The beautiful flowers at the altar last Sunday in memory of Harold Wilson and Clyde Strother certainly did the trick on bringing those folks to mind. One of the things so unforgettable is how families used to visit each other years ago, and I wish there was more of that today. We would visit the Wilson's on Sunday afternoon, and my little brother, Allan Roy Lineberry and I would have such fun with Harold, Jr. and Margaret; and my sister Carolyn, and Evelyn Wilson, who were about the same age, could always find something to laugh about and mischief to get into. I was proud to get the chance to give Mrs. Frances a big hug on Sunday! And Clyde and George Strother were very instrumental in the formation of my young life. I used to say, "When I grow up, I'll have a husband who will put his arm around me in church and give me a little hug, like Mr. George does Mrs. Clyde all the time."

At Christmas time, Mr. George Strother and his brothers, Len and Percy, along with other elders of the church, would have little bags of goodies for each child ~ each person in the church: an orange, an apple, little candies and lollipops. Every time I smell oranges, it brings that happy time to me all over again. We would go and visit Mr. Percy and Mrs. Mynette Strother; they had wonderful grapevines, and they invited us to share. Mr. Percy would take us children out to see his mules. My dad was so fond of Mr. Percy that he had planned to name me after him, had I been a son rather than a daughter. And we loved to visit Miss Constance Strother and her brother, Len, who was Church Clerk for as long as I could remember. Miss Constance had some special magic magnetic Scottie dogs she would let us play with; when you put a piece of paper between the magnets, you could make one Scottie follow the other (upside down) all over the paper! She was my mother's Sunday School teacher for years, and many of the ladies of the church would come to our house for Sunday School class meetings. It was up to me to serve them refreshments.

Eloise Lineberry Walker, 92, of Chapel Hill, died December 2, 2010, at Duke Hospice at The Meadowlands in Hillsborough. When applying for membership in the Friendship Force, to the question that asked what her hobbies/interests were, she wrote, "joie de vivre," which covered it all.

Eloise is survived by her son, Jim, and his wife, Chris, of Pittsboro; her daughter, Jenny of Chapel Hill; her sisters, Mary Elizabeth Strong of Alexandria, VA, Nancy L. Matthews of Cary, Carolyn L. Apple of Artesia, NM, and Jacqueline L. Marshall of Cleveland, GA; her brother, Leonard W. Lineberry of Purcellville, VA; numerous nieces and nephews; great- and great-great-nieces and -nephews, and cousins; countless friends; and her much-loved dog, Atticus.

She and two sisters are the only ones of the Lineberry children living. Brother Leonard is deceased. Jackie apparently is divorced from her husband - Marshall. Mark says Jackie is very talkative. She remembers me and would welcome a call from me. Mark will send her a copy of the letter she wrote to I'm used

Her father worked for Sanders Food market to and sold trucks and also tractors. There is a picture with R.W. King on a Ford tractor

Jackie recalls that after Betty Upchurch died the Upchurch store he ran was not closed as Mark thought but was run for a time by HARVEY APPLE (who was Jackie's mother Carolyn) and JAMES WATKINS. Mark has no memory of this arrangement.

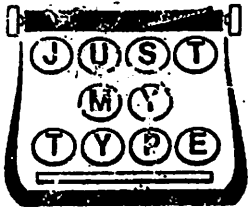

Dear Pastor and Church:

I regret that I cannot be there this coming Sunday for Homecoming – I was a week early, having to be in North Carolina for a Lineberry family reunion on October 5th. How good it was to be at Inwood again! I had a chance to speak with several old friends there on Sunday, but missed many others. I enjoyed the children's sermon very much – the explanation of the role of deacons in the church. My very earliest memories are of that church family, and I'd like to share some of those precious memories with you.

Dear Pastor and Church:

I regret that I cannot be there this coming Sunday for Homecoming ~ I was a week early, having to be in North Carolina for a Lineberry family reunion on October 5th. How good it was to be at Inwood again! I had a chance to speak with several old friends there on Sunday, but missed many others. I enjoyed the children's sermon very much ~ the explanation of the role of deacons in the church. My very earliest memories are of that church family, and I'd like to share some of those precious memories with you.

