CLAN 4 (RICHARD UPCHURCH III)

Richard Upchurch III b. ca 1750 in Brunswick Co., VA moved with his father to the Moccasin Creek area of NC and lived there until 1817 at which time he died intestate. Richard U. III is the head of a large Upchurch clan which has not been thoroughly documented. Details are being assembled. (See Section VI for an outline of the Richard III/James Upchurch Subclan). 63

To the worshipful the Justices of Plea's and Quarter Sessions for the County of Franklin the petition of James U., John Pace, and Clara his wife, Buckner U., Sion U., Britton U., Clabon U., Berkly, and Larkin U. by his guardian or next friend, John Carpenter.

Humbly (shurch) unto your Worships, that they are the children and heirs at law of Richard U. dec. late of Franklin County, who departed this life, some time in the month of _____ and year of ____ Intestate, and was at the time of his death seized and possessed of a tract of land in fee simple, lying and situated in the county aforesaid containing 350 acres or thereabouts, adjoining the lands of John Pace and others.

Your petitioners further represent and (shew) to your Worships, that a division or partition of said land has not yet taken place, and Humbly pray your Worships to appoint five free older commissioners to lay off to them their distributive proportions, agreeable to law and report their proceedings under their hands and seals to the next court, and your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray, etc. J. Whereupon it is ordered that William Harrison, Jerimiah Percy, (Jock), Thomas Dunn, Philemon Pearce, and Stephen Pearce, divide and alot the land set forth in the foregoing petition, agreeable to the prayer of the petitioners, and report under their hands & seals to next court.

2. Commentary on the Richard U. III Petition.

We are indeed fortunate to have the above petition which clearly documents the children of Richard U. III. From other information there appears to have been an additional daughter, Frances U., making nine children in all. 72
A detailed outline for son James U. is given in UB, Vol. 1, No.1, Page 19. 67
There is some indication that dau Clara U. md. John Pearce rather than 2796, 2797
John Pace as indicated in the petition. Son Buckner U. and his descendants 69
have been described in Morgan's Upchurch Story. He moved to Brown Co., IL.
Sons Sion, Britton, and Burkely appear to have remained in NC. Son 64, 68, 65
Claburn moved to Hancock, GA in 1822 and to Henry Co., GA in 1832 joining 70
a group of other Upchurches. So far we know little of son Larkin. 66

1. ACTION OF THE COURT APPOINTED COMMISSIONERS.

In Franklin County, NC Will Book F for the year 1818 there appears the following official entry:

The undersigned commissioners appointed in pursuance of an Order from the Worshipful the County Court of Franklin to us directed assembled accordingly at the late residence of Richard Upchurch dec'd and proceeded 63 to divide the Land of said decedant agreeable to the prayer of the petitioners as will more fully appear by referring to the plat of the county surveyor hereunto annexed all of which Lots as laid down in Said plat are fairly and plainly marked - as was drawn as follows

2. COMMENTARY ON THE DIVISION OF THE LANDS OF RICHARD U. III.

Other information reveals that the Richard U. referred to above (sometimes called Richard U., Jr. but designated in UB as Richard U. III) 63 is the Head of Upchurch Clan 4, the son of Richard U. II, the gs of 152 James U. I, the ggs of Richard U. I, and the ggs of Michael U. I, the 151,149,146 original American Upchurch immigrant.

Richard U. III died intestate in 1817. It was therefore necessary for 63 the County Court to appoint three Commissioners to divide his property and to allocate it to his heirs. Susannah Pace, the second wife of Richard U. III was presumed to have predeceased her husband as she is not mentioned in the division of the property. However, other records show she was alive at his death as she subsequently sued and obtained dower rights.

Clearly there were eight children alive at the time of the property division. Among the seven sons listed some of the names are not spelled according to predominant tradition. For Clabon we use Claburn, for Britton we use Britton and for Berkly we use Burkely. Clara U., a daughter of Richard U. III, would have been the wife of the John Pearce listed.

The land of Richard U. III distributed to his eight children totaled 182 $\frac{1}{4}$ acres. Before his death Richard U. III sold to his son, Britton U., 100 acres of land for one dollar. The 1810 Franklin Co. NC Census shows he had 27 slaves. From these and other records it would appear that Richard U. III was a man of means.

Prior to the divisions referred to above Richard U. III's second wife, Susannah "Sooky" Mary ("Polly")(Pace) Upchurch sued for dower rights in the estate of Richard U. III. The court appointed Commissioners auctioned part of the estate and awarded the widow \$1257. The original Commissioners appointed were: William Harrison, Jerimiah (Jack) Perry, Thomas Dunn, Philemon Pearce and Stephen Pearce.

Of the seven sons of Richard U. III, Sion, Burkely, Larkin, and James remained in Franklin Co., NC. Britton and Claburn moved to GA. Buckner moved to IL by way of Randolph Co., NC. Son-in-law, John Pearce (mistakenly referred to as John Pace in some cases) also moved to IL by way of Randolph Co., NC. The records tend to show that Richard U. III had two daughters, Clara U. and Frances U. However, it is possible that there was only one daughter and that she held both names Clara and Frances. If there was a dau. Frances U. she must have predeceased her father as she did not draw a lot. It is certain that John Pearce md. a daughter of Richard U. III.

The document reproduced above refers to an attached plot provided by the County Surveyor. This plot map is not presently available to the Editor. A study of this map and related information could reveal the precise location of the property of Richard U. III. It was in the Moccasin Creek area of Franklin Co., NC.

Frances (XID-72). Henceforth, we will proceed on the basis that there
was one daughter, Clara Frances U. and she will be identified as XID-72.

VI. OUTLINE OF SELECTED CLANS OR SUBCLANS

INTRODUCTION AND OUTLINE OF THE CLABURN UPCHURCH SUBCLAN OF THE
RICHARD UPCHURCH III CLAN

Claburn Upchurch was one of eight children of Richard U. III. XID

Claburn was born in the Moccasin Creek area of Franklin County, NC in 1789. The exact location is not known. He remained in this area among brothers and sister and cousins until he was full grown, married and had children. In 1822 at age 33 he moved his family to Hancock County, GA (80+ miles SE of Atlanta). In 1832 he moved for the last time to Henry County, GA (20+ miles SE of Atlanta) where his Uncle Charles U. (Head of Clan 2) had settled. 164

Claburn U. was an active farmer in NC. He was on the Franklin Co., NC, Tax List beginning in 1804 and as follows: 1812 (108 acres - 1 white poll - Capt. Lewis Boone's Dist); 1814 (same except 136 acres); 1815 (same); 1816 (same except Capt. Wood's Dist); 1817 (108 acres - 1 white poll, 1 black poll - Wm. Stone's Dist); 1821 (0 acres - 1 white poll - Capt. Denson's Dist). Claburn md. 3 JUN 1809 Amey Bunn, dau 71
of James Bunn of Franklin Co., NC. On 3 JAN 1811, Claburn bought land from the estate of the late Joseph Norris. This land joined Moccasin Creek. Other buyers were Jubal U. (Claburn's Uncle), 158
Eaton U. (son-in-law of Joseph Norris and presumed son of Charles U. and hence 1st cousin of Claburn), and Britton U. (brother of 68
Claburn). Land in Franklin Co., NC, which Amey inherited from her father, Jesse Bunn, was disposed of by Claburn and Amey in 1814. Claburn's Uncle Jubal U. purchased the tract which adjoined land of Stephen Pearce and Jesse Bunn. In 1818 when the Franklin Co., NC estate of the late Richard U. III was divided, Claburn received 63,70
22 acres as his share.

While the exact location of Claburn's property in Franklin Co., NC is not known it is certain to be in or near the Moccasin Creek area. Note the "ring" of the names: Norris (Norris Creek), Pearce (Pearce Community), and Bunn (Town of Bunn is six miles NE of Moccasin Creek area).

In 1830 Claburn U. and his family appeared on the Census Rolls in Hancock Co., GA. In the household was a female 50-60 years of age who is presumed to be Amey's mother. In the 1840 Georgia Census the Claburn U. family appeared in Henry Co., GA. Known relatives of Claburn also listed as heads of households on the 1840 Georgia Census were: Briton U. (a brother in Gwinnett Co. - 20 miles 68
NE of Atlanta); Thomas Gay U., Sr. (a 1st cousin in Fayette Co. - 2071
20 miles SW of Atlanta); Charles U. (an Uncle in Henry Co. - 20 miles 164
SE of Atlanta); Lunsford U. and Richard U. (sons of Claburn in 1226,1229
Henry Co.).

