




Ed Mabry built this rustic grist mill near Meadows of Dan on unusually flat land that lacked a stream strong enough to generate power for milling. So he and his wife Lizzie began buying land in order to gain the water rights. By 1914, they had purchased five small parcels and built an extensive flume system. A small dam stored the runoff from rains and spring thaws.

The Mabrys operated two sets of stones, one for grinding cornmeal and the other for a grain mixture fed to livestock. Although the mill was smaller than most, Mabry was able to gain many loyal customers. Many of them also were drawn by the blacksmith shop, sawmill and carpentry shop he operated. Throughout his life, Ed Mabry was known as a talented handyman. "Carry it on to Ed" was common advice when repairs of any kind were required.

After he died in 1936, his wife operated the mill for a while on her own. When designing the Parkway in the 1930s and '40s, landscape architects quickly chose Mabry Mill as one of the special scenic places to be preserved. Although the mill remains operational, it grinds meal only occasionally. Just as it did when the Mabrys ran it, the mill remains a focal point of the community and a gathering place for neighbors.

Dear Cousin Phil:

I really <u>did</u> receive your letter regarding Fannie GAY Wootton's speculation that Frances UPCHURCH was actually the daughter of a GAY/widow of an UPCHURCH rather than the daughter of Jubal UPCHURCH. You will recall that you asked my opinion of this. Mrs. Wootton's claim probably has merit. Although it is not <u>prima facia</u> evidence for the relationship, it is basically founded on two primary sources:

- (1) the Franklin County Marriage bond of Williford UPCHURCH to Frances GAY (19 December 1820).
- (2) the Franklin County will of Thomas GAY (written 2 February 1837), which names his daughter Francess BAKER, and

However, Mrs. Wootton asserts that the Frances GAY of the marriage bond was the daughter of Thomas and Agnes GAY. What evidence does she have for this, i.e. that the Frances GAY of the 1820 marriage is indeed the same person as the Frances BAKER daughter/heir of Thomas GAY in 1837? She also states that the Frances GAY of the 1820 marriage bond "would have made her about 15 years old when she got married." Although 15 years is a reasonable marriageable age for a girl, I know of no evidence that this particular Frances [GAY][UPCHURCH][BAKER] was born around 1805. I estimated that Blake BAKER's wife Frances was born about 1800, but this was based on census records of age ranges of white females in the household. Neither of these gaps, however, detract from the importance and significance of two primary sources.

On the other hand, my speculation that Frances UPCHURCH was the daughter of Jubal UPCHURCH is just as shaky, if not less so. I am enclosing a copy of my 1989 letter to you, rather than repeat my arguments at the time. My argument, however, is at a disadvantage - it is not based on any primary source documents, only assumptions and unusual similarities (which may themselves have value here). On this basis, Mrs. Wootton's claims should probably have precedence. I would not make an out of hand dismissal of either.

You added some important information with the 1829 James UPCHURCH deed to Frances UPCHURCH. To me, the location of this property (in Wake County on the south side of Moccasin Creek) is most intriguing. I have detailed information on the disposition of Blake BAKER's property

in this area but no information as to how he acquired some of it in the first place. I know that he acquired 418 acres in an equity deed in 1856, but he had about 355 acres more for which there are no Wake County land records indicating that he ever acquired such property. I have been speculating that he acquired the property in 1829 as a dowery of his first wife, Frances UPCHURCH, though it now seems that she already owned the property at the time of her marriage to Blake BAKER. This is further evidence for Frances UPCHURCH nee GAY rather than nee UPCHURCH. All of Blake BAKER's real estate, by the way, was in Wake County, on the south side of Moccasin Creek.

This is beginning to look more and more like a staff study that I would have done 20 years ago in Command and General Staff College!

