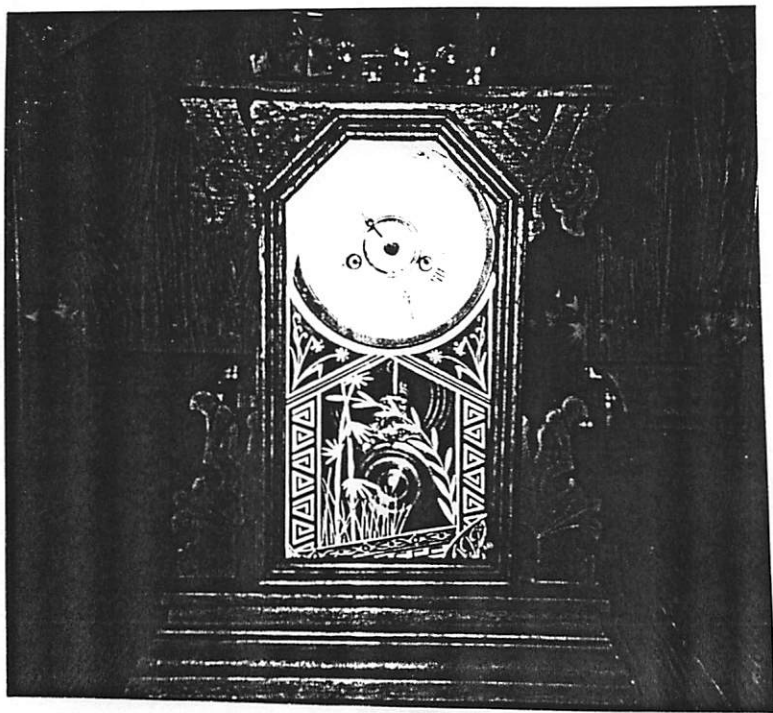
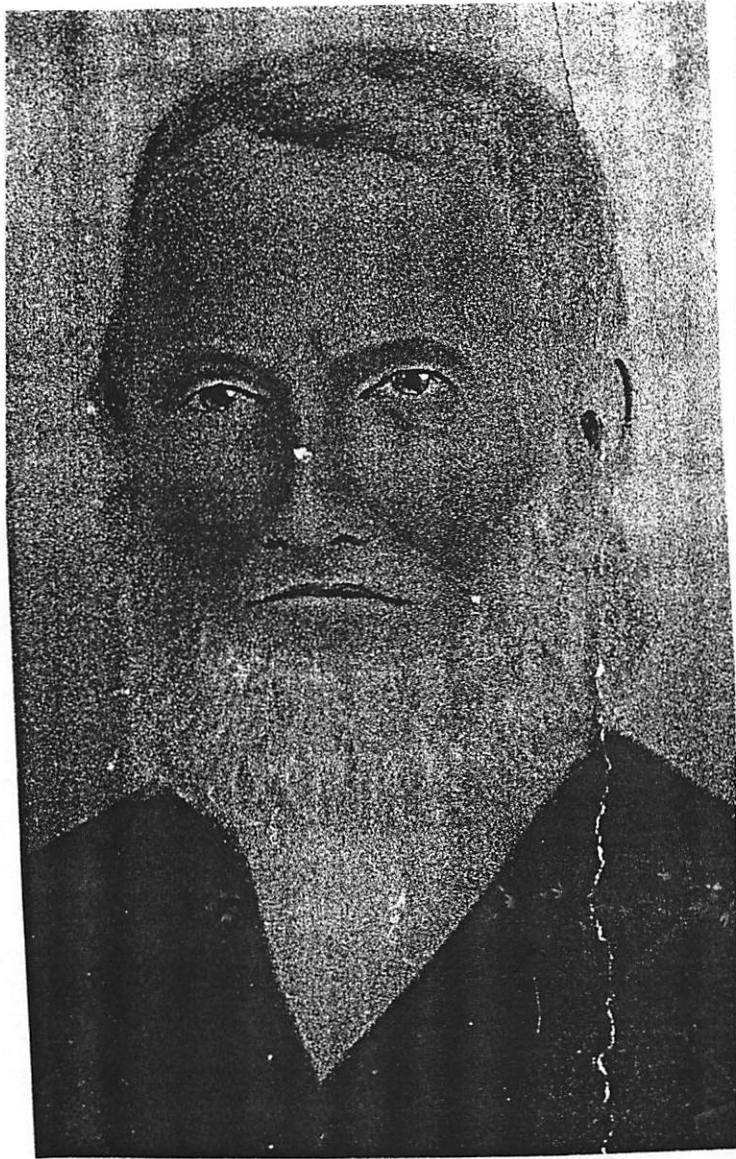