While we have settled upon the spelling of Claburn the records bear many spellings including: Claiborn, Clabon, Claibon, Clabourn, Clabourne, and Clabun. For the record, the brothers Claburn and 70
Britton named sons after each other so that Britton U. had a son 60,60
Claburn U. and Claburn U. had a son Britton U. 2787,70,1231

Claburn and Amey U. had twelve children, five of whom were born in Franklin Co., NC, four of whom were born in Hancock Co., GA, and three of whom were born in Henry Co., GA. Claburn died in 1862 in Clayton Co., GA., his homeplace having fallen into that county upon the division of Henry Co. in 1858. Amey also died in Clayton Co. As far as is known Claburn was a farmer throughout his life. His picture is shown elsewhere in this issue of UB.

The brothers and sister of Claburn U., all born in Franklin Co., NC, were also heads of subclans in the Richard U. III Clan. They were (including Claburn):

1. WILL OF JAMES UPCHURCH - WRITTEN, 1 MAY 1833 PROVEN, MARCH
COURT, 1850 - RECORDED BOOK N, Page 318-320. Franklin Co., NC.

"In the name of God Amen. I, James Upchurch of the County of Franklin & State of North Carolina being of perfect mind & sound memory blessed be God for the same and knowing the mortality of my body & that it is appointed for all men once to die do make & publish this my last will & testament in manner & form following. (Viz).

First to pay all my just debts

- Item 1st. I leave to my dearly beloved wife Thany Upchurch during her natural life the land & plantation whereon I now live containing four hundred acres more or less also six negroes names as follows Esther, Richard, Billy, Abram, Clary, & Harriet, & all of my Stock of Horses, Hogs, Cattle, & Sheep, & all of my household & kitchen furniture my farming utensils of every description all of my bacon lard corn & faddar wheat Oates & Cotton & at her death to be divided as hereafter directed. 994
- Item 2nd. I give & bequeath to my Son Kearney Upchurch a certain tract of Land containing two hundred & Seventy eight acres more or less lying on the waters of Mocson Creek adjoining the lands of Burkley Upchurch, Larkin Upchurch, John Pearce & 65,66,2797 others whereon he now lives. An at the death of my wife Thany Upchurch I give & bequeath to my Son Kearney Upchurch one half of the negroes that I have loaned to my Said wife & their increase from the writing of these presents Slave & Slavry like to him & his heirs forever. 989
- Item 3rd. I give & bequeath to my Son Jimmison Upchurch the land & plantation whereon I now live containing four hundred acres more or less also the other half of my negroes & their increase from the writing of these presents that I have loaned to my wife Slave & Slavry like for him to take in possession at the death of my wife. Thany Upchurch to him & his heirs forever. 990
- Item 4th. It is my will & request at the death of my wife Thany Upchurch for the residue of my estate that I have not above bequeathed to be sold on a credit of nine months by my executor or executors & the money arising from the Sales of the Same to be equally divided between my following children & my granddaughter (Viz). 2. COMMENTARY ON THE WILL OF JAMES UPCHURCH.

This is an important document for the Richard U. III Clan and for the closely related Upchurch Clans which compose the Moccasin Creek Branch of the Upchurch Family. The will clearly identifies members of the James U. family and also shows that James U. lived in close proximity to his brothers Burkely U. and Larkin U. and to his sister Clara Frances U. The latter may be deduced from the fact that adjoining land of John Pearce is mentioned and it is known that John Pearce md. Clara Frances U., a dau of Richard U. III. The 678 acres willed consisting of a 400 acre and a 278 acre tract represented considerable wealth. This land is most likely in the general vicinity where Richard U. II settled when he moved from VA to NC about 1755. The 400 acre tract appears to be the one which James acquired from his Uncle Moses U. for \$600 in 1804 at which time Moses U. and his brother Nathan U. were shifting their locations west from the Wake Co./Franklin Co. border to the Chatham Co./Wake Co. border. Since James U. willed this 400 acres to his son Jamison (Jimmison) U. we may someday be able to trace the land through the disposition records of Jamison U. According to the purchase from Moses U. the 400 acres were on Moccasin Creek. According to the will the 278 acres were also on Moccasin Creek. It appears that the 278 acres may have been part or all of the lands of Richard U. II acquired by James U. from the heirs in 1825. At the time the will was written in 1833 it appears that Kearney U. had not yet made his move to the Cross Roads District of Wake Co., NC as he was living on the 278 acre tract willed to him. We have elected to use the spelling Jamison U. for one of the sons of James U. although this will uses the spelling Jimmison U.

In his will James U. made a pointed effort to take care of his wife and his male offsprings which were only two in number. The three daughters were mentioned and perhaps were considered to have done well enough through marriage. The will favors us with the names of the three daus and the names of their husbands. The spelling for one dau has been deciphered as Cloe although it could be slightly different.

One puzzle remains. James U. mentions his granddau Lecy U. but we have no idea of the parents of Lecy. In principle she should be the dau of Kearney U. or Jamison U. but subsequent listings of their children do not show a Lecy U.

We wish to report considerable progress in documenting the Burkely U. Subclan of the Richard U. III Clan. In this matter we have had the constant support of Edythe Lee (Medlin) Tippet of Zebulon, NC. Edythe is a descendant of Burkely U. Our latest breakthrough is to learn that the Rev. James Larry U. is of the Burkely U. Subclan. I talked by phone to Larry and to his father, Thurman Rudolph U., and learned that their line continued back with James Malley U. and thence back to one James U. Upon supplying this and related information to Mrs. Tippet she was able to confirm that James U. was a son of Ambrose U. and a gs of Burkely U. and that this James U. was buried in an unmarked grave in the Ambrose U. Cemetery on Old Highway 64 just east of Pilot, NC. This is at the southern end of the Moccasin Creek Area in NC.

VI. OUTLINE OF SELECTED CLANS OR SUBCLANS

INTRODUCTION AND OUTLINE OF THE BUCKNER UPCHURCH SUBCLAN OF
THE RICHARD UPCHURCH III CLAN (CLAN 4)

The eight known children of Richard U. III (Head of Clan 4), of whom Buckner U. was one, got an early start in making sure there would be Upchurch descendants throughout America. The eight children, each of whom is Head of a Subclan, were all born and reached adulthood in the Moccasin Creek Area of NC in the southwestern part of Franklin Co., NC. The only thing we know about son, Larkin U., is that he married. Sons, Claburn U. and Britton U. migrated to the states south of NC. Sons, Burkely U. and James U. and their children stayed in central NC, primarily in Franklin and Wake Counties. Three of the children either went to the midwest or their descendants went there. Son, Sion U. and some of his descendants migrated to IL. Daughter, Clara Frances U. (or Frances Clara U.) md. John Pearce and moved to IN in the early 1800's. We have temporarily lost track of this couple (for the past 150-170 years).

Son, Buckner U. did the two step in moving to the midwest. Buckner U. moved his growing family from Franklin Co., NC to the Randolph Co., NC area about 1820 when he was about 43 years of age. More children were added in the Randolph Co. area where Buckner lived for about 23 years before moving on to Brown Co., IL in about 1843 when he would have been about 66 years old. Some of Buckner's sons preceded him to IL, while his son, Silas U. remained in Randolph Co., NC. On the 1850 Census of Brown Co., IL, Buckner U. was present with his wife and his youngest child who was age eleven at the time. We do not know why Buckner U. elected to move to IL so late in life. One hazards the guess that he projected a more suitable existence in the presence of his relatives then located in IL.

The chronological evidence in the records for activities of Buckner U. is as follows:

1. 17 SEP 1794. Buckner U. in Franklin Co., NC was witness to a deed whereby Richard U. II gave his son Nathan U. 100 acres of land. (Note: If Buckner U. was b. 1777 as his age on the 1850 Census would indicate he would have been only 17 years old in 1794. Would a 17 year old have been eligible to witness a legal document? Perhaps he was born before 1777. - Ed.). 152,78
2. 1800 Census - Franklin Co., NC. Buckner and wife had two dau. under age 10 years.
3. 1801 - Wake Co., NC. Buckner purchases 100 acres from James Rees.
4. 4 APR 1803 - Wake Co., NC. Buckner U. bought land.
5. 1804 - Franklin Co., NC. James U. sells 200 acres to Buckner U. of Wake Co., NC.
6. 1805-1806 - Franklin Co., NC - Tax Rolls. Buckner U. - 200 acres.
7. 26 MAR 1806 - Wake Co., NC. Buckner U. sells land to Burwell Bell.
8. 1807-1808 - Franklin Co., NC - Tax Rolls. Buckner U. - 200 acres.

