Commentary: Moses Upchurch (XID 1111) was born about 1822 in Chatham County, NC. He was the son of Courtney Upchurch and the grandson of Moses Upchurch, head of clan #1. As a youngster, he moved with his family to Alabama about 1830. We find him marrying Emily Wilson in Perry County, AL in 1850. Later we find Moses and his descendants in Mississippi. The story of the Upchurches in MS is a complex one and several serious researchers have helped to bring clarity. Notable among them are Mary Ann Livingston and Sharon Kay Rone, both of whom continue as long-term supporters of our Upchurch Family history effort.

Moses was son of Courtney Upchurch (born circa 1794 died <1850) and wife Cynthia Richardson. See Courtney. Courtney Upchurch born circa 1794 and died < 1850 married 21 Apr 1814 Cynthia Richardson in Chatham Co, NC. Children were Moses, Burnett, Calvin B, Sion, Delicea, Cynthia, and James Co. (I assume Co = Courtney – RPU). Between 1834 & 1836 they moved to Dallas County, Alabama.

Moses Upchurch (498), the son of Courtney Upchurch and Cynthia Richardson, was born about 1822 in Chatham County, North Carolina. On 28 November 1850 he married Emily Wilson in Perry County Alabama. Emily was born about 1834 in North Carolina or Alabama. The couple settled in either Dallas or Perry County, Alabama. By August 1856 Moses Upchurch had moved his family to Mississippi. The first record of Moses Upchurch in Mississippi was on 2 September 1859 in Oktibbeha County when he signed a quit claim to buy land from Thomas Carroll. Moses paid \$140 down and owed \$140 due on 1 January 1860 and \$240 due on 1 January 1861. Apparently Moses was unable to meet his notes because J. B. Champion paid him \$430 for the land in an annexed quit claim deed on 31 March 1860. Moses was caught up in the Civil War shortly after this when he enlisted as a private into Company E, 3 Battalion Mississippi Infantry (State Troops) at Starkville. He was captured at Vicksburg, Mississippi on 4 July 1863 and on 10 July he signed a parole oath declaring that he would not bear arms against the Untied States or serve in any capacity for the Confederate Army.

On 20 August 1870 Moses and his family were still living in Oktibbeha County. It is interesting to note that the one-year old child of Moses and Emily, Walter Lane Upchurch (506), was not living with his parents at this time and was found in the household of Jacob Junary instead. 405 The reason for this is unknown. Perhaps Emily was ill or someone else was having to nurse the child. By 2 May 1871 Moses was working land on the Valentine Plantation when he signed a lien mortgage to James A. Valentine. Moses owed \$80 for two cows and calves named Lill and Buggs and \$146.10 for pork. The money owed for this stock was to earn 8% interest. Moses would also owe Mr. Valentine for a running account for supplies used to make a crop on the land. 406 On 26 April 1872 the B. J. Rivers and Company loaned Moses Upchurch (498) and Mark Wesley Upchurch (499), the son of Moses, \$300. The security used for this loan was the stock and crops produced on the Valentine Farm. 407 On November 1872 Moses and Mark Wesley gave \$490 and a promissory note to James A. Valentine for 320 acres. The note was for \$4190 at 8% interest to be paid in five installments of \$838 each, due 30 November 1873 through 1877. 408 By 19 Dec 1874 Moses and Mark Wesley had trouble paying for the land. John Thomas Upchurch (500), another son of Moses, joined Moses and Mark Wesley in an agreement with James A. Valentine to pay off the land with promissory notes of cotton bales produced at 10% interest. 409 The last record found of Moses and Emily after this was the 1880 Oktibbeha County census. No tombstone, obituary, or probate records have been found for either Moses or Emily in Oktibbeha County. Family history has it that they are buried in unmarked graves in the



Old Colcolough Cemetery about ten miles south of Starkville on property now owned by the Mississippi State University and the United States Department of Wildlife.⁴¹⁰

Moses Upchurch (498) had ten known children: Mark Wesley Upchurch (499); John Thomas Upchurch (500); twins, Robert Albron or Alvin Upchurch (501) and William Calvin Upchurch (502), Monroe Franklin Upchurch (503); Troy McDonald Upchurch (504); Peter J. Upchurch (505); Walter Lane Upchurch (506); Martha Upchurch (507); and Ara Minta Upchurch (508). Family history has it that one or two additional daughters were born to Moses and Emily. Little is known about three of these children. Monroe Franklin Upchurch (503) was born about 1859 in Oktibbeha County. 411 No other record has been found for him except for his appearance on the 1870 and 1880 census records for Oktibbeha County. He supposedly left home and was never heard from again. 412 Peter J. Upchurch (505) was born about 1867 in Oktibbeha County. 413 His name was found as Peter J., Peter, and J. P., but Peter J. is assumed to be the correct one. On 18 Nov 1891 in Homes County, he married Lizzie Cobb. 414 Peter J. died young and is believed to have left no descendants. Peter J. supposedly had the talent of being able to talk the fire out of a burned person. 415 On 23 January 1901 his wife married Robert P. Allen in Homes County. 416 Martha Upchurch (507) was born in Oktibbeha County sometime between 1870 and 1873. She is believed to have died young though one family version thought she had married and gone to Georgia.⁴¹⁷

