Joseph U. died 282 young or they became incapable of having further issue. Our information on this family is rather limited but we are fortunate to have the assistance of our Cousin Mrs. Frederick Stanley Bremer (nee: Sandra 26086 Kay Massengale "Sandi") of Indianapolis, IN. She is the daughter of Mabel Olgia U., the gd of William 26084,1805 Sherman U. and the ggd of John Lafayette U. We 366 are indebted to her for the photo of her Greatgrandfather and for other details on the family. She has related how John Lafayette U. and his family ran a store in Slat, KY. 366 She continues to be active in researching the heritage of this family and will no doubt have more details for us in due course. The picture of John Lafayette U. shown herein is 366 believed to have been taken when he was about 45 years of age, which would have been about 1904. The picture reveals a man of substance. He is a handsome man with a neatly trimmed moustache. His clothes are classically elegant for the era with a suit, shirt and tie of quality and a bowler hat which rests on his head at an angle that reflects confidence and composure. This was



probably not the everyday dress of this Upchurch of pre-Civil War birth. One concludes that when John did decide to dress for a special occasion he appeared as a proud member of his family and community. It will

be a pleasure to learn more about him.

Traveled Paris, TN to Crossville, TN where we 22237 joined Cousin Carol Conway for lunch in her home and for a planning session on the Upchurch lecture to be 22239 held in Jamestown, TN on 4 JUN 1995. Carol's dau, Jane, was unable to be present but she had made two of our favorite pies for the occasion. 22237 Carol is (nee: Frona Carol U., dau of William Robert U. of the 2020 George U./Joseph A. U. Subclan. Carol presented us with 37/144 some delicious candy and a microwave steamer which will be greatly used upon return home. We traveled on to Oak Ridge, TN where we joined Cousin Dr. David Thomas 5614 Upchurch for dinner and a tour of the ear, nose and

throat medical facility in which he is the senior partner. It was Tom's parents who led us on the tour of Henry Co., TN on the previous day. Tom has been an active participant in our family history project for many years. We had an enjoyable visit on medical and genealogical applications using computers. Tom and I discussed the preparation of one or two Upchurch articles for the upcoming Henry Co., TN family history book.

4 June 1995 (Sunday).

We left Chattanooga early and rendezvoused with Carol Conway at her home in Crossville, TN. From there we convoyed (do two cars made a convoy?) to Jamestown, TN, the county seat of Fentress Co., TN. The route proved to be along a gently rolling countryside which is most attractive. After a brief stop in Jamestown where we met Carol's brother, William Shelton U. "Shel" we proceeded to Pall Mall, TN and to the nearby Upchurch Chapel with its associated Upchurch Cemetery. As we arrived we were greatly surprised to see so many cars and people. The Chapel does not have a regular congregation and minister but special events are held in the Chapel from time-to-time. One of the regular special events is "Decoration Day" which is always on the first Sunday in June. It seems clear that this site started out as a family cemetery and has been used for that purpose intensively for many decades, so that there are now well over a hundred individuals buried there. The Chapel was subsequently added. The rest of the story, previously, told in Upchurch literature, is that the land for this cemetery/chapel was given by Joseph A. U., Head of the George U./Joseph A. U. Subclan. One further presumes 137/144



that Joseph A. U. himself is buried in the cemetery 144 and that this site was in fact a part of his farm.

A digression at this point is in order to explain the relationship of Fentress Co., TN and the Upchurch family. The relationship appears to be exclusively 137 to George U. and his descendants. George U. was born, raised and started his family in Brunswick Co., VA. He continued to rear his family in Iredell Co., NC where he was found during the 1790-1800 era. In the 1805-1815 era, he moved his family to Wayne Co., KY. It appears all of his children, some of whom may have married in Iredell Co., NC, moved with him to Wayne Co., KY, but perhaps all did not move at once. For the most part, the children of George U. remained near where George U. settled in 137 Wayne Co., KY. However, his youngest son, Joseph A. U. 144 acquired land in the Pall Mall area. Originally, this land was considered to be a part of Wayne Co., KY. Later the state lines were established such that the Pall Mall area fell into TN.

As I stood on the sites near Pall Mall I was curious as to how in the early 1800s one could make their way south from the George U. homestead to the Pall Mall area. 137 Cousin Glenn Barton, who was present, explained that this trip would have been feasible - one would simply work their way up the creek from the George U. homestead to the headland and then down the next creek which would lead to the Pall Mall area. The distance would have been a few miles. The lure of good land at a cheap price would be a significant incentive. It appears he found his bride Jane Crouch in the Pall Mall/Jamestown area. In due course, some of the descendants of other children of George U. 137 also made their way to Fentress Co., TN.

We were amazed at the large gathering of people for Decoration Day at the Upchurch Chapel and enjoyed chatting with various relatives while Carol decorated her parents' burial sites. Almost all of those present have an Upchurch heritage or has a close association with Upchurch descendants Never before have I been engulfed by so much Upchurch heritage with so little time to digest it.

As the group at Upchurch Chapel gradually disbanded, we joined forces with Glenn Barton and his wife, Christine (U.) Barton and with Carol we preceded to inspect several nearby sites. One was the site where Sgt. Alvin C. York, the most decorated soldier of WWI, was born. This was just a mile or so from the Upchurch Chapel. A short distance along the road we stopped at the site marking the Conrad Pile spring and Cave. We could see the stream of cool clear water that resulted from the spring but not the cave which was back in the brush. Conrad Pile was a



X

very early settler in the area and a special character. Carol had frequented this area when she was growing up, as her home was a short distance away. She had a container to obtain some of the spring water. In hindsight, we now know that the rocks were very slippery. I will not explain what happened but Carol will, no doubt, agree with me that ladies who are dressed in elegant frocks and their best pearls should be careful when they attempt to get bottles of water from streams.

A short distance away we stopped at Wolf River Cemetery which was established in the early 1800s. The oldest grave now recognized is for Charlie Paul who died in 1826. Conrad Pile is buried here as is Sgt. Alvin York. This cemetery was originally called Mt. Pleasant Burying Grounds. It is not legally associated with Wolf River United Methodist Church which is just across the road. Carol attended school and church at this church which was founded in 1840.