9. 1809-1810 - Franklin Co., NC - Tax Rolls. Buckner U. - 147 acres.
10. 1810 Census Franklin Co., NC. In Buckner U. household with Buckner and wife are dau 2 ages 10-16, males 4 less than age 10 years.
11. 1811-1817 - Franklin Co., NC - Tax Rolls. Buckner U. - 147 acres.
12. 1817 - Franklin Co., NC. Buckner U. receives 23-3/4 acres from his father's estate.
13. 1817 - Franklin Co., NC. Buckner U. selected as Juror for MAR 1817 Court.
14. 1818 - Franklin Co., NC - Tax Rolls. Buckner U. - 170 acres.
15. 1819 - Franklin Co., NC - Tax Rolls. Buckner U. - 147 acres.
16. 1819 - Franklin Co., NC. Buckner U. sells land to Claborn Moore.
17. 1820 - NC Tax Lists. The only Buckner U. listed is in Franklin Co., NC.
18. 1820 Census. No records available.
19. 1826 - Franklin Co., NC. Buckner U. sells tracts of land to Sion U. and to James U. (his brothers), and to Robert Lindsey. 64

20. 1830 Census. Buckner U. is in "DAVI" County, NC (could be Davie or Davidson. - Ed.).
21. 1840 Census. Buckner U. is in Randolph Co., NC with his wife and two dau age 20-30 and 3 sons - one less than 5, one 15-20, and one 20-30.
22. 1843. Buckner U. and his wife and children arrive in Brown Co., IL (date approximate and per Morgan in her UPCHURCH STORY. - Ed.).
23. 1850 - Brown Co., IL. Buckner U. is age 73 and one son age 11 is in the home. The wife appears to have deceased before 1850.

In the early 1800's Buckner U. may have moved temporarily into Wake Co., NC as he did own land there. In his move to the Randolph Co., NC area it appears he may have moved first to Davie or Davidson Co., NC as he appears in "DAVI" County on the Census rather than in Randolph where he was subsequently found in 1840. Randolph Co., NC was formed with its present day boundries before 1800.

Buckner U. finally disposed of his lands in Franklin Co., NC in 1826. He could have moved west before this time and as early as 1820 as reported by Morgan.

So far, we have been deprived of the names of the females in the Buckner U. household. They consisted of the mother and the two dau who were in the home certainly as late as 1840. There is some confusion over the ages of the daughters. The 1800 and 1810 Census records show that they were born before 1800 and would have been over age 40 years in 1840. Yet, the 1840 Census shows them as being 20-30 years of age.

An outline of the Buckner U. Subclan, to the extent that details are available, is provided below through the 9th generation.

With regret we report the death of Joseph McGee Upchurch at age 80 on 23 JUN 1982 in Columbia, SC. He was a subscriber to UB but unfortunately we had not corresponded effectively, perhaps due to his advanced age. From clippings of two versions of his obituary sent to us by Nancy Crayton (Dobbins) Griffith of Bowie, MD and Frank Jefferson U., Sr. of Charlotte, NC, we learn that Joseph was a prominent individual. Born in Raleigh, NC, he went to Washington, DC, in 1932 to serve as an aide to Sen. Robert R. Reynolds (D-NC). During WW II he became the first Head of the Federal Housing Administration. He was a political advisor to Presidents Roosevelt, Truman, Johnson and Kennedy. He was Co-chairman of the 1961 Kennedy-Johnson Inaugural Committee. In WW II he originated the "Clean Plate Club" and the "Victory Garden" programs. He was a Chairman of the WW II Mobilization Committee and produced various Army shows around the country. Joseph also produced the 1939 Worlds Fair at Flushing Meadows, NY.

Joseph McGee U. was a financial advisor to John Ringling of Ringling Brothers, Barnum and Bailey Circus. In the late 1930's he was a Washington lobbyist for the Circus and a New York bank. Joseph used the Circus to help sell war bonds. Prior to his retirement and move to Camden, SC in 1948, Joseph had been Vice President of Manufactures Hanover Trust in New York City. In Camden, where he lived until his death, he built the Kirkwood and Pinewood Apartments. He was an avid golfer. In the 1920's in Raleigh he played semi-professional baseball and had there been dubbed the "gray fox" because of his gray hair at age 19. He was also the first President of the Glider Pilot's Association of America and the former owner of Garden-Aid and Garden Farm Tractor Manufacturing Company.

Joseph McGee Upchurch was born Joseph McGee Lane, son on Julian Lane and Sarah Allen Upchurch. The parents separated and Sarah married secondly Lewis G. Bashford. Joseph's name was changed to Upchurch.

Ambrose U., a seventh generation Upchurch was b. ca 1818 and d. 2 JUL 1894. He is buried, without a marker, in the Ambrose Upchurch Cemetery which is located on the north side of old Highway 64 just west of the community of Pilot in Franklin Co., NC. The original home of Ambrose U. is still standing near the cemetery on the south side of the highway. All known records for Ambrose U. appear in Franklin Co., NC and it is presumed that he spent his entire life in the Pilot community where he was a farmer. It is almost certain that he was born in the Moccasin Creek area just a mile or so north of the Ambrose U. Cemetery. Ambrose U. on 1 JAN 1840 in Franklin Co., NC. md. Harriett Pearce, a dau of John Pearce, b. 1787 and Frances U. The parents of this Frances U. who in 1808 md. John Pearce, b. 1787 is uncertain. It seems possible that she was a dau of Benjamin U., the Head of Upchurch Clan No. 23 and a brother of Richard U. III. If this is so, Ambrose U. md. his second cousin.

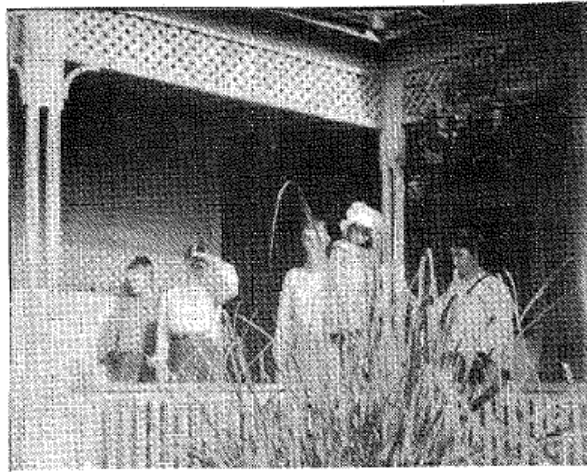

The picture of the larger group was made about 1902 as may be judged from the fact that Eva Lois Cook was b. 9 OCT 1899 and she appears to be about three years old in this pose. The setting was the home of Romulus Madison U. in Hughes Springs, Cass Co., TX. He was about 60 years old at the time. The other two pictures appear to have been around the turn of the century also as judged from the age of the two young Upchurch adults.

Romulus Madison U., b. 1842 (Franklin Co., NC), d. 1910 (Hughes Springs, TX), was the son of Lindsey U., b. ca 1815 (Franklin Co., NC), the gs of Sion U., b. ca 1775 (Franklin Co., NC) and the ggs of Richard U. III, Head of Upchurch Clan No. 4. Romulus and his brother Escue Hazeltine U. moved to IL and in Irving IL, Arthur and Eva, two children of Romulus, were born. He subsequently moved to Cass Co., TX where a third child, Ella was born. The birth place of dau Ina is uncertain. Whether Romulus and Escue migrated from NC to IL alone or with other family members is uncertain. They would have moved either just before or just after the Civil War, most likely just after. Since Romulus was a railroad man he may have moved to IL in connection with his railroad interests. This seems to be the reason he subsequently moved to TX.

As far as we can tell the move of Romulus from NC to IL was entirely unconnected with the move of other Upchurches to the midwest. However, it is a fact that several grandchildren and ggchildren of Richard U. III did move to IL and IN and his only daughter, Frances Clara (Upchurch) Pearce moved to IN after the Revolution.

It also seems to be a coincidence that Walter Jackson U., son of Sarah Elizabeth U. and gs of Claburn U. took up residence in the eastern side of Cass Co., TX, and his second cousin Romulus Madison U. took up residence in the southwestern part of the county. It would come as a surprise to learn that these second cousins ever were aware of the presence of each other in Cass Co., TX.

INTRODUCTION AND OUTLINE OF THE SION UPCHURCH SUBCLAN OF THE
RICHARD UPCHURCH III CLANXID

The name Sion was popular in the 1700's and 1800's and several males in the Upchurch family were so designated. The earliest Upchurch to bear this name appears to be Sion U., son of Richard U. III, Head of Upchurch Clan 4. Sion appears to be another version of the noun Zion which is used to designate an important Hebrew center of activity or even the Hebrew religion. There appears to be no particular connection of the Upchurch family with the Jewish faith which would have led to the use of the name Sion. On the other hand, various Christian faiths have used the word Zion regularly in naming their churches so perhaps Upchurches adopted the name because of its general religious connotation. The form Zion seems to be used in naming places; whereas, the form Sion seems to be used in naming people. Perhaps some people used the name Sion as an improper spelling of Scion (or Cion) which means "a descendant". In some early Upchurch records the version Scion is used interchangeably with Sion.