Sorry to be so late in responding. In my retirement, I'm working harder than I did when I was in uniform, only enjoying it more! But it has all been complicated by some rather serious medical problems. Four months after my mother passed away, I suffered a heart attack and underwent emergency by-pass surgery at the National Naval Medical Center. Four months into the recovery from that I developed recurrent melanoma and underwent surgery to remove all of the lymph nodes from my left axilla. There was evidence that the surgeons did not get there fast enough, so I had to get radiation therapy to the region. However, since the accepted treatment for this thing is to do nothing but wait for it to come back, I took a more aggressive approach and went hunting for some studies. Thanks to an old friend and former colleague from the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research, I am now on an experimenal treatment protocol being managed out of Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. So far, I'm one year out with no recurrence, but, believe me, one in this situation soon becomes a raving hypochondriac! Between cardiology at Navy Medical and oncology at Walter Reed, I'm wearing down a track between the 2 medical centers!

The good news is that Jan underwent successful neurosurgery for her trigeminal neuralgia and is reducing her medications significantly. Oldest son Blake graduated in physics from James Madison University and joined the Peace Corps. He's starting his third year in Zimbabwe. Youngest son Alex graduates (Mechanical Engineering) next week from McGill University in Montreal. He'll be returning home and job hunting.

In that letter you also asked about the Richard S. BAKER's marriange. He was my great grandfather. He married Margaret ("Bettie") Baker (different BAKER family, but they were probably cousins if you go back far enough). She was the daughter of William J. ALA BAKER (b. ca 1805, d. 23 March 1855; I don't have anything further on his ancestry) and △ Elizabeth HOPKINS (b. ca 1805, m. 21 November 1831, d. ?), who was the daughter of A+D William HOPKINS (b. ?, d. ?) and Jane STRICKLAND (b. ?, m. ca 16 January 1801, d. ca ≥ 1859), who was the daughter of Mathew [sic] STRICKLAND (b. ?, d. ca 1829 in Franklin Co., NC) and Mary PERRY (b. ?, m. ca 5 January 1774 in Bute Co., NC, d. ?). The attached printout from my "Family Tree Maker" program gives you the descendents of Blake BAKER, Richard S. BAKER's father.

Dear Mr. Upchurch:

Your letter of 7 January, 1989 beat me to the draw. I had been informed of you and the <u>Upchurch Bulletin</u> last fall by our mutual cousin, Fritz McDuffie of Oak Ridge, TN, and have been meaning to write to you ever since. Before doing that, however, I felt obliged to spend a few weekends in the Library of Congress reviewing past issues of the <u>Bulletin</u>. I had not heard of this publication before, but found it fascinating reading. To be quite truthful, I have not spent very much time on the UPCHURCH side of my family until now. Most of my on-again, off-again researches have concentrated on the BAKER family. I was stimulated first by Fritz McDuffie, and then the <u>Bulletin</u>, to broaden my horizons to the UPCHURCH/PHILLIPS/RAY lines. In the process I have been developing family group sheets on various family members. Many of these have rather glaring holes and gaps in them so it will be some time before I can provide a complete set of data. The attached outlines are only those basic to my ancestry.

I (Willis Alton REID, Jr.) was born in Raleigh, NC (Rex Hospital to be exact) 15 Sep 1941. My parents are Willis Alton REID of Nash Co. (Whitakers/Red Oak area) and Mary Margaret (BAKER) REID of Wake Co. (Moccasin Creek area in Little River District). I attended Needham B. Broughton High School (Class of '59), North Carolina State College (B.S. in Zoology, 1963), the University of Kansas (M.A. in Zoology/Parasitology, 1965), and North Carolina State University (Ph.D. in Zoology/Parasitology, 1970). I entered active duty in the U.S. Army Medical Service Corps in 1965 and have now served 23 1/2 years of continuous commissioned service. I married Janet Lancaster WARNER (of Palm Beach, FL, but born in Boston, MA) 24 April 1966. She has a B.S. from Duke University (1966) and M.S. (1969) and Ph.D (1978) in Zoology from North Carolina State University. She was born 18 Oct 1944. We have two sons: Blake Dietrich REID, born 27 July 1971 in Rex Hospital, Raleigh, NC and Alexander Nathan REID, born 19 Sep 1974 at Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington, DC. The names "Blake" and "Nathan" have family significance on my side of the family, as you will see below. My parents had only one other child, my sister Margaret ("Margie") Beatrice REID, born 21 July 1938 in Raleigh, NC. She is unmarried, and elementary school teacher in Raleigh, NC (Ravenscroft School).