Next on our agenda was to proceed to the Community Center in Jamestown to prepare for the Upchurch lecture. Over 30 individuals were present for the event. Everyone enjoyed refreshments prepared by Carol Conway. Upchurch lecture was enjoyed by all and much discussion took place before and after the event. Cousin Christine (U.) Barton, the Jamestown Librarian, was kind enough to bring copies of the UPCHURCH BULLETIN which Cousin Carol Conway had placed in the Library. Many contacts were made that will be useful in amplifying Upchurch history as the months go by. Several linkages were made for those present. One group came all the way from Texas for the event. Now we need to write each participant and encourage further involvement in our family project. Details on the participation list may be shared in a future issue of the UB. The success of the Lecture is due in large measure to Cousin Carol Conway who spent considerable time, effort and money in publicizing and preparing for the event and in supporting our presence.

Following the lecture we had the opportunity to visit the Jennings Funeral Home in Jamestown. This is owned by Cousin Billy Jennings and his wife, Carol. Cousin Barbara (Jennings) Buck joined us for this event. Later we all had dinner together at the Sea-Boat Restaurant. Carol had arranged for us to spend the night in a local motel. There we visited briefly with Cousin Castro U. who was also spending the night.



5 June 1995 (Monday).

We left Jamestown and traveled west to Livingston in the neighboring county of Overton. This took us through a more rugged part of Fentress Co., TN. All the counties adjoining Fentress Co. involve much Upchurch history also, as the Upchurches of Fentress Co. spread out into these areas. We now have a visual impression of Fentress Co as being a beautiful setting. Jamestown, the county seat, sits on a level to rolling upland area from whence drainage runs in every direction to form streams. From the south, Jamestown is reached through rolling country. To the west, rugged areas are interspersed with lovely valleys and upland plateaus. In the northwestern part of the country lies beautiful Wolf River Valley where Joseph A. U. settled in the early 1800s. The valley contains productive river bottom farm land and pleasant rolling uplands grading into low mountains in the distance. Most of the cleared land is now in grass used to support a cattle industry. Many members of the extended Upchurch family have continued to find a pleasant life in this setting. Others have left never to return, while quite a few leave for a life of experience and work only to return for visits or to resettle in the land of their nativity. Fentress Co. is beautiful and one can understand why our relatives remain bound to it in body and mind.

We did not get to explore the eastern part of the county. There are other important aspects of life in Fentress Co, TN to which we can only allude here. Mark Twain (Samuel Clemmons), the famous author, was conceived in Fentress County but was born after his parents left the area. The Crockett family has roots in the area, as does the Hull family that gave rise to Cordell Hull, the Secretary of State in the Franklin Roosevelt Administration. The Civil War was a challenge for the area. The county was divided and bitterness continued for several decades after the war. The leaders had Southern sympathies and there were some slaves in the county. The bulk of the people favored the North. Guerrilla bands from both sides terrorized the county throughout the war. The passage of time has served as a great healer.

The Wolf Valley Area is prominently featured in the movie "Alvin York" made in 1941 and featuring Gary Cooper in the role of Sgt. York of WWI fame. The movie is now seen from time to time on late night television. The movie presents some stark realities of the time and place but perhaps fails to reveal the beauty of the setting.



During June 5, 1995, we wended our way back to Lake St. Louis, Missouri, during the 15th day of our sojourn to learn more about selected clans of the Upchurch family. Personally, I found the land and people encountered fascinating and count the trip as making a substantial contribution to understanding our shared Upchurch heitage. We are grateful to all who made our travels so enjoyable and productive. I am especially appreciative of the support of my dear wife, Sallaine, who is such a helpmate in this genealogy venture which is mostly "my thing".

We appreciate Sandy's continued interest in our shared heritage.



With the exception of his venture in the 1898 war scene, Cullen spent his entire life in Wayne Co., KY where all of his children and practically all of his grandchildren were born. We are yet to learn the details of his involvement in the war. Presumably, he was involved for a brief period, as the entire war was of short duration. The war is remembered for the strange sinking of the American battleship "Maine" in the harbor of Havana, Cuba, and for giving future President Theodore Roosevelt some fame for his charge up San Juan Hill in Cuba.

The photographs show that Cullen won the heart of a beautiful lady. He married Josephine Sumpter when she was not yet 20 and following his stint in service. The 1904 photo shows him to have developed into a distinguished gentleman in the six years following his 1898 photo when he was a 17 year-old stripling. (The handsome jacket he wears in the 1904 photo is a carbon copy of the warm stylish jacket your editor's wife insisted he obtain in recent months to counteract the Missouri winter).

Our 1898 veteran appears to have had the legal name
Bratcher Cullen Upchurch. However, he styled himself Cullen Bratcher U. 1734
or Cullen B. U. and frequently went by this name. This characteristic of
changing first names around has been noted often in the family and especially
in the era represented. Cullen's father Silas Melvin U. was often referred to 1734,317
as Melvin Silas U. Cullen's son Silas Hubert U. was often referred to as 317,1734,29296
Hugh Silas U. They probably did not realize they would be driving family 29296
historians mad.

We are indebted to Cousin Melva Henninger, daughter of Hugh U. 29297,29296 not only for providing the above photo but also for the fact that she maintains a keen appreciation for her Wayne Co., KY origin. She and her husband, Ernest Herman Henninger, PhD, generously share details they collect. 29299 collect. Melva, nee: Melva Doris U., is one of about a half-dozen cousins who, living away from Wayne Co., KY, still maintain contact and work to bring their Upchurch heritage into bolder relief.