The proof that Sion U. was a son of Richard U. III is given in the 1817-1818 estate papers of the father who died intestate in Franklin Co., NC in 1817. Sion was clearly named as a son in the papers (see UB, Vol. 1, pg. 75, 157) and received 27½ acres of land in the division of the estate. This land was in the Moccasin Creek area of NC which is in the southern tip of Franklin Co. The creeks and the neighbors identified with Sion U. hold clues which could help us identify the more precise location of his property and thus the location of the Upchurch enclave in the Moccasin Creek area. Sion's property inherited and otherwise adjoined that of his brothers and sisters and his aunts and uncles. As far as we know Sion U. was born, raised, lived his entire life and upon death was buried in this particular community. He was born about 1775 and died between 1830 and 1840 as he was on the census records for the former year but not for the latter one. One account shows that he died before 8 JAN 1833 which would have meant that he died no later than 58 years of age.

The 21 entries above deserve comment. The number of land transactions indicate that Sion U. was a person of means and of substance. We know of the names of four of his children - Albert, Cynthia, Lindsey and Richmond. The Census Records (entries 6 and 18 above) reflect at least two additional individuals who may or may not be children of Sion and his wife, Elizabeth. From the 1810 Census we may assume the female 16-26 was the wife, Elizabeth, and that she must have been age 26 (hence b. ca 1876) since the other female (presumably Cynthia) was age 10-16 and must have been age 10 (hence b. ca 1800) since these assumptions would have made the mother age 16 at the birth of her

daughter. Two of the males under 10 could have been Albert and Richmond (b. ca 1802 per other records). Lindsey, presumed to have been born ca 1815, would be excluded from the three males, hence indicating a 4th son, b. 1800-1810 whose name is unknown. The males 16-26 and 26-45 leave us with a puzzle. The younger of these could have been Sion and, if so, he must have been age 26 to have had a daughter age 10 at that time. In this case the older male in the household could have been the father of Elizabeth. (Sion's father, Richard U. III is eliminated as he would have been age 60 and too old. Also, some correspondents show Richard U. III on the 1810 Census with five whites and 27 slaves although your Editor's extraction of the 1810 Census did not reveal Richard U. III). Conversely, the older male could have been Sion U. in which case the male age 16-26 could not have been a son of Elizabeth as she was not old enough at age 26 maximum in 1810 to have had a son 16 years old. Another hypothesis is that Elizabeth U. was the second wife of Sion U. and that she was the mother of some or all of the three males under age 10 as of 1810. In such a case the first wife of Sion U. could have been mother of the male age 16-26 and the female age 10-16.

The 1830 Census reveals a potential 6th child in the male age 10-15 who could not have been on the Census 20 years earlier. The older couple is presumed to be Sion and Elizabeth while the male 20-30 is presumed to be one of the sons who was age 0-10 in the home in 1810. The birth date for Sion would be 1780-1790 according to the 1830 Census or 1765-1784 or 1784-1794 according to the 1810 Census depending on the male selected as representing Sion in 1810. Since he purchased land in 1804 he must have been born at least as early as 1784. Obviously, more research is needed on the names of the Sion U. family relative to birth dates and names.

We have on file the following reference: "Sales in Richard U. estate 8 JAN 1833 to Elizabeth U., Richmond U., Cynthia U., Albert U. and James Gay". (Presumably Franklin Co., NC. - Ed.). It seems obvious that Richmond and Cynthia are children of Sion U. and that Elizabeth is his widow. One wonders if this is the estate sale of Sion U. and not that of Richard U. Entry 19 above seems to be a final settlement of the Sion U. estate. Note that son Richmond U., the Executor, has moved to Nash Co., NC and we should look for him there in the 1840 and later Census Records.

We are persuaded by logic that Cynthia U., dau of Sion U., was the same as the Cynthia U. who md. 31 MAR 1838 (Franklin Co., NC) one Calvin U. We do not know the parents of this Calvin U. It seems likely that he is a grandson of Charlotte Pearce who md. an as yet unidentified Upchurch and had children Calvin U., d. 1844, Charlotte U., Little Berry U., John U., and Stephen U. The 1830 Census Records for Franklin Co., NC indicate that Calvin U. d. 1844 did not have a son of the right age to have md. Cynthia U. in 1838 but that Stephen U., brother of Calvin U., d. 1844, did have a son of the right age but at this point we do not know if he did in fact have a son named Calvin U.

We are in touch with present day descendants of Lindsey U. and Richmond U., two of the children of Sion U. and our records continue to improve on these lines. We hope more details will come to light on Cynthia U. and her presumed husband Calvin U. The latter is not found in the 1840 and later Census Records in Franklin Co., NC and one hopes he will surface elsewhere. Since Lindsey U. died in IL, having followed two of his sons there, it is

a good guess that his sister and her husband may have followed a similar path. Of Albert U. we know very little.

One of the grandchildren of Sion U., namely, Richmond Herbert U. (called Uncle Dee by the family), a son of Lindsey U., inadvertently helped develop a partial trail for his family. Uncle Dee was born in Franklin Co., NC and md. Sarch _____. They had no children and when they died left no will. They owned property in Bald Knob, AR and may have lived there. In about 1944 three of the older nephews: Charles Bolster, Arthur Cariker U. and Larkin U. met to settle the estate. They identified 19 relatives among whom the estate was divided. These records, graciously transmitted to us by Mrs. Eva Lois (Cook) Pollard, a dau of Eva Lula U., helped to develop our knowledge of this set of Upchurches more fully.

The rich history of the Richard U. III/Sion U. Subclan has been unfolding nicely. We solicit input and encouragement to allow it to continue to be more fully documented. Proudly we present below the outline of the subclan through the 9th generation as it is currently organized.

Our readers will recall that Sam Houston (1793-1863) lived in TN as a boy and young man. He led Texas to independence in 1835 battles with Mexico and in 1836 became the President of Texas. Britton U. and wife are shown in Hackett, AR in the 1870's or 1880's. He is a grandson of Richard U. III, the Head of Upchurch Clan No. 4. When Richard U. III died intestate in Franklin Co., NC in 1817, his son Claburn U., the father of the man shown above, felt the need to move on. Claburn U. moved in 1822 to Hancock Co., GA where his son, Britton U., was born in 1825. In 1832 he moved to Henry Co., GA where his Uncle Charles U. had located earlier. Sometime after marrying Susan in GA in 1850, Britton U. moved to Columbia Co., AR, probably before the Civil War. He was probably the Britton U. who was in the Confederate Forces - Co. A, Crawford's Arkansas Calvary. About 1869 Britton U. moved his family to Hackett, AR and there he and his wife died in 1897 and 1914, respectively. They are buried in the Pleasant Hill Cemetery, two miles east of Hackett. We are indebted to Miss Grace Upchurch of Fayetteville, AR for this photo. She is a granddaughter of Britton Upchurch.

INTRODUCTION AND OUTLINE OF THE BURKELY U. SUBCLAN OF THE
RICHARD U. III CLAN (CLAN 4)

The children of Richard U. III, Head of Upchurch Clan No. 4, tended to take their families to new locales. His son, Burkely U. was an exception. Burkely U. stayed put in the Moccasin Creek Area of central North Carolina where he was born ca 1795, raised and lived until his death in 1863. In fact, the children and grandchildren of Burkely also tended to stay in the same general area, although they did spill over the adjacent county lines into nearby neighborhoods so that in addition to a central core of descendants in Franklin Co. enclaves of Burkely's descendants can be found close by in Wake, Nash, Johnson and Harnett Counties. We have not made a concerted effort to assemble the details on this subclan but the ordinary course of interaction has brought substantial information to light. We are especially indebted to Mrs. Carsey Tippet (nee: Edythe Lee Medlin) who has been a splendid cooperater. She lives in Zebulon, NC in the heart of Burkely U. country and is considered the prominent historian of the Zebulon area.

Burkely U. appears to have been born about 1795 in Franklin Co., NC in the Moccasin Creek Area. He was raised on the farm in the midst of the children and grandchildren of Richard U. II. Burkely U. served in the War of 1812 and shortly thereafter on 30 AUG 1815 in Franklin Co., NC he md. Alsey Pace. In 1816 Burkely U. bought 200 acres of land in Franklin Co., NC from John Pace (Bk. 17, Pg. 74). It is reasonable to speculate that John Pace was his father-in-law or a brother-in-law and that the land was in the Moccasin Creek Area. We know that it was in Alford's District. When Richard U. III died without a WILL in 1817 the eventual result was that Burkely U. inherited a portion of the estate which amounted to 18 - 3/4 acres. He held on to the full 218 acres at least until 1822 according to the tax rolls. It appears that Burkely's right to his father's estate was sold to his brother James U. in 1825. Later when the WILL of James U. was probated in 1850 (written 1833) the Moccasin Creek Area land belonging to the James U. estate was recorded as being adjacent to land of Burkely U. A copy of the estate settlement of Burkely U. is not at hand but he died in 1863 and the estate sale was held on 24 APR 1863.

