Commentary: Mark Wesley Upchurch was the son of Moses Upchurch and the grandson of Courtney Upchurch of the Moses/Courtney sub clan. Courtney had moved from NC to AL about 1835. There his grandson, Mark, was born on 1 Sep 1851. Mark later lived in Mississippi. In subsequent years, many Upchurch family reunions were held involving the descendants of Mark, who died in 1901. Mark Upchurch was a Lutheran minister.

Mark Wesley Upchurch born 1 Sep 1851 was son of Moses Upchurch and grandson of one Courtney Upchurch of Moses/Courtney Upchurch Clan.

The reunion held 21 Jun 1980 at Leroy Percy State Park at Hollandale, MS was called the Mark Wesley Upchurch Family Reunion. In 1981 will be 20 Jun 1981. Mark Wesley Upchurch born 1 Sep 1851 (AL). Moved with his family to MS between 1852 – 1856 where he died 21 Nov 1901. He married (1st) Betsy "Bettie" An Langford

He married (2nd) Martha A. McKay

He married (3rd) Joseph Martha Edmonia Hughes

There are a total of 10 children known from the 1st and 3rd marriages, two of which died before reaching adulthood.

85 descendants attended the 21 Jun 1980 reunion representing 6 of Mark Wesley's children.

Mark Wesley Upchurch – don't know where born. He died near Sturgis, MS. Assume he was married in the Sturgis area. No issue* of 1st marriage. Married 3rd 3 Oct 1886 Joseph Martha Edmonia Hughes probably born in MS. [*Not true – RPU]

Mark Wesley Upchurch married 1st Betsy "Bettie" Ann Langford on 23 Jan 1870. She was born 12 Oct 1855. They had issue. I have no info on place of birth of Mark Wesley Upchurch in AL. He was born in Winston Co, MS. He married 3rd Joseph E. M. Hughes but I don't know where – assume it was in MS – probably Oktibbaha Co. She was buried in Craig Springs Cemetery in Oktibbaha Co, MS. She and Mark were buried at different places because of distance and trael problems.

Mark Wesley Upchurch born 1 Sep 1851 (Perry Co, AL) died 21 Nov 1901 (Oktibbeha Co, MS) (Buried – Bradley, Oktibbeha Co, MS). [He was a farmer and a Lutheran minister] married 1st 28 Jan 1870 (Oktibbeha Co, MS) Elizabeth Ann Langford "Betsy". "Betty" born 25 Oct 1845 (MS) died 1876 – 1879 (Oktibbeha Co, MS). Note that Langford was sometimes spelled Lankford.

Mark Wesley Upchurch (499)

Mark Wesley Upchurch (499) was born 1 September 1851⁴¹⁸ in Alabama, ⁴¹⁹ died 21 November 1901, and was buried at Bradley, Oktibbeha County, Mississippi. He was a farmer and Lutheran minister. ⁴²⁰ One of his 1899 sermons has survived, entitled "Make this valley full of ditches." The four page handwritten sermon included eight lines of poetry that Mark Wesley probably wrote himself. ⁴²¹ Mark Wesley was married three times in Oktibbeha County. On 28 Jan 1870 he married his first wife, Betsy "Bettie" Ann Langford, ⁴²² who was born 12 October 1855 and died 1876 – 1879, the daughter of John Langford and Lucinda___?__ Mark Wesley and Betsy had three children. On 23 Dec 1879 he married his second wife, Martha A. McKay, ⁴²³ who was born about 1847 and died 1880 – 1886. No children have been found or this marriage. On 30

Oct 1886 he married Joseph Martha Edmonia Hughes, 424 the daughter of Joseph Hughes and Martha Ellison, who was born 22 Jun 1862 in Sturgis, died 20 Mar 1911, and was buried at Bradley. Mark Wesley and his third wife had seven children. 425

Mark Wesley Upchurch (499) had ten known children: William Harrison Upchurch (509); Lucinda Upchurch (510); Delanie Upchurch (511); Bertie Elvira Upchurch (512); Frederick Sylvester Upchurch (513); Ellen Airmenta Upchurch (514); Wesley Ira Upchurch (515); Renna Lee Upchurch (516); Rosalee Mae Upchurch (517); and Troy Calvin Upchurch (518). 426 Lucinda Upchurch (510) was born 26 December 1873 in Sturgis and died 28 Jun 1916. She married an Adams and had three children: Elnora Adams who married Elwood Anderson; Elvira Adams; and Henry Adams. Delanie Upchurch (511) was born 4 August 1876 in Sturgis and died 7 July 1913. 427 On 31 December 1896 she married J. Q. Wells in Oktibbeha County. 428 They had three children: Willie Lou Wells; Polly Bell Wells; and Bessie Wells. 429 Frederick Sylvester Upchurch (513) was born 17 April 1890 in Sturgis, died 5 Mar 1924, and was buried at Inverness. 430 He was remembered as being sort of an oddball and a drifter with a really bad temper. He would live with his parents until he got mad about something and then he would move on for a little while. 431 Rosalee Mae Upchurch (517) was born 17 August 1898 in Sturgis, died 12 February 1901 and was buried at Pleasant Hill Methodist Cemetery in Winston County. 432 Troy "Roy" Calvin Upchurch (518) was born 27 March 1900 in Sturgis, died 1 March 1910⁴³³ of an unknown three week illness, and was buried on 2 March at the Craig Cemetery in Oktibbeha County. 434

On 26 Apr 1872 in Oktibbeha Co, MS the B. J. Riners & Co loaned Moses Upchurch and his son **Mark Wesley Upchurch** \$300.

On – Nov 1872 in Oktibbeha Co, MS Moses Upchurch & son <u>Mark Wesley Upchurch</u> gave \$490 and a promissory note to James A. Valentine for 320 acres to be paid over 5 years. By 19 Dec 1874 they were having trouble meeting payments and they brought another son of Moses Upchurch, John Thomas Upchurch, into the deal.

In 1978 all the descendants of **Mark Wesley Upchurch** started getting together.

Holmes County, Mississippi presented a big mystery in the Upchurch history. Two of the children of Moses Upchurch (498) went to Holmes County to marry, Walter Lane Upchurch (506) and Peter J. Upchurch (505). William Harrison Upchurch (509) some of Mark Wesley Upchurch (499) and nephew to the above men, also married here. However, there are additional Upchurch members in Holmes County that have not been tied in with any of the other Upchurch lines. Family history has it that Moses Upchurch (498) had one or two additional daughters that are not accounted for in this history. Perhaps part of all of these Holmes County lines are some of his descendants.

On 24 January 1894 Mrs. L or T. M. Upchurch married W. S. Madison. The bride was eighteen and the groom twenty-one. On 3 January 1895 Maude Upchurch married Henry Alston. Nothing more is known about these girls. Due to the age of the first bride, the Mrs. could be in error. The two brides could be Upchurch sisters, sisters who had previously married Upchurch men, or totally unrelated.

In 1900 Holmes County, two widowed sisters lived in the same house hold, Eveline Lucus and Fannie Upchurch. Eveline was born in June 1854 and Fannie in February 1872. Fannie had three children by her Upchurch husband: Mable Upchurch (964) born in October 1892; Fannie Upchurch (965) born in January 1895; and Jimmie Upchurch (966) born in June 1896.⁶⁸⁹ Fannie Upchurch (965) married Lee Burge on 27 Jun 1913 in the same county.⁶⁹⁰ The father of these Upchurch children has not been found.