Lucinda U. is said to be one of the five children of Moses U., each of whom 376,141 married a Privett sibling. Several members of the George U. The origin of the name of the Upchurch Village in Clinton Co., KY now seems to be resolved. The question on this matter was presented in <u>UB</u>, Vol. 14, No. 3 (JUL) 1993, page 93, with a map showing the Upchurch Village and a nearby road also named Upchurch. Cousin Truex Newman U., to whom we express appreciation, performed a library search and in a 22 NOV 1993 letter to your editor transmitted the following information:

Hiram H. U. (aka Ahile U., Hial U.) was b. 16 MAR 1844 and d. 16 AUG 1922, and is buried in Albany, Clinton Co., KY. His son, Abraham L. U. "Abe" was b. 6 FEB 1867 and died 6 AUG 1966 and was also buried in Albany, KY. These dates fit well with the concept that Hiram H U. could have been an edlerly respected community member for whom a Post Office could have been named in 1908. This Upchurch Post Office was about three miles north of Albany,, KY.	313
Reuben Sloan, the father-in-law of Hiram H. U., was killed by the Confederate Guerrilla Band, reportedly while he pleaded for them not to take his horses. There were other encounters between this Band and members of the Upchurch family. The story is told in the book CHAMP FERGUSON by Thurman Sensing.	
Ahile U. joined the Clear Fork Baptist Church in Albany, KY, in JUL 1866. He gave one acre of land on the waters of the Clear Fork for the purpose of "advancing the common school system of Kentucky". We are indebted to Cousin Charlie Woodrow Crouch, Jr. for this photo. He is the son of Charles Woodrow Crouch, Sr., and the grandson of the above pictured Elizabeth Sells. Cousin Charlie is a recent collaborator in our Upchurch family history effort and lives in Lexington, KY. In a 1998 letter he wrote:

"Dear Cousin Phil - I am enjoying reading and rereading the <u>UPCHURCH BULLETIN</u> that you sent to me. You have done a tremendous job. Thousands of people are indebted to you for your work". Parenthetically, one might say it is folks like Cousin Charlie who make it possible to continually elevate our knowledge and appreciation of our family history.

The Upchurch heritage of Cousin Charlie Crouch, Jr. traces back to the North Central Tennessee Counties of Pickett, Fentress and Overton. In a 1998 letter he wrote movingly of connections to this area and his relatives there as follows:

"I wanted to share with you a little of the family history of Elizabeth and Fannie Sells. They married brothers, Jess and Elijah Crouch. When my Grandmother died in 1932, my Father was only 11. For years he was shuffled between relatives and friends of the family. Some of his happiest times were in Tennessee. He spent time with his Grandmother Lucinda, Uncle Raymond Sells and Uncle Elijah (Lige) and Aunt Fannie. He was very close to Lige and Fannie's son Delmer. They called themselves double first cousins. We made family vacations to Tennessee every year. It developed in me a deep love for all my relatives in Tennessee. I visit my cousins Brittany and Chase as often as possible. They are Delmer's gr grandchildren. They were adopted by their grandparents, Charles and Janice, after their parents death."

Notice of his demise was provided by three cooperators - Charlie Woodrow Crouch, Jr., of Lexington, KY; Melva Doris (U.) Henninger, and Laura Joanne (Morgan) Bass of Lakewood, CO. It was kind of all three of them to inform us. The obituary which appeared in the 19 MAR 1999 (FRI) HERALD-LEADER of Lexington, KY follows:

HERALDALEADER STAFF REPORT

Hallice F. Upchurch Sr., a former Wayne County judge-executive, died Wednesday at the Hospice Care Center at St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington, He was 69.

Mr. Upchurch, a Republican, was judge-executive from 1978 to 1989 and from 1994 to 1998. He was a Monticello City Council member from 1972 to 1975.

In 1983, Mr. Upchurch and three Wayne County magistrates, under a plea agreement, pleaded guilty to a total of 54 misdemeanor theft charges stemming from the use of county funds to pay for gravel and improvements on private property.

Mr. Upchurch, who also had been a farmer and businessman, had been a director of the Monticello Banking Co. and a member of Otter Creek Masonic Lodge No. 350, Monticello Lions Club and Monticello-Wayne County Chamber of Commerce. He had been a deacon at Monticello First Christian Church.

Mr. Upchurch, a native of Susie in Wayne County, was a graduate of Cumberland College.

Surviving are his wife, Katy Phillips Upchurch; a son, H. Frank Upchurch Jr. of Monticello; a daughter, Holly U. Buckman of Gravel Switch; a sister; and three grandchildren.

Services will be at 3:30 p.m. Saturday at Monticello First Christian Church. Visitation will be after 6 p.m. today at Marvin S. Hicks Funeral Home in Monticello. Contributions are suggested to Hospice Care Center or Monticello First Christian Church.

A. A Report of a Five Day Journey to Wayne Co., KY in July 1999 in search of Upchurch Roots.

On 1 JUL 1999 Robert Phillip Upchurch and his wife departed their home in Missouri for the purpose of learning more about Upchurch roots in Wayne Co., KY. This trip had been previously announced in the <u>UB</u> and it was undertaken under the joint sponsorship of Mrs. Ernest H. Henninger, nee: Melva Doris U. of Greencastle, IN, Mr. David Hugh U., Sr. of Albany, KY, and Ms. Delores Morris of Monticello, KY. We are especially indebted to Melva for advanced preparation and followup and to her husband, 29297 Dr. Ernest Henninger, who provided moral and logistical support. 29299

This trip centered on Upchurch Clan No. 5 headed by George U. 137 He was born, grew to adulthood and married in Brunswick Co., VA. He moved to Iredell Co., NC. when his children were at or approaching adulthood sometime before 1800. However, the west called and sometime in the 1810-1814 period he relocated to the Little South Fork River in southern Wayne Co., KY near Mt. Pisgah. Although some of his adult children had married in NC, all soon joined George in KY. The Clan headed by George U. has been very prolific and one 137 estimates that about twenty percent of all descendants of Michael U. I, b. about 1624 (England), d. 1681 (Surry Co., VA) trace their family lines back through George U. We have also had unusual success in documenting the descendants of 137 George U. thanks to many collaborators. For this success we are also deeply indebted 137 to the late Olive Morgan whose book The Upchurch Story gave special attention to our Wayne Co., KY cousins.

Any serious student of the Upchurch Family would want to visit Wayne Co., KY.

I have long wished to walk the ground trod by Cousin George U. in KY and this
trip provided my first opportunity to do so. My dear wife embraced the venture
and provided her strong support as she has for my serious and whimsical adventures
lo these many years.