My Great great grandfather was the Blake BAKER who married Frances UPCHURCH (Wake Co. marriage bond posted 16 Nov 1829). I would like to make a case for her being a "lost" daughter of Jubal UPCHURCH. In a 1986 issue of the Upchurch Bulletin [7(1):13-21] you stated that "there was another daughter of Jubal Upchurch, but her name has not been learned. We speculate that she married as a young woman and lived in the Franklin Co., NC area and had children." You go further, on page 21, to list her as "VI. Unknown daughter". According to rough calculations from the 1830 Franklin Co. census, Frances

UPCHURCH was born between 1800 and 1810 (this assumes that she was the free white female between 20 and 30 years old in the household of Blake BAKER). This age would put her in the same contemporary age group as the other children of Jubal UPCHURCH which you listed. In the 1840 Wake Co. Census, there were two females 30-40 years old in Blake BAKER's household. Secondly, I note that the "Unknown Daughter's" sister, Charlotte UPCHURCH, married a John SANDERS in 1833 and that in 1829 an Edwin SANDERS was the bondsman for the marriage bond of Blake BAKER and Frances UPCHURCH. They (Blake and Frances) named a son (my great grandfather) Richard Sanders BAKER. It is apparent that the SANDERS family was close to the BAKER and UPCHURCH families. Thirdly, the name "Richard" is not a common given name in the BAKER family; it is (as you well know) the basic given name in the UPCHURCH. It is likely that Frances UPCHURCH had a hand in naming her son for an UPCHURCH family member. I have been unable to find any other leads to the parentage of Frances UPCHURCH. that the marriage bond was posted in Wake Co., instead of Franklin Co., is something of a sticking point, since there is no indication that the Jubal UPCHURCH family were ever Wake Co. residents. However, considering the back and forth movement of families in the Moccasin Creek area across the county line, I am becoming more inclined to treat the region almost as an independent jurisdiction in itself. The Blake BAKER-Frances UPCHURCH marriage was number 30 on your list of UPCHURCH marriages in the Upchurch Bulletin 4(4):149-151 (1983). For the moment, I am assuming that Frances UPCHURCH was the daughter of Jubal UPCHURCH. If you have more information on this, I would certainly appreciate it.


Frances (UPCHURCH) BAKER apparently died between 1840 and 1846, since she is not listed in the Blake BAKER household in 1850, and Blake BAKER remarried Margaret BUNN in 1846. Blake BAKER had a total of 12 children, but only 5 of them (the children of Frances UPCHURCH BAKER) are UPCHURCH descendants. Two of these (Richard Sanders BAKER and Thomas H. BAKER) were Confederate soldiers in Company K, 24th North Carolina Regiment. Thomas H. BAKER was wounded "gunshot with ilium fracture" at Sailors Creek, VA, captured, and later died at Fort McHenry Post Hospital (Baltimore, MD). Richard Sanders BAKER was wounded "miniball in the arm" at the Battle of Seven Pines, was captured at Petersburg late in the war, and was released at Fort Deleware. He enlisted as a 3rd Lieutenant and came home a Captain. I have his original commissioning paper when the unit was first formed as the "Poplar Spring Greys".