Miscellaneous Holmes County Upchurch's



Holmes County, Mississippi presented a big mystery in the Upchurch history. Two of the children of Moses Upchurch (498) went to Holmes County to marry, Walter Lane Upchurch (506) and Peter J. Upchurch (505). William Harrison Upchurch (509), son of Mark Wesley Upchurch (499) and nephew to the above men, also married here. However, there are additional Upchurch members in Homes County that have not been tied in with any of the other Upchurch lines. Family history has it that Moses Upchurch (498) had one or two additional daughters that are not accounted for in this history Perhaps part of all of these Holmes County lines are some of his descendants.

On 24 January 1894 Mrs. L or T. M. Upchurch married W. S. Madison. The bride was eighteen and the groom twenty-one.⁶⁸⁷ On 3 January 1895 Maude Upchurch married Henry Alston.⁶⁸⁸ Nothing more is known about these girls. Due to the age of the first bride, the Mrs. could be in error. The two brides could be Upchurch sisters, sisters who had previously married Upchurch men, or totally unrelated.

In 1900 Holmes County, two widowed sisters lived in the same household, Eveline Lucus and Fannie Upchurch. Eveline was born in June 1854 and Fannie in February 1872. Fannie had three children by her Upchurch husband: Mable Upchurch (964) born October 1892; Fannie Upchurch (965) born January 1895; and Jimmie Upchurch (966) born in June 1896. Fannie Upchurch (965) married Lee Burge on 27 Jun 1913 in the same county. The father of these Upchurch children has not been found.

A friend of mine is is a MS Civil War reenactment group and we were talking yesterday and I mentioned that my Moses Upchurch ancestor (my 2 x great-grandfather) was captured and pardoned in the Vicksburg in 1863. And that he lived in Oktibbeha County, MS – the same as my friend. He asked where he was buried and I told him "presumably at Old Colcolough Cemetery" near Dorman Lake south of Starkville". At least that's what anything I've found says – although there is no headstone and no confirmed death date.

I told him how overgrown and abandoned the cemetery was. He volunteered his reenactment group to clean it up AND they will erect a Civil War veteran headstone, complete with Confederate ceremony. I was amazed! I just need to fill out some paperwork and provide a copy of his pardon at Vicksburg – which I have on photocopy.

Genealogists preserve history in way that is increasing in popularity

November 8, 2010

Descendents of Moses Upchurch, born 1822- died 1880, gathered Sunday, in the Old Colcolough Cemetery for an honor ceremony for the newly erected Civil War headstone.

The special service is one of the ways genealogists are recognizing

The special service is one of the ways genealogists are recognizing the accomplishments of their family, as well as preserve family and local history.

Descendents and relatives attend the Sunday afternoon service which was conducted by local Civil War re-enactment group, the 1st Mississippl Light Artillery, Company C (Turner's Battery). The Old Colcolough Cemetery is located at the junction of Hwy. 25 South and Dorman Lake Road, about seven miles south of Starkville.

Sunday's service is one of a growing trend among genealogists. Researching family history can take a genealogist in several directions, even to cemeteries to find relevant information.

As more and more information is revealed about a name from the past, families discover crumbling grave markers, if any markers can be found.

As a way of honoring the past and providing a marker for future research, the trend to replace the marker and honor military service is important.

As part of Sunday's service, visitors learned more about the life of Moses Upchurch.

Moses Upchurch.

Moses and his wife, Emily Wilson, moved into Oktibbeha County

around 1856 from Perry County, Ala. In 1862, Moses joined the Mississippi military and served as private in Co. E, 3rd Battalion MS Infantry, State Troops. On July 4, 1863 he was captured during the seige of Vicksburg and later paroled when he swore allegiance to the United States.

Returning to Oktibbeha County, Moses and Emily lived south of Starkville and in 1871 he was working as an overseer on the Valentine Plantation. The last record of Moses and Emily is the 1880 US Census for Oktibbeha County.

Moses and Emily were the parents of ten known children, several of whom continued to live in the Oktibbeha County area. Many descendents can be found today in surrounding counties. The ten children were Mark Wesley U., John Thomas U., twins- Robert Albron/Alvin and William Calvin U., Monroe Franklin U., Troy McDonald U., Peter J. U., Walter Lane U., Martha U., and Ara Minta U.

Moses was a fourth generation descendent of the immigrant ancestor, Michael Upchurch, who arrived in America in 1650.

He is also the grandson of the first Moses Upchurch, who served for America in the Revolutionary War.