The story of the sojourn is best told in trip report form which follows:

1 JUL 1999 (THUR).

Left home at 6:30 a.m. and drove east in heavy rain for several hours. Drove from Louisville, KY to Lexington, KY on a scenic route and got a good feel for the beautiful KY horse country with its historic rock fences. At mid-afternoon in Lexington, by prior arrangement, we met Cousin Charlie Woodrow Crouch, Jr. 44572 He has exceptional interest in his Upchurch heritage and has been an excellent cooperator. He traces back to the Sarah Jane U. line in the 502 George U./Joseph U. Subclan. His relatives lived on the TN side of KY/TN 137/144 border but they link back to the Upchurch enclave in Wayne Co., KY

established by George U. We enjoyed meeting with Charlie for the first time following many productive interchanges by mail. He presented me with a copy of <u>The Enduring Hills</u> by the late Janice Holt Giles. This is an historical novel based on her special knowledge of the unique cultural framework which has evolved in the hill country of the Cumberland Mountains. This is an enchanting book and I almost came to feel I was reading about Upchurch cousins. Thanks, Charlie, for the treat!

We arrived in Monticello, the County Seat of Wayne Co., KY, and settled ourselves in the Tiffany Inn before nightfall. Then we scoped out the town which is in a rolling countryside, overlooked by hills, some far and some near. It is a beautiful area with substantial cleared areas by matched forested hills. One sees corn, soybean and wheat crops and much pastured land. Patches of the famous KY burley tobacco are seen here and there - some small and some large. The homes appear mostly modern and all are neatly kept. It appears nearby Cumberland Lake has brought substantial prosperity to the area.

2 JUL 1999 (FRI)

9:30 a.m. - Melva (Upchurch) Henninger and husband, Ernie, joined us for the day. Miss. Norma Sue Rogers joined us for coffee and a visit to the Wayne Co. Library and Historical Society. I became a member of the Historical Society while there. Sue is not an Upchurch descendant but some of her relatives md Upchurches. I need to check my Rogers book for her. Sue gave me a Rogers Packet.

The Wayne Co., KY Historical Society is now in a room in the Library. They have bought the old downtown hotel and will move there in due course. We discussed a donation of the <u>UB</u>. It is best to give to the Historical Society as they will eventually have room for display - Wayne Co. Historical Society, P. O. Box 320, Monticello, KY 42633.

The Society has an excellent file of newspaper clippings of obituaries, marriages, etc. arranged by family. Need to get a copy of the Upchurch entries.

The Society has just started on a Heritage Book for Wayne Co., KY.

Cousin Melva and I will sort out how to get Upchurch information in the book.

Sara Belle U. is one of the officers of the Society. Need to learn her husband's name. Inspected the Genealogical Society Section of the Library. They have numerous books about specific families and in general about the county. Many of them include Upchurch names. One especially interesting book Pleasant Hill Baptist Church Sunnybrook, Wayne Co., KY, compiled and edited by Irene Atwater Byrer has 14 Upchurches cited. Copied a William Bertram sheet. Had lunch at Tiffany's with Melva and Ernie and two of her brothers, David and Linvell and Linvill's friend, Inez. David has a unique view of how Upchurch blood lines may have been diluted in

America. He enjoyed pulling my leg. Went to Melva's brother's home in Oil Valley (James "Jimmy" and Judy U.). They have one child - a teenage son. They are building a beautiful new home. Jimmy works for the highway (as did his father) and Judy teaches school. We were joined at the home by Melva's niece, Cynthia and her husband, Dennis, and their teenage son. We all trekked (10 of us) to the Little South Fork. Visited the Keeton Cemetery and talked with Paul Simpson who lives across the road. There is one Upchurch entry "Leona dau of G.B & Amanda Upchurch, 16 OCT 1896 - 19 SEP 1896" - Two foot high stone, well maintained cemetery, beautiful hilltop site. Inscription: "Weep not papy and mamy for me. I am waiting in heaven for the".

In a row by itself - suggesting other Upchurch burials in the row possible.

Traveled further on a county maintained road up the Little South Fork beyond its origin by union of Keeton's Creek & Pattons Creek. Crossed Keeton's Creek and went over to Milton Robert"s country retreat which he bought four years ago, 1400 acres. Moses Salee first settler in the area. Milton was Mayor of Monticello and a county functionary and has an interest in history. He and his wife were very cordial hosts. He tells the story of his land joining an ancestor of Harry Truman. Milton built his retreat home recently and used and old standing chimney. The original meat house is still present - log house with trough (popular) for salting meat. Minnie Cross (now 90 and sharp - lives in Monticello) was born on this home site. We got to Milton's by traveling Patton Creek Road. Discussed with Milton how people made a liiving. He said there was plenty of game.

Milton escorted us up Pattons Creek to the Upchurch Cemetery which is under Chimney Rock which is to the south. Chimney Rock being on NC/TN border. Melva says Shadrack U. lived "under" Chimney Rock. Melva also says that Shadrack bought George's land when George died in 1830. Milton says all Wayne Co., KY records are intact. Inspected overgrown Upchurch Cemetery. Jimmy says he knows Mr. Coffee who authored the Cemetery Book and that this cemetery was named Upchurch Cemetery because it was the only monument he could read. (Actually there is a readable BRAKE marker also). We made our way through the overgrown cemetery and found two readable markers. RPU found: "John Wm. Son of J.M. & E. Brake, 11 NOV 1855-5 DEC 1866" Judy found: "Ruthy Upchurch, b. 14 DEC xxxx, d. 1 MAR 1860". There are about 30 other stones - mostly not readable - but in the winter some might be.

This cemetery is a short distance - ½ mile from the old Parmley School site which is up on the ridge. We returned to Jimmy's house and thanked all. We (RPU & SSU) had dinner at Tiffany Inn and drove through Elk Spring Cemetery. It is large. Night at Tiffany Inn. A VERY SUCCESSFUL DAY!

3 JUL 1999 (SAT).

Got notes up-to-date. Breakfast - Tiffany Inn. Drove over to Mill Springs and had a delightful visit with the two ladies in the Gift Shop. It is run by the Women's Club. They are both quite interested in Wayne Co. history. Bought cups for me and a cardinal pin for Sallaine. Inspected the old mill. Returned to Tiffany Inn and got notes ready for lecture.