Re the 16 issues you ordered for 1989-1992 (4 years x 4 issues/year) - all have been sent except two issues - 1991 Issue #3 + 1992 Issue #4. We are out of print on these two and will reprint + send copies to you as soon as we can get to it.

As you go over these issues please let me know if you spot any errors and if you have any questions. It is always nice to have someone else looking at the UB with a critical eye.

Upchurch Records for Texas has recently received a boost. Cousin Charles Peterson is a great worker of the Internet. He discovered that the State of Texas now has their Vital Records indexed and on line. He downloaded all the Upchurch marriages, births, deaths, etc and sent me a copy. I am in the process of extracting these and making a separate profile sheet for each individual involved to be placed in my profile systems. There will add several thousand sheets. I'm just glancing through these records & recognize a number of names you and I encountered when we were with you in Texas in 1996. her husband was buried at the Pluto Cemetery it seems likely she would have been buried there but I have no evidence one way or the other.

Your Page 8 concerns the 1880 Census for Ellis Co, TX for John and Sarah W. U. The John U is John C. U, son of Richard U, II of the Richard U, III/Clarence U, I Subdan - Richard U, IV line. This John is another brother of your Amey Ann. However, I can't figure out how the Sarah fits in. She could be a wife of John but seem a little old. She is not his mother. I have been marrying 1st Sally Hamby and 2nd Lou Wigginton - but no Sarah.

Your Page 9 concerns the 1880 Census of Ellis Co, TX for the John U Family. This is John A. U, son of James A. U of the Harmon U/Allen U Subdan - James A. U line.

The documents you sent set me to thinking about the children of John and Amey Ann (U) washer. I recopied my marked outline and copies of the two resulting pages are enclosed. We have 8 children listed and there seems to be good evidence for all of them. However,

The 1900 Census shows Amey Ann had, as of that date (and she would have had no more after that being 53 years old in 1900), a total of 9 children of whom 7 were still living. The 7 still living fit well with the 8 we have listed as all except Henrietta were still living as of 1900. However, where is the 9th child. There are some gaps in the list which could allow for 1, 2 or 3 more children, stillbirths, abortions or early infant deaths - for example in 1875/1876 or 1882/1883 or 1889 (unborn at age 42 ??). Since the census shows 9 I suspect that is the correct number although we may never know the birth date or name of the unidentified child.

More puzzling is that the obituary of John Washer in 1903 shows him to have 8 children - 4 Males & 4 Females. This takes us back to the 8 we have listed - except that we show 3 Males and 5 females - A puzzle !!

I have listed what is missing on the 8 children - maybe you have answers to some of the questions

I have a new queen 1997 F150 V8 4WD Ford 1/2 ton pickup. It is not as sharp as your red outfit but I have wanted one for two years and am proud of it. I need a stepladder to get in.

