New Milestone Achieved by UAFA By Jay Buck

In the Allied Families Research Center in Chesterfield, MO there are twenty vertical file cabi-

nets, each containing four drawers. These cabinets hold several hundred thousand Biofiles, each devoted to a specific person. These Biofiles were assembled by Phil Upchurch over a forty-year period based on his own research as well as inputs from over a thousand family history cooperators. Biofiles were created primarily for American Upchurches and their descendants and for non-Upchurches (Allied Families) who lived nearby and were inter-connected with the Upchurch family.

The end result is a wide and diverse body of information dealing with land ownership, occupations, lifestyles, and political landscapes associated with individuals



who lived in particular communities throughout America. But perhaps of greatest importance to the

family historian are the interviews carried out by Phil and the comments and musings that he added over the course of his research. These observations by Phil help bring to life the stories of our ancestors' time on this earth.

Now UAFA is pleased to announce that these Biofiles can now be accessed through our website. In the course of over two years, Debbie Spitzer, Nancy McClintock, and Maureen and Jay Buck have prepped and scanned these Biofiles so that they can be accessed through our website, www.alliedfamilies.com. One can find these Biofiles under the resources tab. A dropdown menu will offer three options: Transcribed Biofiles, Upchurch

Biofiles by given name, and Biofiles of Allied Families by surname. Transcribed Biofiles are those individual Biofiles that have been typed by volunteers such as Carla Michaels, Hope Blackford and others. Since these transcribed Biofiles are typed and in PDF format, one can easily search the document. The other Biofiles are those that were handwritten by Phil. But in order to make these Bioflies easier to access, they have been bookmarked so that given names of Upchurches and the surnames of Allied Families can be searched. By press time, all of the Biofiles will be on the website. But be advised that this is the "beta" version and there are likely to be

errors, bad links and so on. If one should encounter any problems, or have any comments, please contact Jay Buck at jay.buck@alliedfamilies.org.

Now that the Biofiles have been scanned, the next step is for the entire collection of Phil's original work to be sent on to North Carolina State University for inclusion in the Robert Phillip Upchurch Collection. The work of Phil Upchurch in both plant sci-

ence and in his exhaustive work on family history will be preserved in both its original form, and as a digital version, for generations to come.

The History of Memorial Day

Monday [May 30, 2020] in the United States is Memorial Day, a day of remembrance for those who died in our nation's service. The origins of this day of remembrance are in doubt, with more than two dozen cities and towns laying claim to being the birthplace of Memorial Day. There is also evidence that organized women's groups in the South were decorating graves before the end of the Civil War.

Originally called Decoration Day, the holiday was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic: "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land."

It is believed that the end of May was chosen for the first Memorial Day because "flowers would be in bloom all over the country."

The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York, in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days un-til after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war). In 1971 Memorial Day was declared a national holiday to be held on the last Monday in May. In addition, several southern states have an additional, separate day for honoring their Confederate (Civil War) dead as follows:

Mississippi: Last Monday in AprilAlabama: Fourth Monday in April

• Georgia: April 26

North Carolina: May 10South Carolina: May 10


Louisiana: June 3

Tennessee (Confederate Decoration Day): June 3

• Texas (Confederate Heroes Day): January 19