I gave an Upchurch lecture in the local high school. Melva and others provided refreshments. There were about 35 present for the meeting and there were a fair number of questions after adjournment. Note that I got no special response to including Martin A. Massengale in the presentation. I am not sure about Henry Alvin U. who was included in the presentation. One lady made reference to pg 147 of Morgan's book and had a question about Ahile Knox U. [Daddy? - Susan ??].

Joyce Patton was quite interested in the Ramsey book on display and wanted to know where she could get it or if I would copy it for her.

Note that I had some correspondence with Martin Lee U. before the lecture and that his name is well displayed in town {Insurance}. However, he was not present at the lecture.

Melva provided a copy of 1830 Wayne Co., KY Census (1 sheet) showing a Silas U. she cannot identify. I need to resolve.

After the lecture we returned to Tiffany Inn to recover. By plan, joined Melva and her extended family for dinner at Tiffany Inn. We were guests of Ernie and Melva. About 20 present. Met Melva's two daughters, Audrey and Carol, and fiancee of Audrey. Met Melva's brother, Fred U., who was not present at lecture.

Night at Tiffany Inn.

4 JUL 1999 (SUN).

Left Monticello, KY, 6:30 a.m. and departed from HWY 90 going west to drive by communities of SLAT, MURL, SUZIE & STOP, at STOP Cemetery copied: "Cleo U., 14 JAN 1915 - 17 APR 1996; Ruby R. U., 3 JUN 1913 - (7 DEC? [RPU note not clear] 1998". On back of monument "Our children: Juanita, Gene, Glen, Lynn, Gale". Drove over dam for Cumberland Lake and on to Louisville. Had lunch at Joe Huber's Restaurant and conferred with him. Toured his pick-your-own operation and also that of the Huber Winery.

Night in Hampton Inn in Clarksville, IN.

5 JUL 1999 (MON).

Returned to Lake St. Louis, MO, arriving at 12:00 noon - 5 hrs driving time.

SOME AFTERTHOUGHTS.

Having concluded the trip to Wayne Co., KY and digested the visit some comments seem in order. First to the follow-up. We have now written to all those we contacted on the trip to thank those who helped and to answer or raise questions as appropriate. We have also subscribed to the Wayne Co., KY weekly newspaper



THE OUTLOOK and two issues have arrived. Each one contains several references to Upchurch family members. Several books have been identified which should help with our understanding of Wayne Co., KY and its history. Some information has been collected on just what route George U. might have taken in his1810-1814 move from Iredell Co., NC to Wayne Co., KY.

It is our great hope that we will be able to locate the exact boundaries of the land on which George U. settled when he came to Wayne Co., KY. While visiting in Wayne Co., KY, we had several discussions with cousins about why George U. picked the tract of land on which he settled. The valley floor is only about 100 yards wide as one gets up the valley to where one finds the Upchurch Cemetery. This was not the best land in the county. Maybe the better land was already taken. Maybe this was cheaper land and what he could afford. Maybe this is the tract for which he had a specific grant. Perhaps we will learn more with continued study. In any case, he had plenty of game. While some of the descendants stayed on this original tract, others moved a short distance away - some to the south and some to the north. His son, Joseph U., established an Upchurch enclave near Pall Mall, TN which was really just a short distance away over the hill. Going in the other direction, a substantial Upchurch enclave was found at Slickford just across the mountain from the Upchurch Cemetery on the LSF. In the early days one guesses that a mountain path connected the family members who stayed on the LSF with those who moved to the Slickford area.

Based on the number of Upchurch listings in the Monticello, KY phone book, one can conclude that on a per capita basis there is a stronger Upchurch presence in Wayne Co., KY than in any other county in America. I would welcome a challenge to that assertion.

Upon reflection we conclude that our Upchurch sojourn to Wayne Co., KY was most successful and enjoyable. We will welcome correspondence on any aspects of the George U. Clan.


Our July 1999 trip to Wayne Co., KY continues to yield information bearing upon the Upchurch clan headed by George U. Issues of the OUTLOOK newspaper of Monticello, KY continue to arrive weekly and in due course will be extracted to enhance our data base for Upchurch related information in Wayne Co., KY. Another follow up activity concerns our effort to locate land owned by George U. and his descendants on the Little South Fork of the Cumberland River in Wayne Co., KY. We have engaged Jacquelyn Coffey Daffron of Monticello, KY to help us obtain copies of the relevant documents. Jackie does research for a fee. We will welcome any special contributions to help pay for this effort. So far, the expense is being borne by the limited Upchurch Research Fund Account. Several exchanges have taken place with Jackie and we will be reporting on the results obtained in a future issue of the UB. It is already clear that this effort can yield good results but that it will take careful study.

In the last several months we have had an outstanding series of exchanges with Mrs. Betty Langley (nee: Betty June Bean) of Hurst, TX. Together we are making a serious effort to identify the father of her GGF William S. U. "Shell", b. about 1848 (KY). It is almost certain that William S. U. is a descendant of George U. and most likely that his father was a grandson of George U. We have 137 quite a few more bits and pieces of this puzzle and will welcome assistance from anyone who can help us put the entire story together.

2 AUG 1958) reads as follows: "In my efforts to locate the missing heirs (children) of the deceased Mary (Upchurch) Miller, I had to try other sources than Uncle Alf's living children. So, the trail let up around Ava and Seymour, Missouri, where Old John Henderson Upchurch lived (that I am named after,

as I recall it being narrated to me). Here, I believe, I struck the best source of information that I could possibly hope for, as Alf went there first after leaving Kentucky and lived there several years." (Ava is in Douglas Co., MO and Seymour is in adjoining Webster Co., MO).

We have no doubt that the photograph presented herein is of John Henderson U. I, but a study of all data now available causes us to wonder 404 just who the "Old John Henderson U." JHU, II refers to was. We had always -,1719 presumed JHU,II was referring to John Henderson U., I as "Old John 1719,404 Henderson U." - "that I am named after". However, bear in mind that there were two John H. U's. who lived in southwestern MO. One was John Henderson U. I, who was known to have this name (less the I, we have 404 assigned) and he was definitely the 1st Cousin of Giles Berry U., father of 310 John Henderson U., II. The other was John H. U., the Uncle of 1719,379 John Henderson U., I. Now the question - just who was John Henderson U. II 404,1719 named after and when did the middle name "Henderson" get into the picture? Perhaps, John H. U. actually had the middle name Henderson and that his nephew 379 XID 404 was given the same name followed by a third same name for XID 1719. In any case this matter does not influence the family linkage established, only who was named for whom.