Burkely U. appears on the 1830, 1840, 1850 and 1860 census records for Franklin Co., NC. He appears as a land owner throughout and appears to reside on the same place in each census. His growing family appears on the record and he is shown to be a slave holder. We know nothing of church records in relationship to Burkely U. and we find little of him in the court records or as a major factor in the community. He appears to have been a solid rural citizen who struggled to provide for a family. His name is found with many spellings and we have settled on Burkely.

The name of Burkely U. does appear in various kinds of records in conjunction with quite a few other Upchurches. The net result is that

we are given considerable assistance in sorting out the most likely relationships among the children and grandchildren of Richard U. II. This task is still in progress. 152

We will welcome any supplementary information on Burkely U. and his descendants. 65

We feel particularly called upon to mention Ambrose U., b. 1818, d. 1894, the oldest child of Burkely U. This is because we know that Ambrose U. lived just a mile west of Pilot, NC on old U.S. Highway 64 on the south side of the highway. Across the road is the Ambrose U. cemetery. Your Editor passed this site hundreds of times in the 1940-1970 era without knowing of its connection with the Upchurch family. 545

1. COMMENTARY:

We are now in contact with our cousin Harold Fritz McDuffie, Jr. 11496
of Oak Ridge, TN, a descendant of W. K. Phillips. Fritz is keenly
interested in several genealogical lines including two Upchurch lines,
both of which trace back to the Moccasin Creek area of NC.

W. K. Phillips, b. 25 JAN 1831, is the son of Elizabeth U., 11487,992
the gs of James U. and ggs of Richard U. III, Head of Clan. Thus 67,63
Fritz is locked into the Richard U. III/James U. Subclan. His
other Upchurch connection is due to the fact that W. K. Phillips 11487
md. Susan Pearce, dau of Nathan Pearce, b. 23 MAY 1783 and
Susan (Upchurch) Pearce. This Susan U. was b. ca 1790 and lived
in the Moccasin Creek area and without doubt must be a gd of
Richard U. II by one of his eight sons, any one of whom cannot 152
be ruled out with certainty. However, the best bet is Benjamin U. 163
as he had four dau showing on the 1790 census, none of whom have
yet been identified. Fritz has recently visited relatives in the
Franklin Co., NC area including his cousin Henry K. Baker who
lives in the Moccasin Creek area of NC on the old Phillips place.

Fritz has kindly supplied a brief autobiography of his ancestor
W. K. Phillips written about 1908. We have so little in the way of 11487
written descriptions of life in the 1800's in the Moccasin Creek
area of NC that it seemed in order to share this with the readers
of the UB. With the permission of Mr. Harold Fritz McDuffie, Jr. 11496
it is reproduced herein below.

2. Life of William K. Phillips, ESQ (born 25 JAN 1831, 11487
died 28 JUL 1914) written circa 1908 by
William K. Phillips.

"On my paternal side, I descended from an English family who
sometime during the eighteenth century came to America, and settled
in Southampton County, Virginia. My Grandfather, Frank Phillips,
moved from Virginia to Wake County, North Carolina, and settled
on a plantation near Penny Hill. From that neighborhood he chose
and married Fanny Barham, and from that union were born Billie,
Ben, Barham, John and Dollie. Sometime in the early part of the
nineteenth century the whole family except John moved to the western
part of North Carolina. John went into business at what was then
called the County Line in Franklin County, North Carolina, and while

in business, in or about the year 1821, he married Elizabeth Upchurch, who was the daughter of James and Thany (nee: Butler) Upchurch. To that union were born five sons and one daughter; of the five sons I was the third and was born on January 25th, 1831 (as I was told afterwards in the midst of a great snow storm). My first recollection after my birth was the death of my sister when I was two years of age, and from that time until I was ten or twelve years of age, my mother having no daughters, the work of a girl fell upon me as well as the work of a boy. The girl's part consisted of cooking, washing dishes, laundering, and to play back and forth to the old fashioned spinning wheel to make thread to weave into cloth to clothe the family. The Boy's part of the work that fell on me was to keep wood for the house, hoe the truck patches, hold the calf off while milking, and very often I got a tickling with a sprout to keep me nimble and wide awake. 67,994

My father quit business after he got married and depended upon farming for the support of the family, but having no land of his own, he was forced to hire out we three elder boys to support the family, so I being the youngest of the three boys was hired out for twelve months at one dollar per month (poor pay and I guess poor work).

From that time, say from ten years of age, I was hired out until I was fifteen years of age at two dollars per month. By this time my father had purchased a tract of land and I was taken home to do duty on our own farm. My fourth brother (J.B.) who was younger than I, and who had never been hired out, was at home. He and I pitched in and felled the forest, ditched the low lands, fenced the fields, cultivated the same and soon had the land paid for. Before this, my eldest brother had married, and the next had taken a trip to Tennessee for a year, and by that means the greater part of the burden fell upon me.

At the age of eighteen and one-half years, my father set me free. Never having been to school a day, my first thought was to work some and to go to school some, so I had my mother gather up the few clothes I had, put them in a pillow case, and I took them under my arm and lit out to hunt for a job. The first man I saw that wanted to hire said he would take me two days at twenty-five cents per day. I accepted the proposition and gave him two faithful days' work, hilling corn in low grounds. At the end of the two days he paid me my wages, and I gathered my pillow case and moved on for the next job. So I left my native County of Franklin and crossed the line into Nash County and worked in turpentine for several days at twenty-five cents per day. I then hired myself to a man for one month for five dollars. At the expiration of that month or soon afterwards, I went to Black Creek Depot, now in Wilson County, N. C., boarded a train (for the first time) to Wilmington, N. C. The fare on the Railroad to Wilmington took the last cent of money I had in the world, but my brother was with me and he upheld me for a few days, until I could get work to do. It was but a few days before a contractor on a new railroad emplyed me at twelve dollars per month to help grade on said road. I not being used to such wages thought I had a fortune in sight, so I went to work with a vim for one and a

half months, which brought me to Christmas, 1849, at which time I applied for my wages, and applying was all, for I never got a cent. Well, there I was, wanting to visit my people and no means to do so. My next move was, on board a steamer that plyed between Wilmington, N. C., and Charleston, S. C., a distance of 181 miles at ten dollars per month. I continued on board of that boat as a deck hand for two months. I then drew my wages, rigged myself out with a new suit of clothes, hat and boots, and supplemented my pillow case with a new trunk. I then made a trip home to visit my people. I remained at home for a few months, and returned to Wilmington, sometime in the summer of 1850. My work after getting back was various. Sometimes my work was on a river steamer, sometime on the warf, sometime up the river cutting wood. By this time Christmas was drawing near, and I received a letter from my father requesting me to come home and assist him on the farm for the next year and that my pay should be a part of the crop, so I concluded to do so. I arrived at home near Christmas, and after the holidays, I set in on the farm with the understanding that after the crop was laid by, my father would board me so that I could attend the free school for a short time. Sure enough, when we laid by crop, I walked three miles to school which was held in a little log cabin which was about sixteen by eighteen feet square. Well I continued to go for one month and that was the beginning and the ending of my school days. Up to this time I had only made money enough to keep myself neatly dressed. I was wild and rude and had a great deal of fun with my neighbor boys, and the most of them seemed to like me. I had by this time past my twentieth year and I came to the conclusion that to live a single life was not very desirable, for I had tried that, so there was a girl in the neighborhood who I admired very much, so I ventured to call upon her, notwithstanding I had some doubts as regards to the result, nevertheless, I pressed my suit, and in a few months all was well. On the twelfth day of October, 1851, I led to the altar Miss Susan Pearce, and we both were made one. After our marriage, we were not certain where we should live, for neither of us had a home of our own. I became a tenant of my father for the next year and he settled us in the woods in a log cabin eighteen feet square, covered with slabs. Well it soon came time for us to move, so I procured a one ox cart and went to my wife's father after her goods to go housekeeping on, which consisted of one feather bed and covering, one homemade dressing table, and a few gourds to put lard in. My part of the furniture consisted of two old split-bottom chairs and one pine table that my mother gave to me. Notwithstanding I was in debt for money borrowed to buy my license to marry, I had saved from my share of the crop that year five barrels of corn and enough money to buy four hundred pounds of pork, so we were happy and pretty well contented with our lot in the world. In 1852 we went to work on the farm, my wife doing the necessary housework and the chopping on the farm, and I doing the plowing. The reward for our labors that year was a good crop. However we had to give my father one-half of all we made as rent for land and team.

In the Fall of that year, I came to the conclusion that I would try to have a little property of my own, so I bought the place we lived on from my father, containing thirty-five acres, and a horse

from another man, giving eighty-five dollars for the house and land, which money I borrowed from my uncle, my father going my security, which took me four years to repay principal and interest. In 1853, I went into the turpentine business in connection with my little farm, and the price of turpentine dropped so I made a failure.