My grandmother's (Beatrice Gertrude PHILLIPS BAKER) side of the family is replete with UPCHURCHs. It was not until I started looking into this that I discovered that my grandmother and my grandfather (Thomas Yates BAKER) were actually third cousins (if the Frances UPCHURCH ancestry case mentioned above holds up). Her parents (William Nathan PHILLIPS and Mary Susan RAY) were also cousins. I will not go into complete narratives of each of these families as they are well outlined on the attached sheets. In short it appears that I am descended from Richard UPCHURCH (II) by three different lines:

1. via Frances UPCHURCH and Blake BAKER (if my postulate about Frances UPCHURCH's father holds water); 2. via Elizabeth Thany UPCHURCH and John PHILLIPS; 3. via Gilly UPCHURCH and James RAY. There may be a forth descendancy line if Susan PEARCE (the first wife of William Kearney PHILLIPS) is an UPCHURCH. I have seen this stated but have not seen any source of that information. Can you enlighten me any more on this?

Beatrice Gertrude PHILLIPS' mother was Mary Susan RAY, daughter of Albert Haywood RAY and Jacqueline Summerlin BRYANT, grand daughter of James RAY and Gilly UPCHURCH. I knew her as "Grandma Susan". She married William Nathan PHILLIPS when she was only 17 and they had 5 children (see attached sheet). I remember only one of these (other than my grandmother) - "Uncle





#### 1994 SEASON'S GREETINGS FROM THE REIDS



Dear Friends,

How time flies! It seems like only last month that we were sending our last year's greetings. Now it's time to do it again and to fill you in on the comings and goings over the past year.

Willis officially retired in 1993, but he's working just as hard now (and having more fun) then he did when he had to put on a uniform every day. He is consulting under a contract from the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research to help them manage their technology transfer program. The nice part about it is that he does most of the work at home and pretty much sets his own work schedule (no calls before 9:00 am, please). He does, however, get over to WRAIR regularly and, through his consulting work, maintains contacts with all of his good friends there and up at Fort Detrick. The home office is now equipped with the separate phone line for the FAX machine (301-493-4169), which is active 24 hours a day, and early in the year we went onto CompuServe for e-mail. Our e-mail address is: 74024.1511@compuserve.com.

Willis takes off about one week per month to go down to Raleigh and take care of some of his mother's affairs. She is not well and this is an opportunity for Willis to look after things around her house. During these trips, he usually finds an opportunity to pick up some good NC barbecue for the freezer, and, on the return trip, to swing by our place in Floyd County, Virginia. Roger Barber, who is more than just a tenant on the property, is doing a fantastic job in helping us to improve the place, and he has supervised some major renovation and reconstruction efforts, including a whole three room addition to the cabin. Roger also blessed us with the newest addition to our family - the pick of the litter from his dog Oprah's pups. "Sean", now six months old and 33 pounds, is a cross between Australian Shepherd and Border Collie (the vet wrote "Aussie Collie" on his records), and is a real people-dog, frisky but even tempered. Recently he had a life experience - he caught the frisbee in mid-air! He sits and fetches on command; now if we could only get him to come. He desperately wants to be friends with "E-T" the cat, but he (E-T) is having nothing to do with this upstart intruder, and is perfecting his most ferocious hissing, swatting, and dog avoidance

techniques. Sean learned early to keep out of range of those claws.

Jan is continuing her work on copepod taxonomy as a Resident Research Associate at the Smithsonian's Museum of Natural History, and this year she assumed her new duties as the President of the Biological Society of Washington. She is grateful to be more or less back to a normal routine after a long siege of trigeminal neuralgia in the spring. She has been spending a lot of time at the dentist having many old metallic (and electroconductive) fillings replaced, a new treatment which seems to be helping. She is grateful to Willis, Blake and Alex for so much cooking, housework and taxiing this summer,

to E-T for keeping her company in bed, and more recently to Sean for forcing her outside on those long, healthy early morning walks. She has lost 15 pounds, but she doesn't recommend the method. Willis is doing his best to put weight back on her and he is largely succeeding - he is now the chief cook of the family. Fortunately, though, Jan has been able to get down to the museum on a fairly regular basis, and with the new e-mail address, can communicate with her colleagues all over the world. We are truly hitch-hikers on the Information Highway.

