Joseph Cole Upchurch, Sr. and the Granite Piano By UAFA President Tom Upchurch, M.D.

J oseph Cole Upchurch, Sr. (1 Feb 1917 – 21 Mar 2001) is buried at Bonaventure Cemetery on a bluff overlooking the Wilmington River East of Savannah, Georgia. The cemetery is one of the most beautiful in the world and JC's grave marker, a grand piano carved from black African marble by Charles Sipple, is certainly one of the

JC worked with his father at the Piano Company when he was young then he and his new wife, Doris, joined his father in the business when he returned from his naval service in WWII. After George Kelly died in 1956, the business was moved to a new location in Savannah and renamed "Upchurch Music Company". JC and Doris subsequently operated the store at that site until the late 1980s when JC became too old to manage the business. After the store closed, he continued to work as a piano technician until his death. By that time pianos had been the family salvation and business for over 100 years. The marble piano memorial for JC seems quite appropriate.

The Joseph Cole Upchurch, Sr family is a member of the Moses Upchurch clan. JC and Doris had six children and many grandchildren. They named their first son Joseph Cole "Joe" Upchurch, Jr. He named his son Joe Cole "Cole" Upchurch III who named his son Joseph Cole "Joseph" Upchurch IV. 

Are you looking for some excellent genealogy projects to keep you busy and building your family tree in October? Here are six of them you definitely must do before Thanksgiving.

1. Do Some Cemetery Research in the Field