The above presentation barely touches upon the rich mother lode of details available based on the Wayne Co., KY - Douglas Co., MO connection for the George U. Clan. Not covered here is another major chapter in which several of us are trying to sort out the 2-4 children of George U., b. 1810, only two of which William Alfred U. and Giles Berry U. are cited herein. 309,310

George U. was b 1757 in Brunswick Co. VA. He lived for at time in Iredell Co., NC where some of his children grew to adulthood and were married. However, in the 1810-1815 era the entire clan found their way to Wayne Co., KY. This clan is huge and is one of the best documented among all of our 22 Upchurch clans. The book The Upchurch Story by Olive Morgan published in 1975 gave special attention to this clan and we are indebted to her for her outstanding research which spanned several decades. The children of George U. were Lydia, Shadrack, Thomas, Moses, Rachel, John and Joseph. All of their lives were played out in Wayne Co., KY or in nearby TN counties as in the case of Joseph and Lydia.

In recent years members of the George U. clan have helped to maintain a thrust on their clan, Notable among these are Melva (Upchurch) Henninger and Robert F. Barrs who married Nadine, a Wayne County Upchurch.

Just recently a call came from Sue Wright of Wayne Co., KY. She has recently returned to genealogy and is devoting more time to her Upchurch heritage. She reported on an upcoming Upchurch Reunion in Wayne Co., KY. Melva and Robert will be there. Unfortunately I will be unable to attend. Sue reported on a book titled "Killings". It is a fictional account but presumably based on real circumstances which unfolded in the Slickford area of Wayne Co., KY. We are saddened to learn of the passing of S. Nadine (Upchurch) Barrs of Centreville, VA on 31 AUG 2010. She and her husband, Robert F. Barrs, Sr., have been great cooperators and circumstances have permitted us to become close friends. We visited in VA and FL. or yours truly for more details. If you are interested in history at all you will be fascinated by the Cooperstown article.



In terms of migration we find this family starting in Brunswick Co., VA, shifting to Iredell Co., NC and settling about 1810 in beautiful Wayne Co., KY. From there Alfred U. (309) and other Upchurch relatives established a lasting presence in Douglas Co., MO. But the unfolding story takes Alfred on to Conway Co., AR where we note his final resting place on Petit Jean Mountain. There his son Moses U. took note of Iva Elsie West who was born in the Pioneer Cabin in 1890. He courted and married her and they produced four children and many grandchildren of whom Ken was one.

Petit Jean Mountain is divided by a ravine-like depression. Presently on the south side is the State Park to which the Pioneer Cabin has been relocated. Originally it was on the other side of the ravine and presumably close to the still existing very old small Lutheran Church. Quite close to the church is the Petit Jean Mountain Cemetery in which the church has a reserved section. The Cemetery serves also as a Community Cemetery but the prevalence of Upchurch and Upchurch related burials leads one to believe that this was Upchurch land or that it was nearby as was the cabin. More research is needed. The land of Moses U. was about 200 yards away.

The telling of our story would not be complete without mentioning Winthrop Rockefeller, grandson of the tycoon John D. Rockefeller, Sr. Winthrop came to AR in the 1950s and established himself as a huge presence being Governor 1967-1971. He accumulated a large amount of land on Petit Jean Mountain to form WinRock Farm which is his burial site. Some of the land he purchased was Upchurch land. Ken's uncle Doyle U. worked at WinRock Farm. The overall connection of our Upchurches to Governor Rockefeller is another Upchurch footnote in history.

Another exceptional coincidence about Petit Jean Mountain needs telling. In the last several months my work preparing certain professional papers to send to the Upchurch Collection led me to track down former colleague Dr. Theodore Hutchcroft. He and I worked together closely from 1977-1983 on affairs of the Council for Agricultural Science and Technology of which I was President in 1982. It turns out Ted lives in retirement on Petit Jean Mountain. Furthermore, he edits a newsletter dealing with the Petit Jean Mountain Community. Ted has helped me understand the history of



the Mountain and I have introduced him to Cousin Ken. In an upcoming issue of his newsletter Ted will tell the story of the Pioneer Cabin and, hopefully, of the role our Upchurches played on the mountain.

Ken was raised on Petit Jean Mountain and has a great love for it. He recalls going with his GF Mose to visit the rancher "Dutch" who owned land that was to later become WinRock Farm. Mose farmed on the mountain and sold part of his land to form WinRock Farm and part to form the State Park. Each May Ken and his wife Wilma visit and care for Petit Jean Mountain Cemetery where many of his ancestors and relatives rest in peace. But there is more to Ken's story. He had a career in the U. S. Air Force from which he retired. There he was a Russian language expert. The fact that an Arkansas boy of modest beginning can achieve at the level of learning such a challenging language says volumes about the capacity for achievement by salt of the earth Americans and about the opportunities that abound in our country. Additionally, Ken tells me that all three of his daughters have served in the U. S. Air Force. He now has a granddaughter enrolled at West Point.

The story we tell here has many facets. It unfolds a stream of activity in one of our Upchurch Clans which reaches from VA to NC to KY to MO and finally to AR. It reveals a story of Upchurch history on Petit Jean Mountain which was little known but has now been highlighted. It tells the story of how Upchurches of the 11th (Ken), 12th, and 13th generations are still vibrant on the American scene. It tells the story of how our long sustained Upchurch Family History Project can help present-day members get into the "loop" and how they can help us add their part of the story to our records and publications. We are indebted to Cousin Ken for helping with all of these facets and for his financial support. Additionally, he supplied much data and material for his line for addition to our files. On behalf of the extended Upchurch family we thank Ken and his family for their service to our Country.

Students of Upchurch history will know that the George U. Clan was only one of several Upchurch Clans that had a presence in Arkansas. The subject of these other AR Upchurch Clans has been covered in numerous <u>UB</u> issues and elsewhere. The broader AR Upchurch story needs to be told.