In August of that year, I was elected Constable for our district; in which capacity I served four years, and the balance of the time up to 1861, I was deputised by the sheriff of our County to close up my unsettled matters and act for him in any capacity he might call upon me to do. My earnings, together with the product of my little farm, had enabled us to live reasonably well.

At this time my wife and I had six children born to us, three boys and three girls. Of that number only two survive at the writing of this sketch, viz, Mrs. J. B. Baker of Spring Hope, N. C., and Mrs. M. V. McDuffie of Asbury Park, N. J.

We hold up our head now, and behold the war cloud which is drawing nearer and nearer. Is this war between the States? Yes, Listen! At every city, town, village and country store, you could hear fife and drum, and the voice of the recruiting officer calling for volunteers. About this time the Southern Congress had passed a law to conscript every man between the age of twenty-one and fifty years. About the first of May, 1862, I put out to Camp Mangrum two miles west of Raleigh and volunteered and joined Capt. A. D. Crudups Company, which was Company B of the 47th regiment of North Carolina State Troops. After having my name enrolled, I obtained a pass home for seven days to arrange matters as best I could. When my pass expired, then came the trying time of my life. The idea that I had to leave my wife and four little children, never expecting to see them again, was almost death, though the force of circumstances compelled me to go. I joined my Company at Goldsboro, N. C. I was made First Sergeant of our Company on the first day I arrived at camp, which office I held during the war. Our command did guard duty in several parts of Eastern North Carolina, until the Fall of 1862, at which time we were ordered to Virginia to Camp Johnson below Petersburg, and while there my little son Erastus B. died at home with scarlet fever, but I was not allowed to go home to see him buried. On the 13th day of December our command was ordered to Kingston, N. C., at which place we met the Federal Troops for the first time. After skirmishing a few days the Yankees left. I shall not attempt to give all the places and dates I went during the war, but will further on give the names of our officers, so the reader of the history of the war can tell where our command was; but I shall give a few incidents in passing on over the period of the war. In June 1863, our command was rushed from North Carolina to Virginia to take part in the Seven Day's Battle around Richmond, but the battle had ended before we arrived. Our regiment was commanded at first by Col. Rogers, but he soon resigned and Col. Ferabow took his place. We were in Pedigrew's Brigade, Heath's division, A. P., Hills Corps and Lee's Army. I don't suppose there was a man in Lee's Army, but what loved him. He was a noble, kind hearted man. I was taken sick, carried to Lynchburg hospital and while I was sick my command was ordered with Lee's Army to

Gettysburg, where a very destructive battle was fought. Our Brigadier General Pedigrew was killed at Falling Water on his return from Gettysburg, and General McRae took command of our brigade. On November 27th, 1863, we met General Meade on the Rapidan River and drove him back. We then went into Winter quarters near Orange Court House, Va., and did guard duty until about the 4th of May, 1864, at which time we left camp and on the next day we met the enemy in the great battle of the Wilderness which lasted two or three days. In a day or two later, we were in the battle at Spottsylvania Court House, next at Mechanicsville, next at Cold Harbor. This brought us to sometime in June 1864. Now we go to Petersburg, and after a few days fighting, we threw up breastworks, preparatory for the siege of Petersburg and Richmond. Our line of breastwork was said to be some forty miles long, and some portions of the line were under a continuous fire for nearly nine months. We were very often called across the line to do battle, and very often we shifted our position to do duty as the case required. We continued to remain in and about the trenches until the 7th day of April, 1865, on which day Richmond fell. I was captured by the enemy, as a prisoner, and carried to Heart's Island, New York harbor, at which place I remained until about the 22nd of June, 1865. At that time I was taken to New York City at which place I remained three days. From New York I was taken to North Carolina by way of Moore Head City. On June 28, 1865 I landed home, having only received a slight wound during the four years war.

On reaching home, I found my wife and children well. The old man, Jacky Winborn, who had remained and been a father to my wife and children during the war was still with them, but he was taken sick in a few days after I got home and died on the 11th day of July, 1865.

I found things in a better condition when I got home than I really expected. The soldiers had taken nearly all they could lay their hand upon, such as cattle, meat, corn, fodder, etc., but my folks had managed to hide enough corn and meat to make out very well on, besides my wife had saved two bales of cotton, which when sold would constitute our money crop, which did us more good than that amount ever did us before or since. Our parents were slave owners and we anticipated a great portion of our wealth from that source, but behold the war had freed the negroes, and if we ever expected to have any property it must come from some other way. My people had a very nice little crop growing. Part of that and what I could gather up enabled me to finish paying for a tract of land I bought just before I went off to the war.

We now had to begin life anew, and the reconstruction period was upon us which was more terrible than war. The best of our white men were disfranchised and not allowed to take part in the government, either in county or state. The negroes held all the minor offices, such as constable, justice of the peace, juror, county commissioner, register of deeds, school committees, etc. The negroes, carpet-baggers and scalawags held such sway over the whites as to force them to band together for protection in a Society called the Ku Klux Klan which was very horrifying to the negro and caused them

to open their eyes. Things went on this way until 1876 when Governor Vance was elected Governor of North Carolina, and then matters became better but never came to rights until the negroes were disfranchised.

After the reconstruction flury blew over, I was appointed justice of the peace by the legislature, which office I held for several years and then resigned.

I had a little country store, that in connection with my farm enabled me to give my children a pretty fair education.

On the 7th day of March, 1891, the wife of my bosom who had shared the joys and troubles with me for nearly forty years died suddenly. She was a faithful wife, a dutiful mother and a Christian woman, and by them who knew her best loved her most. I was now left alone, all my children having married and gone. My only chance to keep house was to retain my negro cook. Sometime during the year I came to the conclusion that I could not keep house under my present circumstances and that it would be best for me to marry again. So on the 9th day of December, 1891, I led to the altar Mrs. N. H. Harris (nee: Chamblee) and we were made man and wife, and up to this time she has made me a faithful and loving wife, and I can say what most men cannot say, that I have had two, among the best women in the world.

I have been very prosperous in the world considering my chance. By close economy and strict attention to business, I have been enabled not only to educate my children, but to assist them to educate their children and establish their character in life. Besides this I have accumulated a righ pretty little estate, for which I am thankful. I have just entered into the 77th year of my age. I am still living in Franklin County, N. C., within five miles of where I was born.

Mrs. Walter Razzie Lee Upchurch, nee: Elva Era Burkhalter, of 77
Atlanta, TX has been a keen searcher for Upchurch family history for
many years. Her husband is the son of Walter Jackson Upchurch of the 74
Richard Upchurch III/Claburn Upchurch Subclan. Her interest has 63/70
extended to making connections with great historical figures of
several centuries ago. She has provided a packet of materials on
this work at my request. Eventually, we hope to digest her approach
and results and provide an extract of them for the readers of the UB.
She has done some outstanding work.

OUTLINE FOR THE BRITTON U. SUBCLAN OF THE RICHARD U. III
CLAN (CLAN 4).

Britton U. was b. ca 1787 in Franklin Co., NC, the son of 68
Richard U. III, Head of Upchurch Clan Number Four. He migrated 63
to Gwinnett Co., GA probably in the 1820's with his wife and
young children and appears to have died there sometime after 1850.

We first find Britton U. on the official record in the 1790 68
census for Franklin Co., NC. He is age 3 at the time and fits the
single male entry in the home who is under age 16. In the 1800
census of the same county we still find Britton U. age 13 in his 68
father's home being the only entry for the category male age 10-16.
Next we find him in the same county marrying on 20 FEB 1808 Elizabeth
Massey with Asa Massey and G. Hill, Jr. being bondsman and witness.
Britton would have been age 21 at the time. Elizabeth Massey was 2784
the dau of Asa (Asey) Massey and the gd of Pettipool Massey. These
Massey's were members of the Moccasin Creek Area of NC as were the
Upchurches and they were very close neighbors.

From 1808 through 1815 we find Britton U. on the tax rolls of
Franklin Co., NC but no tax for land is shown, only tax for one poll.
It is likely that he was farming on his father's place during this
time. In 1816 he acquired for one silver dollar from his father,
Richard U. III, 100 acres of land adjoining other land of his father, 63
and of his Uncle Benjamin U. This is recorded in Book 17, Pg. 172
of the March 1816 Court Session for Franklin Co., NC. Within a few
months the father died intestate so it would appear that father and
son were making final arrangements on a part of the father's estate.
We have not yet located a transaction whereby Britton disposed of this
100 acres. He inherited another 22 - 3/4ths acres from his father's
estate in 1817. This latter parcel was sold in 1825.

