The New American Upchurch Index Tree

This tree is a compilation of all 19 UAFA Upchurch clan trees and includes 75,020 Upchurch ancestors, 3,043 photos, 110 stories and 32,615 records. It also follows Ancestry.com privacy standards, so we can allow anyone to view the tree who has an Ancestry.com account. Because of privacy standards, living people cannot be viewed by the public so searches should begin with older generations. Information about living people is being added daily by UAFA Tree Masters but only becomes visible to the general public after the person is



deceased (the same reason that census records are sealed for 72 years and referred to as the Right to Privacy Act).

Each January we plan to replace the

previous year's Index tree with a new one that will capture all the improvements/additions/corrections to the Clan trees from the previous year. The Index will then remain static until it is replaced by the next year's tree.

There are a couple of interesting and useful UAFA-specific features in the tree: First, most individuals can be traced back to an Upchurch clan head who lived in the colonial era of America. After the clan head is identified, the user can opt to switch to the Clan tree to see the latest available information or just continue to use the big tree. A good example of the purpose

and use of this function can be seen in my grandfather, David Joshua "Davy" Upchurch's line. His father is descended from William U. IV and his mother from William U. IV and Charles U. On his pedigree view all three lines are visible. He can be traced back to Clan Heads William U. IV and Charles U. in this single tree. Check it out by clicking here. (Note: An Ancestry.com account is necessary for this link to work).

The other unique feature sprinkled throughout the Index and Clan trees is smiley face emojis in some of the names. At first glance they may look a little funky, but they are important as the emojis signify a marriage to an extended family member—we like to call them "kissing cousins". If the marriage crosses clans, there will be links in the individual trees directing the reader to both clans for pedigree and descendant information.

UAFA Upchurch Trees in Ancestry.com can be accessed two ways. In both cases, you will be prompted to sign in to your Ancestry.com account or set one up if you haven't done so already (a free 2-week trial is available). The first approach is to <u>click here</u>. After the page opens, select "View all" in the right upper

corner and all the UAFA trees will be displayed. The second approach requires a few more clicks but works from anywhere there is an Internet connection: Sign into www.ancestry.com; Select "Search" at the top of the page; Choose "Member Search" from the drop box; type in "Phil Upchurch"; Choose the top option; when the page opens, select "View all" in the top right of the screen.

We hope this new feature will boost the pleasure and success for those interested in the pursuit of family genealogy and history.

One lady was able to identify the two photographs depicted on this page, which also came from Debbie Brennum's grandmothers trunk. Joan Buck de Korte posted the following:

Mary BUCK married Jim UPCHURCH, and Sarah BUCK married Jim REED. They were sisters.

Mary born, 16 July 1885, died 14 May 1908. Sarah was born 1889

and died 1918. The children of John L. and Malvina BEATY.
John L. was the son of Squire BUCK, the son of John HICKMAN and Mary ANGLE.
John HICKMAN was the ninth child of Thomas and Mary RANGE BUCK. Thomas was the elder brother of my grandfather Jonathan BUCK.

John HICKMAN 1825 -- 1860, was killed during the Civil War at Olympus, Tennessee. Mary ANGLE was the daughter of Squire and Mary ANGLE.

Mary and Sarah's sister, Martha BUCK, born 17 Aug. 1891. She married Rosier REED, 24 Jan. 1909.

This couples' daughter Grace REED married Ernest BUCK. who live in Pall Mall and are my dearest cousins. Ernest is the son of my grandfather BUCK's brother David BUCK.