In closing it is well to remind all that this story is the sort that can be uncovered and told hundreds of times in our extended Upchurch family. We have done it before and trust that others will step forward and follow Ken's example.

Harmon U., the head of Upchurch Clan No. 16 was in Montgomery Co, NC before 1800. In 1841 the county was divided and that part west of the Pee Dee River became Stanly County. That is where Harmon's land was located. Some of his descendants are there to this day.

George U., the head of Upchurch Clan No. 5 was in Iredell Co., NC prior to 1800 where his children grew to adulthood and married. By 1815 the entire family had moved to Wayne Co., KY, where a huge Upchurch Enclave resulted.

William U., IV, the head of Upchurch Clan No. 9, arrived in Wilkes Co., NC in the early 1780s and he died there in 1787. By 1800 the family had dispersed. A segment went to Greenville Co., SC by 1800 and from there to Henry Co., TN. While there was some evidence of the William U. IV family in western NC in the early 1800s, we have not been able to document descendants in the area beyond 1820.

Sherwood U., the head of Upchurch Clan No. 10 had a strong presence in Rutherford Co., NC about 1800 and some of his descendants are there today but not well documented. Sherwood moved on to GA where he died.


While these western NC Upchurch clan heads were close kin, circumstances took them to different places and they failed to maintain contact.



A TRIBUTE TO COUNTY COURT HOUSES

Family historians are all too familiar with court houses across America, where records vital to the understanding of family heritage are made and stored. They are always investigated hopefully. Sometimes we are joyful as they yield up long sought information. Sometimes we are disappointed as we learn that the desired records were lost or the earlier court houses were burned.

We take this occasion to highlight the court house of Douglas Co., MO in tribute to the thousands of court houses throughout America that have been vital to the pursuit of family history. Likewise, this is a tribute to the employees in court houses who have often gone beyond the call of duty to serve the burning desires that beat in the heart of family historians.

To more fully tell the story of how the photo of the Douglas Co., MO court house has come to grace the pages of this issue of the *Upchurch Bulletin*, a report of the trip leading to the photo will be related.



A VISIT TO THE UPCHURCH ENCLAVE IN DOUGLAS COUNTY, MO IN OCTOBER, 2014 BY ROBERT PHILLIP UPCHURCH, SERVING AS AN UPCHURCH FAMILY HISTORIAN

The story of any colonial American family includes as a subtext the story of how the family over many generations has found itself establishing enclaves across the face of the United States. Such is the case with the Upchurch family leading to this report of a visit to one of many dozens of such Upchurch enclaves. The visit took place on October 20, 2014, and came about in an unusual way.

The enclave in question has long been on the minds of Upchurch historians, as numerous correspondents trace their heritage back to Douglas Co., MO. The back story is that George Upchurch (1757-1830), who as one of 22 members of the fifth generation of the family in America and thus, head of a "clan," provides a good starting point for our story. He was born in the Upchurch enclave in Brunswick Co., VA, went on to establish an Upchurch enclave in Iredell Co., NC from 1790 to 1810, and from there to initiate an Upchurch enclave on the Little South Fork of the Cumberland River in Wayne Co., KY. His descendants, to this day, populate Wayne County, which will forever be considered the home county of the George Upchurch clan. To advance our story, we can report that right after the Civil War, some of the grandchildren of George and their neighbors migrated by wagon train to Douglas Co., MO where land grants were readily available. The full story of naming these people and telling of their exploits will have to unfold elsewhere.

So how did the October, 2014 visit come about? It arose because Dr. and Mrs. William J. Brown (Lois) of Florida and North Carolina invited the writer and his wife (a sister of Lois) to spend a week with them as their guests in a time-share condo in Branson, MO. We happily accepted with the goal of spending a week of riotous living, a goal we often articulate, but seldom achieve. With rounds of golf and shows, we were somewhat riotous.

Knowing that the Upchurch enclave in Douglas Co., MO was only an hour and a half drive from Branson, I timidly offered my companions a day side-trip to explore this rural county deep in the Ozark region. They graciously acceded to my entreaty, and the outing was on a fine day and enjoyed by one and all.

I had prepared myself in advance by printing out from Find a Grave the Upchurch burials in Douglas County. They were found in four cemeteries, primarily in two. The focus of our visit was Ava, the county seat and the only incorporated town in the county. We first visited the Douglas County Library in Ava, where we found a room devoted to family history. Several books inspected revealed that the Upchurches have been a solid part of the area since right after the Civil War. No references to Upchurches living in the area today were encountered, although more research could reveal some. Certainly descendants of Upchurch females are alive in the county today and that is a matter to be explored. With the help of my wife and the



librarians, I was able to copy a dozen or so references and write ups, which now reside in the Douglas Co., MO geographical file of Allied Families Archives.

But the most delightful part of the visit came when we spent about thirty minutes visiting with Nina Spurier Carter, who is an assistant in the Ava Chamber of Commerce. It so happens that she has a strong heritage in the area and is a dedicated family historian. Naturally, we bonded and hope to stay in contact. Nina offered to obtain for our Allied Families files copies of certain land records to help us understand more fully the Upchurch story of the area.

Our trip took us over parts of the western half of Douglas County, where Ava is located and where the Upchurches settled. The county ranged from a rolling terrain to low Ozark forested mountains. Many pastures and hay fields were observed, some now abandoned, but not a single field of corn, soybeans, or wheat. Clearly, this is cattle country, of which there was fair evidence. Route 76 which we took was good, but somewhat curvy, with hills little graded. Along the way, there were numerous modest homes. There was some industry in evidence, but this rural area is left to make its own way with limited resources.

Ava, a town of about 3,000 souls, seems to have struggled to advance from the 1930s, as the main town has the flavor of Andy Griffith's Mayberry. The story of the county court house is emblematic of this situation. Two earlier wooden versions stood in the town center, which now sports a pavilion. The 1930s version, built under the WPA (Works Projects Administration) of the Depression era, is a solid and serviceable two story level structure bereft of adornments, reflecting the practical stance of the solid local population. And yet, a closer reading of the local situation reveals the spirit of rural America. There are many vibrant local organizations, such as schools, events, celebrations, local restaurants and even a country club with a golf course. The inevitable bypass and crossroads has brought on fast food establishments, service stations, and other such amenities.