Britton U. had moved his family to Gwinnett Co., GA by 1830 as
he appeared on the census there in that year and in 1840 and 1850 as
well. Our present records show that Britton U. had three sons and a
daughter, b. 1810-1820 whose name is not yet known. There are obviously
many more details about this family to be uncovered.

Mrs. Elva Upchurch is a gifted member of our extended Upchurch family who deserves to be honored for her outstanding accomplishments in numerous fields. For many years she has been a tireless researcher of genealogical records for the Upchurch family and for her own lines. She has supplied a large amount of information which has appeared and will continue to appear in the UB. On 25 FEB 1925 she md. in Linden, TX, Walter Razzie Lee Upchurch, b. 4 MAY 1902 (Cass Co., TX). He is a 76 member of the Richard U. III/Claburn U. Subclan and also of the 63/70 Charles U./Charity U. Subclan. 164/-

Elva has made contributions to family history in many ways. She has had over 100 old photographs restored. She has been responsible for placing monuments at over 60 previously unmarked graves. Perhaps her most outstanding genealogical contribution has been through her participation and membership in the National Society of the Magna Charta Dames. We will further honor Elva here by introducing the readers of the UB to this National Society.

In England in the late 1100's and early 1200's the Kings were inclined to rule in a selfish way as many kings had done in many lands. The leaders in the country, called Barons, decided to bring some fairness to the system. On 15 JUN 1215 the Barons confronted King John and forced him to sign the "Articles of the Barons". This document was the immediate forerunner of the famous Magna Charta which became the model for later constitutions including our own USA Constitution drafted over five hundred years later. The Magna Charta had to do with freedom of worship and fairness in taxation. Of the 25 Barons who secured the Magna Charta

17 have descendants living today. To be a member of the National Society of the Magna Charta Dames you must be a direct female descendant of one of the above mentioned Barons. In 1985 Elva was able to provide this proof and was accorded membership. She says she will sponsor anyone who thinks they qualify and would like to try for membership. The cost for lifetime membership is \$125.00 plus you must provide documentation on your line. Once you get your line so far back records become available to help you complete the picture. Once you get this far you will find it easy to show a relationship to many ancient famous people. Elva writes: "My line through the Bible and down to my GreatGrandChildren total 148 Generations, through the KINGS (more than the Pharoahs) it is 142 Generations. There is no way I can count my Kings who are my ancestors. ---- All you have to do is get it back to one King or Queen. Queen Isabel was my lucky streak. ----- It is amazing what you can do if you try."

At first your Editor thought that it would be unusual for a present day citizen to be related to famous people of several centuries ago. However, after studying Elva's work and some other references it now becomes clear that we are all related to many famous people as you go back 500 years or more. This is because there were fewer people to be our ancestors 500 to 2000 years ago and many people of blood relation intermarried. This requires more explanation and an article entitled "Genealogical Consequences of Consanguinity (Blood Relations) in Marriage" appears elsewhere in this issue of the UB. We are especially indebted to Elva for enlightening us on this fascinating topic of family history.

Elva is a person of boundless energy who has proved that she can become a professional in almost any field. She is primarily a "Self-taught" person who has achieved many notable goals. She taught herself to play numerous musical instruments and she is a soloist with a perfect pitch. She has a record of almost 30 years of not missing Sunday School where she is a certified teacher. For over 50 years she was a pianist for the First Nazarene Church in Atlanta, TX. For many years she has had a role over radio station KALT. She gives the weather and spiritual messages and is known affectionately as "The Hickory-Nut Mountain Lady". Her accomplishments have been the subject of several newspaper articles.

Elva, b. 19 DEC 1905, in Atlanta, TX is the daughter of Thomas Taylor Burkhalter and Nancy Evelyn (Morgan) Burkhalter. Their heritage in Cass Co., TX begins prior to the Civil War. Elva and Razzie had 3 children and they have 3 grandchildren and 5 greatgrandchildren.

There is yet one more reason we pay this tribute to Elva. That is because she is not an Upchurch except by marriage and yet she has enriched Upchurch family history immensely by her research and her sharing. In extending our special thanks to Elva we extend by implication thanks to all those individuals who have married into our family and adopted it fully. These insights help us to visualize our Upchurch heritage more easily and provide a number of interesting bits of information. One of these is on the name Little Berry. In the 1800s the names Little Berry and Green Berry were popular given names and the two variations appear numerous times in the extended Upchurch family. There is always the question of whether the spelling should be as one word or two as in Little Berry Phillips or Littleberry Phillips or as in Green Berry U., or Greenberry U. We have normally opted for using the name as two words, as this satisfies our quest for every person to have two given names where possible. In this case we are vindicated because Little Berry Phillips definitely signs his card L. B. Phillips.

We are yet to learn the name of the large Baptist Church for which Little Berry Phillips was Sunday School Superintendent. Presumably it was in Raleigh, NC, and in that case the church would have to have been the First Baptist Church on Capitol Square (where your Editor courted his wife and listened to the preaching of Reverend Broadus Jones, one of the most eloquent preachers of all time), or the Tabernacle Baptist Church on Moore Square (where your Editor married Miss Sallaine Sledge exactly forty years ago next August 21, 1988).

The Phillips family is very large and has a long history in the Moccasin Creek Area of central NC where Richard U. II settled about 1755. There are many, many intermarriages for the Upchurch and Phillips families and especially so for the descendants of Richard U. III, the ggf of Little Berry Phillips, since Richard U. III and many of his descendants remained in the Moccasin Creek Area.

It is with great regret that we report the death of Walter McGowan Upchurch, Jr., a noted member of the Richard U. III/James U. Subclan. An exchange of correspondence with his brother, Herbert Jackson U., Sr., of Columbia, SC has brought us all the details. Your editor's first contact with Walter came through a phone call while on a visit to New York, NY on 22 APR 1979. Subsequently, we exchanged correspondence and conferred at his residence in Durham, NC. Walter was a graduate of Duke University with an A.B. degree in 1931 and a law degree in 1936. He held a variety of administrative posts at Duke and was an outstanding performer there. The war and follow-on duties with Shell Development and Shell Oil Companies led to outstanding accomplishments in industry also. He retired from Shell in 1971, having risen to Senior Vice President of the Shell Companies Foundation. His devotion to Duke had never wavered and throughout his life he served the institution. In 1964 he became a Duke Trustee. He is especially remembered as Founder of Duke's Summer School Chapel Choir and for his service to students. Memorial service for James David Upchurch (born 10375
January 28, 1857-died July 7, 1901) and wife, Ann Chadwick 22318
(born July 6, 1857 - died November 3, 1935) was held at
2:30 p.m. at Mid-Way Park, Boles, Ark., July 10, 1950.

James David was reared on the old Upchurch place three miles east of Hackett, Arkansas.

Safrona Ann Chadwick was born in Georgia, later moved to Chickamauga, Tenn. After the Civil War her mother brought her, an only child, to live on the Upchurch farm at Hackett. They occupied a small log house near the big farm house.

David and Ann played, hoed in the fields, went to school together and when they grew up they were married, January 20, 1878. A big dinner was held in the Upchurch home in honor of the occasion as was the custom in those days. David and Ann lived in the same vicinity until there were nine children. They moved to Cameron, Oklahoma, where two more children were born. Then in 1897 they moved to Scott County, Arkansas, and settled on a farm near Weeks. Their twelfth child was born here. The family now consisted of twelve children and Mrs. Upchurch's mother who made her home with them.

At the young age of 43 years James David was taken ill and died, July 7, 1901. Two years later the grandmother passed away, leaving Ann to carry on alone with her twelve children and many debts and no means of support. Never for a moment did she falter. She bought a farm at Weeks and she and her children toiled to make it a success.

The sweetest tribute to be paid to this valiant Christian mother was by her oldest child Alice who said, "She was not afraid of anything. She was not afraid her children would starve. She was not afraid they might go wrong. They would all lie down to sleep in an open hallway at night - she was not the least bit afraid they would be harmed."

Scripture: Proverbs 31: 10 - "Who can find a virtuous woman? For her price is far above rubies." The above are excerpts from the memorial message delivered by James L. Neal of Springdale, Ark., son-in-law in the Upchurch family.

The meeting closed by singing "Bless be the Tie that Binds.""

generation in the Richard U. III/Britton U. I Subclan

Britton U. I (not to be confused with his nephew,
 Britton U. II, aka James Britton U.) was Head of the
 Richard U. III/Britton U. I Subclan. He was born,
 raised and had all of his children born in Franklin Co,
 NC. Sometime between 1823 and 1830 he moved his family
 to Gwinnett Co., GA, having been granted a Cherokee Land
 Grant there (Lot 572, 1st Dist. 4th Section). None of
 his siblings moved to this county with him and many of
 his descendants remained in this county and multiplied.
 Thus, we have the fortunate circumstance that the history
 of Upchurches in Gwinnett Co., GA is the history of the
 Richard U. III/Britton U. I Subclan. Undoubtedly, we
 will continue to mine this genealogical vein for years
 to come. In due course, we hope the Upchurch Archives
 will be plentifully supplied with maps, histories and
 stories of Gwinnett Co., GA Upchurches.