After graduating in Physics from James Madison University last December, Blake came home and waited to hear from the Peace Corps - and waited - and waited - and waited. Finally he heard - Zimbabwe! He left in October, and is now in Harare (the capital) taking his in-country training. In January, he moves down to far southern Zimbabwe, to the Malungudzi Secondary School. It's about 60 km from Beitbridge, on the South African border. There, for 2 years, he will be teaching high school level science and probably math. The whole school has only I teachers, including him. We've had two letters and a phone call from him so far. His Christmas "wish list" included AA batteries, suntan lotion (SPF 8), elephant repellant, razor blades, packets of powdered Gatorade (anything but orange flavor!), colored chalk, film (ASA 200), durable short sleeve shirts, a Venda phrase book, watercolor pens and paper, a solar power pack, and his banjo. One problem he reports is that, although the official language is English, the tribal language in that area is Venda, and it is an unwritten language which fewer than 500 whites speak. That means that there are no dictionaries or phrase books to fall back on, so he's winging it. He would really enjoy mail, but we don't know his address at the school yet. Send any letters or cards to us and we will forward them. In the meantime, over New Years, you will find him white water rafting along 15 miles of the Zambezi River below Victoria Falls (Class 5 rapids!). By the way, Blake isn't really that much shorter than Alex; he just refused to put on shoes for the photo.

While Blake is roughing it in Zimbabwe, Alex is languishing in what must be relative comfort in urban Montreal. He is in his third year of Mechanical Engineering at McGill University and by all reports is doing well (although we hear that math this semester is a killer). This summer, he worked at the Instrumentation Division of the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research. He was fabricating devices, widgets, and gadgets that our WRAIR medical scientists use for their research, and was heard to say once that "This is great. I'm being paid for taking shop." With Alex working regular hours at WRAIR, and Blake working irregular hours as a temp, both of them devoted the summer to putting on the Wildwood Summer Theater's 30th annual musical production, "The Mystery of Edwin Drood". It was Blake's swan song for WST and he produced the play; Alex grew a beard for a chorus part (but with lines). The production was a smash hit. We saw it three times, and we were glad to get reacquainted with the boys afterwards.

We wish you all a happy Christmas and year's-end holiday with home and family.

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

Your letter of 7 January, 1989 beat me to the draw. I had been informed of you and the Upchurch Bulletin last fall by our mutual cousin, Fritz

McDuffie of Oak Ridge, TN, and have been meaning to write to you ever since.

Before doing that, however, I felt obliged to spend a few weekends in the Library of Congress reviewing past issues of the Bulletin. I had not heard of this publication before, but found it fascinating reading. To be quite truthful, I have not spent very much time on the UPCHURCH side of my family until now. Most of my on-again, off-again researches have concentrated on the BAKER family. I was stimulated first by Fritz McDuffie, and then the Bulletin, to broaden my horizons to the UPCHURCH/PHILLIPS/RAY lines. In the process I have been developing family group sheets on various family members. Many of these have rather glaring holes and gaps in them so it will be some time before I can provide a complete set of data. The attached outlines are only those basic to my ancestry.

□ I (Willis Alton REID, Jr.) was born in Raleigh, NC (Rex Hospital to be △ exact) 15 Sep 1941. My parents are Willis Alton REID of Nash Co. △ (Whitakers/Red Oak area) and Mary Margaret (BAKER) REID of Wake Co. (Moccasin Creek area in Little River District). I attended Needham B. - Broughton High School (Class of '59), North Carolina State College (B.S. in Zoology, 1963), the University of Kansas (M.A. in Zoology/Parasitology, - 1965), and North Carolina State University (Ph.D. in Zoology/Parasitology, □ 1970). I entered active duty in the U.S. Army Medical Service Corps in - 1965 and have now served 23 1/2 years of continuous commissioned service. A I married Janet Lancaster WARNER (of Palm Beach, FL, but born in Boston, MA) 24 April 1966. She has a B.S. from Duke University (1966) and M.S. - (1969) and Ph.D (1978) in Zoology from North Carolina State University.  $\square + \triangle$  She was born 18 Oct 1944. A Jefferson Haywood PHILLIPS died in 1958 from a heart attack here in