REC'D 9 OCT 1996

I am enclosing some more information for you: Page one is a plat of the area of the Pluto Cemetery; notice the road west of the cemetery is called Benz's Chapel Rd. + further west is the Hill Co. & Ellis Co. line. Page two is the marriage date of Dave Upchurch + his first cousin ~~the~~ Elizabeth Nasher. Page three is the 1900 Hill Co Census, with my Grand Parents + Great Grand Parents. Nolie + Susie Bailey + Rufus K. Bailey + family

Page four is of my other Great Grand parents
John + Amy Ann Nasher + family, notice
below them is their son-in-law George Gardner
with his two boys Clyde + Calvin Gardner.
His wife Henrietta has already died.

They are living in Hill Co. + living not far from
their daughter Susie Nasher Bailey.

Page five is William Upchurch + his family.

William is buried in Tusca, Ga.

Page six is my Grand parents + Great Grand parents
+ further down is the family of Nathaniel Bailey
brother to Nelsie.

Page seven is of a John + Josie Upchurch. Is this
the Upchurch of Italy, W. Va? It lists the
mother as Martha S. I, also, have a
Martha Susan Upchurch of Ellis Co. dying in 1916

Page eight is a John + Sarah Upchurch. Is
this a son + Mother + who are they?

Page nine is a John A + Mary Upchurch of
Ellis Co. Who are they?

Hopefully, I'll have news soon concerning

Not only do we learn that the church at Pluto was called BARRY CHAPEL, we learn that at her death on 6 NOV 1928 the only surviving child of Richard U, IV was John C. U. of Vaughan, TX. I have written to Ed Gooding and have asked if he might be willing to pay a visit to Vaughan to see if there are any cemeteries in the area and if so to learn if any Upchurch Family members are buried there. I have also suggested that he ask if anyone in the community recalls John C. U. or knows anything of his descendants. I don't know if Ed wants to do this or even if he is up to it. In any case it was about time I wrote him.

I am delighted to learn that plans for working on the Pluto cemetery are progressing. This letter should arrive just before or just after your meeting on the 29th. I will be anxious to learn the results of your meeting. Having a video of the meeting sounds great. I hope we can also have a still photo of the group. My first thought in sending these items to you was to see if you might visit with your mother (or anyone else) to see if you might get any more information about any of the entries on our list for the Pluto Cemetery. Any improvement at all would be welcomed - such as what does an initial stand for, who were the parents of any of the individuals, etc. Naturally, I am looking for Upchurch related material but any additions to the list would be in order (including people known to be buried there but not on the list).

After getting this list organized I realized that most of the burials involved people who died before your mother was around. Still, I recall that you said she went to Geneva at Pluto. Maybe she will remember a few details.

Having returned to these lists several times I am now convinced that the R. E. J. Upchurch (1817-1907) on the 1979 list (but not on our 10 APR 1996 list) was none other than Richard Upchurch, IV - your Greatgreatgrandfather. I have spent an hour or so going over my records and

can find no contradictory records. Furthermore, I suspect (just speculation) that the Sarah M. U (1829-1894) is his 2nd wife and that the R. E. U (1854-1897) is a previously unidentified son of Richard U, III. With this in hand the Pluto Cemetery takes on more significance.

I trust all is well with you. Life is very exciting at this end. I have just bought a 278 acre farm (we close 24500) and have hired an operator to help me run it. Now I have to buy a tractor, planter, etc. Also I will sell off 120 acres of the tract in 10 acre tracts to keep my hand in the real estate business. Also we have started getting the brush off of an area to seed to pasture with a view towards getting some cows. We'll see how it works out.

I enjoyed meeting your Uncle Johnny and would like to figure out what I have in the way of summaries that you might pass on to him. The "loose milk" story he told was great and I have already told it to several people.

Gene, please drop me a line about any information that you have that is new. I think I have processed everything you have sent. I'll go over your file again when I next hear from you. In the meantime I'll be going over the records and details we collected on the trip to make sure everything gets into Biopiles and onto Master outlines.