VI. OUTLINE OF SELECTED CLANS OR SUBCLANS

Outline Of The Richard U,III/Larkin U. Subclan 63/66

Most of the Upchurch subclans headed by sons of Richard U., III, have been outlined in previous issues of the UB. We have deferred portraying the Richard U.,III/Larkin U., subclan in hopes that more details would appear. However, the time has come to tell what we do know which is as follows:

 - (I) Richard U., III (Head of Clan No. 4) 63
 - (A) Larkin U., b. ca 1795 (p. Franklin Co., NC), p. d. ca 1845 (p. Franklin Co., NC), md. p. ca 1815 (p. Franklin Co., NC). 66
 - (1) Dau, b. ca 1817 (p. Franklin Co., NC).
 - (2) Son, b. ca 1816 (p. Franklin Co., NC).
 - (3) Son, b. ca 1832 (p. Franklin Co., NC).
 - (4) Dau, b. ca 1838 (p. Franklin Co., NC).

Our best estimate is that Larkin U. had two dau and two sons as shown above. However, the exact number, age and sex of his children remain an open question. 66

Some aspects of the life of Larkin U. are well documented. The Franklin Co., NC Court papers dealing with the estate of Richard U., III, following his death in 1817 show clearly that Larkin U. was a son and heir of the deceased. This son received 18 -3/4 acres of land from the estate. He also purchased odd items at the estate sale. We next find him on the 1820 tax rolls of Franklin Co., NC. Then we find him as head of a household on the 1830 census of Franklin Co., NC as follows: 66

- Male - age 30-40 (Larkin U.) 66
- Female - age 10-15 (Daughter)
- Female - age 30-40 (Larkin's wife)
- Female - age 70-80 (Larkin's mother or mother-in-law)
- Male - slave age 10-24

From this 1830 census we deduce that Larkin U. was b.
1790-1800 (hence ca 1795) and that he had a daughter b.
1815-1820 (hence ca 1817).

For the corresponding 1840 census of Franklin Co., NC,
we have Larkin U. again as head of a household as follows:

Male - age 5-10

Male - age 20-30 (Son)

Male - age 40-50 (Larkin U.)

Female - age 0-5

Female - age 30-40

Female - age 40-50 (Larkin's wife)

The daughter in the home in 1830 does not appear in 1840,
most likely having married. A younger female and a younger
male have been added. However, the male age 20-30 in the
household in 1840 was not recorded in 1830, creating somewhat
of a puzzle.

Larkin U. does not appear on the 1850 census of Franklin
Co., NC, nor have we yet found him elsewhere. This leads us
to hypothesize that he died before 1850 (hence d. ca 1845).

Otherwise, we find Larkin U. on the records of Franklin
Co., NC, as follows:

1. In a will dated 1 MAY 1833, James U. left his son
Kearney U. 278 acres in Franklin Co., NC, on
Moccasin Creek. This tract adjoined land owned
by Larkin U.

2. In 1838 Larkin U. deeded land in Franklin Co., NC,
to Matthew Johnson - Bk 27, Pg 542.

3. In the SEP 1838 Franklin Co., NC, Court records,
Larkin U. appeared as a participant in a court case.

4. The estate inventory for William Dunn was processed
in Franklin Co., NC, in 1833-1834. Larkin U. is
mentioned.

Item 4 above causes us to speculate that Larkin U. md.
a daughter of William Dunn.

We can find no other Larkin U. born before 1810, so
all records bearing the name of such a person born before
1810 must refer to the Larkin U. with which this article is
concerned.

At this point our presentation turns to an item
produced from the lifelong genealogical efforts of our
Cousin Elva Era (Burkhalter) Upchurch of Atlanta, TX.
In a letter dated 2 FEB 1978, she provided information on
a Larkin Church family found on the 1850 census of Walker
Co., GA. Elva speculates, probably correctly so, that
this Larkin Church is in fact Larkin Upchurch. The details
on the family are as follows:

Larkin Church (Larkin Upchurch) b. 1815 (NC)

Zachariah _____ (son), b. 1849 (Walker Co., GA).

The presently known facts would accommodate a Larkin U.,
b. 1815 (NC) as a member of the John U., III Clan or as a
member of the Richard U., III Clan. We know that John U. III
had a son John U. who had a son Larkin U., b. ca 1816.
This Larkin U. is found on the 1850, 1860 and 1870 census
records for Wilkes Co., NC. It seems, therefore, unlikely
that Larkin U., son of John U., is the Larkin U. who
appears in Walker Co., GA in 1850. We are left with the
strong belief that the Larkin U. on the 1850 census of
Walker Co., GA is, indeed, the son of Larkin U., b.
ca 1795. Still, there are puzzles on the matter. If
Larkin U., b. ca 1795 had a son Larkin U., b. 1815, the
son should have been in his father's household in 1830,
and no such age male was shown on the 1830 census of
Franklin Co., NC, for the Larkin U. household. It is
peculiar that a male of the right age did appear in 1840.
There is a male age 20-30 in the Larkin U. household in
1840 which could account for a son, Larkin U., b. 1815.
Perhaps, this son was simply missed in the 1830 census.

It is possible to rationalize that the Larkin U. on
the 1850 census was married and living in the home of his
father, Larkin U., as shown on the 1840 census of
Franklin Co., NC. The son, Larkin U., b. 1815, would
have been the male age 20-30. His wife would have been
the female age 30-40. The male age 5-10 and the female
age 0-5 would have been their small children. This

does not match-up perfectly with the 1850 Walker Co. census details which translate into daughters age 9 and 6 and into a son age 1, as of 1840. Although there is not an exact match as to number, age, and sex, it is still tempting to speculate that the Larkin U. family on the 1850 Walker Co., GA census was in fact living with the household's father in 1840. Two other bits of information reinforce the logic of our speculation. One is that the female age 30-40 in the 1840 household is not found as a 20-30 year old female in the 1830 census, hence she could easily have been added to the 1840 household as a daughter-in-law. The other is that the 1840 household still has a female of the right age to have been the wife of Larkin U., b. ca 1795. (That is the female (wife) age 30-40 on the 1830 census repeats as a female (wife) age 40-50 on the 1840 census). This reduces the temptation to speculate that Larkin U., b. 1795 remarried and as of 1840 had two young children by his new wife.

All the above leaves ones head "swimming" as regards Larkin U., b. ca 1795 and his family. However, we shall, no doubt, know more by and by.

It should be noted that the comprehensive presentation of Upchurch families in GA in UB, Vol. 10, No. 4, did not include the 1850 records for a Larkin U. of Walker Co., GA. We had the information in hand but were not smart enough to realize it and make it a part of the presentation. A quick look at our GA census records for 1860 and beyond does not reveal Upchurch information from Walker Co., GA, nor have the members of this Larkin U., b. 1815 family surfaced as individuals. There is the outside chance this family may indeed be a "Church" and not an "Upchurch" family.

We will welcome help of any sort in giving more form and substance to the Richard U., III/Larkin U. Subclan. 63/66

We are fortunate to have this picture of Rowena U. 1228
(AKA Roena) who was b. 1814 in Franklin Co., NC. She was
part of the movement in the early 1800s which involved the
migration of many North Carolinians to Georgia. Her
father, Claburn U. I, was born and raised in Franklin Co., 70
NC and there married Amey Bunn. Rowena was their 71,1228
third child. They had two more children before moving to
Hancock Co., GA about 1820 when Rowena was about six years 1228
old. There she grew to be a young adult and there married
in 1831 at age 17, Kinon Branam (AKA Kenyon Brannon or 1239
Branon). Kinon was from Putnam County, GA, which adjoins 1239
Hancock County, GA on the west. It appears that this young
couple moved to Putnam County, GA shortly after they were

married and it is likely that their ten children were all born in Putnam County, GA.

Rowena, b. ca 1877 in Putnam County, GA and was preceded in death there by her husband who passed away 13 FEB 1875. He is buried in the Carter/Branham Cemetery in Putnam County, GA, and we presume his wife is buried there also. We would like to know the exact location of this burial site. We presume it may be near the Crooked Creek Primitive Baptist Church where Rowena and her husband were known to be members in 1845. We would be pleased to learn more about where this couple lived in Putnam County, GA, and whether or not they lived at just one location or several. 1228

The movements of Rowena (Upchurch) Branam during her lifetime were played out against the backdrop of related movements by other members of her family. These related movements have been addressed in various issues of the UB and we will return to them from time-to-time. We are always anxious to add more to our storehouse of knowledge about such movements and will welcome contributions in this regard. 1228