When I was a toddler, I remember **Miss Jane Green** (now Mrs. Deese, I believe) and **Miss Maude Upchurch** taking me by the hand when my parents, **James A. and Almira Lineberry**, would take me to Sunday School. I can see those little chairs in a circle as Miss Jane taught us bible verses ("God loveth a cheerful giver . . .") and sang Jesus songs, ("Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so . . .").

A few years later I recall **Miss Carrie Scott** telling someone what a well-behaved little girl I was in church, as she was sitting behind me during worship services, and that word somehow got back to my mother. My father died when I was only 12 years old, but I remember how much he and **Mr. Frank Cooper** enjoyed those wonderful old hymns, such as "Love Lifted Me." Mr. Cooper would be on the pew behind us, and I would turn and look up at him as he echoed, "Even me!" and he'd wink at me and sing all the louder..

The beautiful flowers at the altar last Sunday in memory of **Harold Wilson** and **Clyde Strother** certainly did the trick on bringing those folks to mind. One of the things so unforgettable is how families used to visit each other years ago, and I wish there was more of that today. We would visit the Wilson's on Sunday afternoon, and my little brother, **Allan Roy Lineberry** and I would have such fun with **Harold, Jr. and Margaret**; and my sister **Carolyn**, and **Evelyn Wilson**, who were about the same age, could always find something to laugh about and mischief to get into. I was proud to get the chance to give **Mrs. Frances** a big hug on Sunday! And **Clyde and George Strother** were very instrumental in the formation of my young life. I used to say, "When I grow up, I'll have a husband who will put his arm around me in church and give me a little hug, like Mr. George does Mrs. Clyde all the time."

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At Christmas time, **Mr. George Strother** and his brothers, **Len** and **Percy**, along with other elders of the church, would have little bags of goodies for each child ~ each person in the church: an orange, an apple, little candies and lollipops. Every time I smell oranges, it brings that happy time to me all over again. We would go and visit **Mr. Percy and Mrs. Mynette Strother**; they had wonderful grapevines, and they invited us to share. Mr. Percy would take us children out to see his mules. My dad was so fond of Mr. Percy that he had planned to name me after him, had I been a son rather than a daughter. And we loved to visit **Miss Constance Strother** and her brother, **Len**, who was Church Clerk for as long as I could remember. Miss Constance had some special magic magnetic Scottie dogs she would let us play with; when you put a piece of paper between the magnets, you could make one Scottie follow the other (upside down) all over the paper! She was my mother's Sunday School teacher for years, and many of the ladies of the church would come to our house for Sunday School class meetings. It was up to me to serve them refreshments.

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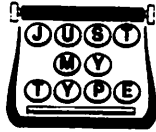

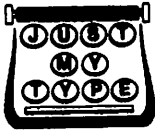

She was also a passionate protector of the beaches and took it upon herself to educate anyone she felt was endangering the natural beauty of the coastline.

When Alzheimer's Disease began to dim her incredibly dynamic personality, Nancy returned to her home in Cary and her children cared for her throughout the remainder of her life. Her daughter Susan lived with her and provided daily loving care. In addition, Cindy Jones, of Raleigh, assisted the family in caring for their mother for more than 11 years. The family wishes to thank both Susan and Cindy for providing the best care available on this side of Heaven. The family would also like to express their strong appreciation and respect for the staff of Hospice, whose assistance was extremely helpful during the last months of their mother's life.

Survivors include four daughters, Kathryn Adams and husband Sam of New Hill, Sarah White and husband Bill of Concord, Susan Matthews of Cary, and Priscilla Bedford and husband Bob of Raleigh; three sons, Jim Matthews of Cary, Joe Matthews and wife Melody of Raleigh, and Sam Matthews and wife Debbie of Raleigh; nine grandchildren; four great-grandchildren; three sisters; and a brother. She was preceded in death by her parents, husband, two brothers, two sisters, and her daughter, Rebekah Lee Matthews.