If someone were looking for the unspoiled face of rural America in which to raise a family, Ava, MO would be a good bet. We are proud to claim it as an Upchurch enclave.

Cousin Shelby Huster U. is of the George U./Joseph U. Subclan. While born in Fentress Co., TN, he has lived for many years in Muncie, IN. From there, he reports that he has developed a keen interest in pottery made historically and also recently in the shire of Kent in England. The pottery has the brand name "Upchurch" after the village of Upchurch in Kent. While we have never connected Upchurch human beings with the origin of the name of the village, we gladly accept the visibility to our family name that the pottery venture lends to us. It even led members of Shelby's family to visit Upchurch in Kent, England.

Cousin Melva Upchurch Henninger recently contributed to an elaboration of the Southern Ridge Trail in Wayne Co., KY. This runs in the area where George U. settled about 1812. Good stuff!

Descendants of the George U./Moses U. Subclan who moved to Douglas Co., MO are portrayed at various places in the <u>UB</u> issues available online at <u>www.upchurchstory.com</u>. One of the spots would be <u>UB</u>, Vol. 9, No. 2, April, 1988, pg. 59. In that portrayal, one sees descendant John Preston Privett (1867-1942). He married Delora Ann Ritter and they lived in Ava, MO. Her GGF Jesse Barry Ritter was the ancestor of Tex Ritter, country music singer and actor. He was the father of the late John Ritter, noted for his acting career, including his role in the sitcom "Three's Company." We are shameless in linking our Upchurch family to well-known names, however tenuous the connections may be. Our family has a big claim on footnotes in history.

We regret to report the passing of Cousin Edna Mabel Sanders in CA on May 12, 2014. She was a member of the George U./Moses U. Subclan and her Upchurch heritage traces back to Wayne Co., KY by way of Douglas Co., MO. She would have been thrilled by the report of our visit to Douglas Co., given in this issue. For many years, she provided data and financial support for Upchurch research. May she rest in peace.

Note narrative and Descendants Report and *Upchurch Bulletin* excerpts. Additionally, we provide here a report of a cooperator's visit to Wayne Co., KY, the site of her heritage going back to George Upchurch:

Excitement mounted as we flew into Lexington, KY and then traveled to Monticello, KY. "We" would be descendants of Alvin Cullun Crabtree and his first wife, Mary Polly Upchurch Crabtree. Richard Arndt and I (Jacki Hoffman) would be their Great Grandchildren and my daughter, Kristin Outtrim would be their Great Granddaughter. Richard and I are first cousins – our mothers were sisters. This was our first trip to Kentucky and our first genealogy trip.

I am more the historian/genealogist than Rich and Kristin but they were excited to make this journey too. John Marion Crabtree was the son of Alvin and Mary and was our Grandfather (Great Grandfather). He was born in Monticello. So we were so excited to see where he lived until he was about 17 years old. He had many adventures that we will never know until he was 22 years old and enlisted in the Army for World War I. After the war, he met our Grandmother, Gladys Margaret Luy. They married and moved to South Dakota. This short saga has many "whys" that will remain a mystery forever.

Our first stop on Saturday was at the Monticello Museum. We were looking for a county map but found so much more which included a warm southern welcome. There were a handful of area historians having lunch that day who were full of local history. Harlan Ogle offered to open the Genealogy Library for us on Monday for research.

I had corresponded with a couple of cousins who planned a reunion for us at the Wayne County Park. John Marion Crabtree had one full sister, Crissie Jane Crabtree Frost Smith. Most of her grandchildren came to meet us. What an honor to meet relatives that had been unknown to us for so many years. Ellen Davis is an Upchurch cousin who also attended the picnic. We visited for several hours and exchanged pictures and stories. They wondered why John Marion left Kentucky and we have wondered the same thing. We did learn of his departure. He was living with sister, Crissie, at the time. She walked him to the gate of her yard to say goodbye. She said – You'll be back before the snow flies. It would be 50 years before they saw one another again.

On Monday, we spent the entire day at the amazing Monticello Genealogy Library and obtained volumes of information. Which, for a genealogist, means more recording and more research!



Sunday evening and Tuesday, we searched cemeteries. In Wayne County, Kentucky it seems everyone is related to everyone else in one way or another. So in addition to finding generations of our direct blood line, we found many aunts, uncles, and cousins. Now to sort those pictures! It was amazing to see folks that actually looked like our family!

On Wednesday, Ellen Davis joined us for the day. We visited a few cemeteries. But we also stopped to visit with more Upchurch kin. Clyde and Junior Upchurch were a wealth of information. They shared both old and new stories about the area Upchurch Families. Clyde took us for a drive and he could tell you who lived in each and every house today and even years ago. The highlight of our drive was the Sandy Hollow Church. The church is worn down and not used any more, but just next to the church is an opening in the woods. Traveling three miles up that path takes you to the home of Shadrack and Thirsey Jane Upchurch, our Great Great Grandfather. We could make the climb on 4-wheelers. Clyde promised to get together enough 4-wheelers together when we come next time to climb that mountain. I can hardly wait!

A side note. I met Toni Upchurch James via the message board on Ancestry.com. She told me about the book, Killings, that was about life in Wayne County, KY from about 1880 to 1940. Even though names and places were changed, there is a "cheat sheet" that identifies may of our ancestors. They lived a very poor life in a very rough area.

My goal for the trip was to find the grave of Mary Polly Upchurch who passed away at age 30 in Wayne County, KY in 1867. Unfortunately, there is no record as to where she is buried. But as a true genealogist, that won't stop me. I will continue to look. Alvin is buried in the Stop Cemetery at Stop, KY. He had moved to Indiana and passed away there but was brought home for burial. His grave is marked with a small granite marker. There is "space" next to him but nothing to note that Mary might be next to him. I purchased a small granite marker that will be placed on Alvin's grave that says, "In memory of Mary Polly Upchurch Crabtree 1867-1897. Wife of Alvin and mother of Shade – John – Crissie." We may not know where she is, but she remains in my heart.