The citizen-soldiers who fought for the Confederacy personified the best qualities of America. The preservation of liberty and freedom was the motivating factor in the South's decision to fight the second American Revolution. The tenacity with which Confederate soldiers fought underscored their belief in the rights guaranteed by the Constitution. These attributes are the underpinning of our democratic society and represent the foundation on which this nation was built.

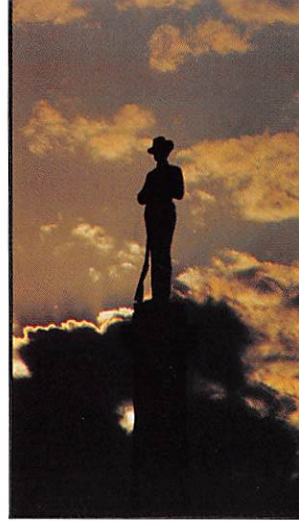

Today, the Sons of Confederate Veterans is preserving the history and legacy of these heroes, so future generations can understand the motives that animated the Southern Cause.

The SCV is the direct heir of the United Confederate Veterans, and the oldest hereditary organization for male descendants of Confederate soldiers. Organized at Richmond, Virginia, in 1896, the SCV continues to serve as a historical, patriotic, and non-political organization dedicated to insuring that a true history of the 1861-1865 period is preserved.

Membership in the Sons of Confederate Veterans is open to all male descendants of any veteran who served honorably in the Confederate armed forces. Membership can be obtained through either direct or collateral family lines and kinship to a veteran must be documented genealogically. The minimum age for membership is 12.

Proof of kinship to a Confederate soldier can take many forms. The easiest method is to contact the archives of the state from which the soldier fought and obtain a copy of the veteran's military service record. All Southern states' archives have microfilm records of the soldiers who fought from that state, and a copy of the information can be obtained for a nominal fee. In addition, the former Confederate states awarded pensions to veterans and their widows. All of these records contain a wealth of information that can be used to document military service.

The SCV has a network of genealogists to assist you in tracing your ancestor's Confederate service.



The SCV has ongoing programs at the local, state and national levels which offer members a wide range of activities. Preservation work, marking Confederate soldiers' graves, historical re-enactments, scholarly publications, and regular meetings to discuss the military and political history of the War Between the States are only a few of the activities sponsored by local units, called camps.

All state organizations, known as Divisions, hold annual conventions, and many publish regular newsletters to the membership dealing with statewide issues. Each Division has a corps of officers elected by the membership who coordinate the work of camps and the national organization.

Nationally, the SCV is governed by its members acting through elected delegates to the annual convention. The General Executive Council, composed of elected and appointed officers, conducts the organization's business between conventions. The administrative work of the SCV is conducted at the national headquarters, 'Elm Springs,' a restored ante-bellum home at Columbia, Tennessee.

In addition to the privilege of belonging to an organization devoted exclusively to commemorating and honoring Confederate soldiers, members are eligible for other benefits. Every member receives the *Confederate Veteran*, the bi-monthly national magazine which contains in-depth historical articles on the war along with news affecting Southern heritage. The programs of the SCV range from assistance to undergraduate students through the General Stand Watie Scholarship to medical research grants given through the Brooks Fund. National historical symposiums, reprinting of rare historical books, and the erection of monuments are just a few of the other projects endorsed by the SCV.

The SCV works in conjunction with other historical groups to preserve Confederate history. However, it is not affiliated with any organization other than the Military Order of the Stars and Bars, composed of male descendants of the Southern officer corps. The SCV rejects any group whose actions tarnish or distort the image of the Confederate soldier or his reasons for fighting.

If you are interested in perpetuating the ideals that motivated your Confederate ancestor, the SCV needs you. The memory and reputation of the Confederate soldier, as well as the motives for his suffering and sacrifice, are being consciously distorted by some in an attempt to alter history. Unless the descendants of Southern soldiers resist those efforts, a unique part of our nation's cultural heritage will cease to exist.