— Wilhelmia G. PHILLIPS. She died unmarried at Dorothea Dix State Hospital

All of the children went to live with their RATI grandfather, William Kearney PHILLIPS, who lived only a couple of miles away, or from the and he provided for their upbringing and education. My grandmother attended GERTRUDE PHILLIPS - the Oxford (NC) Female Seminary for one year and attended school for a year △ in New Jersey, living with her aunt and uncle, Elizabeth Davis (PHILLIPS) □ +□ and Marshall V. McDUFFIE (the grandparents of Fritz McDUFFIE). I remember her - as an inveterate reader, an educated woman who could actually read Latin! A + A Mary Susan (RAY) PHILLIPS remarried Hugie PATTERSON and you will find her - under his household in the 1900 Wake Co. Census. Actually, her son A + A Jefferson PHILLIPS is listed with them (he is listed as "stepson" to Hugie - PATTERSON) but he may have only been visiting at the time the census taker △ + △ came around. She had three children by her second marriage: Patricia A + D PATTERSON, Mary PATTERSON, and Clyde PATTERSON (I am sorry but I do not have - the vital statistics on these children.) My information is that the PHILLIPS △ +△ family felt that Mary Susan was marrying beneath her station, since Hugie D+\*D PATTERSON was only a tenant farmer, but I haven't found any evidence that she  $\triangle + \triangle$  was actually ostracized for this. She is buried with her 2nd husband in a - small roadside family plot on County Road #2309 near Duke's Lake, in Wake Co.

A You are, of course, familiar with the autobiography of William Kearney PHILLIPS. From reading this alone, one would get the impression that he was - a man of successful but somewhat modest means. That is an understatement! - Among numerous family papers uncovered after my grandparents deaths, are  $\triangle + \triangle$  copies of W. K. PHILLIPS' estate papers, for which my grandfather, T.Y. △ BAKER, was one of three executors. A copy of W. K. PHILLIPS' 1914 will - (written in 1911) is enclosed. You will note that the properties that were - divided among his heirs included: 22 tracts of land in Wake and Franklin - Counties, totaling more than 2,220 acres; 4 lots with houses in Zebulon, NC; 4 lots without houses in Zebulon, NC; and one sale and feed stables. His - cash distributions totaled more than \$23,000 (in 1917 dollars) and the - contents of his safe contained over 70 promissory notes totaling more than - \$40,000 and secured by mortgages, deeds of trust, livestock, etc! (although - many of these were considered "uncollectible")(I am enclosing a copy of A that inventory as well). It appears that Mr. PHILLIPS was not only a farmer - and a merchant; he was the Moccasin Creek Banker, as well!

I am still compiling the PHILLIPS/RAY/UPCHURCH connections to my BAKER

— lines and will be happy to correspond concerning these particular issues. I

— am particularly interested in confirming my postulation relative to the

— ancestry of Frances UPCHURCH and in getting more information about James

— RAY (who married Gilly UPCHURCH), Susan PEARCE (wife of William Kearney

PHILLIPS), and Jacky BRYANT (wife of Albert Haywood RAY). I am afraid,
however, that you will have to bear with me on tardiness in writing. Until
I retire from the Army and have time to go into it full time I am limited to
only occassional visits to the National Archives, Library of Congress etc.
and scattered evenings when I can concentrate for any extended period. My
wife says if I can make money at it she will let me buy an IBM-PC to replace
this little old Kaypro 4; I may take her up on it and go pro. In the meantime,
please find enclosed a check for \$15.00 for my subscription to the Upchurch
Bulletin (1989).
